Aloha Chair Lee, Vice Chair Inouye, and members of the Committee on Transportation and Culture and the Arts,

The County of Hawai'i strongly supports this proposed bill. Hawai'i Revised Statutes § 249-9(a)(1) provides that all license plates shall bear the word "Hawaii" along the upper portion of the plate and the words "Aloha State" along the lower portion of the plate. As written, the existing law does not permit the inclusion of the 'okina in the word "Hawaii". This measure seeks to remedy that omission.

Act 170, passed by the legislature in 2022, mandates the use of Hawaiian diacritical markings in Hawaiian names and words on official state and county letterhead. We support broader implementation of Hawaiian diacritical marks across government, including our state vehicle license plates.

SUBJECT: S.B. 2201 - Relating to License Plates HEARING: Tuesday, January 30, 2024, 3:00 p.m.

Pursuant to Section 6-402 of the Revised Charter of the City and County of Honolulu, the Department of Customer Services (CSD) administers the motor vehicle registration program for the island of Oahu, including the issuance of license plates.

Every license plate is required by law to have the word "Hawaii" along the top center of the license plate. Unfortunately, the statute does not spell "Hawaii" with an 'okina. This bill will ensure that the word is correctly spelled "Hawaii".

This bill will also allow the word "Hawai'i" and the phrase "Aloha State" to be in either upper or lower case to increase design options for future license plates.

Two years ago, the Legislature passed Act 170 which requires Hawaiian diacritical markings in Hawaiian names and words in official State and County letterhead. We support further expansion of the use of Hawaiian diacritical marks in other aspects of government, including our State license plates. Thank you for this opportunity to provide testimony in support for this bill.

Ulupono Initiative supports SB 2201, Relating to Number Plates.

Dear Chair Lee and Members of the Committee:

My name is Micah Munekata, and I am the Director of Government Affairs at Ulupono Initiative. We are a Hawaiʻi-focused impact investment firm that strives to improve the quality of life throughout the islands by helping our communities become more resilient and self-sufficient through locally produced food, renewable energy and clean transportation choices, and better management of freshwater resources.

Ulupono <u>supports</u> SB 2201 and <u>offers amendments</u>. This bill requires license plates to include 'okina and authorizes the use of all uppercase letters, all lowercase letters, or initial capital letters in motor vehicle license plates.

Ulupono supports the effort to require 'okina and allow for lettering options on Hawai'i's license plates. Should this measure move forward, we ask that the committee consider adding language into the measure to allow for specialty license plates to be dedicated to electric vehicles. Reducing the use of fossil fuels in ground transportation aligns with the State's commitment to meeting a zero emissions clean economy by 2045. As we look to support the adoption of electric vehicles across the state, additional incentives, such as dedicated license plates, could be a helpful tool for our community.
