**Supporting the Intent**

**Senate Bill No. 2922, SD2, HD2, Relating to Public Utilities**

Chair Yamashita, Vice Chair Kitagawa, and Members of the House Committee on Finance:

The Office of the Governor supports S.B. No. 2922, SD2, HD2, Relating to Public Utilities.

The Maui wildfire resulted in unbearable loss of lives, homes, infrastructure, and businesses. This tragic event is a wake-up call that due to climate changes, the risk of catastrophic wildfires, along with other natural disasters in Hawaii has increased.

S.B. No. 2922, SD2, HD2, would create a process for electric utilities to develop and submit wildfire protection plans to the Public Utility Commission (PUC) for approval and allow the recovery of related costs and expenses through securitization, while avoiding a disproportionate impact on a specific ratepayer or county and requires public utilities to report wildfires potentially caused by or occurring in connection with their operations.

We need to ensure wildfire mitigation and prevention policies and plans are adopted by the State, but we need to also find reasonable ways to finance these improvements and investments. Through the securitization model that is proposed in this bill, resources will be available to address wildfire risk mitigation in a manner that should have a minimal impact on utility customers' electricity bills.

The Governor is keenly aware of our state's high electrical rates and the impact that it has on all of our residents. But, the wildfires were a stark and harsh signal to our state that we need to do more to protect against disasters like wildfires. The Office of the Governor supports this bill as it creates a process for wildfire plan protection and mitigation that must be approved by the PUC. Once approved, the PUC would also then have the ability to review a request for securitization financing. Utility rate securitization transactions have an extensive track record of success. Bonds securitized by rates receive AAA credit ratings from credit rating agencies and thus provide a means of securing capital at a lower interest rate than those currently available to utilities, in particular utilities without an investment grade credit rating.

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The Office of the Governor has serious concerns and does not support efforts by other parties to expand the scope of securitization to cover costs or claims related to Maui's catastrophic wildfire or efforts to require claims from those fires be prioritized or paid before the utility would be able to securitize costs from the wildfire protection plan. Due to climate change, we will unfortunately likely be prone to exposure to more wildfires in the future. As such, it is important that we provide the utility with a reasonable financing mechanism to invest and implement these necessary protections. Therefore, we do not support efforts to amend this bill so that claims from the Maui wildfire, can or should be paid, instead of wildfire protection plan investments.

Chair Yamashita and Members of the Committee:

My name is Michael Angelo, and I am the Executive Director of the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs (Department) Division of Consumer Advocacy. The Department offers comments on this bill.

The purpose of this bill is to: (1) create a process for electric utilities to develop and submit wildfire protection plans to the Public Utilities Commission (Commission) for approval and allow the recovery of related costs and expenses through securitization, while avoiding a disproportionate impact on a specific ratepayer or county; and (2) require public utilities to report wildfires potentially caused by or occurring in connection with their operations.

The tragedy and devastation of the wildfires that arose on Maui during the August 8, 2023 windstorm must be prevented from reoccurring. The State needs viable financing options to mitigate the risk of a future catastrophic wildfire occurring. Securitized bond financing, if bounded by adequate ratepayer protections and used with discipline, could offer a relatively low-interest source of funds. The Department

appreciates that the bill incorporates the contents of House Bill No. 2407, which focuses on creating pathways to prevent wildfires and protects at-risk infrastructure while incorporating important protections to help minimize the financial impact on ratepayers.

The Department has remaining concerns with some aspects of the processes outlined in § 269-B and § 269-C. The Department's proposed amendments below would add important protections for due process and stakeholder participation, and make it explicit that decision-making must occur during a standard docketed proceeding. The Department also proposes amendments to include the Department in proposed § 269-C(h) for liability protection. The Department includes recommended amendments for ratepayer protections in the proposed § 269-E and § 269-G to address the recent inclusion of securitization terms and provisions from the Office of the Attorney General in House Bill No. 2407, carried over here in this bill.

Therefore, the Department recommends the following amendments to the proposed statutory addition to Hawaii Revised Statutes Chapter 269, in Section 2 of the bill, to address its concerns for ratepayer protections:

**"PART . WILDFIRE PROTECTION AND MITIGATION**

\* \* \* \* \*

**§269-B Electric utility workshops.** The commission may periodically convene workshops to help electric utilities develop and share information for the identification, adoption, and implementation of best practices regarding wildfires, including but not limited to risk-based wildfire protection and risk-based wildfire mitigation procedures and standards. The best practices discussed in these workshops may be incorporated into the proposed wildfire protection plans and updates submitted by electric utilities for commission approval pursuant to section 269-C.

**§269-C Wildfire protection plans.** (a) Each electric utility shall have and operate in compliance

with a risk-based wildfire protection plan, which shall be submitted to ~~filed with and evaluated by the~~ commission for approval. The wildfire protection plan shall be based on reasonable and prudent practices, ~~which may be identified through workshops convened by the commission pursuant to section 269-B, regulatory proceedings conducted by the commission, and commission standards adopted by rule or order.~~ The electric utility shall design the wildfire protection plan to protect public safety, reduce risk to electric utility customers, and promote resilience of the Hawaii electric system to wildfire damage. [. . .]

\* \* \* \* \*

(b) Each electric utility shall regularly submit updates to its wildfire protection plan for approval on a schedule determined by the commission.

\* \* \* \* \*

(d) ~~The commission, in consultation with the department of land and natural resources, Hawaii emergency management agency, and local emergency services agencies,~~ shall evaluate each electric utility's wildfire protection plan and plan updates through a public process according to the commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure in Hawaii Administrative Rules Chapter 16-601. The commission shall allow the department of land and natural resources and local emergency services agencies to participate in

proceedings evaluating wildfire protection plans and plan updates.

(e) No more than ninety days after the last party filing, and no more than a total of one hundred eighty days after the initial application for approval of the submitted wildfire protection plan or update filing in the docketed proceeding ~~or non-docketed case related to the commission's evaluation of a wildfire protection plan or plan update from an electric utility,~~ the commission shall approve or approve with conditions or reject the wildfire protection plan or plan update based on whether ~~if~~ the commission finds that the wildfire protection plan or plan update is based on reasonable and prudent practices and designed to meet all applicable rules and standards adopted by the commission. The commission may, in approving the wildfire protection plan or plan update with conditions, direct the electric utility to make modifications to the wildfire protection plan or plan update that the commission believes represent a reasonable balancing of mitigation costs with the resulting reduction of wildfire risk based on the evidentiary record in the proceeding ~~information provided by the electric utility and based on best practices.~~ If the commission approves the wildfire protection plan or plan update with directed modifications, ~~t~~The commission shall issue a decision explaining any such directed modifications ~~at the time the commission approves the wildfire protection plan or plan update.~~ Such decision shall include a determination of the reasonable costs to develop, implement and administer the wildfire protection plan or

plan update. The commission shall determine which costs may be recoverable through rates, also determining which costs may already be covered by existing rates ~~establish a mechanism to allow timely and prompt recovery of such costs in rates, which shall be incremental to the rates the electric utility is otherwise authorized to charge.~~

\* \* \* \* \*

(h) There shall be no liability on the part of, and no cause of action of any nature shall arise against, the commission or its agents and employees, the Division of Consumer Advocacy or its agents and employees, the State, the commission commissioners, or the commissioners' representatives for the death of or injury to persons, or property damage, for any action taken by such in the performance of their powers and duties under this part.

**§269-E Applications to issue bonds and authorize wildfire protection charges.**

\* \* \* \* \*

(b) The application shall include all of the following:

(1) The principal amount of the bonds proposed to be issued and the selection of a financing entity;

(2) An estimate of the date each series of bonds is expected to be issued;

(3) The expected term, which shall include a scheduled final payment date not to exceed thirty years, and a legal final maturity that may be longer, subject to rating agency and market conditions, during which the

wildfire protection charge associated with the issuance of each series of bonds is expected to be imposed and collected;

(4) An estimate of the financing costs associated with the issuance of each series of bonds (however, in no case should those financing costs be allowed to be recovered from ratepayers);

(5) An estimate of the amount of the wildfire protection charge revenues necessary to pay principal and interest on the bonds and related financing costs as set forth in the application and the calculation for that estimate;

(6) A proposed design of the wildfire protection charges, and a proposed methodology for allocating the wildfire protection charge among customer classes;

(7) A description of the true-up adjustment for the adjustment of the wildfire protection charge to correct for any overcollection or undercollection of the wildfire protection charge, and to otherwise ensure the timely payment of principal and interest on the bonds and related financing costs; and

(8) Any other information required by the commission.

\* \* \* \* \*

(d) In exercising its duties under this section, the commission shall consider:

(1) Whether the wildfire protection costs to be financed by any bonds to be issued are just and reasonable;

(2) Whether the recovery of such costs is consistent with the public interest;

(3) Whether the terms and conditions of any bonds to be issued, including without limitation interest rates, rating, amortization redemption, and maturity, and the imposition and collection of fixed recovery charges as set forth in an application, are just and reasonable;

(4) Whether the recovery of recovery costs through the designation of the fixed recovery charges and any associated fixed recovery tax amounts, and the issuance of recovery bonds in connection with the fixed recovery charges, would result in net savings to consumers and reduce, to the maximum extent possible, the rates on a present value basis that consumers would pay as compared to the use of traditional utility financing mechanisms, which shall be calculated using the electric utility's updated overall corporate debt and equity costs in the ratio approved by the commission at the time of the financing order; provided that the commission may hire and rely upon a financial advisor in connection with this determination; provided that the financial advisor shall not direct how the recovery bonds are placed to market;~~and~~

(5) Whether approval of any bonds lowers the electric utility's overall enterprise risk, and so its return on equity should be lowered accordingly; and

(6) Any other factors that the commission deems reasonable and in the public interest.

The electric utility may request the determination specified in this section by the commission in a separate

~~proceeding from its application for approval of its wildfire protection plan or plan update, in an existing proceeding, or both. If the commission makes the determination specified in this section, the commission shall establish, as part of the financing order, a procedure for the electric utility to submit applications from time to time to request the issuance of additional financing orders designating wildfire protection charges and any associated fixed recovery tax amounts as recoverable.~~ The electric utility may submit an application with respect to wildfire protection costs that an electric utility has paid, has an existing legal obligation to pay, or would be obligated to pay pursuant to an agreement. The commission shall, within one hundred twenty days of the filing of that application, issue a financing order approving or rejecting the request, if the commission determines that the amounts identified in the application are wildfire protection costs.

~~At the option of the electric utility, the electric utility may include in its application for a financing order a request for authorization to sell, transfer, assign, or pledge recovery property to a governmental financing entity if the electric utility expects recovery bonds issued by a governmental financing entity would result in a more cost efficient means, taking into account all financing costs related to the recovery bonds, than using another financing entity to issue recovery bonds to finance the same recovery costs, taking into account the costs of issuing the other financing entity's bonds. If an electric~~



~~utility exercises this option, the commission may hire and rely upon a financial advisor in connection with the commission's review; provided that the financial advisor shall not direct how the recovery bonds are placed to market.~~

**§269-G Security interests in wildfire protection property; financing statements.**

\* \* \* \* \*

If default occurs under the security agreement covering the wildfire protection property, the pledgees of the wildfire protection property, subject to the terms of the security agreement, shall have all rights and remedies of a secured party upon default under chapter 490, article 9, and shall be entitled to foreclose or otherwise enforce their security interest in the wildfire protection property, subject to the rights of any third parties holding prior security interests in the wildfire protection property perfected in the manner provided in this section. In addition, the commission may require in the financing order creating the wildfire protection property that, in the event of default by the electric utility in payment of wildfire protection property revenues, the commission and any successor thereto, upon the application by the pledgees or assignees, including assignees under section 269-H of the wildfire protection property, and without limiting any other remedies available to the pledgees or

assignees by reason of the default, shall order the sequestration and payment to the pledgees or assignees of wildfire protection property revenues. Any financing order shall remain in full force and effect notwithstanding any bankruptcy, reorganization, or other insolvency proceedings with respect to the debtor, pledgor, or transferor of the wildfire protection property. Any surplus in excess of:

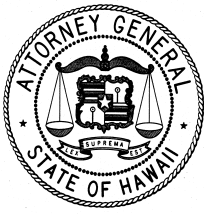
(1) Amounts necessary to pay principal, premiums, if any, interest, costs, and arrearages on the bonds, and associated financing costs arising under the security agreement; or

(2) In the event the wildfire protection property has been assigned to an assignee in connection with the exercise of remedies upon a default, an amount sufficient to repay the principal amount of, and interest that would have accrued on, the bonds had they remained outstanding,

shall be remitted to ~~the debtor or to the pledgor or transferor~~ ratepayers."

The Department also emphasizes that it is important to develop plans and take actions to prevent wildfires together with mitigating the risks from other hazards like hurricanes and flooding.

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Chair Yamashita and Members of the Committee:

The Department of the Attorney General provides the following comments.

This bill creates a process whereby electric utilities develop and submit effective risk-based wildfire protection plans to the Public Utilities Commission for approval and the Commission evaluates those plans and either approves them or does so with modifications. In addition, it requires public utilities to report wildfires caused by or occurring in connection with their operations.

To facilitate the public's understanding of what the Legislature is trying to accomplish regarding funding for the wildfire protection plans, we recommend that there be an explanation of the utility rate securitization process.

