H.B. 1578, H.D. 2, S.D. 1 RELATING TO TRANSPORATION

Senate Committee on Judiciary

The Hawaii Department of Transportation (HDOT) **supports** H.B. 1578, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, which permits a shipping container chassis that holds a valid out-of-state certificate of vehicle registration to obtain a certificate of safety inspection and makes an out-of-state registration for a shipping container chassis valid in the State until its expiration in the other state for one year after a safety inspection.

Shipping container chassis are a critical part in moving container cargo out of ports and to final destinations. Due to the nature of intermodal equipment, shipping container chassis are frequently moved from port to port - and state to state. Most states in the United States recognize the intermodal and interstate nature of shipping container chassis and recognizes out-of-state license plates and registrations.

This bill supports efficient cargo operations, and the efficiency may reduce the costs of transporting goods.

Matson Navigation Company, Inc. (Matson) strongly supports HB1578, HD2, SD1 which allows shipping container chassis with out-of-state certificates of vehicle registration to obtain a certificate of safety inspection and allows for the out-of-state registration to be valid in the State of Hawaii for one year after the vehicle safety inspection is completed.

It is estimated that over 90 percent Hawaii's imported goods pass through our commercial harbors, including consumer goods, motor vehicles, construction materials, and fuel. Almost every other state in the United States recognizes the intermodal, interstate nature of shipping container chassis and recognizes out-of-state license plates and registrations.
