My name is Rebecca Kapolei Kiili. I am writing to express my **strong support** for SB 2069. As a Kumu Kaiapuni, Hawaiian Language Immersion Program (HLIP) teacher for my entire public school teaching career of 18 years on Maui, I can attest to the need for more positions to support the growth of our program here and across the state. Maui has a total of seven schools in three communities that have Kula Kaiapuni programs. The communities are Lahaina, Hamakua-Kula, and Hāna. Island wide, we have approximately 800 students in grades K-12 and approximately 90 in the three 'Aha Pūnana Leo preschools. This is almost one thousand students just in Maui who are enrolled in our Hawaiian language programs.

Teacher positions are critical to meeting this high demand in growth at all schools-elementary, middle, and high school in each of the three communities. The current weighted student formula that school's use for student enrollment does not necessarily work for all school types. For example, a rural school like Hāna has to balance out the need for upper level teachers in content areas for middle and high school programs with the need for more elementary teachers. Funding ten more teacher positions would not only help support smaller schools, but also support schools like mine where our program is a part of a larger high school.

Having curriculum specialist positions would also support our programs statewide to develop curriculum for all grade levels. For a long time, many Kaiapuni teachers have had to create their own curriculum because there were no dedicated positions to support this. Respectfully, the HIDOE is behind in providing curriculum specialists. As a long time teacher, I feel some sense of relief and hope that these positions will significantly improve the quality of curriculum for our students. I do hope that the positions will be equally allocated across all of the islands so that neighbor island schools get just as much attention as O'ahu schools.

Funding these teacher positions and curriculum specialists positions is vital to our program's continued success. Reaching the milestone of 30 years of Hawaiian language education in the HIDOE, these positions are essential and paramount. Again, I **strongly support** SB 2069 and trust that all of you will support the intentions of this bill which are to further the education of our students in the native Hawaiian language of our state.

Chair Kidani, Chair Chang, and Members of the Committee:

My name is Kaala Fay Camara and I am a charter school Hawaiian Language Immersion curriculum coordinator at Kualapuu Conversion Charter School on the island of Molokai, and I support Bill SB 2069, relating to the department of education. This bill appropriates funds to the DEO for the establishment of 3 full time curriculum specialist positions and 10 full time classroom teacher positions for Ka Papahana Kaiapuni schools.

Even though our Conversion Charter Elementary school is small compared to other schools in Hawaii, we provide the only Elementary Hawaiian Immersion program on the island of Molokai for the past 30 years, beginning in 1993. As so, we have had to develop a much needed curriculum from the ground up for grades K-6. Regardless, the guality of education provided our students is of great priority, ensuring standards aligned curriculum is integrated in all subject areas, teacher certification is sought and pedagogy and research based strategies and assessments are provided. We are grateful for materials and resources that have been developed by Hale Kuamoo of UH-Hilo Ka Haka Ula o Keelikolani program, KS Publishing, and the Aha Punana Leo. But all of these still fall short of the State's obligation to provide much needed reading, writing, math and science resources for our growing population of Hawaiian Language learners, especially when it comes to modified instruction, materials and manipulatives for Hawaiian Language Special Education students and the services that should be provided to them. Because of the lack of materials, we, at Kualapu'u school have also grown to develop our own reading materials published and sold on amazon for other Kaiapuni schools to use. All of these forward thinking processes and resource development at our small school on Molokai has been due to the foresight of great leaders, administration, and teachers that see the importance and need for Curriculum Resource positions in our schools to continue to develop resources that help fill the gap in our Papahana Kaiapuni programs when it comes to certified teachers and standard aligned and research based curriculum and assessments. In the past we have had to write for our own state and federal grants to help supplement our Curriculum Coordinator position for many years, and now use our student weighted formula funds to continue to have this position that helps develop curriculum and support our Kaiapuni teachers with the most up to date research based strategies for student engagement and achievement.

To provide much needed resources for our growing Papahana Kaiapuni Schools and to fill the gap of years of lack of necessary resources, we ask your committee to support this bill.

My name is Shannon Alueta and I'm writing today as a private citizen and as a Native Hawaiian to voice my **support** for the aforementioned bill which will appropriate funds to the Department of Education for the establishment of three full-time equivalent (3.0 FTE) curriculum specialist II positions and ten full-time equivalent (10.0 FTE) classroom teacher positions for Ka Papahana Kaiapuni schools if passed.