Utility rate securitization is a way for a utility company to turn its customers' future payments on their utility bills into money that the utility can use upfront. Instead of waiting for individual customers to make their payments on their bills, the utility company bundles its unpaid bills into a security. This security is then sold to investors. In return, the investors receive a promise of getting paid back over time as customers pay their bills.

Consequently, utility rate securitization turns future utility payments into an investment security. It helps the utility company get money upfront, and investors earn returns over time as the utility bills get paid. Further, utility rate securitizations receive investment grade ratings because they offer a reliable and steady income stream

backed by an essential service that people need, and they operate in a regulated environment. Utility rate securitizations have no impact on the credit ratings of the State of Hawaii and of a county because the securities have no recourse to the funds of the State or a county.

Due to the specialized nature of securitization financing, we asked Craig Scully, Esq., of Katten Muchin Rosenman LLP, the State's Public Finance General Advice Counsel, to review the bill. Mr. Scully has reviewed the bills that allow public utilities to securitize rates to raise capital that can be used to pay for costs and expenses arising out of catastrophic wildfires. Based on Mr. Scully's review, we recommend that section 2 (page 3, line 8, through page 52, line 5) of this bill, which addresses the provisions necessary to implement the utility rate securitization, be deleted and its contents replaced with section 8 (page 56, line 1, through page 103, line 10) of House Bill No. 2700, H.D. 3, S.D. 1, Relating to Wildfires (a copy of which is linked here: [https://www.capitol.hawaii.gov/sessions/session2024/bills/HB2700\\_SD1\\_.pdf](https://www.capitol.hawaii.gov/sessions/session2024/bills/HB2700_SD1_.pdf)), which also addresses the implementation of the utility rate securitization, and be passed as an H.D. 3 of this bill.

In League of Women Voters of Honolulu v. State, 150 Hawai'i 182, 205, 499 P.3d 382, 405 (2021), the Hawai'i Supreme Court held that the constitutional requirement that a bill must pass three readings in each house "begin[s] anew after a non-germane amendment changes the object or subject of a bill so that it is no longer related to the original bill as introduced." Similar to section 2 of this bill, section 8 of House Bill No. 2700, H.D. 3, S.D. 1, establishes the statutory framework for utility rate securitizations. However, section 8 of House Bill No. 2700, H.D. 3, S.D. 1, offers additional clarification and refinement, thereby better fulfilling the objectives of this bill.

While there are certain differences between section 8 of House Bill No. 2700, H.D. 3, S.D. 1, and section 2 of this bill, we believe that these differences do not present a germaneness problem.

We note that section 8 of House Bill No. 2700, H.D. 3, S.D. 1, does not have a definition of "governmental financing entity" that section 2 of this bill has (page 9, lines

3-16) because section 8 contemplates that only the utility, and not the State or a county, will be issuing the utility rate securitization bonds.

Also, while section 8 of House Bill No. 2700, H.D. 3, S.D. 1, does not have an explicit "penalties" section that appears in section 2 of this bill as section 269-D (page 23, line 1, through page 24, line 2), we note that the Public Utilities Commission has the authority to assess penalties against a utility. See section 269-28, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS). Further, we note that section 8 of House Bill No. 2700, H.D. 3, S.D. 1, does not have a "Bonds; issuance; wildfire protection property interests" section that section 2 of this bill has in section 269-F (page 38, line 8, through page 42, line 15). We note that these provisions are addressed in section 8 of House Bill No. 2700, H.D. 3, S.D. 1, as "Wildfire protection plan financing order," section 269-E (page 82, line 5, through page 92, line 17), and in "Wildfire protection charge," section 269-F (page 92, line 18, through page 94, line 7).

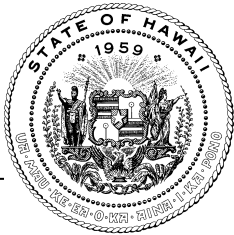
We note a typographical error in House Bill No. 2700, H.D. 3, S.D. 1, that mistakenly permits the Commission to authorize an electric utility to recoup from ratepayers any actual costs linked to the development, implementation, and administration of a wildfire protection plan beyond those costs previously sanctioned by the Commission when it deems those extra costs as "unreasonable" rather than "reasonable." To avoid that error in this bill, when inserting the wording from H.B. No. 2700, H.D. 3, S.D. 1, we propose correcting the wording of the third paragraph of the new section 269-C(f), HRS, on page 74, lines 3-10, as follows:

If the actual costs are equal to or greater than the amounts that the commission determined were reasonable in its decision under subsection (e), the commission shall not direct the electric utility to refund to ratepayers the amount the commission previously determined was reasonable and shall limit its review to any additional costs, which it shall allow the electric utility to recover from ratepayers if the commission finds the costs [~~unreasonable.~~] reasonable.

Because of the complexity of the securitization process, additional information is required to safeguard ratepayers and prioritize the public interest. Our comments are still being refined and developed.

We respectfully ask the Committee to consider our suggested amendments.

Chair Yamashita, Vice Chair Kitagawa, and members of the Committee, the Hawai'i State Energy Office (HSEO) offers comments on SB 2922, SD2, HD2, that creates a process for electric utilities to develop and submit wildfire protection plans to the Public Utilities Commission for approval and allow the recovery of related costs and expenses through securitization, while avoiding a disproportionate impact on a specific ratepayer or county. The measure also requires public utilities to report wildfires potentially caused by or occurring in connection with their operations.

HSEO appreciates the intent of the measure to use securitized recovery bonds to protect an electric utility from potential impacts from catastrophic wildfires and that the core planning elements found in the preferred HB 2407, HD2, have largely been incorporated. HSEO has reservations about including any liability shield language to this measure. Having and implementing a wildfire protection plan, even as specified and approved by regulators, may not account for all areas where negligence could result in injury, death, or damage and should not warrant blanket protections.

**DESCRIPTION:** Creates a process for electric utilities to develop and submit wildfire protection plans to the Public Utilities Commission for approval and allow the recovery of related costs and expenses through securitization, while avoiding a disproportionate impact on a specific ratepayer or county. Requires public utilities to report wildfires potentially caused by or occurring in connection with their operations. Effective 7/1/3000. (HD2)

**POSITION:**

The Public Utilities Commission (“PUC” or “Commission”) offers the following comments and amendments for consideration.

**COMMENTS:**

The Commission supports the intent of this measure to create a process for electric utilities to develop and submit wildfire protection plans to the Commission and allow the recovery of related costs and expenses through securitization while minimizing impacts on specific ratepayers or counties. The Commission understands the importance of reducing the likelihood and impact of wildfires across the State and is committed to supporting such efforts.

At a high-level, the Commission offers the following suggestions on this measure, described further below:

- Modify the definition of “wildfire protection costs” to include only costs associated with catastrophic wildfires that the Commission finds were prudently incurred;
- Harmonize any deadlines for PUC decisions to eliminate any ambiguity about how long the PUC has to render a decision;



- Remove the civil liability shield for electric utilities with a Commission approved wildfire protection plan;
- Make adjustments to the cap on how much of an average residential customer's bill may constitute of wildfire protection charges;
- Allow the wildfire protection charge to cover the costs for the Commission's potential financial consultant;
- Clarify language surrounding the transfer of systems operation obligations to allow appropriate review by the Commission; and
- Mandate reporting on all reasonable actions the electric utility will take to ensure its system is safe, reliable, and prepared for a wildfire and require the list of risks described in §269-C paragraph 12 to consider certain risks and risk drivers at a minimum.

The Commission has a duty to ensure that any rates it authorizes are just and reasonable. This measure would enable an electric utility to utilize securitization to recover any wildfire protection costs, which are specifically defined as "any capital costs and operation and maintenance expenses related to the development, implementation, and administration of a wildfire protection plan prepared pursuant to section 269-C." To better protect ratepayers, the Commission recommends amending this definition to costs to include only costs that the commission finds were or will be prudently incurred.

This measure would also require the Commission to issue decisions on any wildfire protection plans submitted to the Commission, as well as issue decisions on any associated financing orders. These deadlines are scattered throughout this measure and are often inconsistent with each other. The Commission urges this Committee to harmonize any PUC deadlines in this measure so that there is no ambiguity about what the applicable deadline for a PUC decision is. Given the pressing urgency of reducing the reducing the likelihood and impact of wildfires in Hawaii, the Commission understands the desire for a quick decision by the Commission on any applications seeking approval for a wildfire protection plan, or any application for a financing order to recover the costs associated with the development, implementation, and administration of a wildfire protection plan. Nevertheless, this need for a quick decision must be balanced with the equally important needs to develop a sound docket record and to protect the procedural rights of any parties and participants in the docket. This measure contemplates the Commission having to determine the reasonability of many extremely complicated and technical matters related to a wildfire protection plan or securitization. Imposing strict time requirements on any Commission decision may impair the development of a sound docket record, the proper evaluation of that docket record, and the issuance of a Commission decision that serves the public interest. As such, the Commission offers that amending this measure to require a Commission decision within ninety days of the last party filing in the docket would better balance the many considerations at play here,

as it would not only allow the Commission to develop a sound docket record but also require quick action by the Commission once that docket record is properly developed.

The Commission also notes that this measure would create a limited civil liability shield for any electric utility with a commission approved wildfire protection plan. The Commission is concerned that such a shield may inadvertently disincentivize the electric utility from operating in a safe and reliable manner and therefore recommends the removal of this shield from this measure. Removing this shield would ensure that electric utilities are continuously monitoring and improving wildfire protection practices.

Additionally, the Commission notes that this measure would limit wildfire protection charges such that they constitute no more than five percent of the average residential bill, calculated at the time of the last such financing order. Such a hard cap may result in the Commission being unable to grant adequate and compensatory cost recovery to the electric utility for wildfire protection costs that the Commission has determined were or will be prudently incurred. Furthermore, customer bill amounts are constantly fluctuating, even with a constant amount of usage, due to the volatility of the electric utility's fuel expenses. Requiring the bill impact here be calculated on the basis of the average residential bill calculated at the time of the last such financing order may result in a bill impact that is misrepresentative of the average residential bill at the time the Commission will be issuing a decision on a financing order.

Finally, the Commission recommends minor amendments to further clarify the requirements of a wildfire protection plan to ensure timely submission and review of such plans.

Consistent with the Commission's comments above, the Commission offers the following amendments to:

Page 10, Line 16 to Page 11, Line 13

"Wildfire protection costs" means any capital costs and operation and maintenance expenses related to the development, implementation, and administration of a wildfire protection plan prepared pursuant to section 269-C. "Wildfire protection costs" does not include any penalties levied against an electric utility pursuant to section 269-D. "Wildfire protection costs" may also include any of the following:

(1) Catastrophic wildfire costs or expenses authorized by the commission in a financing order for recovery that the commission has determined were or will be prudently incurred;

(2) Federal and state taxes associated with recovery of the amounts pursuant to paragraph (1);

(3) Financing costs; and

(4) Professional fees, consultant fees, redemption premiums, tender premiums, and other costs incurred by the electric utility in using proceeds of bonds to acquire outstanding securities of the electric utility, as authorized by the commission in a financing order that the commission has determined were or will be prudently incurred.

Page 16, Line 17 to Page 19, Line 3

(12) Include a list that identifies, describes, and prioritizes wildfire risks, and drivers for those risks, throughout the electric utility's service territory, including all relevant risk and risk mitigation information as may be required by guidance or rules adopted by the commission, and at a minimum the following:

(A) Risks and risk drivers associated with design, construction, operations, and maintenance of the electric utility's equipment and facilities; and

(B) Particular risks and risk drivers associated with topographic and climatological risk factors throughout the different parts of the electric utility's service territory;

(13) Describe how the wildfire protection plan accounts for risks the electric utility identifies under paragraph (12);

(14) Describe the reasonable actions the electric utility will take to ensure its system will achieve the highest level of safety, reliability, and resiliency, and to ensure that its system is prepared for a wildfire, including hardening and modernizing its infrastructure with improved engineering, system

design, standards, equipment, and facilities, such as undergrounding lines, insulation of distribution wires, and pole replacement;

~~(14)~~(15) Include a showing that the electric utility has an adequately sized and trained workforce to promptly restore service after a wildfire, taking into account employees of other utilities pursuant to mutual aid agreements and employees of entities that have entered into contracts with the electric utility;

~~(15)~~(16) Identify the estimated development, implementation, and administration costs for the wildfire protection plan;

~~(16)~~(17) Identify the timelines, as applicable, for development, implementation, and administration of any aspects of the wildfire protection plan;

~~(17)~~(18) Describe how the wildfire protection plan is consistent with the electric utility's other hazard mitigation and grid hardening plans, including plans to prepare for, and to restore service after, a wildfire, including workforce mobilization and prepositioning equipment and employees;

~~(18)~~(19) Identify community outreach and public awareness efforts that the electric utility will use before, during, and after a wildfire;

~~(19)~~(20) Describe the processes and procedures the electric utility will use to do all of the following:

(A) Monitor and audit the implementation of the wildfire protection plan;

(B) Monitor the effectiveness of the wildfire protection plan and the wildfire protection plan's implementation and identify areas for improvement; and

(C) Monitor and audit the effectiveness of electrical line and equipment inspections, including inspections performed by contractors, carried out under the wildfire protection plan and other applicable statutes and rules of the commission;

~~(20)~~(21) Demonstrate elements of data governance, including enterprise systems, as may be required by guidance or rules adopted by the commission;  
~~(21)~~(22) Include any modifications to paragraphs (1) to ~~(20)~~(21); and

(e) No more than ninety days after the last party filing, ~~and no more than a total of one hundred eighty days after the initial filing~~ in the docket or non-docketed case related to the commission's evaluation of a wildfire protection plan or plan update from an electric utility, the commission shall approve or approve with conditions the wildfire protection plan or plan update if the commission finds that the wildfire protection plan or plan update is based on reasonable and prudent practices and designed to meet all applicable rules and standards adopted by the commission. The commission may, in approving the wildfire protection plan or plan update with conditions, direct the electric utility to make modifications to the wildfire protection plan or plan update that the commission believes represent a reasonable balancing of mitigation costs with the resulting reduction of wildfire risk based on the information provided by the electric utility and based on best practices. The commission shall issue a decision explaining any such directed modifications at the time the commission approves the wildfire protection plan or plan update. Such decision shall include a determination of the reasonable costs to develop, implement and administer the wildfire protection plan or plan update. The commission shall establish a mechanism to allow timely and prompt recovery of such costs in rates, which shall be incremental to the rates the electric utility is otherwise authorized to charge.

