SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

URGING THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION TO DISSEMINATE INFORMATION TO EDUCATE STUDENTS AND TEACHERS AND TO RAISE AWARENESS ABOUT THE SMOKING EPIDEMIC.

1 WHEREAS, the Keiki Caucus declared addressing electronic 2 smoking devices as one of its biggest priorities for the 2023 and 2024 legislative sessions; and 3 4 WHEREAS, section 8-31-1, Hawaii Administrative Rules, 5 states "[t]he public school system strives to provide its 6 7 students with a safe and secure learning environment, as well as appropriate instruction and school experiences that mutually 8 9 reinforce good personal health and safety practices"; and 10 11 WHEREAS, Chapter 8-31, Hawaii Administrative Rules, is the 12 Board of Education's "Tobacco Free School System" policy; and 13 14 WHEREAS, the Board of Education provides for counseling and 15 rehabilitation assistance to employees who wish to stop smoking; and 16 17 18 WHEREAS, section 302A-102, Hawaii Revised Statutes, relating to smoking at public schools, does not prohibit vapes 19 20 or "tobacco products" at public schools, but only prohibits "tobacco"; and 21 22 23 WHEREAS, vapes are evolved "tobacco products" derived from nicotine, the main psychoactive ingredient in tobacco; and 24 25 26 WHEREAS, vapes, vaporizers, vape pens, hookah pens, electronic cigarettes, e-cigars, and e-pipes are some of the 27 many terms used to describe electronic "tobacco product" 28 nicotine delivery systems; and 29 30 WHEREAS, Hawaii Department of Health data shows that 31 32 forty-eight percent of high school students and thirty-one

1 percent of middle school students have tried using an 2 e-cigarette; and 3 WHEREAS, the Hawaii Department of Health Youth Risk Survey 4 of 2009-2017 shows that since 2015, when tobacco started to 5 evolve into vapes or "tobacco products", there was a significant 6 resurgence in student smokers; and 7 8 9 WHEREAS, Hawaii's public schools consider vapes and "tobacco products" to be contraband, and students may be 10 suspended or expelled for possessing them on campus; and 11 12 WHEREAS, since smoking is a toxic and addictive behavior, 13 14 student smokers should be counseled and not punished; and 15 WHEREAS, during the process of debating priorities, the 16 Hawaii Children and Youth Summit 2022 students stated that the 17 participants desire is to create middle school and high school 18 programs with peer-to-peer support, therapy, and counseling to 19 20 emphasize the consequences of smoking while increasing awareness 21 about health education; now, therefore, 22 23 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2024, the 24 House of Representatives concurring, that the Department of 25 Education is urged to disseminate information to educate 26 students and teachers and to raise awareness about the smoking 27 28 epidemic; and 29 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Education is 30 urged to consider that punishment such as suspension and 31 expulsion are not effective or efficient safeguards against 32 33 smoking; and 34 35 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that disciplinary actions for smoking should include a conference with an administrator and 36 37 parent or legal guardian and counseling on tobacco prevention 38 and education about the adverse health effects of smoking among 39 youths; and 40
