## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE BOARD OF EDUCATION, IN PARTNERSHIP WITH THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION, TO PRODUCE A PLAN FOR ADHERING TO SCHOOL COUNSELOR BEST PRACTICES.

WHEREAS, school counselors play a critical role in ensuring 1 students' academic, career, social, and emotional development 2 and in promoting equity and access to opportunities and 3 educational experiences for all students; and 4 5 WHEREAS, school counselors support students' postsecondary 6 access and success by helping them navigate the college 7 admissions process, explore career opportunities, and develop 8 essential life skills; and 9 10 WHEREAS, school counselors also provide preventative and 11 responsive services, such as individual student planning and 12 systems support, to help students overcome barriers that may 13 impede their academic and postsecondary success; and 14 15 WHEREAS, just half of Hawaii public school graduates in the 16 2022-2023 school year enrolled in a postsecondary education 17 institution in the fall after graduation; and 18 19 WHEREAS, students are at risk of the "summer melt" 20 phenomenon, whereby about ten to twenty percent of high school 21 graduates who apply and are accepted to college - most of which 22 are low-income - choose not to attend; and 23 24 WHEREAS, the progression of students from high school to 25 26 postsecondary education and career readiness requires year-round support, including during the summer months when important 27 transitions occur; and 28 29



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WHEREAS, having a twelve-month school counselor can ensure 1 continuity of support for students, particularly for those who 2 may not have access to such support outside of school; and 3 4 WHEREAS, grant-funded summer transition programs through 5 local organizations, such as Hawaii P-20, have served more than 6 7 four thousand students between 2020 and 2023, helping them access over \$3,500,000 in scholarships; and 8 9 10 WHEREAS, students also benefit from more individualized attention from their school counselors; and 11 12 WHEREAS, the American School Counselor Association (ASCA) 13 recommends a student-to-school counselor ratio of two-hundred-14 15 to-one to effectively address the comprehensive needs of all students, yet just sixty-two percent of Hawaii public middle and 16 17 high schools meet this recommendation; and 18 19 WHEREAS, the ASCA recommends that a minimum of eighty percent of a school counselor's time should be spent in direct 20 21 and indirect student services, yet Hawaii public middle and high school counselors report only being able to spend seventy-three 22 percent of their time on these services; and 23 24 25 WHEREAS, the ASCA provides a clear definition of the 26 appropriate activities that should be the focus of counselors to 27 maximize impact for students, yet Hawaii public intermediate, middle, and high school counselors report having a more clearly 28 29 defined job description as one of their top needs; now, 30 therefore, 31 32 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2024, the 33 House of Representatives concurring, that the Board of 34 35 Education, in partnership with the Department of Education, is requested to produce a plan for adhering to school counselor 36 best practices; and 37 38 39 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in preparing the plan, the 40 Board of Education is requested to include the following: 41



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- (1) How the Department of Education can ensure that every 1 2 public high school in the State can be staffed with at least one full-time, twelve-month school counselor, in 3 accordance with the ASCA's recommended student-to-4 counselor ratio; 5 6 How the Department of Education can ensure that the (2) 7 8 role and job descriptions of school counselors align with the ASCA's role statement, emphasizing their role 9 in supporting students' postsecondary access and 10 success; 11 12 (3) How the Department of Education can provide school 13 counselors with the necessary resources and training 14 to effectively support students in their academic, 15 16 career, social, and emotional development; 17 (4) How the Department of Education can encourage school 18 administrators to create supportive environments that 19 allow school counselors to focus on direct and 20 indirect services to students, rather than 21 administrative tasks; and 22 23 How the Department of Education can support the (5) 24 development and implementation of comprehensive school 25 counseling programs that address the needs of all 26 27 students; and 28 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board of Education is 29 30 requested to submit its plan, including any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior 31 to the convening of the Regular Session of 2025; and 32 33 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 34 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Chairperson of the 35 Board of Education, Superintendent of Education, and President 36 37 of the University of Hawaii System.