As a former public school librarian, I do believe that these additional positions would be of great value to Ka Papahana Kaiapuni schools for the following reasons:

- 1. There are very few textbooks and resources available in Hawaiian for each level of the K-12 Kaiapuni student population. Curriculum coordinators would be able to greatly assist in curating and creating these materials for this purpose which would alleviate the burden on the classroom teacher.
- 2. There is a tremendous lack of ready resources that offer the perspective of the Hawaiian world view. That means, not only do Kaiapuni teachers need to find, translate and teach from resources that others have created, they also need to switch from a Western/Non-Hawaiian perspective to that of a Native Hawaiian perspective to ensure that no matter the content area, Hawaiian culture, language, and ways of being are being taught. Having more curriculum coordinators would help to lighten this load on the classroom teacher by assisting in finding and developing these materials as needed.
- 3. **Kaiapuni classroom teacher position numbers are not keeping pace with student growth.** More and more students are choosing to immerse themselves in Hawaiian language, history and culture, yet the number of Ka Papahana Kaiapuni teachers has not grown along with it. Successful immersion programs rely heavily on teacher quality AND quantity. It's high time to make this right.

In closing, the Ka Papahana Kaiapuni positions noted in SB 2069 are badly needed and I am urging you to support them through the passage of this bill.

I am testifying in STRONG SUPPORT of SB2069 - Relating to Education.

Please fund teacher and support positions at kula kaipuni so that schools may open or expand close to where students live. It's clear that kula kaiapani like 'Anuenue do everything they can to leverage the resources they has to educate all of its students. It would be much easier for them to meet the needs of their students if some students did not have to come so far. Although the hours spent bussing from the West side are a testament to students' (and their 'ohana's) dedication, it must take a toll on their ability to be present and high functioning in class. Practically, well functioning students are much easier to teach than poorly functioning students--any teacher would agree. While the State cannot influence many aspects of students' lives, it can at least influence how easy it is for them to get to school.

Funding educator positions at kaipuni also addresses equitable access to Hawaiian language education. Students should have the option to attend kaiapuni schools as close as possibly to their own communities, especially those that have large Hawaiian populations. My daughter is fortunate that we live within walking distance of Anuenue school -- one of the handful that do. In many ways my family does not face the challenges of other kaiapuni families. I wish for them what my child benefits from.

In conclusion, please pass SB2069 to increase the number of teachers available at kula kaipuni. The new positions will relieve significant pressure that already exists on the schools and their families. School enrollment is unlikely to go down significantly at current campuses given the overall increasing demand for kaiapuni education. Teacher funding will demonstrate the state's support to successful Hawaiian language education pathways.

Furthermore, there are six complex areas, including an entire island, where Kaiapuni education remains inaccessible. SB2069 aims to rectify these issues and uphold equitable access to resources and education across all islands in Hawaii's public schools.

Additionally, the bill recognizes the critical gap in representation for Hawaiian education within the Board of Education. By acknowledging the importance of both language pathways,

English and Hawaiian, SB2069 takes a significant step towards ensuring fair and comprehensive representation at the highest levels of educational governance.

In essence, SB2069 is not just commendable; it is a necessary and timely response to the evolving educational landscape in Hawaii. By strategically appropriating funds, this bill addresses staffing shortages, enrollment challenges, and systemic gaps, fostering the growth and success of Kaiapuni schools and contributing to the overall improvement of public education in the state.

He will be given the tools of knowledge to understand how his ancestors coexisted with the elements, the environment, and with each other. This will propel him forward to having a better understanding of what inherent talents and abilities he has to offer to his environment, himself, and his community. Immersion schools

Aloha mai e nā po'o a me nā lālā o ka 'Aha 'Ōlelo,

Mai ka lā hiki mai a ke komohana, mai ka moa'e aheahe a nā kona, aloha e nā hoa o nā kūkulu 'ehā o ke ao! My name is Wendy Akioka, also known as Kumu Kalae in my community. My son graduated from a kaiapuni school, my daughter attends my school, Ke Kula Kaiapuni o Kailua, and my husband teaches at a kaiapuni school, Pū'ōhala. I am also an active member of the 'Aha Kauleo and the chair of the Hawaiian Education Committee for the HSTA. Needless to say, kaiapuni is a part of our 'ohana and lifestyle.

I can provide a unique perspective, because I have worked in many capacities of the education system, from high school Hawaiian language teacher, to elementary kaiapuni teacher, to OHE resource teacher, to Early College Coordinator for kaiapuni under a grant a Windward Community College, back to high school kaiapuni teacher. I understand this system from various, unique perspectives.

I am testifying in STRONG SUPPORT of SB2069 - Relating to Education.

