The Hawaii State Council on Developmental Disabilities **STRONGLY SUPPORTS SB2503**, which requires all places of public accommodation constructed after 12/31/24 and state building construction completed after 12/31/24 to provide universal changing accommodations that are equally accessible regardless of gender.

Senate Bill 2503 – Relating to Equity

The Disability and Communication Access Board (DCAB) supports Senate Bill 2503 – Relating to Equity.

This bill would require all places of public accommodation constructed after 12/31/24 and all state building construction completed after 12/31/24 to provide universal changing accommodations in public restrooms that are equally accessible regardless of gender.

A fundamental goal of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) is to ensure people with disabilities have an equal opportunity to participate in basic civic activities and everyday events, such as going to a restaurant or movie, shopping at a mall, or simply attending a high school sports event with friends and family. People with disabilities who cannot use a toilet should have access to universal changing accommodations that provides a safe, sanitary, and private space to be changed and cleaned by a caregiver when participating in civic activities and everyday events.

Re: S.B. 2503

The Hawai'i Civil Rights Commission (HCRC) offers these comments on S.B. 2503, which

requires new establishments of places of public accommodations and new state buildings to provide

universal changing accommodations equally accessible regardless of gender. This new part of Chapter

489 will be expressly excluded from HCRC jurisdiction.

As background, the HCRC has enforcement jurisdiction over Hawai'i's laws prohibiting

discrimination in employment (Chapter 378, Part I, HRS), housing (Chapter 515, HRS), public

accommodations (Chapter 489, HRS), and access to state and state-funded services (section 368-1.5,

HRS). The HCRC carries out the Hawai'i constitutional mandate that no person shall be discriminated

against in the exercise of their civil rights. Art. I, Sec. 5.

The measure proposes a new part to the statutes, and places it within Chapter 489. Noting that the HCRC has jurisdiction over discrimination in public accommodations under Chapter 489, Part I, the HCRC appreciates the placement of this new adult changing station requirement in a new part, expressly excluded from HCRC jurisdiction. In this respect, the new statutory requirement would be similar to Chapter 489, Part II, relating to Breastfeeding in Public Accommodations, which is also expressly placed outside of HCRC jurisdiction.

This measure would significantly aid those with disabilities who need help with toileting, by providing safe and sanitary facilities that would allow them to join friends and family members on social outings. The lack of access to changing facilities can limit those with disabilities from leaving home which would lead to less access to engaging with the community. This bill will aid them and their caregivers, regardless of gender, by providing support that would allow them to partake in social interaction, connection, and sense of belonging.

The measure defines universal changing accommodations as a "powered, height adjustable adult changing station that is either floor or wall-mounted." Several other states, including New Hampshire, California, and Arizona have enacted similar measures, some more limited than this proposal, emphasizing the need for these accommodations in large entertainment venues or state buildings. For example, California's statute is limited to places of public amusement such as sports arenas or theaters. Arizona's statute is only applicable to buildings built with public monies. New Hampshire's law applies to all public buildings. This measure would require universal changing accommodations in a broader range of establishments in the state of Hawai'i.

This is pioneering legislation that would aid those with disabilities and their caregivers.

The Hawaii State Public Library System (HSPLS) **supports the intent of S.B. 2503 and provides comments** on the bill, which requires all places of public accommodation constructed after 12/31/24 and state building construction completed after 12/31/24 to provide universal changing accommodations that are equally accessible regardless of gender.

The HSPLS supports the intent of this measure, but notes that the December 31, 2024 timeline referenced in the definition of "new establishment" means that the measure will apply to buildings that completed final design 1-2 years ago. This may require significant change orders to redesign a previously finalized design and could delay the construction schedule for the project. Instead, we suggest that the Legislature consider a benchmark that could reasonably be met without significantly impacting projects that are nearing final design.

The Department of Accounting and General Services (DAGS) requests the following amendment be made in the proposed language contained in lines 20 – 21 on page 5 of the bill:

" (e) <u>Where feasible and cost effective, state building construction projects bid</u> after June 30, 2025, shall include universal changing accommodations pursuant to part _____ of Chapter 489."

The addition of this amendment allows agencies to reasonably redesign projects already in process to meet this requirement and to minimize the claims for hardship due to unreasonable time constraints.

Bill No. and Title: Senate Bill No. 2503, Relating to Equity.

Purpose: Requires all places of public accommodation constructed after 12/31/24 and state building construction completed after 12/31/24 to provide universal changing accommodations that are equally accessible regardless of gender.

Judiciary's Position:

The Judiciary appreciates the intent of Senate Bill No. 2503 and offers the following comments and concerns.

Respectfully, this measure should not apply to State projects that have applied for building permits or projects that will have applied for building permits as of the effective date of the bill, even if they will be constructed after December 31, 2024.