~~—— (1) Any act taken in accordance with a wildfire protection plan or plan update approved by the commission under this part; or~~

~~—— (2) Any failure to take an action proposed by an electric utility in a wildfire protection plan or plan update and thereafter removed from the wildfire protection plan or plan update by modification of the commission.~~

(~~h~~g) There shall be no liability on the part of, and no cause of action of any nature shall arise against, the commission or its agents and employees, the State, the commission commissioners, or the commissioners' representatives for the death of or injury to persons, or property damage, for any action taken by such in the performance of their powers and duties under this part.

(~~i~~h) The commission shall, as appropriate, adopt rules or issue orders for the implementation of this section. The rules or orders may include but need not be limited to procedures and standards regarding data governance, risk-based decision-making, vegetation management, public power safety shutoffs and restorations, pole materials, circuitry, and monitoring systems.

(i) The commission's approval of a risk-based wildfire protection plan does not establish a defense to any enforcement action for violation of a commission rule or order, or relieve an electric utility from proactively managing wildfire risk, including by

In any action seeking to hold an electric utility civilly liable for the death of or injury to persons, or property damage, no inference of liability may be drawn solely based on a failure by the electric utility to adhere to the requirements of an approved wildfire protection plan.~~

The electric utility may request the determination specified in this section by the commission in a separate proceeding, in an existing proceeding, or both. **Ulupono Initiative supports SB 2922 SD2 HD2, Relating to Public Utilities.**

Dear Chair Yamashita and Members of the Committee:

My name is Micah Munekata, and I am the Director of Government Affairs at Ulupono Initiative. We are a Hawai'i-focused impact investment firm that strives to improve the quality of life throughout the islands by helping our communities become more resilient and self-sufficient through locally produced food, renewable energy, clean transportation choices, and better management of freshwater resources.

**Ulupono supports SB 2922 SD2 HD2 and offers comments.** This bill creates a process for electric utilities to develop and submit wildfire protection plans to the Public Utilities Commission for approval and allow the recovery of related costs and expenses through securitization, while avoiding a disproportionate impact on a specific ratepayer or county. This bill also requires public utilities to report wildfires potentially caused or occurring in connection with their operations.

Hawai'i's unique communities and ecosystems are increasingly threatened by the devastating impacts of wildfires. In recent years, we have witnessed a rise in the frequency and intensity of wildfires, exacerbated by climate change, land and water management practices, and urban encroachment into fire-prone areas. The culmination of these forces resulted in the devastating and heartbreaking destruction seen on Maui last year.

Undisputed are the importance and urgency of preparing for increased risks from wildfires and ensuring that loss and damage caused by wildfires are addressed. This bill also rightly identifies the critical need for public utilities to have access to capital in order to invest in wildfire risk mitigation and disaster relief. By enabling the securitization of rates, this bill offers a potential path to raise the necessary funds, thereby protecting both the utilities' financial stability and the interests of ratepayers from escalating costs due to higher interest rates on borrowing.

This bill reflects an uncomfortable set of circumstances and a difficult decision for lawmakers. The pressing need (and community expectation) is that significant investments be made towards wildfire mitigation and recovery, at a moment when the largest electric utility is facing unprecedented financial constraints. These unfortunate circumstances have led to the need for creative financing alternatives to accelerate priority investments.

While many may view such a bill as a benefit to existing electric utilities, it is important to note that any business would struggle to make significant investments while facing limited access to the capital markets. Higher interest rates and other unfavorable lending terms would otherwise only end up increasing energy rates for customers.<sup>1</sup> In addition, due to the financing structure of renewable energy projects, an electric utility that suffers from a lower credit rating may also be less likely to leverage their balance sheet to support important utility-scale renewable energy projects, undermining Hawai'i's ongoing shift towards achieving a completely renewable energy future.

UluPono recognizes the multifaceted challenges facing the electric utilities, including the need to address ongoing potential wildfire liability while aggressively pursuing the state's policy goals of increasing clean energy, improving grid reliability and resiliency, and reducing costs for customers. As such, a measure such as this can help establish a financial instrument to enable much needed wildfire mitigation investments that the community demands be made. This is not a perfect solution—there are tradeoffs to be sure—but, on the whole, UluPono considers this a net positive for the state.

While this bill's objectives are clear and necessary, it is essential to ensure that the mechanisms for rate securitization are transparent and include robust safeguards to prevent undue financial burdens on ratepayers. UluPono applauds the amended provisions requiring regular audits and reporting to maintain accountability and transparency in how the raised funds are utilized towards wildfire mitigation and recovery efforts, and we recommend that such reporting be open and available to the public, as applicable. UluPono also applauds the provision requiring that, in order to seek approval for recovery of costs using securitized rates, the utility develop and seek approval from the Public Utilities Commission for a wildfire protection plan, but we reiterate that such a wildfire mitigation plan should be developed in a docketed process that is open to community and stakeholder engagement. UluPono considers community engagement a crucial component of the decision-making process, particularly when it comes to investments that support community health and safety—even more so when the investments will ultimately be at the ratepayer's/community's expense.

SB 2922 represents a small step towards managing the financial implications of natural disasters on public utilities and their customers. UluPono supports the bill's intent and encourages the inclusion of additional safeguards to ensure transparency, accountability, and the protection of ratepayers' interests.

Aloha Chair Yamashita, Vice Chair Kitagawa and members of the Committee,

My name is Wren Wescoatt, Vice President of Development for Longroad Energy (Longroad), and I am testifying in support of SB 2922 HD2. This bill is an important step toward restoring Hawaiian Electric Company's (HECO's) credit rating which will reduce the financial costs to ratepayers and allow the utility to continue progress on meeting the state's clean energy goals, which are intended to help mitigate the harmful effects of climate change.

I have been developing clean energy in Hawai'i for the past 15 years for Longroad and First Wind. Together, our team has developed about half of the utility-scale wind and solar capacity operating in Hawaii today, and we financed more than \$500 million for construction of local projects – all of which have power contracts with HECO.

As a state, Hawai'i has been making steady progress toward 100% renewable electricity. But in order for any new utility-scale renewable energy projects to be contracted and constructed, the utility must have a credit rating of sufficient quality for lenders to provide financing. Additionally, HECO must be able to pay fees and post security to support the power purchase contracts which are reviewed and approved by the Public Utilities Commission (PUC). Since the Maui wildfires, HECO's credit was downgraded, and until that credit rating improves, it will be difficult for Longroad and other independent power producers to finance future energy projects here. Utility-scale renewable projects will be put on hold, and all the progress that Hawaii has been making toward 100% clean power will come to a full stop.

We support SB 2922 HD2, which offers an important solution to help restore HECO's credit rating. Securitization would allow the utility a critical path to access low-interest capital to fund its normal operations and system improvements with appropriate limits to protect ratepayers.

However, since continued progress toward Hawai'i's Renewable Portfolio Standards is critical to mitigating climate change and future wildfires in the long term, we are requesting **an amendment to add language that would include the fees and financial security to support PUC-approved renewable energy projects.**


In the definition of "Wildfire Protection Costs," we propose adding a subsection (5) as follows:

"...(5) Fees and security required for the continued procurement of renewable energy that achieves the state's renewable portfolio standards and mitigates future wildfire risk through power purchase contracts that shall be reviewed by the PUC."

This would allow HECO to enter into new Power Purchase Agreements that are currently being negotiated and could go a long way toward improving the utility's credit rating, which would ultimately lower costs for ratepayers and enable Hawai'i's clean energy transition to continue.

I ask for your favorable consideration in passing SB 2922 HD2 with the above amendment.

**Senate Bill No. 2922 SD2 HD2 - RELATING TO PUBLIC UTILITIES**

To the Honorable Kyle T. Yamashita, Chair, Honorable Lisa Kitagawa, Vice Chair, and Members of the Committee:

Kaua'i Island Utility Cooperative (KIUC) is a not-for-profit utility providing electrical service to more than 34,000 commercial and residential members.

**KIUC supports this legislation with modifications.**

KIUC recognizes that it is in the best interest of the state to minimize negative impacts to electric utility ratepayers for wildfire risk mitigation, disaster relief, and litigation. Providing vehicles such as the Catastrophic Wildfire Securitization Act to allow utilities to establish securitized charges in order to raise capital can have a positive impact on the utilities' financial viability.

KIUC further agrees that financially stable utilities with the ability to access capital for critical investments necessary to improve safety and reliability is extremely important for Hawaii. Securitization can be a cost-effective method for accessing capital for utilities and may be critically important for utilities that have non-investment grade credit ratings or other capital access difficulties.

KIUC does not anticipate the need to seek a financing order for wildfire mitigation efforts, or for utility system rebuilding cost as proposed in the bill because KIUC would have access to funding assistance from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). It is reasonable to expect FEMA would cover 75% of KIUC's rebuilding costs following a major catastrophic event, which would include a wildfire. Additionally, as a cooperative, KIUC has access to low-cost capital through the U.S.D.A. Rural Utilities Service (RUS), which would likely be a lower interest rate source of debt capital than even AAA-rated securitized bonds. If RUS debt is unavailable, KIUC would seek capital from one of our cooperative lenders, such as the National Rural Utilities Cooperative Finance Corporation or CoBank.

KIUC appreciates the flexibility to potentially utilize the provisions of a financing order in the event Kauai suffered from a catastrophic wildfire event which could result in responsibility for damages and claims outside of utility property covered under FEMA provisions or typically available for RUS financing. Due to the significant costs of issuing and servicing a securitized debt offering, securitization would likely only be applicable to wildfire recovery costs in excess of \$100 million dollars. KIUC does not anticipate our wildfire mitigation costs and expenses reaching this level, making securitization of limited applicability to financing the needs for Kaua'i.

With or without securitization and related financing order, recovery of prudently incurred wildfire mitigation costs is critically important for an electric utility. As currently drafted, outside of a high dollar level securitized debt offering, which electric cooperative likely will not have enough eligible costs to participate in, there is no other provision for cost recovery. KIUC does not have the ability to adjust utility rates for wildfire plan related costs without going through a expensive and time consuming general rate case process with the Hawaii PUC.

**Because of this, as currently drafted, this bill does not give parity to cooperative utilities in the ability to recover costs for wildfire mitigation efforts and potential claims**

KIUC recommends the bill be amended to include a provision for electric cooperatives to recover allowable costs as a surcharge or "rider" to member electric rates upon approval of costs by the HPUC, in the event that issuing bonds under securitization provisions is not cost-effective.

**KIUC offers the following addition to §269- E Applications to issue bonds and authorize wildfire protection charges:**

(g) Absent a financing order, the public utilities commission may create, pursuant to an application from a cooperative electric utility, a non-bypassable surcharge referred to as a fixed recovery charge, which shall be applied to wildfire protection costs as described in §269-A Definitions. The fixed recovery charge will be a dedicated, discrete tariff rider and shall be reconciled and adjusted on a yearly basis via a yearly informational filing with the HPUC and shall go into effect 30 days after such yearly filing.

Finally, **KIUC supports the language in §269-B (e);** "Fixed recovery charges and any associated fixed recovery tax amounts shall be imposed only on existing and future ratepayers in the utility service territory." KIUC supports the intent to specifically avoid statewide cost recovery mechanisms tied to securitization provisions alone.

Aloha Chair Yamashita, Vice Chair Kitagawa, and members of the Committee,

Clearway Energy Group ("Clearway") supports the intent of SB 2922 SD2 HD2, which provides a mechanism for securitization of utility costs associated with wildfires.

Clearway is one of the largest suppliers of renewable energy to Hawaiian Electric and its customers. Clearway owns and operates four solar energy projects on Oahu, two of which are solar-only projects that came online in 2019 (5 years into 22-year Power Purchase Agreements (PPAs)), and two of which are solar plus battery storage projects, Mililani I Solar and Waiawa Solar, which came online in July 2022 and January 2023, respectively (one year into 20-year PPAs). Clearway has three additional projects under development that were recently awarded in Hawaiian Electric's Stage 3 Renewable RFP. Our projects provide clean, reliable power to Hawaiian Electric's customers at a fixed price and at a lower cost than electricity from fossil fuel sources.

