SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

URGING THE DEPARTMENT OF LAW ENFORCEMENT TO DEVELOP AND IMPLEMENT A U VISA CERTIFICATION POLICY.

1 2 3 4 5 6 7	WHEREAS, Congress enacted the Victims of Trafficking and Violence Prevention Act of 2000 to encourage immigrant victims to report crimes and contribute to investigations and prosecutions and support law enforcement efforts to investigate and prosecute crimes committed against immigrant victims by creating the U visa certification policy; and
8 9 10 11 12	WHEREAS, the United States Department of Homeland Security has created the U Visa Law Enforcement Certification Resource Guide to assist local government jurisdictions to create their own U visa certification document; and
12 13 14 15 16	WHEREAS, the Orange County Sheriff-Coroner Department of the State of California has already implemented a U visa certification policy under Policy 609; and
17 18 19 20	WHEREAS, the U visa is an immigration benefit for immigrant victims of certain crimes who will assist, are currently assisting, or have previously assisted law enforcement in the investigation or prosecution of a crime; and
21 22 23 24 25 26	WHEREAS, the U visa provides eligible immigrant victims with nonimmigrant status to temporarily remain in the United States while assisting law enforcement, allowing these individuals to legally remain and work in the United States; and
20 27 28 29 30	WHEREAS, immigrant victims who do not have legal immigration status may be reluctant to help in the investigation or prosecution of criminal activity for fear of removal from the United States; and



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1 WHEREAS, immigrants, especially women and children, can be 2 3 particularly vulnerable to crimes like human trafficking, domestic violence, sexual assault, and other types of abuse; and 4 5 6 WHEREAS, any eligible immigrant victim may apply for a U visa, which must first be certified by a qualifying federal, 7 8 State, or certifying agency, such as the Department of Law 9 Enforcement, before being reviewed and acted upon by the United 10 States Citizenship and Immigration Services; and 11 12 WHEREAS, while the certifying law enforcement agency does 13 not have the authority to grant or guarantee a U visa, this step 14 is necessary for a U visa, as the certification verifies that a 15 qualifying criminal activity occurred and that the victim was helpful or will be helpful in the investigation or prosecution 16 17 of the qualifying crime; and 18 19 WHEREAS, the State currently does not have a U visa 20 certification policy in place; and 21 22 WHEREAS, the State would benefit from having a U visa 23 certification policy to ensure that victims of certain crimes have a safe opportunity to report these crimes without fear of 24 deportation; now, therefore, 25 26 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-second 27 28 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2024, the 29 House of Representatives concurring, that the Department of Law 30 Enforcement is urged to develop and implement a U visa certification policy; and 31 32 33 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Law Enforcement is requested to submit: 34 35 36 (1)An interim report on the development of a U visa 37 certification policy, including any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later than twenty 38 days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 39 2025; and 40 41



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1	(2) A final report on the implementation of the U visa
2	policy, including any proposed legislation, to the
3	Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the
4	convening of the Regular Session of 2026; and
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6	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this
7	Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Governor and
8	Director of Law Enforcement.
