HB 2744 HD1 – RELATING TO ORAL HEALTH

Chair Yamashita, Vice Chair Kitagawa, and members of the Committee, thank you for the opportunity to testify on **HB 2744 HD1 in support.**

This measure establishes an oral health task force to review the status of oral health in the State and make recommendations to improve the oral health infrastructure in Hawai'i. This initiative is in collaboration with the Hawai'i Oral Health Coalition, of which faculty from NAWSON and JABSOM both are engaged in and collaborate with.

The dental hygiene program at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa Nancy Atmospera-Walch School of Nursing (UHM NAWSON) is the only baccalaureate level program in the state and is accredited by CODA. It offers the educational preparation required of dental hygienists to provide oral health care and education to the people of Hawaii, the continental U.S., and the Pacific-Asia region. The program also offers clinical services for community members at the UHM Dental Hygiene Clinic. Students majoring in dental hygiene can become licensed professionals who offer preventive, education, and therapeutic services for the control of oral diseases and the promotion of optimum oral health. Students receive education in basic dental hygiene, dental and oral pathology (disease), clinical dental hygiene, dental materials and more. Students gain competency in screenings to assess eligibility for preventive services, and applying dental materials such as dental sealants during the course of their education.

The recommended members of the Task Force include a faculty member of the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa Nancy Atmospera-Walch School of Nursing (NAWSON) which includes the Department of Dental Hygiene. The faculty is to be appointed by the speaker of the House of Representatives. In addition, the Task Force will include a

representative of the University of Hawai'i John A. Burns School of Medicine, to be appointed by the President of the Senate.

This Task Force will fill an important role in our state by creating a dedicated entity which will review information on the status of oral health in the State and make recommendations to improve oral health infrastructure in Hawai'i. Benefits of this Task Force include stronger cross-sector collaboration on oral health issues, up-to-date analysis of community oral health status, increased awareness of the importance of oral health, and clear, actionable recommendations for improvements.

The NAWSON wishes to recognize the incredible talent and dedicated experts in oral health that are faculty of NAWSON. These faculty commit to enhancing access to oral healthcare through the education and training of the future dental hygienist workforce. In addition, Dr. Mattheus, PhD, APRN-Rx, CPNP, FAAN, Nancy Atmospera-Walch Endowed Professor in School Health & Professor, is the Senior Practice Director and Dental Sealant Program Director for the Hawai'i Keiki: Healthy and Ready to Learn Program. Dr. Mattheus was a recipient of the Achievement Rewards for College Scientists (ARCS) Scholarship, Honolulu Chapter for her doctoral research study on the prevention of early childhood caries in primary care practice and and has served as the Hawai'i State Oral Health Champion designated by Harvard University's Center for Integration of Primary Care and Oral Health (CIPCOH). We would like to recommend her as a candidate task force member.

The UH JABSOM recommends Dr. Jill Omori, Director of the Office of Medical Education, and Dr. Matthew Oishi, part-time faculty in charge of the oral health curriculum for the medical students, as qualified experts who would offer high value contributions to this Task Force.

- 1 Fiscal Implications: The proposed measure appropriates funds out of the State's general
- 2 revenues for fiscal year 2024-2025 and 1.0 full-time equivalent (FTE) position to the Department
- 3 of Health (DOH) to administer and oversee a contract to hire a consultant to facilitate the work
- 4 of the oral health task force, including completing the task force's interim and final reports and
- 5 to lay the foundation for a robust public dental health program in the state. The Department defers
- 6 to the Governor's Executive Biennium Budget Request appropriation priorities.
- 7 **Department Testimony:** The DOH supports this measure to establish an oral health task force
- 8 to review information on the status of oral health in the state and make recommendations to
- 9 improve oral health infrastructure in Hawaii.
- An oral health program is a critical part of all state public health departments. However,
- the DOH Dental Health Division was eliminated as part of the 2009 budget cuts. Oral health
- disease is a particularly critical issue in Hawaii with many children and adults suffering from
- preventable dental disease. Access to dental care is a challenge since most of the primary and
- specialty oral health providers are in the urban areas of the City and County of Honolulu. The
- lack of access to oral health care is particularly serious in rural communities on the neighbor
- islands and in low-income urban/rural areas of Oahu.
- 17 Rebuilding the Department's oral public health program will help to fulfill the basic core
- public health functions of assessment, assurance, and policy development and meet the dental
- health mandates of Hawaii Revised Statutes Title 19, Chapter 321, Part V §321-61 to §321-63.