In supporting the intent of SB 2922 SD2 HD2, Clearway wishes to underscore the importance of a financially stable utility in keeping Hawai'i on track to meet its clean energy and grid reliability goals. Independent power producers such as Clearway enter into PPAs with the utility based on the strength of the utility's credit and confidence that it will honor its contractual obligations to pay for the power produced. These renewable power plants operate under supply contracts with Hawaiian Electric for decades, and the financial viability of the plants depends on the long-term financial viability of our customer. In the case of Clearway's operating plants, a stable long-term revenue stream goes to fund the long-term debt that financed the upfront capital costs on equipment and labor to construct the projects.

In this current environment of uncertainty, it is critically important to Clearway that our existing contracts are protected and that there is no interruption in Hawaiian Electric's purchases of power from our facilities. Additionally, for investors to have confidence investing in new renewable energy projects developed in Hawai'i, the utility will need to be viewed by the investment community as financially stable and capable of providing sufficient credit support. Until that point, it will be difficult for new, large-scale clean energy projects to move forward.

Hawai'i has an urgent need for new electric generation and storage resources to stabilize the grid and keep the State on track toward its clean energy goals. We encourage the Legislature to adopt measures that create a constructive path forward for Hawaiian Electric.

My name is Evan Oue and thank you for allowing me to submit testimony on behalf of the Hawaii Association for Justice (HAJ) in **STRONG OPPOSITION** to SB 2922 SD2 HD2 - RELATING TO PUBLIC UTILITIES. The measure seeks to implement the Catastrophic Wildfire Securitization Act (the "Securitization Act"), to allow public utilities to securitize rates in order to raise capital that can be used to pay for costs and expenses arising out of catastrophic wildfires.

SB 2922 SD2 HD2 was amended to reflect SB 2997 to: 1) allow the electric utilities to develop and submit wildfire protection plans to the Public Utilities Commission (PUC) for approval; and 2) allow the recovery of related *costs and expenses through securitization*.

Primarily, the measure was recently amended to incorporate a new Section 269-C (g) and (h) (Pages 21-22) to provide immunity for electric utilities and the Public Utilities Commission (PUC). Specifically, subsection (g) provides the electric utilities immunity for death of or injury to persons, unless it acts in a manner that constitutes "willful misconduct, bad faith, or reckless disregard of its obligations, in each case, in compliance with its obligations under a financing order and any applicable wildfire protection plan."

This provision would provide electric utilities immunity for: 1) an action in compliance with a mitigation plan approved by the PUC; and 2) failure to comply with a provision of the mitigation plan that was removed from the measure. We are concerned with the broad immunity in this provision does not account for negligence or the failure to act reasonable in compliance with

the mitigation plan or PUC order. This would be catastrophic for future victims that are injured or killed by negligently complying with the mitigation plan.

Additionally, we are concerned with subsection (h) with the overbroad immunity provided to the PUC for any action taken by such in the performance of their powers and duties under 269-C. This overbroad immunity eliminates all claims including negligence or wrongful misconduct for implementation and approval of the mitigation plan that may result in property damage or death of or injury to individuals. This would remove any sense of accountability for the PUC and leave those harmed by a potential negligence or wrongful act in approving the mitigation plan without any form of recourse.

**We fail to see the justification for the immunity provisions in subsections (j) and (k), especially after the devastation of the Lahaina Wildfire. Accordingly, we strongly urge that subsections (g) and (h) on Pages 21-22 be removed from the measure.**

Alternatively, should the measure continue to move with sections (g) and (h), we would recommend the following amendments to ensure that the immunity provided in these sections are not overly broad and prevent liability for misconduct, bad faith, or disregard. Sections (g) and (h) should be amended to read as follows:

"(g) So long as the electric utility has not acted in a manner that constitutes ~~willful~~ misconduct, bad faith, or ~~reckless~~ disregard of the electric utility's obligations, in each case, in compliance with any applicable wildfire protection plan, no electric utility shall be civilly liable for the death of or injury to persons, or property damage, as a result of:

(1) Any act taken in accordance with a wildfire protection plan or plan update approved by the commission under this part; or

(2) Any failure to take an action proposed by an electric utility in a wildfire protection plan or plan update and thereafter removed from the wildfire protection plan or plan update by modification of the commission.

(h) There shall be no liability on the part of, and no cause of action of any nature shall arise against, the commission or its agents and employees, ~~the State~~, the commission commissioners, or the commissioners' representatives for the death of or injury to persons, or property damage, for any action taken by such in

the performance of their powers and duties under this part, unless that action constitutes misconduct, bad faith, or disregard of the commission's obligations."

Furthermore, HAJ is concerned with the implications that the Securitization Act may have on victims and survivors of 2023 Maui Wildfire (the "Wildfire"). The victims and survivors of the Wildfire who lost loved ones, homes, businesses, and jobs should be the main priority when considering the future proceeds for the entities that were responsible for the damage and destruction that devastated the community of Lahaina. Allowing the public utilities to securitize rates to raise capital that can be used to pay for *costs and expenses* arising out of catastrophic wildfires is overly broad and will diminish the utility's ability to remedy the damage and destruction that was caused during the Wildfire.

HAJ is concerned that the current draft completely omits recovery costs for legitimate claims and settlements from the Wildfire and would revictimize the victims of the Wildfire by undercutting their ability seeking recourse for the negligence that led to the recent destruction of so many lives and livelihoods on Maui. Permitting the proceeds from the Securitization Act to be utilized for legal expenses and other costs prior to the payment of litigation awards or settlement to victims is unconscionable and removes any sense of accountability for those found liable for the Wildfire.

Furthermore, we are concerned with the use of "service territory" in Section 269-E(f). This may unfairly limit the recovery of these costs to Maui ratepayers which have already experienced enough from the Wildfire. Limiting the fixed recovery charges and any tax amounts to the future ratepayers in the "utility service area" will directly place the burden of the costs on Maui residents and victims. This would be tremendously unreasonable to place on a community that is still recovering.

Ultimately, we fail to see why those who have caused so much damage and destruction should be rewarded for their callousness by granting the ability to use borrowed funds for the payment of other costs and expenses, including legal fees, prior to making the victims who lost everything whole in the Wildfire. Holding those accountable and responsible for the negligence that changed the lives of many Maui residents forever should be of the utmost importance. Permitting the use of the proceeds to be utilized for any other expenses prior to the payment of legitimate awards or settlements would be an affront to the victims of the Wildfire.

Accordingly, HAJ recommends this measure be amended to: 1) designate the payment of litigation claims and settlements as a "high priority" for the proceeds of the Securitization Act in addition to costs and expenses; and 2) prevent the charges from being solely imposed on existing and future ratepayers of a particular utility service territory.

We look forward to working with all stakeholders on language for the measure which is suitable and protects the victims of the Wildfires. Thank you very much for allowing me to testify in **STRONG OPPOSITION** of the current draft of SB2922 SD2 HD2. My name is Jimmy D. Alberts and I am testifying on behalf of Hawaiian Electric in support of **SB 2922, SD2, HD2, Relating to Public Utilities and requesting modest amendments that improve the technical functioning of the securitization portion of the bill without altering its substance. Please see attached blackline for proposed amendments. These amendments reflect input from the Attorney General's office.**

SB 2922, SD2, HD2 now includes two substantive components that are important to the bill: (1) a part creating a process for a utility to submit a wildfire mitigation plan for approval to the public utilities commission; and (2) a part creating a process for the commission to approve securitizations of reasonable and prudent wildfire costs and expenses. For ease of reference, we divide our testimony into two parts.

**Wildfire Risk Mitigation Plan**

Hawaiian Electric understands the importance of having a robust wildfire mitigation strategy while providing safe, reliable power at a reasonable cost for our customers and communities. Nearly seven months after the tragic Maui wildfires,

Hawaiian Electric continues to press ahead with recovery efforts and identifying utility best practices and new technologies to prevent such a tragedy from ever happening again in our service territory. This bill is forward-looking and is about working to prevent something terrible like this from ever happening again. This bill will give utilities the tools we need to make our grids safe and resilient.

The Maui wildfires have prompted us to revisit the assumptions and determinations of risk shaping our wildfire mitigation efforts. Hawaiian Electric intends to work closely with the community to address key issues such as whether a preemptive power shutoff program is appropriate for Hawai'i. We also have accelerated and intensified the implementation of our own Wildfire Mitigation Plan and have taken other immediate action steps, including implementing fast trip settings on circuits, re-inspecting all lines for vulnerabilities, and initiating the process for replacing poles, conductor and fuses in high-risk areas.

We believe that SB 2922, SD2, HD2's wildfire risk mitigation plan part achieves three important objectives for the State: (1) it creates a public process for adopting robust, cost-effective wildfire protection plans according to codified standards; (2) it ensures that electric utilities have the resources necessary to implement those plans; and (3) it prevents civil litigants from undermining the public utilities commission's ability to make decisions vital to preventing wildfires in Hawaii.

### **Securitization**

We respectfully request this committee's assistance to improve the language of SB 2922, SD2, HD2's securitization section per the attached blackline. The increasing risk of catastrophic wildfires has placed an unprecedented financial strain on electric

utilities, necessitating new solutions to ensure continued safe and affordable electric service. This bill presents a strategic approach to this complex problem by introducing a securitization mechanism specifically tailored to wildfire-related costs. This bill provides a utility access to capital in response to a climate related event and has been adopted in some form in more than twenty-five states.

SB 2922, SD2, HD2 authorizes the issuance of bonds to pay for electric utilities' costs and expenses related to catastrophic wildfires. The bonds would be backed—that is, securitized—by a guaranteed revenue stream of future rate payments.

Under SB 2922, SD2, HD2, the commission may authorize the issuance of these bonds only under certain circumstances. The commission must determine that the wildfire costs and expenses the bonds are covering are just and reasonable. It must determine that the payment of interest rates and other bond-related fees is itself just and reasonable. It must determine that issuance of the bonds is consistent with the public interest.

SB 2922, SD2, HD2 would also codify a series of specific requirements designed to protect the integrity of these bonds. These detailed requirements parallel similar requirements in securitization statutes in other states, including California. They are necessary for the bonds to satisfy the expectations of the market for utility bonds; the requirements of rating agencies; and the rules of the IRS for favorable tax treatment.

We proposed edits to the provisions of SB 2922, SD2, HD2, in several respects. These edits are reflected on an attached blackline document.

First, we have proposed a number of technical amendments to the bill that bring HD2 in line with the expectations of the market and rating agencies as to how utility

securitizations work. These amendments do not change the substance of the bill—they ensure, instead, that its purpose to permit effective securitization of wildfire costs is successful. These amendments reflect standard best practices for utility securitizations that are designed to achieve the best possible ratings and meet market expectations. These are designed to ensure that the bill includes the features needed for a successful securitization transaction. These amendments bring this version in line with numerous securitization statutes adopted in recent years in other states. Those other state statutes have resulted in many successful securitization transactions, and we recommend these amendments to meet market and rating agency expectations, thus leading to the lowest possible cost. Furthermore, several of these changes were made with the goal of aligning this bill with the Attorney General’s comments on prior versions.

For example, we have inserted language that clarifies that references to “default” refer to a default “under the terms of the bonds,” as the legislation intends. We have also broadened the definition of catastrophic wildfire to be more inclusive of residential structures. There are various other clean-up edits, including defining electric utility to align with state code, clarifying the definition of financing costs to ensure that the fees result from the issuance of the financing order and other transaction-related costs, and removing redundancies.

More substantively, we have added a provision to address equitably spreading the securitization costs across customers of all three utilities, added language to clarify the operation of the 5% ratepayer cap, and added a subsection specifically describing the operation of wildfire protection charges, including how they are collected.

We are also open to working with other stakeholders to propose or accept edits to the bill that would further clarify that the public utilities commission has flexibility to use securitization to pay for prudent and reasonable costs—subject, in all cases, to the five percent cap.

As in previous iterations, we have made edits to ensure the functioning of the securitization transaction. For example, we clarified what precisely must be included in the application for a financing order.

Lastly, for the sake of clarity, we amended certain provisions requiring that the PUC must find that the securitization transaction would reduce ratepayer costs.

In the wake of the Maui fires, electric utilities will need to raise substantial amounts of capital to cover expenses associated with catastrophic wildfires. Securitization is the most efficient, least-cost way to finance those expenses. Bonds securitized by rates receive AAA credit ratings from credit ratings agencies and thus provide a means of securing capital at a lower interest rate than those currently available to utilities. For Hawaiian Electric, the potential savings are even greater, because rating agencies have rated us below investment-grade in the wake of the Maui fires, even before any determination of cause or fault has been reached. That rating means our ability to raise capital at this time is constrained and costly, which could harm customers through higher rates and reduced investment. A financially weak utility is less able to make the investments and commitments Hawaii needs to meet its renewable energy and other goals.

Securitization is also well-established. Since the 1990s, at least twenty-five states have allowed investor-owned utilities to finance costs and expenses using

securitized bonds. In 2022 alone, utilities in California raised over \$8 billion through securitization to cover costs associated with wildfires.

In summary, SB 2922, SD2, HD2's securitization part, with our proposed amendments, will enable the expenses due to catastrophic wildfires – that the commission determines customers should pay – to be financed at a lower cost and with less impact on customer bills. It will support the financial strength of electric utilities, which will enable them to make investments to reduce the risk of future wildfires at the lowest possible cost. And it will result in the adoption of a mechanism for funding wildfire costs that is well-established and well-tested, providing an added assurance of efficacy.

