SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES TO CONVENE A BABY BONDS WORKING GROUP.

1 2 3	WHEREAS, intergenerational poverty undermines social and economic wellness; and
4 5 6 7 8	WHEREAS, according to the 2009 paper "Childhood and Intergenerational Poverty: The Long-Term Consequences of Growing up Poor" by Robert L. Wagmiller, Jr., and Robert M. Adelman, "individuals who grow up in poor families are much more likely to be poor in early adulthood"; and
9 10 11	WHEREAS, Hawaii's high cost of living makes overcoming intergenerational poverty difficult for working families; and
12 13 14 15 16	WHEREAS, according to the National Low Income Housing Coalition's 2023 Out of Reach study, a minimum wage employee must work one hundred seven hours per week to afford a one- bedroom rental home at fair market rent in Hawaii; and
17 18 19 20	WHEREAS, the same study also found that a worker must earn \$41.83 per hour to afford a two-bedroom rental unit without being cost burdened; and
21 22 23 24	WHEREAS, the Massachusetts Institute of Technology's living wage calculator estimates a livable wage for a Hawaii resident who is a single adult and has no children to be \$27.33 per hour
25 26 27	and a single adult with one child to be \$51.83 per hour; and WHEREAS, longstanding systemic inequality and its continued
28 29 30	effect on government policy has created unacceptable outcomes across the spectrum of child well-being for children in communities of color, including but not limited to Native

Hawaiian and other Pacific Islander, Filipino, Black, Hispanic, 1 2 Asian, and immigrant households; and 3 WHEREAS, the COVID-19 pandemic and its economic fallout 4 further exacerbated entrenched disparities for children of color 5 and their families; and 6 7 8 WHEREAS, in 2021, Connecticut became the first state to 9 pass an initiative that invests directly in children born into poverty known as "baby bonds"; and 10 11 12 WHEREAS, the program sets aside funds for each baby born in Connecticut whose birth is covered by Medicaid, with those funds 13 14 to be held, managed, and invested by the Connecticut Office of 15 the Treasurer; and 16 WHEREAS, when participating children reach adulthood, they 17 are eligible to claim funds to be used for buying a home, paying 18 for higher education or job training, starting a business, or 19 20 saving for retirement; and 21 22 WHEREAS, Connecticut's baby bonds program is designed to narrow the wealth gap and spur long-term economic growth for 23 24 Connecticut's families and economy; and 25 26 WHEREAS, a baby bonds program could significantly alleviate 27 intergenerational poverty in Hawaii; now, therefore, 28 29 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2024, the 30 31 House of Representatives concurring, that the Department of Human Services is requested to convene a working group to 32 consider the creation of a baby bonds program for Hawaii; and 33 34 35 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the working group is requested 36 to consist of the following members: 37 The Director of Human Services or the Director's 38 (1)39 designee, to serve as Chairperson of the working 40 group; 41 42 (2) The Director of Taxation or the Director's designee;

working to implement baby bonds programs or reduce 1 2 intergenerational poverty; and 3 4 (4) Perform an analysis of the Connecticut baby bonds 5 program to determine what aspects of the program may be beneficial to incorporate into a baby bonds 6 7 initiative for Hawaii; and 8 9 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the working group is requested to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, 10 including any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later 11 12 than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2025; and 13 14 15 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, Lieutenant 16 Governor, Director of Human Services, Director of Taxation, 17 18 Director of Finance, and Executive Director of the University of 19 Hawaii Economic Research Organization. 20 21 22
