The Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism (DBEDT) supports the intent of SB 2079, HD1 which allows the State of Hawai'i Plant and Animal Declaration Form to be distributed, completed, and transmitted electronically.

I am Brian Miyamoto, Executive Director of the Hawai'i Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,800 farm family members statewide and serves as Hawai'i's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic, and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

The Hawai'i Farm Bureau supports SB 2079, HD1, which allows the State of Hawai'i Plant and Animal Declaration Form to be distributed, completed, and transmitted electronically.

HFB recognizes the importance of preventing destructive invasive species from entering the State and how difficult it is to manage those that become established in our islands. We appreciate the difficult work of HDOA and its partners in preventing entry and their efforts to eradicate or control these detrimental animals, insects, weeds, diseases, and other pests.

Our ports-of-entry biosecurity program is essential to prevent invasive species from entering the State. The State of Hawai'i Plant and Animal Declaration Form helps prevent new invasive species from entering Hawai'i when completed by passengers and flight crews arriving in Hawai'i. Converting the current paper form to an electronic form will increase the number of completed forms, which can help decrease the number of restricted plant and animal species entering the State.