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# A BILL FOR AN ACT

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RELATING TO PUBLIC UTILITIES.

**BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:**

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the risk of catastrophic wildfires has increased, making it imperative that electric utilities develop, implement, and administer effective plans for wildfire risk mitigation. Electric utilities should develop, implement, and administer wildfire protection plans, and, through a public process, the public utilities commission should review and approve such plans.

The legislature also finds that a resilience working group, convened throughout 2019 and 2020, sought to identify and prioritize resilience threat scenarios and potential grid impacts; identify key customer and infrastructure sector capabilities and needs following a severe event and loss of power; identify gaps and priorities in grid and customer capabilities following a severe event and loss of power; provide recommendations and inputs for investor-owned utility grid planning to address resilience needs; and recommend additional grid and customer actions to close gaps and capabilities following severe events. The resilience working group

identified wildfires as one of five types of severe events of utmost importance to consider for achieving a resilient grid and provided resilience options for utilities to consider.

The legislature further finds that securitization may be the most efficient, least costly way to finance wildfire risk mitigation costs and expenses. Utility rate securitization transactions have an extensive track record of success. Bonds securitized by the right to recover rates receive investment grade credit ratings from credit rating agencies and thus provide a means of securing capital at a lower interest rate than those currently available to utilities, in particular utilities without an investment grade credit rating.

The purpose of this Act is to:

- (1) Create a process whereby electric utilities develop and submit effective risk ~~based-wildfire~~ protection plans to the public utilities commission for approval and the commission evaluates those plans and either approves them or does so with modifications;
- (2) Create a process whereby electric utilities are able to timely recover the prudently incurred costs and expenses of developing, implementing, and administering wildfire protection plans and ensure those costs and expenses are not borne disproportionately by any particular consumer or county; and
- (3) Require public utilities to report wildfires caused by or occurring in connection with their operations.

SECTION 2. Chapter 269, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and to read as follows:

**"PART . WILDFIRE PROTECTION AND MITIGATION**

**§269-A Definitions.** As used in this part:



"Ancillary agreement" means a bond insurance policy, letter of credit, reserve account, surety bond, swap arrangement, hedging arrangement, liquidity or credit support arrangement, or other similar agreement or arrangement entered into in connection with the issuance of bonds that is designed to promote the credit quality and marketability of the recovery bonds or to mitigate the risk of an increase in interest rates.

"Assignee" means a legally recognized entity:

(1) To which an electric utility assigns, sells, or transfers, other than as security, all or a portion of the electric utility's interest in or right to wildfire protection property; or

(2) Who acquires, by way of assignment or otherwise, all or a portion of the wildfire protection property following the exercise of remedies upon a default under the terms of the bonds.

"Assignee" includes a corporation, limited liability company, general partnership or limited partnership, public authority, trust, financing entity, or any other legal entity to which an assignee assigns, sells, or transfers, other than as security, its interest in or right to wildfire protection property.

"Bond" means any bond, note, certificate of participation or beneficial interest, or other evidence of indebtedness or ownership that is issued by the financing entity under a financing order, the proceeds of which are used directly or indirectly to recover, finance, or refinance financing costs of any wildfire protection costs, and that are directly or indirectly secured by or payable from wildfire protection property.

"Catastrophic wildfire" means any wildfire in the State that damaged or destroyed more than five hundred ~~residential or~~ commercial structures or residential structures designed for habitation.

"Commission" means the public utilities commission.

"Consumer" means any individual, governmental body, trust, business entity, or nonprofit organization that consumes electricity that has been transmitted or distributed by means of electric transmission or distribution facilities, whether those electric transmission or distribution facilities are owned by the consumer, the electric utility, or any other party.

"Electric utility" means a public utility, as defined in 14 HRS section 269-1, that is an electric utility company that is engaged in the production, transmission, or distribution of electricity.

"Financing costs" means the costs to issue, service, repay, or refinance bonds, whether incurred or paid upon issuance of the bonds or over the life of the bonds, if they are approved for recovery by the commission in a financing order. "Financing costs" may include any of the following:

- (1) Principal, interest, and redemption premiums that are payable on bonds;
- (2) A payment required under an ancillary agreement;
- (3) An amount required to fund or replenish reserve accounts or other accounts established under an indenture, ancillary agreement, or other financing document related to the bonds;
- (4) Taxes, franchise fees, or license fees imposed on a financing entity as a result of the issuance of the financing order, the assignment, sale or transfer of any wildfire

protection property or the sale of the bonds or imposed on the wildfire protection charges, or otherwise resulting from the collection of the wildfire protection charge, in any such case whether paid, payable, or accrued;

(5) Costs related to issuing and servicing bonds or the application for a financing order, including without limitation servicing fees and expenses, trustee fees and expenses, legal fees and expenses, accounting fees, administrative fees, underwriting and placement fees, financial advisory fees, original issue discount, capitalized interest, rating agency fees, and any other related costs that are approved for recovery in the financing order; and

(6) Other costs as specifically authorized by a financing order.

"Financing entity" means an electric utility or an entity to which an electric utility or an affiliate of an electric utility sells, assigns, or pledges all or a portion of the electric utility's interest in recovery property, including an affiliate of the electric utility or any unaffiliated entity, in each case as approved by the commission in a financing order.

For purposes of this definition and subject to section 269-1G(c), an entity to which an electric utility sells, assigns, or pledges all or a portion of the electric utility's interest in recovery property may include any governmental entity that is able to issue recovery bonds that are exempt from federal tax pursuant to section 103 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, including the State or a political subdivision thereof or any department, agency, or instrumentality of the State or political subdivision; provided that the recovery bonds issued shall not constitute a general obligation of the State or any political subdivision thereof or any department, agency, or instrumentality of the State or political subdivision and shall

not constitute a pledge of the full faith and credit of the entity or of the State or any political subdivision thereof, but shall be payable solely from the funds provided under this part.

"Financing order" means an order of the commission under this part that has become final and no longer subject to appeal as provided by law and that authorizes the issuance of recovery bonds and the imposition, adjustment from time to time, and collection of recovery charges, and which shall include a procedure to require the expeditious approval by the commission of periodic adjustments to wildfire protection charges and ~~to~~ any associated fixed recovery tax amounts included in that financing order to ensure recovery of all wildfire protection costs and the costs associated with the proposed recovery, financing, or refinancing thereof, including the costs of servicing and retiring the bonds contemplated by the financing order.

"Financing party" means any holder of recovery bonds, any party to or beneficiary of an ancillary agreement, and any trustee, collateral agent, or other person acting for the benefit of any of the foregoing.

"Fixed recovery tax amounts" means those nonbypassable rates and other charges, including but not limited to distribution, connection, disconnection, and termination rates and charges, that are needed to recover federal and state taxes associated with wildfire protection charges authorized by the commission in a financing order, but are not approved as financing costs financed from proceeds of bonds.

~~———"Governmental financing entity" means the State or a political subdivision thereof or any department, agency, or instrumentality of the State or a political subdivision to which an electric utility has assigned or pledged its interest in wildfire protection property as security for the payment of debt service on bonds, and related administrative costs and funding of reserves, issued by the governmental financing entity; provided that the bonds issued by the governmental financing entity shall not constitute a general obligation of the entity or of the State or any political subdivision of the State and shall not constitute a pledge of the full faith and credit of the governmental financing entity or of the State or any political subdivision of the State, but shall be payable solely from the funds provided under this part.~~

"True-up adjustment" means a formulaic adjustment to the wildfire protection charges as they appear on ~~eustomer~~ consumer bills that is necessary to correct for any overcollection or undercollection of the wildfire protection charges authorized by a financing order and to otherwise ensure the timely and complete payment and recovery of wildfire protection costs over the authorized repayment term.

"Wildfire protection chargesu" means the nonbypassable fees ~~and charges~~, including but not limited to distribution, connection, disconnection, and termination rates and charges, that are authorized by section 269-E and in a financing order authorized under this part to be imposed on and collected from

all existing and future consumers of a financing entity or any successor to recover both of the following:

- (1) Financing costs specified in the financing order; and
- (2) The costs of recovering, financing, or refinancing wildfire protection costs ~~through a wildfire protection plan~~ approved by the commission in the financing order, including the costs of issuing, servicing and retiring bonds.

"Wildfire protection costs" means any capital costs and operation and maintenance expenses related to the development, implementation, and administration of a wildfire protection plan prepared pursuant to section 269-C. "Wildfire protection costs" does not include any penalties levied against an electric utility pursuant to section 269-D. "Wildfire protection costs" may also include any of the following:

- (1) Catastrophic wildfire costs or expenses authorized by the commission in a financing order for recovery;
- (2) Federal and state taxes associated with recovery of the amounts pursuant to paragraph (1);
- (3) Financing costs; and
- (4) Professional fees, consultant fees, redemption premiums, tender premiums, and other costs incurred by the electric utility in using proceeds of bonds to acquire outstanding securities of the electric utility, as authorized by the commission in a financing order.

"Wildfire protection plan" means the risk-based wildfire protection plan mandated by section 269-C and approved by the commission.

"Wildfire protection property" means the property right created pursuant to this part, including without limitation the right, title, and interest of the electric utility, financing entity, or its assignee:

(1) In and to the wildfire protection charge established pursuant to a financing order, including the right to impose, bill, collect, and receive such wildfire protection ~~fixed recovery~~ charges under the financing order and all rights to obtain adjustments to the wildfire protection charge in accordance with section 269-~~FE~~ and the financing order; and

(2) To be paid the amount that is determined in a financing order to be the amount that the electric utility or its assignee is lawfully entitled to receive pursuant to this part and the proceeds thereof, and in and to all revenues, collections, claims, payments, moneys, or proceeds of, or arising from, the wildfire protection charge that is the subject of a financing order.

"Wildfire protection property" does not include a right to be paid fixed recovery tax amounts. "Wildfire protection property" shall constitute a current property right, notwithstanding the fact that the value of the property right will depend on consumers using electricity or, in those instances where consumers are customers of the electric utility, the electric utility performing certain services.

**§269-B Electric utility workshops.** The commission may periodically convene workshops to help electric utilities develop and share information for the identification, adoption, and implementation of best practices regarding wildfires, including but not limited to risk-based wildfire protection and risk-based wildfire mitigation procedures and standards.

**§269-C Wildfire protection plans.** (a) Each electric utility shall have and operate in compliance with a risk-based wildfire protection plan, which shall be filed with and evaluated by the commission. The wildfire protection plan shall be based on reasonable and prudent practices, which may be identified through workshops convened by the commission pursuant to section 269-B, regulatory proceedings conducted by the commission, and commission standards adopted by rule or order. The electric utility shall design the wildfire protection plan to protect public safety, reduce risk to electric utility customers, and promote resilience of the Hawaii electric system to wildfire damage. Each electric utility's wildfire protection plan shall, at a minimum:

(1) Account for the responsibilities of persons responsible for executing the wildfire protection plan;

(2) Describe the objectives of the wildfire protection plan;

(3) Identify areas that are subject to a heightened risk of wildfire and are:

(A) Within the right of way or legal control or ownership of the electric utility; and

(B) Outside the right of way or legal control or ownership of the electric utility but within a reasonable distance, as determined by the commission, of the electric utility's generation or transmission assets;



(4) Identify a means for mitigating wildfire risk that reflects a reasonable balancing of mitigation costs, continuity of reliable service, and reduction of wildfire risk;

(5) Identify preventive actions and programs that the electric utility shall carry out to minimize the risk of electric utility facilities causing wildfires;

(6) Identify the metrics the electric utility intends to use to evaluate the wildfire protection plan's performance and the assumptions that underlie the use of those metrics;

(7) Describe how the application of previously identified metrics to previous wildfire protection plan performances has informed the wildfire protection plan;

(8) After seeking information from state and local entities, identify a protocol for the deenergizing of power lines and adjusting of power system operations to mitigate wildfires, promote the safety of the public and first responders, and preserve health and telecommunications infrastructure;

(9) Describe appropriate and feasible procedures for notifying a customer who may be impacted by the deenergizing of power lines. The procedures shall consider the need to notify, as a priority, critical first responders, health care facilities, operators of wastewater and water delivery infrastructure, and operators of telecommunications infrastructure;

(10) Describe the procedures, standards, and time frames that the electric utility shall use to inspect electric utility infrastructure in areas that the electric utility identifies under paragraph (3), including whether those procedures, standards, and time frames are already set forth in the electric utility's existing plans or protocols and in coordination with any relevant entities;

(11) Describe the procedures, standards, and time frames that the electric utility will use to carry out vegetation management in areas that the electric utility identifies under paragraph (3), including whether those procedures, standards, and time frames are already set forth in the electric utility's existing plans or protocols and in coordination with any relevant entities;

(12) Include a list that identifies, describes, and prioritizes wildfire risks, and drivers for those risks, throughout the electric utility's service territory, including all relevant risk and risk mitigation information as may be required by guidance or rules adopted by the commission;

(13) Describe how the wildfire protection plan accounts for risks the electric utility identifies under paragraph (12);

(14) Include a showing that the electric utility has an adequately sized and trained workforce to promptly restore service after a wildfire, taking into account employees of other utilities pursuant to mutual aid agreements and employees of entities that have entered into contracts with the electric utility;

(15) Identify the estimated development, implementation, and administration costs for the wildfire protection plan;

(16) Identify the timelines, as applicable, for development, implementation, and administration of any aspects of the wildfire protection plan;

(17) Describe how the wildfire protection plan is consistent with the electric utility's other hazard mitigation and grid hardening plans, including plans to prepare for, and to restore service after, a wildfire, including workforce mobilization and prepositioning equipment and employees;

(18) Identify community outreach and public awareness efforts that the electric utility will use before, during, and after a wildfire;

(19) Describe the processes and procedures the electric utility will use to do all of the following:

- (A) Monitor and audit the implementation of the wildfire protection plan;
- (B) Monitor the effectiveness of the wildfire protection plan and the wildfire protection plan's implementation and identify areas for improvement; and
- (C) Monitor and audit the effectiveness of electrical line and equipment inspections, including inspections performed by contractors, carried out under the wildfire protection plan and other applicable statutes and rules of the commission;

(20) Demonstrate elements of data governance, including enterprise systems, as may be required by guidance or rules adopted by the commission;

(21) Include any modifications to paragraphs (1) to (20); and

(22) Other information as required by the commission.

