**1 Fiscal Implications:** \$18M general fund appropriation for comprehensive statewide air

2 ambulance backup program. However, multiple variations and configurations will reduce cost.

3 **Department Testimony:** The Department of Health (DOH) strongly supports SB3126 SD1,

4 which is part of the Governor's Administrative Package, and continues to work with public and

5 private stakeholders to refine the concepts. While many details remain, DOH believes that

6 keeping SB3126 SD1 alive acknowledges the value of a statewide air ambulance capability,

7 positively affects the public policy conversation, and stimulates county interest in this measure or

8 a public-private partnership variation.

#### 9 <u>Background</u>

The State of Hawaii is serviced by one private sector air ambulance provider, down from two as market conditions forced the exit of a provider in 2022. In November 2022, a tragic accident disrupted interisland transport of patients from remote and rural settings to healthcare facilities for almost six months. Although commercial airlines sometimes transport patients, the commercial carriers are not equipped for advanced life support patients. If the private air ambulance service is down, few alternatives are available for sick patients.

# 1 <u>General Concept</u>

2	DOH asserts that the risk to life safety is untenable with only one air ambulance service provider
3	and proposes a comprehensive statewide air ambulance back-up and resiliency program to
4	provide a second line of defense behind the market-based air ambulance network. This backup
5	network may be totally or partially contracted with the private sector, or preferably, as a
6	comprehensive statewide public/private partnership, and create a greater degree of parity to
7	ground ambulance service, a critical public safety and health policy authorized by the Legislature
8	decades ago that puts Hawaii's residents in proximity to a 24/7 911 ground ambulance service.
9	The public/private comprehensive statewide air ambulance back-up and resiliency program may
10	be tailored to meet unique needs of rural counties, but shares certain core components:
11	• \$18M for acquisition of new twin-engine state-of-the-art helicopters funded by the State,
12	including parts and maintenance, through a long-term lease-to-own agreement.
13	• County or State funding of maintenance, air, and medical personnel, as well as
14	infrastructure such as flight hangars.
15	• Helicopters, though the property of the lease holder, the State of Hawaii, that are
16	deployed to the counties who may in turn operate for non-medical missions such as
17	search and rescue, fire suppression, and law enforcement.
18	• Coordination with local health systems to negotiate sustainable reimbursement rates, as
19	well as subsidies and sponsorships.
20	These costs will be recurring, so this is a long-term investment in Hawaii's healthcare
21	infrastructure, but one that will most certainly save lives.
22	In addition to pilots, flight nurses, and flight medics a comprehensive statewide air ambulance
23	back-up and resiliency program will require logistical support staff to implement and manage the
24	program.
25	Early feedback on this proposal from first responders and hospitals has been encouraging and has

corroborated the need for statewide air ambulance back-up system. Many more details need to

- 1 be discussed, including how the program participants and stakeholders may share in the costs to
- 2 maintain these assets. Nevertheless, DOH respectfully requests the Legislature to keep SB3126
- 3 SD1 moving as stakeholders work towards consensus.

## In consideration of Senate Bill 3126 SD1 Relating to Emergency Aeromedical Services

Honorable Chair Belatti, Honorable Chair Todd, and Members of the Committees:

The County of Kaua'i submits comments on SB 3126 SD1 which establishes an Emergency Aeromedical Services Partnership Program to be administered by the Department of Health in counties with a population less than 500,000; requires cost-sharing for program operations and maintenance and revenue sharing between the State and The County of Hawai'i, County of Kaua'i, and County of Maui; authorizes deposits into the Emergency Medical Services Special Fund; requires rulemaking; declares that the general fund expenditure ceiling is exceeded; and makes an appropriation.

In light that existing aeromedical services provided by the existing fixed-wing aircraft under certain circumstances might not be available or there is backlog or significant delay, the County of Kaua'i supports the concept of having a backup aeromedical rotary-wing aircraft which may also be utilized for fire suppression of wildfires.

We appreciate the source of additional means to strengthen our wildfire suppression arsenal. However, some situations are unclear. If a medical emergency transport and a wildfire occur simultaneously, how will the priority be determined?