This is because there is a desperate need for these positions. SB2069 asks for three curriculum specialists. When I worked at the HIDOE's Office of Hawaiia Education (OHE), where these positions would be housed, the task of creating curricula for the entire kaiapuni program seemed insurmountable. I worked on it myself, but one person is not enough. Two people are not enough. In fact, I might argue that three people are not enough. If you take any classroom textbook and look at the credits, there are 10-15 people working for years to produce that one textbook. Now, imagine needing to create comprehensive, rigorous, and appropriate curricula for all subject areas for K-12 grade levels. People often ask why kaiapuni has been around for nearly 30 years, yet no curricula has been created and I often respond, when has there been a team 10-15 people employed for just that - to create curricula? NEVER! All the resources we have are from full-time teachers creating curriculum on their own time, or from 25 year old grant-work, mostly translations. Some of us still use that, because it is what we have! However, our students should have equitable access to cutting edge technology and modern curricula, just as their counterparts do in the English language pathways.

Regarding the ten teaching positions, I admit that this affects me directly. Ke Kula Kaiapuni o Kailua began nearly three years ago out of thin air. My former principal, Stacey Oshio, agreed to make it happen when asked by Phyllis Unebasami, then I came in and voila! We had a program. The importance of a program like mine to its community is to provide a Hawaiian language pathway for the second largest Native Hawaiian population on O'ahu, that is for the Ko'olau Poko area. It was only made possible because of the existing teacher positions from OHE, because when a new program starts up, there are rarely enough student numbers to support a teaching position under weighted student formula (WSF), especially at the high school level. In late 1990s to early 2000s, the HIDOE was given a set number of positions directly from the legislature because they recognized the burden the smaller numbers were placing on the programs and schools. However, since that time, the number of kaiapuni schools and programs have nearly doubled, yet OHE has not received any increase in positions to offset the growth. What happens now is that larger kaiapuni schools give up their positions in order to make room for programs like mine. The increase in 10 positions would ensure that I do not have to take from someone else to exist.

In conclusion, I am testifying in STRONG SUPPORT of SB2069 - Relating to Education.

I urge the Committee to **PASS** this bill. Mahalo for the opportunity to testify.

I am also the alaka'i, leader, of the EAducation 'Ewa Moku Hui Mākua, the parent group that engaged the community and the HIDOE to establish Kapolei in order to address the lack of access to secondary Hawaiian Immersion Education in the 'Ewa Moku. Kapolei enrolled its first 7th-grade class of 7 students this school year. We will add a second grade level next year in an laser-focused effort to achieve our vision and goal of building a self-contained K-12 kula kaiapuni in the 'Ewa Moku within 5 years.

I am testifying in STRONG SUPPORT of SB2069 - Relating to Education because it will:

- A Pathway to Hawaiian Immersion Access, Equity and Accountability: This bill will ensure equitable access to resources and education specifically for Hawaiian immersion education on all islands in Hawai'i's public schools, and uphold guidelines set forth in BOE policy 105-8. This bill will also ensure that the State upholds both its constitutional responsibility to Article X, Section 4, and Article XV, Section 4 of the Hawaii State Constitution (1978) and the Clarabal decision where the Hawai'i Supreme Court found that the State is also constitutionally required to make all reasonable efforts to provide reasonable access to Hawaiian immersion education.
- Address the Exponential Need and Demand for Hawaiian Immersion Education across the Pae'āina: There has been an increase of 8 kaiapuni schools in the last 10 years. The Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) will recommend that the Board of Trustees (BOT) <u>SUPPORTS</u> this Senate Bill 2069, which appropriates funds to the Department of Education for the establishment of three full-time equivalent (3.0 FTE) curriculum specialist II positions and ten full-time equivalent (10.0 FTE) classroom teacher positions for Ka Papahana Kaiapuni schools.

For Hawaiians, the life of our language, 'Ōlelo Hawai'i, is tied to the health and well-being of our people and culture. I ka 'ōlelo no ke ola, i ka 'ōlelo no ka make is a revered 'Ōlelo No'eau or proverb that translates to "life is in speech/language; death is in speech/language." Ka Papahana Kaiapuni is an important program that both advances the revitalization of our language and educates the next generation of students. Its success supports the health and well-being of Hawaiians, our language and our culture.

Ka Papahana Kaiapuni programming has also been and continues to be integral to the State fulfilling its constitutional obligations. Article X §4 of the Hawai'i State Constitution gives the State the duty to "promote the study of Hawaiian culture, history and language." Further, the Constitution states that the "State shall provide for a Hawaiian education program consisting of language, culture and history in the public schools. The use of community expertise shall be encouraged as a suitable and essential means in furtherance of the Hawaiian education program."