(b) Each electric utility shall regularly update its wildfire protection plan on a schedule determined by the commission.

(c) To develop the wildfire protection plan, the electric utility may consult with and consider information from federal, state, local, and other expert entities.

(d) The commission, in consultation with the department of land and natural resources, Hawaii emergency management agency, and local emergency services agencies, shall evaluate each electric utility's wildfire protection plan and plan updates through a public process.

(e) No more than ninety days after the last party filing, and no more than a total of one hundred eighty days after the initial filing in the docket or non-docketed case related to the commission's evaluation of a wildfire protection plan or plan update from an electric utility, the commission shall approve or approve with conditions the wildfire protection plan or plan update if the commission finds that the wildfire protection plan or plan update is based on reasonable and prudent practices and designed to meet all applicable rules and standards adopted by the commission. The commission may, in approving the wildfire protection plan or plan update with conditions, direct the

electric utility to make modifications to the wildfire protection plan or plan update that the commission believes represent a reasonable balancing of mitigation costs with the resulting reduction of wildfire risk based on the information provided by the electric utility and based on best practices. The commission shall issue a decision explaining any such directed modifications at the time the commission approves the wildfire protection plan or plan update. Such decision shall include a determination of the reasonable costs to develop, implement and administer the wildfire protection plan or plan update. The commission shall establish a mechanism to allow timely and prompt recovery of such costs in rates, which shall be incremental to the rates the electric utility is otherwise authorized to charge.

(f) The electric utility shall track the costs that it actually incurs to develop, implement, and administer the wildfire protection plan. In the electric utility's wildfire protection plan update, the electric utility shall report on the costs as actually incurred for the most recent past period for which the information is available.

If the actual costs are less than the amounts that the commission determined were reasonable in its decision under subsection (e), the commission shall direct the electric utility to refund or credit the costs to consumers, provided, however, that any such refund or credit to consumers shall not affect, alter or impair the value of the wildfire protection property, wildfire

protection charges, or any bonds secured by wildfire protection propertyratepayers.

If the actual costs are equal to or greater than the amounts that the commission determined were reasonable in its decision under subsection (e), the commission shall not direct the electric utility to refund to ~~ratepayers~~ consumers the amount the commission previously determined was reasonable and shall limit its review to any additional costs, which it shall allow the electric utility to recover from consumers if the commission finds such costs reasonable.~~but may disallow the recovery from ratepayers of any additional costs the commission finds unreasonable.~~

(g) So long as the electric utility has not acted in a manner that constitutes ~~wilful~~willful misconduct, bad faith, or reckless disregard of the electric utility's obligations, in each case, in compliance with any applicable wildfire protection plan, no electric utility shall be civilly liable for the death of or injury to persons, or property damage, as a result of:

(1) Any act taken in accordance with a wildfire protection plan or plan update approved by the commission under this part; or

(2) Any failure to take an action proposed by an electric utility in a wildfire protection plan or plan update and thereafter removed from the wildfire protection plan or plan update by modification of the commission.

(h) There shall be no liability on the part of, and no cause of action of any nature shall arise against, the commission or its agents and employees, the State, the commission commissioners, or the commissioners' representatives

for the death of or injury to persons, or property damage, for any action taken by such in the performance of their powers and duties under this part.

(i) The commission shall, as appropriate, adopt rules or issue orders for the implementation of this section. The rules or orders may include but need not be limited to procedures and standards regarding data governance, risk-based decision-making, vegetation management, public power safety shutoffs and restorations, pole materials, circuitry, and monitoring systems.

**§269-D Penalties.** (a) In addition to any other penalties provided by law, a failure by an electric utility to comply with an approved wildfire protection plan or part of an approved wildfire protection plan shall be subject to a civil penalty, as determined by the commission. Imposition of penalties pursuant to this section shall otherwise be in accordance with section 269-28 and all applicable administrative rules. All moneys collected under this section shall be deposited into the public utilities commission special fund. The commission shall utilize performance based regulation to develop financial penalties and incentives tied to compliance with and performance under an approved wildfire protection plan.

(b) Any determination by the commission that the electric utility materially failed to comply with an approved wildfire protection plan or part of an approved wildfire protection plan, and any imposition of a civil penalty, will be inadmissible in any lawsuit or other action against the electric utility seeking compensation for the alleged death of or injury to persons, or

property damage. In any action seeking to hold an electric utility civilly liable for the death of or injury to persons, or property damage, no inference of liability may be drawn solely based on a failure by the electric utility to adhere to the requirements of an approved wildfire protection plan.

**§269-E Applications to issue bonds and authorize wildfire protection charges.** (a) An electric utility may apply to the commission for one or more financing orders to issue bonds to recover any wildfire protection costs, each of which authorizes the following:

(1) The imposition, charging, and collection of a wildfire protection charge, to become effective upon the issuance of the bonds, and an adjustment of any such wildfire protection charge in accordance with a true-up adjustment mechanism under this part in amounts sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds and all ~~related other associated~~ financing costs on a timely basis;

(2) The creation of wildfire protection property under the financing order; and

(3) The imposition, charging, and collection of fixed recovery tax amounts to recover any portion of the electric utility's federal and state taxes associated with those wildfire protection charges and not financed from the proceeds of bonds.

(b) The application shall include all of the following:

(1) The wildfire protection costs to be financed through the issuance of bonds;

(2) The principal amount of the bonds proposed to be issued and the selection of a financing entity;

(3) An estimate of the date each series of bonds is expected to be issued;

(4) The expected term, which shall include a scheduled final payment date which may not to exceed thirty years, and a legal final maturity that may be longer date, which may be longer, subject to rating agency and market conditions considerations,

during which term the wildfire protection charge associated with the issuance of each series of bonds is expected to be imposed and collected;

(54) An estimate of the financing costs associated with the issuance of each series of bonds;

(65) An estimate of the amount of the wildfire protection charge revenues necessary to pay principal and interest on the bonds and ~~related~~ all other associated financing costs as set forth in the application and the calculation for that estimate;

(76) A proposed design of the wildfire protection charges, and a proposed methodology for allocating the wildfire protection charge among customer classes within the electric utility's service territory;

(87) A description of the financing entity selected by the electric utility;

(9) A description of ~~the~~ a proposed true-up adjustment mechanism for the adjustment of the wildfire protection charge to correct for any overcollection or undercollection of the wildfire protection charge, and to otherwise ensure the timely payment of principal and interest on the bonds and ~~related~~ all other associated financing costs; and

(108) Any other information required by the commission.

(c) Affiliated utilities

(1) An electric utility may file an application for a financing order, including as a joint application with one or more affiliate electric utilities, to issue bonds to recover wildfire protection costs. Such an application shall include a description of (i) the total amount wildfire protection costs to be recovered, (ii) how the wildfire protection charges will be allocated among the applicant electric utilities in a manner that is equitable and that need not correspond to the incurrence of wildfire protection costs by each electric utility, and (iii) whether and how the consumers of any of the applicant electric utilities shall be responsible for the payment



of wildfire protection charges allocated to consumers of affiliate electric utilities.

(2) In the alternative, an electric utility may apply for a financing order to issue bonds to recover wildfire protection costs, including wildfire protection costs incurred, or to be incurred, by the applicant and one or more of its affiliate electric utilities. In connection with the issuance of a financing order pursuant this subsection, the commission shall issue a concurrent order to the affiliate electric utility or electric utilities directing such affiliate electric utility or electric utilities impose rates on its or their consumers designed to generate revenue sufficient to pay credits over the life of the bonds to the applicant electric utility in such amount as the commission determines is equitable, just and reasonable. Such an application shall describe the allocation method and adjustment mechanism for the affiliate utility credit payments proposed to be subject to such concurrent commission order.

(de) The commission shall issue an approval or denial of any application for a financing order filed pursuant to this section within ~~ninety~~ one hundred twenty days of the ~~last~~ filing of the application ~~in the applicable docket.~~

(ed) In exercising its duties under this section, the commission shall consider:

(1) Whether the wildfire protection costs to be financed by any bonds to be issued are just and reasonable;

(2) Whether the recovery of such costs is consistent with the public interest;

(3) Whether the structuring, marketing and pricing of the bonds are expected to result in the lowest wildfire protection charges consistent with market conditions at the time the bonds are priced and the terms of the financing order;

~~(43) Whether the terms and conditions of any bonds to be issued, including without limitation interest rates, rating, amortization redemption, and maturity, and the imposition and collection of fixed recovery charges as set forth in an application, are just and reasonable;~~

(54) Whether the recovery of recovery costs through the designation of the fixed recovery charges and any associated fixed recovery tax amounts, and the issuance of recovery bonds in connection with the fixed recovery charges, would result in net savings to consumers and reduce, to the maximum extent possible, the rates on a present value basis that consumers would pay as compared to the use of traditional utility financing mechanisms, which shall be calculated using the electric utility's updated overall corporate debt and equity costs in the ratio approved by the commission at the time of the financing order; provided that the commission may hire and rely upon a financial advisor in connection with this determination; provided that the financial advisor shall not direct how the recovery bonds are placed to market; and

(65) Any other factors that the commission deems reasonable and in the public interest.

The electric utility may request the determination specified in this section by the commission in a separate proceeding, in an existing proceeding, or both. If the commission makes the determination specified in this section, the commission shall establish, as part of the financing order, a procedure for the electric utility to submit applications from time to time to request the issuance of additional financing orders designating wildfire protection charges and any associated fixed recovery tax amounts as recoverable. The electric utility may submit an application with respect to wildfire protection costs that an electric utility has paid, has an existing legal obligation to pay, or would be obligated to pay pursuant to an agreement. The

commission shall, within one hundred twenty days of the filing of that application, issue a financing order, if the commission determines that the amounts identified in the application are wildfire protection costs.

At the option of the electric utility, the electric utility may include in its application for a financing order a request for authorization to sell, transfer, assign, or pledge recovery property to a governmental ~~financing~~ entity if the electric utility expects recovery bonds issued by a governmental ~~financing~~ entity would result in a more cost efficient means, taking into account all financing costs related to the recovery bonds, than using another financing entity to issue recovery bonds to finance the same recovery costs, taking into account the costs of issuing the other financing entity's bonds. If an electric utility exercises this option, the commission may hire and rely upon a financial advisor in connection with the commission's review; provided that the financial advisor shall not direct how the recovery bonds are placed to market.

(~~fe~~) The commission shall not issue a financing order to the extent that the aggregate amount of all ~~the~~ wildfire protection charges under all financing orders previously issued under this part, combined with any new wildfire protection charges issued to be authorized pursuant to the requested under a new financing order, constitute more than five per-cent of the average residential customer bill, including the aggregate wildfire protection charges across affiliated utilities and taking account of any credits from affiliate utilities,

The wildfire protection charge and any associated fixed recovery tax amounts may be a usage-based surcharge, a flat user fee, or a charge based upon customer revenues as determined by the commission for each customer class in any financing order. **§269-F Wildfire protection plan financing order.**

(a) A financing order shall remain in effect until the bonds issued under the financing order and all financing costs related to the bonds have been paid in full or defeased by their terms or, in the event the wildfire protection property has been assigned to an assignee in connection with the exercise of remedies upon a default under the terms of the bonds, until the receipt of proceeds by such assignee in an amount sufficient to repay principal and interest on the bonds and associated

financing costs that would have accrued had they remained outstanding.

