Proposing an Amendment to Article I, section 5 of the Hawai'i Constitution Relating to Due Process and Equal Protection

Dear Chair Rhoads, Vice Chair Gabbard and Committee Members:

The American Civil Liberties Union of Hawai'i **SUPPORTS S.B. 3351 which** proposes a constitutional amendment to prohibit discrimination against a person because of ethnicity, national origin, age, disability, or sex, including sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, pregnancy, and pregnancy outcomes.

Our Hawai'i State Constitution is modeled after the U. S. Constitution, yet also includes more expansive provisions. For example, the Hawai'i Constitution lists key individual rights of citizens, prohibits sex-based discrimination, guarantees an explicit right to privacy and safeguards collective bargaining. In addition, the Hawai'i Constituion reflects the unique history and cultural heritage of Hawai'l, establishing protections for Native Hawaiians, the environment and natural reources, and public wellness.

Nonetheless, our Hawai'i Constitution could be strengthened by adding an Equal Rights Amenmdent that would prohibit discrimination by the government based on a person's ethnicity, national origin, age, disability, or sex — including their sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, pregnancy and pregnancy outcomes. It would also protect against any government actions that would curtail a person's reproductive autonomy or their access to reproductive health care.

Even before the Supreme Court struck down *Roe*, access to abortion and other reproductive care was already nonexistent in many parts of the country. Even in Hawai'i, some people living in rurul areas and the neighbor islands still struggle to get the care they need.

The proposed ERA would, for the first time, explicitly include language to clarify that discrimination based on a person's pregnancy or pregnancy outcome is sex discrimination – this is crucial given the national trend of criminalizing people for various pregnancy outcomes, as well as the Supreme Court's overturning of *Roe v. Wade*.

In closing, we respectfully request your support of S.B. 3351, to reaffirm our commitment to equality for everyone and to advance equality for all.

### INDIVISIBLE HAWAII

February 8, 2024

Dear Senators Rhoads, Gabbard, Elefante, San Buenaventura, and Awa,

I write on behalf of Indivisible Hawaii in strong support of SB3351. Hawaii's constitution already prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, religion, sex or ancestry. This bill would allow Hawaii's citizens to vote on adding prohibitions of discrimination on the basis of ethnicity, national origin, age, disability, sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, pregnancy and pregnancy outcomes. There is already a patchwork of state and federal provisions which address some of these protections. But that patchwork is not without loopholes.

Hawaii's constitution has always prohibited discrimination on the basis of sex. Yet our state constitution was amended in 1998 to prevent same sex marriage. That action was clearly discrimination based on homosexuality. As Justice Gorsuch said in *Bostock v. Clayton County*, 590 U.S. \_\_\_\_, 140 S. Ct. 1731 (2020), "... discrimination based on homosexuality... necessarily entails discrimination based on sex; the first cannot happen without the other." The individual rights we have long held under our state and federal constitutions and have long taken for granted are not set in stone. We have only to look at the U.S. Supreme Court's abortion decision, *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization*, 597 U.S. 215 (2022), to recognize this.

Hawaii has always been in the forefront of protecting individual rights. It was the first state to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment and Hawaii's own state constitution contains a broader protection of individual rights than the U.S. Constitution. SB3351 will help guarantee these rights for our citizens, now and in the future. There is never justification for discrimination.

Dear Chair Karl Rhoads, Vice-Chair Mike Gabbard and Members of the Health and Homeless Committee:

Members of AAUW of Hawaii thank you for this opportunity to testify in **strong support** of S.B. No. 3351 to propose amending Article 1, Section 5 of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i to also prohibit discrimination against a person because of ethnicity, national origin, age, disability or sex including sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, pregnancy and pregnancy.

#### Section 5. DUE PROCESS AND EQUAL PROTECTION now reads:

No person shall be deprived of life, liberty or property without due process of law, nor be denied the equal protection of the laws, nor be denied the enjoyment of the person's civil rights or be discriminated against in the exercise thereof because of race, religion, sex or ancestry.

It is important to add ethnicity, national origin, age, disability or sex including sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, pregnancy and pregnancy outcomes to the due process and equal protection section of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i for several reasons:

- 1. **Protection of Civil Rights**: Explicitly including these categories in the state constitution ensures that individuals belonging to these groups are afforded equal protection under the law. This protection is crucial for upholding civil rights and preventing discrimination based on immutable characteristics.
- 2. **Promotion of Equality**: By recognizing these characteristics within the constitutional framework, Hawai'i sends a strong message about its commitment to equality and inclusion. It establishes a legal foundation for promoting diversity and fostering a society where all individuals are treated with dignity and respect.
- 3. **Addressing Historical Injustices**: Historically, certain groups, such as people who are pregnant, ethnic minorities, LGBTQ+ individuals, people with disabilities, and Kupunas have faced systemic discrimination and marginalization. Incorporating

- these categories into the constitution acknowledges past injustices and signals a commitment to rectifying them through legal protection and equal treatment.
- 4. **Legal Clarity and Consistency**: Explicitly listing these categories in the constitution provides clarity and consistency in legal interpretation and application. It establishes a clear standard for evaluating laws and policies to ensure they do not discriminate against individuals based on these protected characteristics.
- 5. **Preventing Discriminatory Legislation**: Incorporating these categories into the constitution serves as a safeguard against the enactment of discriminatory legislation that targets or disproportionately affects individuals based on their ethnicity, national origin, age, disability, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, pregnancy, or pregnancy outcomes.
- Reflecting Evolving Societal Values: Including these categories in the constitution reflects evolving societal values and norms regarding equality, diversity, and inclusion. It demonstrates a commitment to adapting legal frameworks to align with changing perspectives and addressing emerging issues related to discrimination and equality.
- 7. **Legal Remedies and Recourse**: Constitutional protection ensures that individuals who experience discrimination based on these characteristics have legal remedies and recourse available to them. It strengthens their ability to challenge discriminatory practices and seek justice through legal avenues.

Overall, adding these categories to the due process and equal protection section of the State Constitution of Hawai'i is a significant step toward fostering a more inclusive and equitable society, where all individuals are treated fairly and have equal opportunities regardless of their immutable characteristics.
