- 2 **Department Position:** The Department supports the intent of this measure and provides
- 3 comments.
- 4 **Department Testimony:** The Alcohol and Drug Abuse Division (ADAD) provides the
- 5 following testimony on behalf of the Department.
- 6 The measure amends HRS Chapter 329E to permit law enforcement officers to carry an opioid
- 7 antagonist while on-duty and are authorized to administer an opioid antagonist to an individual
- 8 experiencing an opioid-related drug overdose. The bill requires county general revenues or
- 9 opioid litigation proceeds be used by the respective counties to purchase opioid antagonist to be
- used by the law enforcement officers. It amends the requirement for the Department to educate
- and train on drug overdose response and treatment for law enforcement officers as well as permit
- the Department to require all restaurants and hotels to maintain an inventory of an opioid
- 13 antagonist.

- 1 While the Department supports the use of opioid antagonists to save lives, permitting them to
- 2 carry an opioid antagonist is a matter to be decided by each law enforcement agency.
- 3 The Department also defers to each county on the requirement to purchase opioid antagonists
- 4 used by a law enforcement officer from county general funds or opioid litigation funds.
- 5 The Department already does education and training on drug overdose response. The ADAD
- 6 currently partners with the Hawaii High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (Hawaii HIDTA) to
- 7 implement a current overdose grant from the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), and which
- 8 provides trainings on how to use naloxone, an opioid antagonist. This training is still available to
- 9 law enforcement by request.

Hawai Health & Harm Reduction Center (HHHRC) <u>strongly supports</u> HB 2253, HD 2, which authorizes the Department of Health to require all restaurants and hotel establishments to maintain an inventory of an opioid antagonist.

Last year the Honolulu City Council <u>passed an ordinance</u> requiring bars, nightclubs, and venues serving alcohol to carry nasal naloxone, <u>the first law of its kind in the nation</u>. Within the first week of the law's operation in early January of this year, <u>there was a confirmed overdose reversal at Zippy's restaurant in downtown Honolulu</u>.

HHHRC Executive Director Heather Lusk has been actively involved in the <a href="Hawai" i Opioid Initiative">Hawai</a> i Opioid Initiative. As a founding partner of the Initiative and through its work in administering the state's syringe access program, HHHRC has distributed over 50,000 doses of naloxone and provided training to thousands across Hawai i. HHHRC looks forward to providing whatever training and technical assistance that may be needed to help implement this effort.

HHHRC's mission is to reduce harm, promote health, create wellness, and fight stigma in Hawai'i and the Pacific. We work with many individuals impacted by poverty, housing instability, and other social determinants of health. Many have behavioral health problems, including those related to substance use and mental health conditions, and have also been deeply impacted by trauma related to histories of physical, sexual, and psychological abuse.