As this bill notes, demand for Hawaiian language immersion education has grown over the past decade despite resources declining. Kaiapuni programming requires professionals who have expertise in multiple disciplines including Hawaiian language and their curriculum area or grade level. OHA supports this bill's appropriations and establishment of a total of 13 positions for Ka Papahana Kaiapuni programming. It is an important step to provide Kaiapuni programs the specialized staffing it needs for its expansion and sustainability.

Accordingly, OHA urges this Committee to **SUPPORT** Ka Papahana Kaiapuni by advancing SB2069. Mahalo nui for the opportunity to testify on this important issue.



The Hawaii State Department of Education (Department) fully supports SB 2069. We are requesting 10 additional Kaiapuni teacher positions and 3 Kaiapuni Educational Specialist positions. In the past decade, the Department's Kaiapuni program enrollment has grown by almost 1,000 students to 2,374 students that are being educated in the medium of the Hawaiian language and 8 new schools in the Department to 22 schools in additional communities.



Growth of HIDOE Kaiapuni Enrollment in the Past Decade

The Kaiapuni program has expanded significantly over the last decade: nearly 60% increase in both the number of Kaiapuni programs and student enrollment. The Kaiapuni program has been expanding in response to student and family demand as well as to provide "reasonable access to a Hawaiian immersion program" as required by the Clarabel case in the State Supreme Court in 2019.

Thank you for scheduling this measure, SB2069 to be heard. Nā Leo Kāko'o o O'ahu, the family organization that exists to promote the educational activities of Ke Kula Kaiapuni 'o Ānuenue, is in **strong support.**

Our keiki attend Ke Kula Kaiapuni 'o Ānuenue, the kula kaiapuni nestled in the back of Pālolo Valley. Po'okumu Babā Yim and the Kumu (teachers) and Limahana (staff) of this kula are uniquely qualified - having knowledge and expertise in both K-12 educational principles as well as fluency in 'Ōlelo Hawai'i. Through our networks of likeminded 'ohana, we know the commitment to ensure our youth have access to high quality education in their native tongue is one that many families have, yet accessing student seats within kula kaiapuni are limited. There are far fewer seats than interested students.

To address the lack of access to secondary education in the 'Ewa Moku, a group of mākua (parents) engaged the community and the DOE to establish Ke Kula Kaiapuni o Kapolei, a satellite site of Ānuenue based at Kapolei Middle School. Kapolei enrolled its first 7th-grade class of 7 students this school year. As an established K-12 kula kaiapuni, Ānuenue is providing critical programmatic and administrative support to Kapolei to build its capacity to transition into its own school. Thus, our kula acknowledges that the educational needs and goals of our haumāna (students) and 'ohana (family) are best served within the communities they come from.

Presently, we still feel the urgent need for more regional kula kaiapuni options. Even with Ke Kula Kaiapuni o Kapolei, 'ohana from across O'ahu send their keiki on buses for hours every day to attend school at Ke Kula Kaiapuni 'o Ānuenue. While we remain grateful for the community that our kula kaiapuni provides, and the access to high quality education that the Kumu at Ke Kula Kaiapuni 'o Ānuenue deliver; we see that the demand for kula kaiapuni education is overflowing.

In recognition, this bill comes at the perfect time. Expanding educational resources for Kaiapuni programs, including new programs/site, new FTEs for teacher positions, and classroom materials and equipment are desperately needed. In addition, the curriculum specialists will promote the Kaiapuni pedagogy training, curriculum development, support teacher professional growth, and result in an increase in qualifications of teacher candidates.

First I would like to bring forth an 'olelo no'eau that I feel represents the essentiality of this bill.

"Hāhai nō ka ua i ka ululā'au."

Rains always follow the forest - (Pukui & Varez, 1983; p.50, 405)

This 'ōlelo no'eau speaks of the attraction of rain to a forest, implying that the greater the forest, the greater the rain. Currently the "forest" or the kaiapuni/ kaia'ōlelo programs are experiencing a shortage in "trees" or kumu that can properly mālama the rain/students, consequently leading to students falling through the cracks as these following points will explain.

Currently, the DOE funds 35 teacher positions across the state for 22 schools which may seem sufficient. However 15 (give or take) of those kaiapuni/kaia⁶ōlelo programs are secondary level schools, many of whom are operating under the guidance of 1-3 kumu teaching a variety of subjects just to retain their students in the Hawaiian immersion classes and afford said students a Hawaiian education which is their constitutional right as stated in Article X, Section 4, and Article XV, Section 4 of the Hawaii State Constitution (1978). Whereas the English side has one teacher for every subject. Most secondary teachers on the Hawaiian immersion side are forced to wheel classes, teach subjects to all 3-4 grade levels at one time, and create curriculum in an

English centric/Hawaiian negligent DOE. Furthermore, if you were to assess all 15 secondary schools and allocate positions for the 4 core subjects (math, science, history, and language arts) not accounting for electives (which are also essential to a proper education.) the DOE would actually need to provide 60 positions to the secondary schools alone. As we take a look at the elementary schools, many of our Hawaiian immersion elementary schools operate with kumu teaching multiple grade levels throughout the school year, whereas their English teaching co-workers only have to worry about 1 grade level no matter what their student count is.

