SENATE BILL NO. SB 3026 RELATING TO PESTICIDES

Chairperson Gabbard, Vice-Chair Richards, and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on Senate Bill 3026 relating to Pesticides. The bill replaces representatives from the sugar and pineapple industries with representatives of the coffee and diversified agriculture industries. The Department strongly supports this bill.

Due to the exit of the sugar industry and the reduction of pineapple cultivation in the State the Department has had difficulty finding and retaining qualified individuals for both seats on the Advisory Committee on Pesticides.

As the coffee industry has recently seen impacts from pest pressures such as Coffee Leaf Rust and Coffee Berry Borer the Department supports the inclusion of coffee on to the committee. Diversified agriculture and minor crops make up a large portion of agricultural production in the State and should also have a seat on the committee. Diversified agriculture may also provide a different viewpoint than traditional agricultural producers and includes the sugar and pineapple industries, should those industries seek representation.

SB 3026 - RELATING TO PESTICIDES

Chair Gabbard, Vice Chair Richards, and members of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Environment:

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in support of SB 3026 which replaces representatives from the sugar and pineapple industries with representatives of the coffee and diversified agriculture industries on the Advisory Committee on Pesticides.

There has been a significant reduction of the agricultural footprint of the sugar and pineapple industries since the Advisory Committee on Pesticides was established. The University of Hawai'i College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources has a representative on the advisory committee. Amending the membership of the advisory committee by replacing the sugar and pineapple industries with a representative from the coffee industry, which is among the top 3 most economically significant crops in the State, as well as adding a representative of diversified agriculture allows broader representation of commodities which would include the pineapple and sugar industries.

We support SB 3026 provided that its passage does not replace or adversely impact priorities as indicated in our Board of Regents Approved Budget. Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony on the measure.

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The Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) <u>SUPPORTS</u> SB3026, which would propose amendments to Section 149A-51 of the Hawai'i Revised Statutes, focusing on the composition and functions of the advisory committee on pesticides. We also <u>respectfully</u> <u>request an amendment</u> to further strengthen this proposal. OHA recognizes the importance of effective pesticide management for the well-being of our communities and the preservation of our unique ecosystems.

The shift from sugar and pineapple industries to coffee and diversified agriculture is a crucial step towards modernizing our approach to agriculture in Hawai'i. As our agricultural landscape evolves, it is imperative that our advisory committees reflect these changes to provide effective guidance and oversight. Coffee and diversified agriculture represent sectors that are rapidly growing and hold significant economic potential for our state. By including representatives from these industries on the advisory committee, we can ensure that their unique challenges and perspectives are properly addressed.

A diverse advisory committee, as envisioned in SB2546, ensures a broader spectrum of perspectives, expertise, and experiences, contributing to the development of more effective and equitable pesticide laws and rules. We appreciate the way this legislation provides modernization and expanded inclusivity. OHA believes this will benefit the way pesticides are used and/or regulated on our 'āina.

OHA respectfully asks that the committee consider adding a representative who can ensure Native Hawaiian farming and/or ecological practices are included in these critical discussions. Widespread Native Hawaiian participation in this pesticide advisory committee would be integral to achieving improvements in Native Hawaiian health and well-being by gaining insight into Native Hawaiian tradition knowledge and culture, while simultaneously elevating Native Hawaiian influence through potential agricultural development opportunities.

Thus, OHA would like to offer an amendment to page 1 line 13 that can further strengthen the legislation by explicitly including a representative with expertise or consideration for Native Hawaiian perspectives:

§149A-51 Advisory committee. (a) There shall be an advisory committee on pesticides composed of but not limited to the chairperson, or the chairperson's designated representative, who shall head the committee and one representative each from the department of health, department of land and natural resources, University of Hawaii college of tropical agriculture and human resources, [sugar industry, pineapple industry,] coffee industry, diversified agriculture industry, Hawaii Farm Bureau [Federation], pesticide industry, structural pest control industry, an environmental organization, a citizen group, and a landscape professional, and an individual or organization who can provide knowledge of Native Hawaiian farming or ecological practices.

By embracing a more inclusive advisory committee structure, we take a crucial step toward fostering sustainable agriculture practices, protecting our environment, and safeguarding the health of our communities.

Accordingly, OHA respectfully urges the Committee to **ADVANCE** and **AMEND** bill SB3026. Mahalo nui for the opportunity to testify on this important issue.
