EXECUTIVE OFFICE ON EARLY LEARNING'S POSITION: Support

The Executive Office on Early Learning (EOEL) is committed to expanding early learning opportunities for all keiki across the State and is in **strong support** of S.B. No. 3087 S.D.1 H.D.1.

The intention of this bill is to expand public-private partnerships for all young keiki by administering programs in existing vacant public spaces. Presently, section 302L-1.7, Hawai'i Revised Statutes (HRS), authorizes EOEL to administer pre-plus programs through private-public partnerships on Department of Education (HIDOE) public school campuses. S.B. No. 3087 S.D.1 H.D. 1 would expand access to affordable early learning programs through offering potentially more cost-effective spaces by allowing programs to be administered on other public properties in addition to HIDOE campuses. This measure does not require funding or fiscal support.

We would also like to note that this bill utilizes the terminology "early learning", rather than "pre-plus", as "early learning" is already defined in section 302 L-1, HRS. This bill also does not require any funding or fiscal support.

As EOEL continues to expand the EOEL public prekindergarten program, it is critical to also focus on expanding community-based options as these programs are necessary to meet families' unique needs and demands. Community-based programs offer services that may be longer in duration, assisting families who work traditional and non-traditional hours; culturally and linguistically based; provided in a home-setting, which may be more comfortable or preferred by families; or may accept younger children from birth onward.

The Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) <u>SUPPORTS and offers comments</u> on SB3087 SD1 HD1, which expands access to early learning programs on other state properties and public lands besides Department of Education public school campuses.

OHA is in its fourth year of its 15-year strategic plan, Mana i Mauli Ola. The development of this strategic plan included gathering community input via surveys and focus groups as well as mana'o from internal staff. One of the most critical needs that our community repeated was 'ohana's ability to provide high-quality keiki and kūpuna care.

SB3087 will support the state's ongoing efforts to expand early childhood care and education. In 2020—the same year our strategic plan began—the State Legislature passed Act 46 setting a vision for 100% access to early learning opportunities. We believe this measure is one component that will help the state both achieve the Legislature's vision and meet the needs that OHA has identified for the Hawaiian people.

The Pre-Plus Program has been an important piece of the early learning puzzle, allowing community-based Head Start providers to offer early learning programs on public school campuses. OHA sees this bill as having the potential to expand the impact of a program like Pre-Plus. It sets the tone to prioritize the development of early learning programs in facilities, and it adjusts the existing pre-plus statute to have the possibility for greater reach. The inclusion of other public properties will provide the Executive Office on Early Learning (EOEL) the authority to work beyond public schools to realize its obligations for universal access.

OHA would also like to respectfully remind the State Legislature of the state's obligations to steward crown and government lands, also known as ceded or public land trust lands. Our understanding of this measure is that it will provide facilities for low- or no-cost to community-based providers. This is consistent with the way **early childhood**

care and education must be seen as a public good. We support these lands being used for this purpose rather than for the purpose of generating revenue. We would also like to ensure that the implementation of this expanded program taking careful precautions not to allow for the alienation of any public property that may be part of the public land trust.

OHA believes this program can be an integral component to the State's efforts to actualize Act 46 (SLH 2020). We respectfully request the committee **advance SB3087 SD1 HD1**. Mahalo nui for the opportunity to testify on this important issue.

The Early Learning Board supports the Executive Office on Early Learning's (EOEL) commitment to expanding early learning opportunities for all keiki across the State and is, therefore, in strong support of S.B. No. 3087 SD 1, HD 1.

The intention of this bill is to expand public-private partnerships for all young keiki by administering programs in existing vacant public spaces. Presently, section 302L-1.7, HRS, authorizes EOEL to administer pre-plus programs through private-public partnerships on Department of Education (HIDOE) public school campuses. S.B. No. 3087 SD 1, HD 1 would expand access to affordable early learning programs through offering potentially more cost-effective spaces by allowing programs to be administered on other public properties in addition to HIDOE campuses.

The Board is confident that EOEL will work collaboratively and effectively with other State agencies that own or oversee these properties to provide early learning spaces, with priority given to communities and areas with limited access to early learning programs and services.

As EOEL continues to expand the EOEL public prekindergarten program, it is critical to also focus on expanding community-based options as these programs are necessary to meet families' unique needs and demands, while supporting choice. Community-based programs tend to offer services that extend beyond the traditional school day, helping to meet the care needs of families who work traditional and non-traditional hours.