There has been an increase of students in the past 10 years by almost 1,000 students. It is obvious that our Hawaiian immersion schools are bursting at the seams as more and more parents see the benefits of their child learning in a second language. However with the influx of students and the lack of positions and kumu, many students are not able to fully immerse themselves in the program as the ratio of student(s) to teacher(s) saturates the language comprehension and more so articulation. Many families opt to leave Hawaiian Immersion as their students' Hawaiian education wasn't as advantageous as they expected due to the student to teacher ratio and the negligence of the DOE to acknowledge that said ratio is different for these second language learners.

Many families are turned away by DOE schools at registration for the kaiapuni school that is closest to them. As the student counts increase schools and teachers are left with no choice but to turn families away. Which again to no fault on the part of the school and/or teachers is a direct violation of Article X, Section 4, and Article XV, Section 4 of the Hawaii State Constitution (1978). If every student is afforded a Hawaiian education, why is the DOE/BOE not providing the means for schools and staff to provide such education? You might say that we could just raise the cap for student to teacher ratios. However, if it is ineffective education for English educators, it will surely be ineffective education for students learning a second language.

In conclusion, with the influx of student enrollment and the lack of teaching positions, the committee should recognize 10 positions; however helpful will only be a step towards bridging the enormous gap in the pursuit of providing a **proper** Hawaiian education for the children of our public school system and to ensure that no student yearning to learn the language and knowledge of this land and/or their ancestors is ever turned away.

I implore the Committee to **PASS** SB2069 as the first step to rectifying the gross negligence that the Hawai'i DOE/BOE has been committing for decades. Mahalo for the opportunity to testify.

They were told that they no longer can speak their native tongue. They can no longer conduct business, church, community events - yes, LIVE ma ka 'Olelo Hawaii. In a conversation that I had with my granddaughter, when she realized that 'Olelo Hawaii was OUTLAWED, looked at me in disbelief, and said "How dare they do that to my kupuna! Grandma, why would they do that? Were they crazy?" I said, "No, just greedy - wanting power and control of these islands."

Second, I represent myself. I grew up in a home where the language was spoken ONLY amongst the 'ohana. My parents spoke to me in English, and yes, pidgin. My grandparents spoke to me in English. I was privileged to experience - hear, see and feel my kupuna and makua speak 'Olelo Hawaii to each other, but not to me. They did not talk to me in Hawaiian, except to call me by my Hawaiian name, Leihua. This is one of the greatest gifts that I have from my makua and kupuna. It has been the foundation in my life. The double-edged sword. The blade of pili grass in life.

Finally, for the future generations of Kanaka Maoli, the DOE funds 35 teacher positions across the state for 22 schools. There has been an increase of 8 Kaiapuni schools in the last 10 years. There has been an increase in students in the past 10 years by almost 1,000 students. Families are turned away by DOE Kaiapuni school that are closest to them because of limited funding. There are still 6 complex areas including 1 island that the DOE is not providing access to Kaiapuni education. I am currently serving as a native hawaiian parent participation preschool kumu at Keiki o Ka 'Āina Family Learning Centers at the Kapolei Heritage Center and Nānākuli Elementary School for hawaiian homestead 'ohana with keiki ages 0-5. My own keiki currently attends Ke Kula Kaiapuni o Waiau & Ānuenue, but previously attended Punana Leo o Ko'olau Poko (formerly Kamakau), & Punana Leo o Honolulu. I am an active member of the Pearl Harbor Hawaiian Civic Club. I currently serve as Board President at Kealakai HOA in Kapolei. I am an alumni of the Polynesian Cultural Center, Brigham Young University-Hawaii and Kahuku High and Intermediate.

I am testifying in STRONG SUPPORT of SB2069 - Relating to Education.

There are still 6 complex areas including 1 island that the DOE is not providing access to kaiapuni education. For 12 years, I have made a daily commute so that my young keiki can attend kula 'ōlelo Hawai'i. My commute consisted of traveling from Pearl City to Kāne'ohe (Punana Leo, 3 yrs), then from Pearl City to Kalihi (Punana Leo, 2 yrs). Then from Kapolei to Pearl City to Kalihi (Waiau & Punana Leo, 1 yr) and now I travel from Kapolei to Pearl City (Waiau, 6 years). I silently cry to

myself at the end of each school year patting myself on the back that I did it! I did it for my keiki, for my lāhui, my community, for our future!