As currently written, this bill would apply to and adversely impact the development of First Circuit's Wahiawā District Court. Wahiawā District Court's design is complete and the project is soon entering the building permit process. Indeed, the design documents have been offered for bidding and the project was awarded. Unfortunately, there is no room in the current design for universal changing accommodations and it would be costly to add the design at this late stage.

Dear Chair McKelvey, Vice Chair Gabbard, Honorable Members of the Senate Committee on Government Operations, Chair San Buenaventura, Vice Chair Aquino, and Honorable Members of the Senate Committee on Health and Human Services:

I am Gary Simon, a member of the board of the Hawai'i Family Caregiver Coalition, whose mission is to improve the quality of life of those who give and receive care by increasing community awareness of caregiver issues through continuing advocacy, education, and training.

The Hawai'i Family Caregiver Coalition supports SB 2503, which requires all places of public accommodation constructed after December 31, 2024 and State building construction completed after December 31, 2024 to provide universal changing accommodations that are equally accessible regardless of gender.

Disabled children, adolescents, and adults — over the height and weight limits of baby changing tables — requiring help with toileting cannot use regular handicapped-accessible bathrooms. Instead, there must be a choice to stay home from public spaces, be laid down on a restroom floor to be changed by their caregiver, or leave the public place or event as soon as they need the restroom to be changed inside a vehicle or return home. Universal changing spaces have height-adjustable, adult-size changing tables that accommodate everyone. These are necessary for public areas such as restaurants, hotels, venues, movie theaters, and zoos so that disabled individuals can have equal opportunities to engage in activities and travel. All disabled Americans deserve a safe, private, and dignified changing space.¹

We urge you to support universal changing accommodations and SB 2503, we urge you to recommend its passage, and we thank you for seriously considering the bill.

On behalf of the Epilepsy Foundation of Hawaii (EFH), we urge your **SUPPORT of Senate Bill 2503**, RELATING TO EQUITY. This bill supports providing universal changing accomodations in all places of public accommodation and state building construction construction after 12/31/24.

The Epilepsy Foundation is the leading national voluntary health organization that speaks on behalf of the at least 3.4 million Americans with epilepsy and seizures. Epilepsy Foundation of Hawaii, advocates and provides services for the almost 14,000 individuals living with epilepsy throughout Hawaii. Collectively, we foster the wellbeing of children and adults affected by seizures through research programs, educational activities, advocacy, and direct services. Epilepsy is a medical condition characterized by seizures, which are sudden surges of electrical activity in the brain, that affects a variety of mental and physical functions. Approximately 1 in 26 Americans will develop epilepsy, and approximately 1 in 10 people will experience a seizure, at some point in their lifetime.

Epilepsy is a chronic medical problem that for many people can be successfully treated. Unfortunately, treatment doesn't work for everyone. AT LEAST 1 million people in the United States have uncontrolled epilepsy, which is considered a disability by the Social Security Administration (SSA). Epilepsy does not discriminate. It can effect anyone at any age, gender, ethnicity, or size, and is often times a comorbidity with other disease states. For many, their epilepsy is debilitating.

Universal changing stations are height adjustable and support weights up to 300+ pounds, alleviating the challenge of caregivers having to navigate changing kupuna, adults and older children with disabilities either in their cars or unsafe and unsanitary spaces. Universal changing stations in state and federal buildings would

Dear Chairs San Buenaventura and McKelvey, Vice Chairs Aquino and Gabbard, and Senate Heath and Human Services and Government Operations

My name is Jari Sugano and I am writing in strong support of Senate bill 2503.

My daughter is 15 and has severe developmental delays. Her ability to go out in public is limited as there are no public facilities in our community that have an accessible bathroom for her to change her incontinent supplies.

Arizona, California, New Hampshire, Michigan and Pennsylvania have enacted laws creating Universal Changing Stations in public buildings granting access to individuals with disabilities.

Universal changing stations are height adjustable and support weights up to 300+ pounds. Adults and older children with disabilities, need a safe, sanitary and dignified place to change their incontinent supplies so they can actively engage in civic and community based activities. Infant tables can not support her weight. We are often forced to change her on bathroom floors or in the back of our vehicle.

According to the Center on Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), approximately 19% of Hawaii adults have a disability. Per the CDC, one in 5 adults in Hawaii are caregivers for adults who provide personal care to a friend or a family member with a health problem or disability.

Moreover, the Hawaii State Plan on Aging, estimates by 2030 nearly 28% of adults in Hawaii will be over the age of 60. There will be a 32% increase in adults over the age of 85 during the same period. These accommodations may help a broader and growing community with comparable issues.

Airports across the USA, including the Honolulu International Airport are creating Universal Changing Stations to allow those with disabilities access to travel. We hope senate bill SB2503 will be the start of increasing access to destinations within our community, across the county, and beyond.

A change in law would heighten inclusiveness and ultimately could improve the quality of life for those with a disability in Hawaii. These accommodations may also benefit caregivers, seniors or kupuna, as well.

Appreciate your consideration of our family's request.
