## SENATE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES TO CONVENE A BABY BONDS WORKING GROUP.

1 2 3	WHEREAS, intergenerational poverty undermines social and economic wellness; and
4 5 6 7 8 9	WHEREAS, according to the 2009 paper "Childhood and Intergenerational Poverty: The Long-Term Consequences of Growing up Poor" by Robert L. Wagmiller, Jr., and Robert M. Adelman, "individuals who grow up in poor families are much more likely to be poor in early adulthood"; and
10 11 12	WHEREAS, Hawaii's high cost of living makes overcoming intergenerational poverty difficult for working families; and
12 13 14 15 16 17	WHEREAS, according to the National Low Income Housing Coalition's 2023 Out of Reach study, a minimum wage employee must work one hundred seven hours per week to afford a one- bedroom rental home at fair market rent in Hawaii; and
17 18 19 20 21	WHEREAS, the same study also found that a worker must earn \$41.83 per hour to afford a two-bedroom rental unit without being cost burdened; and
22 23 24 25 26	WHEREAS, the Massachusetts Institute of Technology's living wage calculator estimates a livable wage for a Hawaii resident who is a single adult and has no children to be \$27.33 per hour and a single adult with one child to be \$51.83 per hour; and
27 28 29 30 31 32 33	WHEREAS, longstanding systemic inequality and its continued effect on government policy has created unacceptable outcomes across the spectrum of child well-being for children in communities of color, including but not limited to Native Hawaiian and other Pacific Islander, Filipino, Black, Hispanic, Asian, and immigrant households; and

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WHEREAS, the COVID-19 pandemic and its economic fallout 1 2 further exacerbated entrenched disparities for children of color 3 and their families; and 4 WHEREAS, in 2021, Connecticut became the first state to 5 6 pass an initiative that invests directly in children born into 7 poverty known as "baby bonds"; and 8 9 WHEREAS, the program sets aside funds for each baby born in Connecticut whose birth is covered by Medicaid, with those funds 10 to be held, managed, and invested by the Connecticut Office of 11 12 the Treasurer; and 13 WHEREAS, when participating children reach adulthood, they 14 are eligible to claim funds to be used for buying a home, paying 15 for higher education or job training, starting a business, or 16 17 saving for retirement; and 18 19 WHEREAS, Connecticut's baby bonds program is designed to narrow the wealth gap and spur long-term economic growth for 20 21 Connecticut's families and economy; and 22 23 WHEREAS, a baby bonds program could significantly alleviate 24 intergenerational poverty in Hawaii; now, therefore, 25 26 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-second 27 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2024, that the Department of Human Services is requested to convene a 28 29 working group to consider the creation of a baby bonds program 30 for Hawaii; and 31 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the working group is requested 32 33 to consist of the following members: 34 The Director of Human Services or the Director's 35 (1)designee, to serve as Chairperson of the working 36 37 group; 38 39 (2) The Director of Taxation or the Director's designee; 40 The Director of Finance or the Director's designee; 41 (3) 42

11 12 13 14	(7)	One representative from a nonprofit public interest organization specializing in public health, as invited by the Chairperson;
15 16 17 18 19	(8)	One representative from a nonprofit, public interest organization specializing in anti-poverty policies for low-income individuals, as invited by the Chairperson;
20 21 22	(9)	One representative from a nonprofit public interest organization specializing in advocacy for children, as invited by the Chairperson; and
23 24 25 26	(10)	Other relevant stakeholders as recommended by the working group and invited by the Chairperson; and
27 28 29	BE I' to:	T FURTHER RESOLVED that the working group is requested
30 31 32	(1)	Develop recommendations for a baby bonds program that reduces intergenerational poverty and wealth inequality in the State;
33 34 35 36	(2)	Suggest eligibility criteria for a baby bonds program operated by the State;
37 38 39 40 41	(3)	Coordinate with other stakeholders, agencies, and programs within and outside of the State that are working to implement baby bonds programs or reduce intergenerational poverty; and

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1 (4) Perform an analysis of the Connecticut baby bonds program to determine what aspects of the program may 2 3 be beneficial to incorporate into a baby bonds initiative for Hawaii; and 4 5 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the working group is requested 6 to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, 7 including any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later 8 9 than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session 10 of 2025; and 11 12 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 13 Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Director of Human Services, Director of Taxation, Director of 14 15 Finance, and Executive Director of the University of Hawaii Economic Research Organization. 16 17 18 EAHL 19 OFFERED BY