A financing order shall remain in effect and unabated notwithstanding the bankruptcy, reorganization, or insolvency of the electric utility or the commencement of any judicial or nonjudicial proceeding on the financing order. ~~Wildfire protection charges shall be irrevocable, notwithstanding the true-up adjustment pursuant to subsection (n).~~

~~—— (j) The commission shall issue financing orders in accordance with this part to facilitate the recovery, financing, or refinancing of wildfire protection costs. A financing order may be adopted only upon the application of the electric utility and shall become effective in accordance with its terms only after the electric utility files with the commission the electric utility's written consent to all terms and conditions of the financing order. A financing order may specify how amounts collected from a consumer shall be allocated between wildfire protection charges, any associated fixed recovery tax amounts, and other charges.~~

(~~b~~k) Notwithstanding any other law, and except as otherwise provided in section 269-~~CG~~(e), with respect to wildfire protection property that has been made the basis for the issuance of bonds and with respect to any associated fixed recovery tax amounts, the financing order, the wildfire protection charges, and any associated fixed recovery tax amounts shall be irrevocable. The State and its agencies, including the commission, pledge and agree with bondholders, the

owners and assignees of the wildfire protection property, and other financing parties that the State and its agencies will not take any action listed in this subsection. This subsection shall not preclude an action if such action would not adversely impact the interests of the electric utility and of assignees of the wildfire protection property. ~~limitation or alteration if full compensation is made by law for the full protection of the wildfire protection property collected pursuant to a financing order and of the bondholders and any assignee or financing party entering into a contract with the electric utility.~~ The prohibited actions shall be the following:

(1) Alter the provisions of this part, which authorize the commission to create an irrevocable contract right or chose in action by the issuance of a financing order, to create wildfire protection property, and make the wildfire protection charges imposed by a financing order irrevocable, binding, nonbypassable charges for all existing and future consumers;

(2) Take or permit any action that impairs or would impair the value of wildfire protection property or the security for the bonds or revise the wildfire protection costs for which recovery is authorized;

(3) In any way impair the rights and remedies of the bondholders, assignees, and other financing parties;

(4) Except for changes made pursuant to the formula-based true-up mechanism authorized under subsection (n), reduce, alter, or impair wildfire protection charges that are to be imposed, billed, charged, collected, and remitted for the benefit of the bondholders, any assignee, and any other financing parties until any and all principal, interest, premium, financing costs, and other fees, expenses, or charges incurred, and any contracts to be performed, in connection with the related bonds have been paid and performed in full or, in the event the wildfire protection property has been assigned to an assignee in connection with the exercise of remedies upon a default under the terms of the bonds, until the receipt of proceeds by such assignee in an amount sufficient to repay principal and interest on the bonds that would have accrued had they remained outstanding.

The financing entity is authorized to include this pledge in the bonds.

(c~~1~~) Under a financing order, the bonds may be issued in one or more series, and the electric utility shall retain sole discretion to select the financing entity and to cause bonds to be issued, including the right to defer or postpone such the issuance, assignment, sale, or transfer of wildfire protection property. The commission shall not impose any penalty, disallowance, or other negative consequence on the electric utility in respect of its exercise of such discretion.

(d) The public utilities commission may create, pursuant to an application from an electric utility, a nonbypassable charge referred to as a wildfire protection charge, which shall be applied to recover financing costs and wildfire protection costs. The wildfire protection charge shall be a dedicated, discrete tariff rider. The commission shall, in any financing order, establish a procedure for periodic true-up adjustments to wildfire protection charges, which shall be made at least annually and may be made more frequently. Within thirty days after receiving an electric utility's filing of a true-up adjustment, the public utilities commission's review of the filing shall be limited to mathematical or clerical errors as determined in accordance with any true-up adjustment formulas set forth in the applicable financing order. The public utilities commission shall either approve the filing or inform the electric utility of any mathematical or clerical errors in its calculation. If the commission informs the electric utility



of mathematical or clerical errors in its calculation, the electric utility shall correct its error and refile its true-up adjustment. The timeframes previously described in this subsection shall apply to a refiled true-up adjustment.

(em) Neither financing orders nor bonds issued under this part shall constitute a general obligation of the State or of any political subdivision thereof, nor shall they constitute a pledge of the full faith and credit of the State or any of its political subdivisions, but shall be payable solely from the wildfire protection property provided under this part. All bonds shall contain on the face thereof a statement to the following effect: "Neither the full faith and credit nor the taxing power of the State of Hawaii is pledged to the payment of the principal of, or interest and premium on, this bond.".

The issuance of bonds under this part shall not directly, indirectly, or contingently obligate the State or any political subdivision thereof to levy or to pledge any form of taxation or to make any appropriation for their payment.

~~—(n) The commission shall establish procedures for the expeditious processing of an application for a financing order, which shall provide for the approval or disapproval of the application within ninety days of the application. Any wildfire protection charges authorized by a financing order shall appear on consumer bills. The commission shall, in any financing order, provide for a procedure for periodic true-up adjustments to wildfire protection charges, which shall be made at least annually and may be made more frequently. The electric utility~~

~~shall make a filing with the commission to implement any true-up adjustment, and the review by the commission of these filings shall be limited to mathematical and clerical errors. Within thirty days after receiving an electric utility's filing of a true-up adjustment, the commission's review of the filing shall be limited to mathematical or clerical errors as determined in accordance with any true-up adjustment formulas set forth in the applicable financing order. (f) Wildfire protection charges are wildfire protection property when, and to the extent that, a financing order authorizing the wildfire protection charges has become effective in accordance with this part, and the wildfire protection property shall thereafter continuously exist as property for all purposes, and all of the rights and privileges relating to that property shall continuously exist for the period and to the extent provided in the financing order, but in any event until the bonds are paid in full, including all principal; premiums, if any, and interest with respect to the bonds, and all other financing costs are paid in full or, in the event the wildfire protection property has been assigned to an assignee in

connection with the exercise of remedies upon a default under the terms of the bonds, until the receipt by such assignee of proceeds in an amount sufficient to repay ~~the principal, amount of, and interest~~ on the bonds and associated financing costs that would have accrued on, the bonds had they remained outstanding. A financing order may provide that the creation of wildfire protection property shall be simultaneous with the sale of the wildfire protection property to an assignee as provided in the application of the pledge of the wildfire protection property to secure the bonds.

(~~gp~~) Any successor to a financing entity shall be bound by the requirements of this part and shall perform and satisfy all obligations of, and have the same rights under a financing order as, and to the same extent as, the financing entity.

**§269-GF Bonds; issuance; wildfire protection property interests.** (a) The electric utility may sell and assign all or portions of its interest in wildfire protection property to one or more financing entities that make that wildfire protection property the basis for issuance of bonds, to the extent approved in a financing order. The electric utility or financing entity may pledge wildfire protection property as collateral, directly or indirectly, for bonds to the extent approved in the pertinent financing orders providing for a security interest in the wildfire protection property, in the manner set forth in this section. In addition, wildfire protection property may be sold or assigned by either of the following:

(1) The financing entity or a trustee for the holders of bonds or the holders of an ancillary agreement in connection with the exercise of remedies upon a default under the terms of the recovery bonds; or

(2) Any person acquiring the wildfire protection property after a sale or assignment pursuant to this ~~part~~chapter.

(b) To the extent that any interest in wildfire protection property is sold, assigned, or is pledged as collateral pursuant to subsection (~~ba~~), the commission shall authorize the electric utility to contract with the financing entity ~~and or~~its assignees that it will continue to operate its system to provide service to consumers within its service territory, will collect amounts in respect of the wildfire protection charges for the benefit and account of the financing entity or its assignees, and will account for and remit these amounts to or for the account of the financing entity or its assignees. Contracting with the financing entity or its assignees in accordance with that authorization shall not impair or negate the characterization of the sale, assignment, or pledge as an absolute transfer, a true sale, or a security interest, as applicable. To the extent that billing, collection, and other related services with respect to the provision of the electric utility's services are provided to a consumer by any person or entity other than the electric utility in whose service territory the consumer is located, that person or entity shall collect the wildfire protection charges and any associated fixed recovery tax amounts from the consumer for the benefit and account of the electric utility, financing entity, or assignees

with the associated revenues remitted solely for such person's benefit as a condition to the provision of electric service to that consumer. Each financing order shall impose terms and conditions, consistent with the purposes and objectives of this part, on any person or entity responsible for billing, collection, and other related services, including without limitation collection of the wildfire protection charges and any associated fixed recovery tax amounts, that are the subject of the financing order.

(c) The financing entity may issue bonds upon approval by the commission in a financing order. Bonds shall be nonrecourse to the credit or any assets of the electric utility, other than the wildfire protection property as specified in that financing order.

(d) Wildfire protection property that is specified in a financing order shall constitute an existing, present property right, notwithstanding the fact that the imposition and collection of wildfire protection charges depend on the electric utility continuing to provide services or continuing to perform its servicing functions relating to the collection of wildfire protection charges or on the level of future service consumption, e.g., electricity consumption. Wildfire protection property shall exist whether or not the wildfire protection charges have been billed, have accrued, or have been collected and notwithstanding the fact that the value for a security interest in the wildfire protection property, or amount of the wildfire protection property, is dependent on the future

provision of service to consumers. All wildfire protection property specified in a financing order shall continue to exist until the bonds issued pursuant to a financing order and all associated financing costs are paid in full or, in the event the wildfire protection property has been assigned to an assignee in connection with the exercise of remedies upon a default under the terms of the bonds, until the receipt by such assignee of proceeds in an amount sufficient to repay the principal amount of, and interest that would have accrued on, the bonds had they remained outstanding.

(e) Wildfire protection property, wildfire protection charges, and the interests of an assignee, bondholder, or financing entity, or any pledgee in wildfire protection property and wildfire protection charges shall not be subject to setoff, counterclaim, surcharge, recoupment, or defense by the electric utility or any other person or in connection with the bankruptcy, reorganization, or other insolvency proceeding of the electric utility, any affiliate of the electric utility, or any other entity.

(f) Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, any requirement under this ~~part~~ chapter or a financing order that the public utilities commission takes action with respect to the subject matter of a financing order shall be binding upon the commission, as it may be constituted from time to time, and any successor agency exercising functions similar to the commission, and the commission shall have no authority to rescind, alter, or amend that requirement in a financing order.

**§269-H Wildfire protection charge.** (a) The public utilities commission may create, pursuant to a financing order approved pursuant to section 269-E, a nonbypassable charge for a financing entity, referred to as a wildfire protection charge that shall be applied to the repayment of bonds and related financing costs as described in this part. The wildfire protection charge and any associated fixed recovery tax amounts may be a usage-based charge, a flat user charge, or a charge based upon customer revenues as determined by the public utilities commission for each consumer class in any financing order.

(b) As long as any bonds are outstanding and any financing costs have not been paid in full or, in the event the wildfire protection property has been assigned to an assignee in connection with the exercise of remedies upon a default under the terms of the bonds, proceeds in an amount sufficient to repay principal and interest on the bonds that would have accrued had they remained outstanding have not been received, any wildfire protection charge and any associated fixed recovery tax amounts authorized under a financing order shall be nonbypassable. Subject to any exceptions provided in a financing order, a wildfire protection charge and any associated fixed recovery tax amounts shall be paid by all existing and future consumers within the utility service territory.

(c) The wildfire protection charge shall be collected by an electric utility or its successors, in accordance with section

269-K(a), in full through a charge that is separate and apart from the electric utility's rates.

(d) An electric utility may exercise the same rights and remedies under its tariff and applicable law and regulation based on a consumer's nonpayment of the wildfire protection charge as it could for a consumer's failure to pay any other charge payable to that electric utility.

**§269-IG Security interests in wildfire protection property; financing statements.** (a) A security interest in wildfire protection property is valid and enforceable against the pledgor and third parties, subject to the rights of any third parties holding security interests in the wildfire protection property perfected in the manner described in this section, and attaches when all of the following have taken place:

- (1) The commission has issued a financing order authorizing the wildfire protection charge included in the wildfire protection property;
- (2) Value has been given by the pledgees of the wildfire protection property; and
- (3) The pledgor has signed a security agreement covering the wildfire protection property.

(b) A valid and enforceable security interest in wildfire protection property is perfected when it has attached and when a financing statement has been filed with the bureau of conveyances of the State of Hawaii naming the pledgor of the wildfire protection property as "debtor" and identifying the wildfire protection property.



Any description of the wildfire protection property shall be sufficient if it refers to the financing order creating the wildfire protection property. A copy of the financing statement shall be filed with the commission by the electric utility that is the pledgor or transferor of the wildfire protection property, and the commission may require the electric utility to make other filings with respect to the security interest in accordance with procedures that the commission may establish; provided that the filings shall not affect the perfection of the security interest.

(c) A perfected security interest in wildfire protection property shall be a continuously perfected security interest in all wildfire protection property revenues and proceeds arising with respect thereto, whether or not the revenues or proceeds have accrued. Conflicting security interests shall rank according to priority in time of perfection. Wildfire protection property shall constitute property for all purposes, including for contracts securing bonds, whether or not the wildfire protection property revenues and proceeds have accrued.

(d) Subject to the terms of the security agreement covering the wildfire protection property and the rights of any third parties holding security interests in the wildfire protection property, perfected in the manner described in this section, the validity and relative priority of a security interest created under this section shall not be defeated or adversely affected by the commingling of revenues arising with respect to the wildfire protection property with other funds of

the electric utility that is the pledgor or transferor of the wildfire protection property, or by any security interest in a deposit account of that electric utility perfected under chapter 490, article 9, into which the revenues are deposited.