EOEL notes in its testimony this bill would utilize the terminology "early learning", rather than "preplus", as "early learning" is already defined in section 302 L-1, HRS. This bill also does not require any funding or fiscal support

The ELB appreciates the on-going support from the Legislature to expand access to quality early learning for Hawaii's keiki. We strongly support this measure and respectfully ask that S.B. No. 3087, SD 1, HD 1 be passed. Thank you for this opportunity to offer testimony.

<u>PURPOSE</u>: This bill expands access to early learning programs on other state properties and public lands besides Department of Education public school campuses. Effective 7/1/3000. (HD1).

The Senate Committee on Education (SD1) amended this measure by making technical, nonsubstantive amendments for the purposes of clarity and consistency.

The House Committee on Education (HD1) amended this measure by:

- (1) Changing the effective date to July 1, 3000; and
- (2) Making technical, nonsubstantive amendments for the purposes of clarity, consistency, and style.

The Department supports the expansion of early learning programs on other state properties and public lands besides the Department of Education public school campuses since

it may provide more opportunities for families to access child care throughout the State. DHS will work with the Executive Office on Early Learning (EOEL) and child care providers who are authorized to use and occupy the public school facilities and other available public properties should they be required to be licensed by DHS.

Early Childhood Action Strategy (ECAS) is a statewide cross-sector collaborative designed to improve the system of care for Hawai'i's youngest children and their families. ECAS partners work to align priorities for children prenatal to age eight, streamline services, maximize resources, and improve programs to support our youngest keiki.

ECAS strongly supports passage of SB3087 SD1 HD1, which would expand access to early learning programs on other state properties and public lands besides Department of Education public school campuses.

High-quality early care and learning programs are fundamental to providing children with dependable, nurturing relationships, safe environments, and stimulating experiences that are critical for brain development and school readiness. Experiences in high-quality early care and learning programs can lead to improved educational, economic, health and well-being outcomes for children, lasting into adulthood. Hawaii, however, faces a significant shortage of early care and learning programs, with only one program space for every four children under the age of six.

SB3087 SD1 HD1 would support the State's commitment to increasing access to early learning programs by allowing for the use of space for early learning programs beyond HIDOE campuses to other, existing vacant public spaces. This expansion of options will help facilitate growth of a larger specturm of early care and learning programs to better meet the unique needs and preferences of children and families, such as the needs for full-day, full-year programs, or programs for infants and toddlers.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony **in support of SB3087 SD1 HD1**. With the limited availability of quality early care and learning seats we strongly support the bill's proposal to expand available options and increase access to early learning opportunities for a wider range of children.

E ka Luna Hoʻomalu Yamashita, ka Hope Luna Hoʻomalu Kitagawa, a me nā lālā o ke Kōmike Waiwai o ka Hale o nā Lunamakaʻāinana, aloha kākou! My name is Dr. Waiʻaleʻale Sarsona, Vice President of Hiʻialo at Kamehameha Schools.

Kamehameha Schools <u>supports</u> SB 3087, SD1, HD1, which expands access to early learning programs on other state properties and public lands besides Department of Education public school campuses.

The pivotal enactment of Act 46 (2020) set Hawai'i on the important pathway of ensuring that every three- and four-year-old has access to early learning by the year 2032. As of September 2023, according to the data aggregated by Early Childhood Action Strategy (ECAS), Hawai'i childcare providers reported their capacity to care for keiki between birth and age 5 at 19,983 seats. However, this is still 16% below pre-pandemic levels.

In the Hawai'i Early Learning Needs Assessment (2017), center-based program directors listed the lack of space or appropriate facilities as the most common barrier to increasing the number of seats in their classrooms for three- and four-year-old keiki across Hawai'i. By expanding access to early learning programs on state properties and public lands, more seats can be made available. Our keiki cannot afford to lose any more opportunities. **Please advance this measure.**

Founded in 1887, Kamehameha Schools is an educational organization striving to restore our people through education and advance a thriving Lāhui where all Native Hawaiians are successful, grounded in traditional values, and leading in the local and global communities. We believe that community success is individual success, Hawaiian culture-based education leads to academic success and local leadership drives global leadership.
