SENATE RESOLUTION

URGING THE HAWAII SISTER-STATE COMMITTEE TO RECOMMEND THE INITIATION OF A SISTER-STATE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN HAWAII AND THE SPANISH PROVINCE OF THE BALEARIC ISLANDS.

WHEREAS, Hawaii's relations with sister-states and 1 2 provinces are governed by chapter 229, Hawaii Revised Statutes; 3 and 4 5 WHEREAS, pursuant to section 229-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, the initiation of a sister-state relationship between 6 Hawaii and another state or province follows an evaluation and 7 recommendation by the Hawaii Sister-State Committee, which then 8 forwards its recommendation to the Legislature for its 9 consideration; and 10 11 WHEREAS, the Legislature, if it so chooses, implements the 12 sister-state or province relationship by either adopting a 13 concurrent resolution or enacting a session law for that 14 purpose; and 15 16 WHEREAS, the province of the Balearic Islands, also known 17 as Baleares, is comparable to Hawaii in many ways: with a 18 19 population of 1,200,000 compared to Hawaii's 1,400,000; inhabiting four islands governed by four island councils, as 20 21 compared to Hawaii's seven inhabited islands governed by four councils; whose principal economic sector is the visitor 22 industry from which gross annual revenues are approximately 23 \$18,000,000,000 which sum is almost identical to the value of 24 annual visitor activity in Hawaii, and which industry employs 25 roughly 171,000 people in Baleares compared to the two hundred 26 sixteen thousand employed in the industry in Hawaii; and 27 28 WHEREAS, both island chains have long had a reputation as 29 the leading beach island visitor destination in their respective 30 non-competing regions--Hawaii in the Pacific, Baleares in the 31 32 Mediterranean--as well as a reputation as leading visitor industry innovators; and 33 34

WHEREAS, Hawaii and Baleares face many of the same issues: 1 an over-reliance on tourism as the main economic driver; a large 2 influx over the last sixty years of new residents from the 3 mainland and elsewhere sparking a massive development boom that 4 has impacted local culture; mounting local concerns about over-5 tourism; a major affordable housing deficit that has led to 6 workforce shortages; environmental degradation and growing 7 threats of devastating wildfires; concerns about water supplies; 8 and a reliance on imports for approximately ninety percent of 9 10 the food supply, amongst many other similarities; and

WHEREAS, Baleares has been experimenting in recent years 12 with some of the same policies that have been or are currently 13 being debated in Hawaii including an emphasis on 'quality' 14 tourism to realize higher revenues from fewer visitors; 15 restricting short term visitor rentals; imposing a visitor eco-16 tax; adopting and promoting an industry sustainability pledge; 17 imposing development restrictions on the principal island's most 18 19 admired coast, the Costa Nord or North Shore; expanding use of the once-suppressed local language; expanding rail and bus mass 20 transit, bike lanes, pedestrianization, and other tools to 21 reduce reliance on automobiles; and stimulating rebirth of local 22 food-farming, amongst many other similarities; and 23

WHEREAS, the combination of similar experiences on opposite sides of the world already makes Hawaii and Baleares twins in many ways, affording a valuable opportunity to learn from each other about how to confront the most pressing issues of our times; now, therefore,

31 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-second 32 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2024, 33 that the Hawaii Sister-State Committee is urged to recommend the 34 initiation of a sister-state relationship between Hawaii and the 35 province of Baleares; and 36