There are hardly any programs available for keiki in the Honouliuli area and we are in high demand for more of our Hawaiian 'ohana to reconnect with the language of our kupuna. As a native Hawaiian kumu I work hard to share the Hawaiian language and culture in my own classroom, connecting them with 'āina, their heritage, and help many Hawaiian families to prepare their keiki to attend kula Hawai'i. As a kumu I often think to myself that I would holomua to fill the needs in my community.

We need more programming, we need more kumu. There is not enough educational programs available for the keiki of Honouliuli under the age of 5 to be in. Last I heard from the consortium, there were 10,000+ Honouliuli keiki under the age of 5 who are at home and in no programs. We are in short supply of staff, and I am also willing to mentor mākua/parents who are willing to step up and fill the need. Please support more programming and workforce development so that our Hawaiian communities can thrive.

This bill will ensure that the State upholds its constitutional responsibility to Article X, Section 4, and Article XV, Section 4 of the Hawaii State Constitution (1978).

This bill will also ensure equitable access to resources and education specifically for Hawaiian immersion education on all islands in Hawai'i's public schools, and uphold guidelines set forth in BOE policy 105-8.

I am writing to express my support for Senate Bill 2069, which appropriates funds to the Department of Education for the establishment of three full-time equivalent (3.0 FTE) curriculum specialist II positions and ten full-time equivalent (10.0 FTE) classroom teacher positions for Ka Papahana Kaiapuni schools. I commend your efforts to enhance the educational opportunities for our students in the Hawaiian Immersion Program.

As the current principal of Samuel Enoka Kalama Intermediate School (Ke Kula Waena 'o Kalama) on the island of Maui, I appreciate the initiative to allocate resources for the expansion of our Ka Papahana Kaiapuni. However, I would like to raise a concern regarding the allocation plan for these positions and their potential impact on existing schools like ours.

It is crucial to ensure that the allocation of teachers is not only based on the establishment of new schools but also takes into account the growing needs of existing schools like ours. With nearly 140 Kaiapuni students in grades 6-8 and a growing yearly Kaiapuni enrollment, our school is currently provided only two teachers by the Office of Hawaiian Education. The remaining 6 teachers are funded using our overall Weighted Student Formula from our school enrollment of almost 940 students. As the Kaiapuni program grows, we will not be able to sustain the small school structure of a separate Kaiapuni program, eventually the Hawaiian Immersion students will need to filter into English speaking classes. This is not the intent of the Hawaiian Immersion Program.

I strongly urge you to consider incorporating a more comprehensive and equitable allocation plan into Senate Bill 2069. This will ensure that the additional resources provided benefit not only newly opening schools but also existing schools that are experiencing growth and increased demand for Ka Papahana Kaiapuni education.

Thank you for your attention to this matter and your dedication to improving education in Hawaii. I am hopeful that with your support, Senate Bill 2069 can be strengthened to better serve the needs of all Ka Papahana Kaiapuni schools.

My name is Dr. Dana Tanigawa and I am in support of SB 2069, to address the increase in demand and growth in kaiapuni education by funding 10 teacher positions as well as funding 3 full-time kaiapuni educational specialist positions.

The demand for Hawaiian language immersion has increased. There are over 2,300 students in our program, which has seen an increase in almost 1,000 students over the past decade. There has been an increase in about 10 kaiapuni schools over the last decade and we will have 23 starting next school year. In order to meet this need, we need more classroom teacher positions. Schools continue to open every year and funding needs to increase to meet this growth.

Kaiapuni education is unique in that we cannot just go to a company and purchase curriculum or assessment materials. These need to be developed and vetted to meet kaiapuni learning standards. While the HIDOE system is making strides, it continues to work towards making space and providing equity to kaiapuni education. The educational specialist positions will help provide administrative support for the 23 schools in the areas like working with individuals/companies to build curriculum and assessments, developing classess and ACCNs, advocating for buiding a process for highly-qualified teachers, creating community/organization connections to bridge K-12 and college/career pathways, increasing engagement and work development opportunities, and supporting teachers with instruction and supporting principals in their work.

I am writing on behalf of the Native Hawaiian Education Council (NHEC) to express our **strong support for the passage of Senate Bill 2069 (SB 2069),** which seeks to allocate general funds for the establishment of three FTE Kaiapuni curriculum specialist II positions and 10 FTE Kaiapuni classroom teacher positions. Our endorsement is grounded in the extensive research and annual community consultation findings conducted by NHEC from 2020 through 2023.