1 The oral health taskforce will be instrumental in identifying those key elements and 2 additional staff resources necessary to rebuild a public health dental program in the Department, improve overall oral health in the state, and reduce inequalities in oral health. 3 4 Based on the specialized topic and comprehensive membership of this task force, it may be difficult to recruit members that currently work together on oral health issues as part of their 5 employment or associations if they will be prohibited from continuing these professional 6 interactions during their tenure on the task force based on Part I, Chapter 92, Hawaii Revised 7 Statutes. We recommend adoption of Office of Information Practices language to amend H.B. 8 2744 H.D. 1 for a limited exemption to Part I, Chapter 92, Hawaii Revised Statutes that allows 9 10 interactions/discussions among Oral Health Task Force members that need to talk together about the same issues the task force will be dealing with in the course of their regular work. 11 The DOH appreciates the funds and establishment of a 1.0 permanent FTE position that 12 will increase the Department's capacity to conduct the necessary program activities to improve 13 the oral health of children, families, and other vulnerable populations statewide. 14 Thank you for the opportunity to testify. 15

The Hawaii State Council on Developmental Disabilities is in **SUPPORT OF HB2744 HD1**, which establishes an oral health task force to review the status of oral health in the State and make recommendations to improve the State's oral health infrastructure. Within our population of individuals with developmental disabilities, oral health is a critical issue that requires urgent attention. The Hawai'i Oral Health Coalition, a program of the Hawai'i Public Health Instituteⁱ, is in strong **support of HB 2744 HD 1**, which establishes an oral health task force to review information on the status of oral health in the state and makes recommendations to improve or health infrastructure in Hawai'i, and appropriates funds to the Department of Health for two positions to facilitate the work of the oral health taskforce.

We respectfully request amendments to include language reflected in prior testimony from the Office of Information Practices relating to limited exemption to the Sunshine Law allowing less than a quorum of task force members to discuss potential task force business together during the course of their normal work, provided that they report the matters discussed outside of a noticed meeting at the immediately following noticed meeting of the task force, and that during their communication outside of a noticed meeting there is no commitment to vote is made or sought. This amendment is important because oral health resources and personnel are limited, and it is likely that some discussions may overlap given the nature of task force participants' work. We aim to ensure individuals are able to communicate freely to provide the best support to communities as possible without fear of violating the sunshine laws.

The mission of the Hawai'i Oral Health Coalition (HOHC) is to improve the overall health and well-being of all Hawai'i residents by improving access and equity in oral health care through collaborative partnerships, advocacy, and education. HOHC is a community-driven organization comprised of members representing organizations and individuals from diverse sectors across Hawai'i.

Oral health is essential to the overall physical, psychological, social, and economic well-being of Hawai'i's residents. Yet, our residents suffer from poor oral health:

- Hawai'i has among the highest prevalence of dental decay in children and adults compared to other states.
- Low-income families, intellectually and developmentally disabled residents, kūpuna, Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander populations, and neighbor island residents are disproportionately impacted by poor oral health.
- Lack of an in-state dental school, geographic isolation, lack of community water fluoridation, and societal inequities are significant contributors to our poor oral health status.

Forty-two states maintain dedicated public dental health staff responsible for assessing and monitoring the population's oral health status, community needs, and infrastructure; informing and educating the public about the importance of oral health; and working to reduce barriers to dental care. With over 288,000 adults with Medicaid dental benefits, there is a lack of dental providers to adequately meet the need for services among the population.

Our state's Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs) cared for approximately 40,000 dental patients in 2021ⁱⁱ, and often have long wait lists due to the limited facility and staffing capacity. Additionally, only 240 FQHC and general practice dentists are active in Medicaid in Hawai'i. However, it is unclear how many currently accept new patients. While the legislature recently allocated funding to reinstate basic services to adults enrolled in Medicaid, the shortage of Medicaid providers and limited infrastructure hinders the provision of services across the state, primarily in rural and neighbor island communities.

Furthermore, between 2016 and 2020, there were a total of 29,536 emergency department (ED) visits with a dental related diagnosis by adults aged 21 years and older in Hawai'i, two-thirds of which were admitted for primary dental diagnoses. A significant proportion of these ED visits were Medicaid recipients (9,680), and/or Native Hawaiian/Part Native Hawaiian (5,018). **Medicaid claims constituted 45% of the cumulative total charges for the ED visits with a primary dental diagnosis (\$12.3 million).** Additionally, higher rates of ED visits were found for Hawai'i County, Kaua'i County, and adults ages 21 to 44ⁱⁱⁱ.

It is imperative that we invest time and resources into further examining the oral health landscape in Hawai'i to better understand the full scope of oral health needs, resources, infrastructure, and to identify evidence-based best practices, which can best address the barriers and gaps in our existing oral health care systems. A dedicated oral health task force comprised of key stakeholders is necessary to identify and develop the strategies that address the critical needs of our communities.

Additionally, dedicated staffing under the Department of Health to facilitate and advance the work of an oral health task force will lay the foundation for ongoing assessment of oral health trends and

systems, and the development of effective approaches to improving oral health outcomes for all Hawai'i residents.

The State has begun to reinvest in the oral health of its most vulnerable residents. HB 2744 HD1 is an effective approach to supporting the success and sustainability of this investment. Most importantly, this measure will promote a strong foundation for improved and inclusive oral health outcomes.

