SUBJECT: HB 2427 HD1 – RELATING TO THE PRESCHOOL OPEN DOORS PROGRAM.

DEPARTMENT'S POSITION: The Department of Human Services (DHS) strongly supports this administration measure. This proposal provides DHS with the ability to allow income-eligible families identified as priority populations to continue to benefit from the prioritization selection process for Preschool Open Doors. Importantly, it allows more families to be able to access child care subsidies and school readiness programs more expeditiously.

<u>PURPOSE</u>: The purpose of this bill specifies that the priority of selection for Preschool Open Doors Program participation applies only during the priority application period between February 1 and the start of each program year. Specifies that applications received after the priority application period shall be processed on a first-come, first-served basis. Effective 7/1/3000. (HD1). The measure was amended by:

- (1) Changing the effective date to July 1, 3000, to encourage further discussion; and
- (2) Making technical, nonsubstantive amendments for the purposes of clarity, consistency, and style.

The proposed amendment will preserve the prioritization process for the Preschool Open Doors priority application period and allow the Department to process eligible applications received thereafter on a first-come, first-served basis. Allowing the Department to process applications on a first-come, first-served basis after the priority period closes will allow a continuous enrollment process throughout the program year and allow more children to access a school readiness program without delay.

Currently, prioritizing applications during each application period requires a start and end date for applications to be submitted and received by the Department, time to apply the priority selection criteria to the applicant pool, notifying eligible families, and then initiating the process that eventually results in approving and issuing child care payments. Typically, this results in a 1- to 2-month period after the application period ends before the next application period starts.

Explicitly identifying that the priority selection criteria apply only to the priority application period preserves the prioritization process and will speed up the review and approval of applications received after the priority period ends. This change will allow faster access to Preschool Open Doors program subsidies and increase participation in a school readiness program. More participation in a school readiness program, especially by children of families with low- and moderate-income, will positively impact kindergarten readiness.

These changes will also support the Department's implementation of Act 171, Session Laws of Hawaii (SLH) 2023, which expanded the Preschool Open Doors program to include 3-year-old children, and Act 164, SLH 2023, (the biennium budget bill) that increased appropriations for child care subsidies.

Early Childhood Action Strategy (ECAS) is a statewide cross-sector collaborative designed to improve the system of care for Hawai'i's youngest children and their families. ECAS partners work to align priorities for children prenatal to age eight, streamline services, maximize resources, and improve programs to support our youngest keiki.

ECAS supports passage of HB2427 HD1, which establishes application of selection priorities for program participation in Preschool Open Doors (POD) through the annual POD application period that occurs prior to the program year, and continuous enrollment on a first-come, first-served basis once the program year has started.

There are over 35,000 preschool-age children 3-4 years old in Hawaii. Unfortunately, limited availability and capacity of programs, high costs and unaffordable rates, and insufficent financial supports significantly restrict families' access to preschool opportunities for their keiki. POD provides key financial assistance to enable children to attend preschool, and ensuring quick and robust enrollment of children in POD is pivotal to ensuring as many children as possible benefit from quality early learning experiences that will prepare them for kindergarten and later success in school and life.

HB2427 HD1 establishes a reasonable and appropriate balance between 1) honoring key priorities in the selection of POD participants to serve children with the greatest need factors and to ensure continuity of care to support children's development; and 2) expediting enrollment, ensuring efficient expenditure of funds, and maximizing the number of children served through the program.