The findings from our research and community consultations across the pae'āina have highlighted two crucial points that underscore the necessity of funding priorities for teachers and curriculum support for Hawaiian language-medium instruction learning. Firstly, we have identified that such funding priorities are critical in addressing equity, resiliency, and social-emotional well-being for increased Native Hawaiian learner outcomes. The allocation of funds for teacher positions plays a pivotal role in closing achievement gaps, ensuring educational equity, and fostering the overall well-being of Native Hawaiian learners.

Secondly, our research emphasizes the significance of the expansion and support of 'āina-based learning in Hawaiian language-medium schools and Hawaiian focused charter schools. This approach not only reinforces the value of traditional wisdom and language but also serves as an effective educational strategy for cultivating critical skills among learners. Additionally, it provides an inclusive recovery approach for communities emerging from the challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic and other devastating events, such as the Maui fires.

The COVID-19 pandemic has exacerbated existing educational disparities, and the devastating events like the Maui fires have added to the challenges faced by our communities. In this context, funding for Kaiapuni curriculum specialists and kumu will build upon and expand Hawaiian language-medium instruction and 'āinabased learning opportunities for learners. This becomes imperative for building resilience, promoting cultural identity, and fostering community recovery.

Senate Bill 2069 aligns with the NHEC's mission to advocate for the educational well-being of Native Hawaiian learners. NHEC was established in 1994 under the Native Hawaiian Education Act, the statutory responsibilities of NHEC are to coordinate, assess, and report & make recommendations on the effectiveness of existing education programs for Native Hawaiians, the state of present Native Hawaiian efforts, and improvements that may be made to existing programs, policies and procedures to improve the educational attainment of Native Hawaiians.



Mahalo nui loa for considering our testimony in support of Senate Bill 2069. We urge you to prioritize the passage of this bill for the betterment of Native Hawaiian learners, their communities, and the broader educational landscape.

My name is Sesame Shim and I am the president of Nā Leo Kāko'o o Maui, Inc., a non-profit parent support group of Nā Kula Kaiapuni o Maui at Pā'ia Elementary, Kalama Intermediate, and Kekaulike High School. I am also a parent of 2 children in Kaiapuni schools at Pā'ia Elementary and Kalama intermediate. I am also a Kaiapuni teacher at Kekaulike High School. I am testifying in **STRONG SUPPORT of SB2069** - *Relating to Education*.

In the past 9 years that my oldest son has been in Kaiapuni at Pā'ia and now Kalama, I have seen our Kaiapuni schools in particular grow exponentially. My son entered into a class of 60 students, being one of the largest of that time. Now, 60 students has become the standard. At Kekaulike, we have gone from graduating 5-12 students on average, to now 20 students becoming the standard. And in the next two years, we will have a graduating class of about 39 students.

While we applaud this growth of our Kaiapuni schools it has taken a toll on our teachers and resources that they have been able to provide. We need more teacher positions for the number of students, however we also need more off-ratio positions to accommodate for all of the various subjects at the secondary level. We also need specific support such as Kaiapuni SPED teachers who can support our students with special needs within the Kaiapuni classrooms. And, it is these needs that will be supported by the approval of SB2069.

The State has a responsibility to uphold the Hawai'i State Constitution's(1978) Article X, Section 4, and Article XV, Section C. This bill will help to ensure that these responsibilities are met.

In conclusion, I strongly support the growth of Kaiapuni teaching positions and resources, and we urge the Committee to **PASS** SB2069. Mahalo for the opportunity to testify.

The 'Aha Kauleo (AKL) is the statewide council for the Papahana Kaiapuni, which provides proactive leadership, direction, and advocacy for the development and growth of its Hawaiian medium schools and advises directly through the Office of Hawaiian Education (OHE) of the Department of Education (DOE). AKL consists of parent and teacher representatives per elementary (K-6), secondary grades (6-12) and/or from each Hawaiian medium education site, and a principal representative, along with representatives from the University of Hawaii Hilo and Manoa, Brigham Young University-Hawaii, University of Hawaii-Maui College, Aha Punana Leo, Office of Hawaiian Affairs, Kamehameha Schools/Bishop Estate, and the Queen Liliuokalani Children's Center.

The 'Aha Kauleo is in **STRONG SUPPORT of SB2069** to appropriate funds to the Department of Education for the establishment of three full-time equivalent (3.0 FTE) curriculum specialist II positions and ten full-time equivalent (10.0 FTE) classroom teacher positions for Ka Papahana Kaiapuni schools.