SB3126 SD1, which would disperse to the Counties fifty percent proportionately based on billed amounts, asserts the Maui model that provides aeromedical service as supported by Act 213, Session Laws of 2007, is suitable to meet the needs of the State. The February 2024 Department of Health Annual Report on the Receipt and Expenditure from the Emergency Medical Services Special Fund does not clearly identify the amount disbursed as reimbursement for emergency medical services to Maui County. In 2021, Maui County's population of 164,221 more than doubled Kaua'i County's population of 73,454 which begets the question whether the model is suitable for a county with half the population. With this disparity in population size, we have concerns regarding the cost our County will bear for the operations of the rotary-wing aircraft including the pilots, mechanics, flight nurses, flight paramedics, and dispatch operators, and whether the Maui model can support the needs for Kaua'i.

We look forward to the continued conversation with a broader perspective from stakeholders at the table including hospital and medical professionals.

I am writing to you as the Fire Chief of the Hawaii Fire Department (HFD), a comprehensive emergency services provider for the Island of Hawaii, which encompasses critical roles in fire suppression, emergency medical services (EMS), rescue operations, hazardous materials response, and ocean safety. Our dedicated team serves a vast and diverse geographic area, often facing unique challenges that stem from our island's remote locations and the distribution of medical resources.

The bill S.B. No. 3126, which proposes the establishment of an Emergency Aeromedical Services Partnership Program, represents a pivotal step towards addressing a critical gap in our healthcare delivery system, especially for the rural and remote communities of our island and neighboring counties. The disparities in access to immediate and advanced medical care are not just logistical challenges; they are matters of life and death.

The Hawaii Fire Department (HFD), through its extensive experience in responding to emergencies across the island, recognizes the immense value that such a program would bring. The bill's proposal to enhance the infrastructure for emergency aeromedical services, inspired by the successful model in Maui County, aligns with our mission to improve patient outcomes through swift and efficient medical intervention.

Emergency situations, such as heart attacks, strokes, and severe injuries, require prompt specialized care that is often not available in rural areas. The current limitation of having only one interisland aeromedical provider has been a significant bottleneck in our ability to provide the highest level of care to all residents, irrespective of their geographic location. Establishing a partnership program as outlined in S.B. No. 3126 would not only increase the resilience of our emergency medical system but also ensure that critical care is accessible when and where it is needed most.

In my capacity as Fire Chief and on behalf of the Hawaii Fire Department, I wholeheartedly support S.B. No. 3126. I urge the legislature to recognize the profound impact this bill will have on the health and safety of our communities. By facilitating more effective emergency medical responses, we are not just improving a system; we are saving lives and safeguarding the well-being of our people.

Our most vulnerable and high risk patients deserve a reliable interisland aeromedical service provider in the event of an emergency. We have observed patients from neighbor island facilities, including Molokai General Hospital and North Hawai'i Community Hospital, with serious medical conditions ranging from complicated pregnancies to cardiovascular failure in desperate need of medical attention having to wait to be airlifted and treated on Oahu. With only a single service provider in a State that experiences on average 2,500 air ambulance trips per year, a more stable and reliable solution is needed.

Thank you to the Committee on Health and Homelessness and Committee on Transportation for hearing SB3126 SD1 relating to emergency aeromedical services. We are in **strong support** of SB3126 SD1 relating to emergency aeromedical services.

Global Medical Response owns and operates Hawai'i Life Flight, REACH, Guardian Flight, and AirMed International. Hawai'i Life Flight and REACH are the primary aeromedical providers serving Hawai'i. Global Medical Response also owns and operates American Medical Response (AMR) in Hawai'i for ground transportation. REACH and AMR continue to operate Maui MedEvac as one team. My name is Laura Mallery-Sayre and I am the Executive Director of the Daniel R. Sayre Memorial Foundation, Inc., a 501 (C) 3 public, volunteer non-profit with the mission to save lives in Hawai'i. For the past 26 years, this Foundation has, with the support of our amazing community donors, raised over \$30 Million to provide life-saving equipment and training to the Hawaii Fire Department including 14 fire trucks, an Airbus H125 EMS helicopter, water safety craft, rescue boards, AEDs, long-range communication systems, rescue ropes, underwater communication systems and a rescue boat to name a few. We have secured funding and made the down payment for the purchase of an Airbus H145, twin engine, medevac helicopter, scheduled to arrive in December of 2025. The primary purpose of this aircraft is to provide critical care transport directly from Hawaii Island Hospitals to the trauma centers in Honolulu if time is of an essence and if a Life-flight transport is unavailable, delayed or deemed too dangerous for transport. We have been assured that this transport can take from 1½ hours to 2 hours depending on the location of the Big Island hospital as opposed to a fixed wing transport of up to 7 to 8 hours which requires multiple ambulance exchanges for transport. Such was the case with our dear friend Danny Akaka who collapsed from a major brain bleed at 9:10 in the morning and did not arrive at Queen's until 5:15 PM. During this 8 hour delay, his stroke expanded and his recovery was compromised. SB3126 will help to change this time response and provide better care for our critical need patients. We STRONGLY SUPPORT this Bill and urge you to pass it.