Subject to the terms of the security agreement, upon compliance with the requirements of section 490:9-312(b)(1), the pledgees of the wildfire protection property shall have a perfected security interest in all cash and deposit accounts of the electric utility in which wildfire protection property revenues have been commingled with other funds; ~~provided that the perfected security interest shall be limited to an amount no greater than the amount of the wildfire protection property revenues received by the electric utility within twelve months before:~~

~~—(1) Any default under the security agreement; or~~

~~—(2) The institution of insolvency proceedings by or against the electric utility, less payments from the revenues to the pledgees during that twelve-month period.~~

(e) If default occurs under the security agreement covering the wildfire protection property, the pledgees of the wildfire protection property, subject to the terms of the security agreement, shall have all rights and remedies of a secured party upon default under chapter 490, article 9, and shall be entitled to foreclose or otherwise enforce their security interest in the wildfire protection property, subject to the rights of any third parties holding prior security interests in the wildfire protection property perfected in the

manner provided in this section. In addition, the commission may require in the financing order creating the wildfire protection property that, in the event of default by the electric utility in payment of wildfire protection property revenues, the commission and any successor thereto, upon the application by the pledgees or assignees, including assignees under section 269-H of the wildfire protection property, and without limiting any other remedies available to the pledgees or assignees by reason of the default, shall order the sequestration and payment to the pledgees or assignees of wildfire protection property revenues. Any financing order shall remain in full force and effect notwithstanding any bankruptcy, reorganization, or other insolvency proceedings with respect to the debtor, pledgor, or transferor of the wildfire protection property. Any surplus in excess of:

(1) Amounts necessary to pay principal, premiums, if any, interest, costs, and arrearages on the bonds, and associated financing costs arising under the security agreement; or

(2) In the event the wildfire protection property has been assigned to an assignee in connection with the exercise of remedies upon a default under the terms of the bonds, an amount sufficient to repay the principal amount of, and interest that would have accrued on, the bonds had they remained outstanding,

shall be remitted to the debtor or to the pledgor or transferor.

(f) Sections 490:9-204 and 490:9-205 shall apply to a pledge of wildfire protection property by the electric utility, an affiliate of the electric utility, or a financing entity.

**§269-JH Transfers of wildfire protection property.** (a) A transfer or assignment of wildfire protection property by the electric utility to an assignee or to a financing entity, or by an assignee of the electric utility or a financing entity to another financing entity, which the parties in the governing ~~documents~~ documentation have expressly stated to be a sale or other absolute transfer, in a transaction approved in a financing order, shall be treated as an absolute transfer of all of the transferor's right, title, and interest, as in a true sale, and not as a pledge or other financing, of the wildfire protection property, other than for federal and state income and franchise tax purposes.

(b) The characterization of the sale, assignment, or transfer as an absolute transfer and true sale and the corresponding characterization of the property interest of the assignee shall not be affected or impaired by, among other things, the occurrence of any of the following:

(1) Commingling of wildfire protection charge revenues with other amounts;

(2) The retention by the seller of either of the following:

(A) A partial or residual interest, including an equity interest, in the financing entity or the wildfire protection property, whether direct or indirect, subordinate or otherwise; or

(B) The right to recover costs associated with taxes, franchise fees, or license fees imposed on the collection of wildfire protection charge;

(3) Any recourse that an assignee may have against the seller;

(4) Any indemnification rights, obligations, or repurchase rights made or provided by the seller;

(5) The obligation of the seller to collect wildfire protection charges on behalf of an assignee;

(6) The treatment of the sale, assignment, or transfer for tax, financial reporting, or other purpose; or

(7) Any true-up adjustment of the wildfire protection charge as provided in the financing order.

(c) A transfer of wildfire protection property shall be deemed perfected against third parties when both of the following occur:

(1) The commission issues the financing order authorizing the wildfire protection charge included in the wildfire protection property; and

(2) An assignment of the wildfire protection property in writing has been executed and delivered to the assignee.

(d) As between bona fide assignees of the same right for value without notice, the assignee first filing a financing statement with the bureau of conveyances of the State of Hawaii in accordance with chapter 490, article 9, part 5, naming the assignor of the wildfire protection property as debtor and identifying the wildfire protection property shall have priority. Any description of the wildfire protection property

shall be sufficient if it refers to the financing order creating the wildfire protection property. A copy of the financing statement shall be filed by the assignee with the commission, and the commission may require the assignor or the assignee to make other filings with respect to the transfer in accordance with procedures the commission may establish, but these filings shall not affect the perfection of the transfer.

**§269-KI Financing entity sSuccessor requirements; default of financing entity.** (a) Any successor to an electric utility subject to a financing order, whether pursuant to any bankruptcy, reorganization, or other insolvency proceeding, or pursuant to any merger, sale, or transfer, by operation of law, or otherwise, shall be bound by the requirements of this part. The successor of the electric utility shall perform and satisfy all obligations of the electric utility under the financing order, in the same manner and to the same extent as the electric utility, including the obligation to collect and pay the wildfire protection charge to any financing party as required by a financing order or any assignee. Any successor to the electric utility shall be entitled to receive any fixed recovery tax amounts otherwise payable to the electric utility.

(b) The commission may require in a financing order that if a default by the electric utility in remittance of the wildfire protection charge collected arising with respect to wildfire protection property occurs, the commission, without limiting any other remedies available to any financing party by reason of the default, shall order the sequestration and payment

to the beneficiaries of the wildfire protection charge collected arising with respect to the wildfire protection property. Any order shall remain in full force and effect notwithstanding any bankruptcy, reorganization, or other insolvency proceedings with respect to the electric utility.

**§269-~~LJ~~ Severability.** If any provision of this part is held to be invalid or is superseded, replaced, repealed, or expires for any reason:

(1) That occurrence shall not affect any action allowed under this part that is taken ~~prior to~~before that occurrence by the commission, a financing entity, a bondholder, or any financing party, and any such action shall remain in full force and effect; and

(2) The validity and enforceability of the rest of this part shall remain unaffected."

SECTION 3. Section 269-9, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

**"§269-9 Report accidents.** (a) Every public utility shall report to the public utilities commission all accidents and wildfires potentially caused by or occurring in connection with ~~[its]~~ the public utility's operations and service~~[, and~~  
~~the]~~. The commission shall investigate the causes of ~~[any]~~:

(1) Any accident ~~[which results]~~ that resulted in the loss of life~~;~~; and

(2) Any wildfires that:

(A) May have been caused by a public utility;

(B) Destroyed a significant amount of public utility equipment; or

(C) Resulted in the loss of life.

The commission may investigate any other accidents  
[which] that, in [its] the commission's opinion, require  
investigation.

(b) The public utility's reporting of an accident or  
wildfire under this section shall not be admissible evidence in  
any judicial, administrative, or other governmental proceeding  
for purposes of establishing that the wildfire was caused by the  
public utility."

SECTION 4. Chapter 269-17, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is  
amended to read as follows:

**"§269-17 Issuance of securities.** A public utility  
corporation or a financing entity may, on securing the prior  
approval of the public utilities commission, and not  
otherwise, except as provided in section 269-DE, issue stocks  
and stock certificates, bonds, notes, and other evidences of  
indebtedness, payable at periods of more than twelve months  
after the date thereof, for the following purposes and no other,  
namely: for the acquisition of property or for the  
construction, completion, extension, or improvement of or  
addition to its facilities or service, or for the discharge or  
lawful refunding of its obligations or for the reimbursement of  
moneys actually expended from income or from any other moneys in  
its treasury not secured by or obtained from the issue of its  
stocks or stock certificates, ~~or~~ bonds, notes, or other  
evidences of indebtedness, for any of the aforesaid purposes  
except maintenance of service, replacements, and substitutions

corporation has kept its accounts for ~~such~~ expenditures in ~~such~~ a manner as to enable the commission to ascertain the amount of moneys so expended and the purposes for which the expenditures were made, and the sources of the funds in its treasury applied to the expenditures. As used ~~[herein,]~~ in this section, "property" and "facilities"~~[7]~~ mean property and facilities used in all operations of a public utility corporation whether or not included in its public utility operations or rate base. A public utility corporation may not issue securities to acquire property or to construct, complete, extend, ~~or improve,~~ or add to its facilities or service if the commission determines that the proposed purpose will have a material adverse effect on its public utility operations.

All stock and every stock certificate, and every bond, note, or other evidence of indebtedness of a public utility corporation not payable within twelve months, issued without an order of the commission authorizing the same, then in effect, shall be void."

SECTION 5. Notwithstanding the provisions of section 39A-191, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and the provisions of Act 182, Session Laws of Hawaii 2022, as amended by Act 262, Session Laws of Hawaii 2023, the legislature authorizes the issuance of special purpose revenue bonds for wildfire protection costs that require an allocation of the annual state ceiling under section 39B-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, for the period July 1, 2024, through December 31, 2028. Notwithstanding Section 39A-195, a project agreement entered into in connection with the issuance

of special purpose revenue bonds to finance wildfire protection costs may include a project agreement with an affiliate of an electric or gas utility and may contain provisions limiting the obligation to pay, and the security for the payment of, debt service and related deposits and costs in respect of such bonds or loans funded by such bonds to wildfire protection charges and wildfire protection property. ~~, and further authorizes project agreements with an affiliate of a public utility or a special purpose vehicle in connection with the issuance of special purpose revenue bonds for wildfire protection costs.~~

SECTION 6. The legislature authorizes the allocation of the annual state ceiling under section 39B-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to the issuance of bonds issued pursuant to section 2 of this Act that require such allocation in order for interest on the bonds to be tax-exempt for federal income tax purposes.

SECTION 7. This Act does not affect rights and duties that matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were begun before its effective date.

SECTION 8. In codifying the new part added by section 2 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating and referring to the new sections in this Act.

SECTION 9. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

SECTION 10. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 3000.

In Consideration of Senate Bill No. SB2922 SD2 HD2  
**RELATING TO PUBLIC UTILITIES**

To Chair Yamashita, Vice Chair Kitagawa and the honorable members of the committee,

We are writing on behalf of Lahaina Strong, an organization that was initially formed in 2018 following the Hurricane Lane fire in Lahaina and re-energized last year after the devastating Lahaina fires on August 8. Lahaina Strong has been at the forefront of relief and advocacy efforts, including initiating the "Fishing for Housing" camp, which has been in operation for over 18 weeks along Kaanapali Beach, highlighting the need for dignified housing for Lahaina fire victims. Our organization is the largest grassroots, Lahaina-based community organization, with over 20,000 supporters, engaged in emphasizing the importance of local voices and community-driven solutions.

**Lahaina Strong stands in opposition to SB2922 SD2 HD2** that essentially enables HECO to burden ratepayers with the consequences of its own mismanagement and negligence. By allowing HECO to borrow billions of dollars and use future revenues from ratepayers as collateral, the bill shifts the financial responsibility from the shareholders, who should rightfully bear the consequences of corporate decisions, onto the shoulders of hardworking ratepayers.

As originally drafted by HECO and in the SD2 passed by the senate, SB2922 would impose wildfire liabilities - only on existing and future ratepayers in Maui County. Not surprisingly, the introduction of SB2922 caused the price of HEI shares to immediately increase - a market response that was reported nationally and which clearly indicated that shareholders would not be held accountable by SB2922. By way of contrast, PG&E was required - post California wildfires - to set up a multi-billion dollar shareholder-funded trust to ensure that rate securitization was neutral to ratepayers.

SB2922 is an effort by HECO to address the serious challenges it is facing given the significantly higher costs of capital that HEI is facing due to its post-wildfire credit downgrade to junk bond status. As HECO SVP and CIO Jason Benn said last month in testimony before the Senate (which was reported on by Hawaii News Now): "We must address the financial uncertainties of wildfire risk and regain access to capital markets." Gaining access to capital markets on the backs of Maui County ratepayers while protecting shareholders is unconscionable and will have an enormous economic impact on local working families.

Last month a Maui Legislator confirmed with HECO during a hearing on SB2922 that language in the bill would require that wildfire recovery costs - and potentially all HECO's wildfire liabilities - be imposed only on Maui County ratepayers. A number of legislative committees made amendments to HECO's original language for SB2922 that improved the bill. But subsequent committees weakened these improvements. Unless the language drafted by HECO is kept out of the final conference draft of SB2922, the total cost to the people of Maui County will likely be over \$1 billion and could potentially exceed \$5 billion.

This would result in very significant rate increases for HECO customers in Maui County, which would negatively impact families who are already struggling in the aftermath of the wildfires and cripple Maui's small businesses, many of which are currently barely surviving. It would also increase County and State expenses significantly on Maui, adding to the costs of everything from the delivery of municipal water to the operation of our public schools. All of which will result in greater strain on government budgets and increased consumer costs in every sector, including housing.

To put this in perspective, the annual burden on Maui County ratepayers could be well in excess of the entire amount - currently \$188 million - that thousands of donors worldwide entrusted to the Hawaii Community Foundation with their contributions to the Maui Strong Fund.

Furthermore, SB2922 SD2 HD2 fails to prioritize the needs of those who have been directly impacted by HECO's failures. It is unconscionable that HECO would seek to use securitization funds for anything other than compensating the victims of the devastating wildfires on Maui. These individuals and families have suffered immense losses due to HECO's negligence, and it is reprehensible to even consider using securitization funds for other purposes before fully compensating these victims.

Additionally, the lack of accountability and oversight in SB2922 SD2 HD2 is troubling. There are no clear requirements or safeguards in place to ensure that securitization funds are used responsibly and transparently. Without adequate safeguards, there is a significant risk that these funds could be mismanaged or misappropriated, further exacerbating the injustice suffered by ratepayers and wildfire victims alike.

In conclusion, SB2922 SD2 HD2 prioritizes the interests of a utility company and its shareholders over the well-being of ratepayers and wildfire victims. **Lahaina Strong stands in opposition to SB2922 SD2 HD2** and urges the legislation to instead focus on holding HECO accountable for its actions and providing meaningful support to those who have been harmed by its negligence.
