RELATING TO MENTAL HEALTH TREATMENT.
Authorizes, and establishes a regulatory framework for, the
administration of psilocybin for therapeutic use.

<u>HB 1566</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO CONSUMER HEALTH DATA. Establishes requirements, including additional disclosures and consumer consent regarding the collection, sharing, and use of consumer health data information. Establishes rights for consumers regarding their health data, including the right to have health data deleted. Prohibits the sale of consumer health data without a consumer's signed valid authorization. Prohibits the erection of a geofence around health care centers.	JHA/HLT
<u>HB 1571</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO FIRST RESPONDERS. Requires the State to share in the cost of county first responder personnel fulfilling state-imposed new mandates or increases in the level of service under existing programs.	JHA/HLT, FIN
<u>HB 1596</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES. Exempts drug paraphernalia for marijuana from certain penalties under the Uniform Controlled Substances Act. Makes the possession of less than 1 ounce of recreational marijuana a nonjailable violation punishable by a fine of \$25.	JHA, FIN
<u>HB 1595</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO EXPUNGEMENT. Creates a state-initiated process to expunge records of arrests and convictions pursuant to section 712-1249, Hawaii Revised Statutes, at no cost to the record holder. Requires the Hawaii Criminal Justice Data Center to submit biannual reports to the legislature until all eligible records are expunged.	JHA
<u>HB 1663</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO EXPUNGEMENT OF CRIMINAL RECORDS. Expands eligibility for, and automates, the expungement of conviction records if certain criteria are met. Beginning 12/1/2026, requires the Attorney General to issue automatic expungement orders and the Judiciary to seal or remove information from publicly accessible databases.	JHA
<u>HB 2513</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO EXPUNGEMENT. Allows persons convicted of certain criminal violations to apply to the court for an expungement order under certain circumstances.	JHA
<u>HB 1806</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO THE PROCEDURE FOR TAX APPEALS. Removes language specifying that an appeal from the Tax Appeal Court be filed with the Tax Appeal Court. Allows an appeal from the Tax Appeal Court to be filed within thirty days of entry of a final judgment.	JHA, FIN
<u>HB 2485</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO STATE TAX ADMINISTRATION. Eliminates an obsolete fee for a certified copy of a tax clearance. Adds a penalty for failure to comply with reporting requirements under general excise tax law and transient accommodations tax law for collection of rent by a third party. Raises the unfair competition penalty under general excise tax law to adjust for inflation.	JHA, FIN
<u>HB 2486</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO TAX ENFORCEMENT. Authorizes the Department of Taxation to serve administrative subpoenas outside the State.	JHA, FIN



<u>HB 2487</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO TAX ENFORCEMENT. Provides deadlines for taxpayers under audit to comply with demands to produce documents and evidence. Authorizes the tax appeal court to preclude documents or information not produced pursuant to a demand from being introduced in evidence in a tax appeal or action under section 40-35 unless the failure was due to reasonable cause.	JHA, FIN
<u>HB 2488</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO THE TAXATION BOARD OF REVIEW. Amends the minimum qualifications for the Chairperson of the Taxation Board of Review.	JHA, FIN
<u>HB 1805</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO THE PROCEDURE FOR PAYMENT UNDER PROTEST LAWSUITS. Allows for the interest earned on payments under protest in the litigated claims fund to be paid in nontaxation cases if the claimant prevails. Establishes a procedure for the disposition of moneys and refiling of actions when a payment under protest suit is filed prematurely.	JHA, FIN
<u>HB 1942</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO CORPORATIONS. Permits real property assets of a dissolved corporation to escheat to the State if a creditor, claimant, or shareholder of the corporation cannot be found; real property taxes and any state tax liens have remained unpaid for five years; and the State makes a showing that attempts to locate creditors, claimants, and shareholders of the dissolved corporation have been unsuccessful.	JHA, FIN