First and foremost, this bill will ensure that the State upholds its constitutional responsibility to Article X, Section 4, "The State shall promote the study of Hawaiian culture, history, and language," Article XV, Section 4, "English and Hawaiian shall be the official languages of Hawaii" (Hawaii State Constitution, 1978). Furthermore, the State of Hawaii has two language medium pathways, English and Hawaiian. Whereas the English medium pathway can and has recruited teachers from out of state to fill teaching positions, the Hawaiian medium pathway needs to grow its own, which further highlights the profound need for Kaiapuni teachers who have the linguistic and cultural competencies to teach the range of content all through the Hawaiian language and worldview.

Currently, the DOE funds 35 teacher positions across the DOE's twenty-two Kaiapuni schools. In the last decade, the number of Kaiapuni schools increased by eight and nearly 1,000 students. Yet, the allocated teaching positions have remained the same. DOE schools have been forced to turn away many families because of the lack of teachers. Of concern is that there are six complex areas, including one island, where the DOE is not providing access to Kaiapuni education.

We urge the Committee to **PASS** SB2069 to ensure equitable access to Kaiapuni education on all islands in Hawai'i's public schools and uphold guidelines outlined in BOE policy 105-8.

My scholarship focuses on Indigenous youth language learning in the Yup'ik region of Alaska, and I have worked with others since 1992 on issues of Indigenous youth language development, education, and school language policy.

As an individual with decades of professional research experience in Indigenous language education, I support SB 2069, which will provide necessary resources to grow the capacity of Hawaiian language medium schools to meet the growing demand for Indigenous language medium education in Hawai'i.

A tremendous number of educational leaders and scholars around the country look to the Hawaiian medium schools as an shining example of how to support the well being of Indigenous youth and families, and maintain unique, valuable Indigenous languages and related forms of knowledge through schooling.

Hawaiian medium schools in Hawai'i are also internationally renowned for their successful and inspirational work creating Hawaiian medium pathways for youth development from early education through higher education, and their forward thinking and leadership in the area of developing innovative learning opportunities for young people across the content areas, and in multilingual education.

Given the tremendous increase of students and families seeking Hawaiian medium schools in recent years, the schools need support to grow capacity and add additional teachers. Youth and parents who are seeking Hawaiian medium education across the islands of Hawai'i will benefit tremendously from the passage of this bill. The growth of Kaiapuni is a beautiful thing to see, and with that growth, funding towards more positions will help bring Kaiapuni resources not only to the schools that desperately need them, but will also have a "trickle effect" down to the wider communities, and likely, help to be more "even" with the English side, in terms of resources.

TESTIMONY IN STRONG SUPPORT

Thank you for scheduling this measure, SB2069 to be heard. Nā Leo Kākoʻo o Oʻahu, the family organization that exists to promote the educational activities of Ke Kula Kaiapuni 'o Ānuenue, is in **strong support.**

Our keiki attend Ke Kula Kaiapuni 'o Ānuenue, the kula kaiapuni nestled in the back of Pālolo Valley. Po'okumu Babā Yim and the Kumu (teachers) and Limahana (staff) of this kula are uniquely qualified - having knowledge and expertise in both K-12 educational principles as well as fluency in 'Ōlelo Hawai'i. Through our networks of likeminded 'ohana, we know the commitment to ensure our youth have access to high quality education in their native tongue is one that many families have, yet accessing student seats within kula kaiapuni are limited. There are far fewer seats than interested students.

To address the lack of access to secondary education in the 'Ewa Moku, a group of mākua (parents) engaged the community and the DOE to establish Ke Kula Kaiapuni o Kapolei, a satellite site of Ānuenue based at Kapolei Middle School. Kapolei enrolled its first 7th-grade class of 7 students this school year. As an established K-12 kula kaiapuni, Ānuenue is providing critical programmatic and administrative support to Kapolei to build its capacity to transition into its own school. Thus, our kula acknowledges that the educational needs and goals of our haumāna (students) and 'ohana (family) are best served within the communities they come from.

Presently, we still feel the urgent need for more regional kula kaiapuni options. Even with Ke Kula Kaiapuni o Kapolei, 'ohana from across O'ahu send their keiki on buses for hours every day to attend school at Ke Kula Kaiapuni 'o Ānuenue. While we remain grateful for the community that our kula kaiapuni provides, and the access to high quality education that the Kumu at Ke Kula Kaiapuni 'o Ānuenue deliver; we see that the demand for kula kaiapuni education is overflowing.

In recognition, this bill comes at the perfect time. Expanding educational resources for Kaiapuni programs, including new programs/site, new FTEs for teacher positions, and classroom materials and equipment are desperately needed. In addition, the curriculum specialists will promote the Kaiapuni pedagogy training, curriculum development, support teacher professional growth, and result in an increase in qualifications of teacher candidates.
