## HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 43 AND HOUSE RESOLUTION 32

## REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE TO DEVELOP A STRATEGIC PLAN TO STRENGTHEN FOOD SECURITY FOR LOW-INCOME COMMUNITIES IN HAWAII.

Chair Gates, Vice Chair Kahaloa and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on House Concurrent Resolution No. 43 and House Resolution No. 32 requesting the Department of Agriculture (Department) to develop a strategic plan (Plan) to strengthen food security for low-income communities in Hawaii.

The Plan is to address the following elements:

- 1. Determine the current status of food security and food production in low-income communities,
- 2. Identify obstacles to accessing affordable local food in underserved areas,
- 3. Expand access to locally produced food that is affordable,
- 4. Support local agricultural producers with economic incentives, technical assistance, and other public investments,



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- 5. Evaluate community-based initiatives (such as community gardens, urban farms, agricultural education, and farmers' markets) to mitigate food insecurity in low-income areas,
- 6. Expand agricultural education and vocational training programs for food production in low-income areas,
- 7. Assessing efficacy of food security interventions, and
- 8. Determine the funding and other resources needed to implement a strategic plan to enhance food security for low-income communities.

The Department offers a comment and a recommendation. The Department appreciates the concern about uneven access to locally-produced foods in low-income communities but believes what is being asked of DOA is well beyond its experience and expertise. The Department would be happy to contribute to, but not lead, an effort led by other agencies and organizations that have experience managing and/or participating in the aggregation, distribution, and sale of locally produced food through traditional channels or the hybrid systems that evolved during the food access crises of the COVID-19 pandemic. The Department can contribute recent statistics about agricultural producers down to the county level that may indicate opportunities and limitations of Hawaii's 6,569 agricultural operations.

### HCR 43/HR 32, REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE TO DEVELOP A STRATEGIC PLAN TO STRENGTHEN FOOD SECURITY FOR LOW-INCOME COMMUNITIES IN HAWAII.

## **POSITION: SUPPORT**

The Democratic Party of Hawai'i **<u>supports</u>** HCR 43/HR 32, which requests the Department of Agriculture to develop a strategic plan to strengthen food security for low-income communities in Hawai'i.

Food security is a fundamental human right and a critical component of public health and well-being. Hawaii's Aloha+ Challenge established a goal of increasing access to labor and land resources to support production, processing, distribution, and consumption of local food by 2030, with an overall target of 20 to 30 percent of food consumed in Hawai'i being grown locally. Additionally, the state's Sustainable Hawai'i Initiative set forth a target of doubling local food production by 2020. Yet, low-income communities in Hawai'i face significant challenges in accessing nutritious and affordable food, leading to food insecurity and related health disparities.

Promoting local food production and enhancing food security in underserved areas can contribute to better health and well-being, economic security, and environmental sustainability. Therefore, we support developing a strategic plan to increase food security and food production in low-income communities, which requires a comprehensive approach that addresses issues related to food access, affordability, land use, agricultural production, education and vocational training programs, and community engagement.

Strategic planning efforts should involve collaboration among government agencies, community organizations, agricultural stakeholders, and other relevant entities to effectively leverage resources and expertise, bringing public and private sector entities together to cooperate in helping to end hunger in the islands. Implementing targeted strategies tailored to the unique needs and priorities of different communities can maximize the impact of food security initiatives and ensure equitable access to nutritious food for all residents. Furthermore, investing in programs and initiatives that support local food production, such as community gardens, urban farms, farmers' markets, and agricultural education programs, can strengthen food systems and reduce dependence on imported food.

No one should go hungry in Hawai'i. For the sake of working families across our island home, we must couple our focus on increasing local food production with an emphasis on meeting the food security needs of our most economically vulnerable populations and those who live in rural and remote areas.
