Aloha Chair Gates, Vice-Chair Kahaloa, and Members of the Committee:

I am Brian Miyamoto, Executive Director of the Hawai'i Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,800 farm family members statewide and serves as Hawai'i's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic, and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

The Hawai'i Farm Bureau provides comments on HB 2129, which includes singleingredient products as a purchasing option for certain state departments and entities to fulfill their local food purchasing requirements and defines "single-ingredient product".

HFB strongly supports the increased use of locally grown agricultural products, fruits, vegetables, meats, dairy, and poultry products in our state institutions and appreciates the Legislature's support of the Farm to State program within Act 176 (SLH 2021).

We believe that policies, investments, and resources that support agriculture are necessary to ensure that Hawai i's farmers and ranchers can supply the produce and food products to meet the goals established in Act 176 SLH and this measure.

We are concerned with the inclusion of single-ingredient products, as defined on Page 6, Line 4, in HB 2129

"Single-ingredient product" means a product that is primarily made up of one main ingredient, even if the product undergoes value-added processes, and is one hundred percent grown, raised, manufactured, or produced in Hawai'i.

Does a product that is one hundred percent manufactured in Hawai'i, with no local agricultural ingredient, qualify as a local food purchase?