Operational support for these EMS helicopters is critical right now as we prepare for the delivery of the H145 and should not be delayed. The Daniel R. Sayre Memorial Foundation is poised to be one of your public partners in the Emergency Aeromedical Services Partnership Program. We have already expanded our support to the Maui Fire Department and are working with Chief Brad Ventura, the Maui County Council and Mayor to assist Maui in the purchase of essential Tanker Fire Trucks. We would be happy to assist Maui and Kauai as we move forward with this life-saving program.

My name is Kelly Fliear and 44-year resident of Hawaii. This is a desperately needed Emergency Medical Service for the outer islands. During the two most recent Air Ambulance shutdowns, one permanently - Air Methods and one temporarily after a tragic aviation accident - Hawai'i Life Flight, we on the Big Island found ourselves without Aeromedical support. The US Coast Guard had to eventually supply a C-130 aircraft to transport critically ill patients to trauma centers on Oahu.

The current aeromedical provider, Hawai'i Life Flight is at times either overwhelmed with transports that are in-process, or unavailable due to mechanical or pilot availability issues. These periods of unavailability leaves Hawai'i Island vulnerable without immediate Air Ambulance support.

In specific, a Helicopter Air Ambulance service which can move a critical care patient from a regional hospital to a trauma center or from an accident scene directly to a hospital without the need of a ground ambulance is absolutely essential.

We have thousands of residents as well as visitors from around the globe residing on our shores and at any time someone could need lifesaving transport to Oahu. The fact that this EMS provision is not always readily available is unthinkable.

#### **Testimony Emergency Aeromedical Transportation:**

My name is Dr. Nicholas Franklin. I am a practicing geriatrician and medical director for longterm care with Hawaii Health Service Corporation Kauai Region (HHSC-KR) overseeing two facilities totally 86 LTC beds.

I support SB 3126 as written and encourage consideration to expand the scope by explicitly implementing a structure for select non-emergency medical transport services interisland. This service needs conditions and guarantees for round trip transport accommodations.

Without practical interisland ocean transit, our outer islands lack non-emergency medical transport for access to specialists and interventions on Oahu not amenable to telemedicine for patients unable to endure commercial air travel.

Such patients are typically debilitated with partial or complete paralysis complicated by body habitus that prohibits use of commercial air travel; both for transfer complications and/or inability to transit seated in such upright accommodations. This is a standard requirement when selecting higher level medical transit on land for any patient (van/bus, basic life support certified, advanced life support certified). Hawaii must consider such accommodations for these rare but appropriate cases.

Some procedures; i.e. Automatic Implantable Cardiac Defibrillator (AICD) generator exchange, Ventriculoperitoneal Shunt (VP shunt) adjustments, Transcatheter Aortic Valve Replacement (TAVR) follow up care for repeat replacement; these complicated procedures require access to facilities not available on the outer islands. There are insurance determinations limiting what is ruled 'in-patient' and 'out-patient', resulting in limitations for interval boarding since these longterm care patients can't just stay at hotels with the dedicated RNs and CNAs we deploy alongside. Often, these out-patient procedures require multiple immediate follow up visits in the subsequent days of procedure prohibiting prompt return...for 'outpatient' procedures.

A factor limiting equal medical care on outer islands remains the logistics for transporting these difficult, debilitated patients for standard of care procedures not otherwise available. These situations are uncommon. The situational acceptance for foregoing this sort medical procedure, otherwise appropriate and standard of care for condition/morbidity/age, can be rectified by expanding the focus and goal of SB 3126 to include such specific <u>non-emergency interisland</u> <u>aeromedical transport.</u>

I support SB 3126 providing increased medical transport for emergency outer island care. Please consider how this new legislation can also include clauses to provide important care access for our most vulnerable Hawaii residents on the outer islands.

I write to you today as a concerned citizen, deeply troubled by the tragic incidents that have unfolded along our cliffsides and in our waters, particularly highlighted by the heart-wrenching loss of Kala'iokealaula Ashley Nicole Reyes Kanekoa. Her story, a stark reminder of the vulnerabilities we face in emergencies, especially during night hours and in offshore scenarios, underscores an urgent need for legislative action to enhance our emergency response capabilities.