For these reasons, we respectfully ask you to pass HB 2744 HD1, with amended language expressed above. Thank you for the opportunity to testify.

AlohaCare appreciates the opportunity to provide testimony in **support** of **HB2744**, **HD1**. This measure establishes an Oral Health Task Force to review information and data on the status of oral health in the State and make recommendations to improve the State's oral health infrastructure.

Founded in 1994 by Hawai'i's community health centers, AlohaCare is a community-rooted, non-profit health plan serving over 84,000 Medicaid and dual-eligible health plan members on all islands. Approximately 40 percent of our members are keiki. We are Hawai'i's only health plan exclusively dedicated to serving Medicaid and Medicaid-Medicare dually-eligible beneficiaries. Our mission is to serve individuals and communities in the true spirit of aloha by ensuring and advocating for access to quality, whole-person care for all.

Oral health is an essential aspect of a person's overall health and quality of life. Good oral health is important for healthy pregnancies and avoiding heart disease and diabetes complications and other conditions. Poor oral health is the cause for a wide range of health conditions that affect one's ability to eat, speak, smile and have positive self-esteem.

In 2022, the legislature approved \$29.9 million to reinstate an adult Medicaid dental benefit, with services becoming available January 1, 2023. We are grateful to the legislature and the Med-QUEST Division for this tremendous win for better oral health care for our community. However, even with the new benefit, the historical challenge of an insufficient network of dentists to provide oral health care to Medicaid beneficiaries persists. In order for Medicaid beneficiaries to have access to services, we need more dental providers. The dental provider shortage for Medicaid and other infrastructure shortcomings impact our rural and neighbor island communities most, putting Hawai'i's most vulnerable populations at risk.

Establishing an oral health task force of key stakeholders to assess our State's oral health system will give us an opportunity to systematically review and understand our State's needs, current resources and infrastructure, and identify next steps for improving oral health outcomes for our residents. We must continue to invest in a healthier Hawai'i, and this measure is step in the right direction.

HB2744 HD1 would fill a need in our oral health community by establishing an oral health task force to review information on the status of oral health in the State and make recommendations to improve our health infrastructure in Hawai'i and appropriates funds to the Department of Health for one position to facilitate the work of the oral health taskforce.

We respectfully request amendments to include language reflected in prior testimony from the Office of Information Practices relating to the limited exemption to the Sunshine Law allowing less than a quorum of task force members to discuss potential task force business together during their everyday work, provided that they report the matters discussed outside of a noticed meeting at the immediately following noticed meeting of the task force and that during their communication outside of a noticed meeting, there is no commitment to vote made or sought. Given the likely overlap in discussions between oral health stakeholders and providers in various meetings, this amendment would allow more freedom to communicate without fear of violating the sunshine laws.

Oral health is essential to Hawai'i's residents' overall physical, psychological, social, and economic well-being. Yet, our residents suffer from poor oral health, as reported in the Department of Health's <u>Hawaii Smiles 2015</u>:

- Hawai'i has among the highest prevalence of dental decay in children and adults compared to other states.
- Low-income families, intellectually and developmentally disabled residents, kūpuna, Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander populations, and neighbor island residents are disproportionately impacted by poor oral health.
- Lack of an in-state dental school, geographic isolation, lack of community water fluoridation, and societal inequities are significant contributors to our poor oral health status.

We must invest time and resources into further examining Hawai'i's oral health landscape to understand better the full scope of oral health needs, resources, and infrastructure, and to identify evidence-based best practices that can best address the barriers and gaps in our existing oral health care systems. A dedicated oral health task force comprised of key stakeholders is necessary to identify and develop strategies that address the critical needs of our communities.

The State has begun to reinvest in the oral health of its most vulnerable residents. HB2744 HD1 is an effective approach to supporting the success and sustainability of this investment—Mahalo for supporting this bill.

I am writing to support HB2744 HD1.

This bill establishes an oral health task force to review the status of oral health in the State and make recommendations to improve the State's oral health infrastructure.

The State of Hawaii Department of Health lacks a robust, fully funded, state wide oral health program. As a result, our most vulnerable populations are experiencing poorer health outcomes.

The Hawaii Health Matters - Oral Health Tracker

(https://www.hawaiihealthmatters.org/indicators/index/dashboard?alias=OralHealth) shows that Head Start keiki are receiving less oral health exams and treatments. The percent of Head Start keiki who received a dental exam decreased from 91.4% in 2017 to 52.3% in 2021. The percent of Head Start keiki who receive oral health treatment decreaed from 83.7% in 2019 to 70.2% in 2021.

We need an oral health task force to regularly report to the legislature on state wide initiatives to address these negative oral health trends. Hopefully this task force will have the ability to appropriate funds for these strategic initiatives to increase overall access to dental care.