Senate Bill 3126, with its proposal for the Emergency Aeromedical Services Partnership Program, offers a beacon of hope in addressing these challenges. The harrowing experiences of individuals like Kala'iokealaula, who tragically lost her life after falling from a cliff and being swept away by the ocean's currents, along with the distressing accounts of fishermen whose vessels capsize far from shore, illustrate a critical gap in our current emergency services.

The delay in response times during night hours, compounded by the lack of immediately available and adequately equipped rescue units, can no longer be overlooked. The proposed legislation has the potential to significantly mitigate these risks by ensuring that aeromedical and specialized rescue services are on hand to swiftly respond to such dire situations, regardless of the time or location.

It is imperative that we support Senate Bill 3126, not only as a measure to prevent future tragedies but as a commitment to the safety and well-being of our community members. Enhanced emergency response capabilities, particularly for cliffside incidents and offshore rescues, are essential to ensuring that no call for help goes unanswered in our beloved state.

Let us honor the memory of Kala'iokealaula and the countless others who have found themselves in peril by taking decisive action to improve our emergency response infrastructure. Your support for this bill is a step towards safeguarding our communities against the unpredictable forces of nature and preventing avoidable loss of life.

I am writing to express my strong support for Senate Bill 3126 SD1, which aims to establish an Emergency Aeromedical Services Partnership Program in rural counties with populations of less than 500,000. As the Chief Dental Officer for a community health center, I have witnessed firsthand the challenges faced by residents in rural communities, particularly concerning access to critical healthcare services.

The current healthcare landscape in rural areas of Hawaii is marked by a significant disparity in resources compared to more urbanized areas, such as Oahu. This inequality in access to advanced levels of trauma care, medical specialists, and sub-specialists places residents of these underserved regions at a heightened risk of poor health outcomes, especially in cases of serious medical emergencies like heart attacks, strokes, and traumatic injuries.

Furthermore, the existing system of interisland medical transport is overburdened, with only one interisland aeromedical provider serving the entire state. This limited infrastructure poses a considerable risk to patient safety, as disruptions to these services due to factors like maintenance issues or crew availability can lead to potentially lifethreatening delays in accessing necessary medical care.

Senate Bill 3126 SD1 presents a viable solution to address these pressing issues by establishing an Emergency Aeromedical Services Partnership Program, modeled after the successful initiative in Maui County. By partnering with the Department of Health, rural counties will be able to ensure the consistent availability of air ambulance services, thereby enhancing the overall resiliency of emergency aeromedical services across the state.

The proposed program outlines a clear framework for collaboration between the state and county governments, with defined responsibilities for funding and operations. This collaborative approach will not only improve access to emergency medical transport but also facilitate efficient coordination and resource allocation to meet the unique needs of each community.

Additionally, the bill includes provisions for statewide standards and rulemaking, ensuring that the program adheres to the highest levels of safety and quality of care. By establishing these guidelines, we can guarantee that all residents, regardless of their geographic location, have access to reliable emergency medical services when they need them most.

Aloha All,

I am testifying in opposition to SB3126 regarding state DOH/Counties proposed aeromedical program. While another reliable aeromedical transport option is sorely needed within the state, I do not feel it is within the ability of the County of Hawaii to carry this mission out. The Hawaii Fire Department currently has on island aeromedical capabilities that have recently become limited due to EMS staffing, pilot staffing, and limitations of the the new aeromedical helicopter. The Hawaii Fire Departement has found itself extremely short staffed, particularly in the Paramedic position. On a given day, multiple Advanced Life Support ambulance units are downgraded to Basic Life Support units due to lack of Paramedic staffing/availibilty. This downgrading does an injustice to the communities that they serve by offering limited and inferior care options especially in serious/critical cases. The Hawaii Fire Department currently is not able to support the community with reliable Advanced Life Support/Paramedic care via ALS Ambulance. How can the HFD possibly consider staffing an interisland aeromedical unit when daily ALS Ambulance staffing needs cannot be met?

I fully support the need for more aeromedical services throughout the state. Those of us on the outer islands often need the specialty care services provided by larger and more capable medical institutions found on Oahu. I do not believe that the Hawaii County Fire department is currently capable of providing this service and all that it encompasses as the EMS section is already understaffed with no end in sight. Acquiring this new burden of aeromedical services will result in greater Paramedic staff shortages that will ultimately effect daily ALS ambulance services to the community. A better option may be to allow other agencies such Hilo Medical Center to operate such a program. They may have a better chance to find staffing from the nursing pool or create a new program and train a new generation of flight nurses.
