SCR 14, URGING THE MEMBERS OF HAWAII'S CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION TO MONITOR THE ALLIANCE FOR HIPPOCRATIC MEDICINE V. U.S. FOOD AND DRUG ADMINISTRATION AND TAKE ACTION TO LIMIT THE CASE FROM FURTHER RESTRICTING ACCESS TO SAFE ABORTION OPTIONS.

POSITION: SUPPORT

The Democratic Party of Hawai'i <u>supports</u> SCR 14, which urges members of Hawai'i's congressional delegation to monitor the *Alliance For Hippocratic Medicine v. U.S. Food and Drug Administration* and take action to limit the case from further restricting access to safe abortion options.

Reproductive care is an essential form of health care. In March 1970, Hawai'i became the first state to legalize abortion, three years before the landmark *Roe v. Wade* decision by the United States Supreme Court that protected access to abortion nationwide. By legalizing abortion access, the state recognized that preserving access to safe and legal reproductive care is a vital public health objective for the islands.

Furthermore, Hawai'i's unique geography and high cost of living present barriers to obtaining reproductive care for patients and potential patients. As of 2022, only a few abortion providers host reproductive care clinics on two to three islands in the state. According to Planned Parenthood, the number of abortion providers in the State has been on the decline since the 1990s. Studies show that access to abortion care is linked to financial wellbeing. According to The Turnaway Study conducted by Advancing New Standards in Reproductive Health at the University of California San Francisco, people who were denied access to an abortion experienced an increase in household poverty lasting at least four years relative to those who received an abortion. In addition, women who lacked access to reproductive care were also found to be less able to pay for basic living expenses and had lower credit scores and higher rates of debt and eviction than those with access to abortion care.

The United States Supreme Court's ruling in *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization* overturned *Roe v. Wade* and ended the federal constitutional right to abortion care. In overturning *Roe v. Wade*, the Court erased nearly fifty years of legal precedent supporting the fundamental right to reproductive freedom, leading to a wave of abortion restrictions enacted by state legislatures across the country. The Supreme Court's decision disproportionately harmed Black, Latino, indigenous, and other people of color, for whom access to health care and economic opportunities have historically been impeded by systemic racism.

Sadly, anti-abortion activists are currently attempting to impose attempt to impose a nationwide ban on mifepristone, one of two medications in a regimen that accounts for more than half the abortions in the United States, as well as other forms of contraception. In August of 2023, a federal appeals court ruled that mifepristone should not be prescribed past seven weeks of pregnancy or via telemedicine. Numerous states have also introduced legislation to restrict access to mifepristone and contraception. If implemented, these restrictions may apply even in states where abortion is legal.

Following the *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization* ruling, it is imperative for our state to implement proactive measures to protect access to reproductive care. In the face of a growing and persistent threat to reproductive care, we must preserve the islands' long legacy of leading the nation on this issue.

The Hawai'i State Democratic Women's Caucus writes in support of SCR 14 which requests that Hawaii's congressional delegation monitor the Alliance for Hippocratic Medicine v. U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) case in the U.S. Supreme Court and take action to limit the case from further restricting access to safe abortion options. The Court is scheduled to hear oral arguments on the case on March 26, 2024.

This challenge by anti-abortion advocates challenges the FDA's approval of an abortion drug places medication abortion at risk across the U.S. Medication abortion is the most commonly used method of abortion in the U.S., accounting for more that half of all abortions.¹

Mifepristone was first approved by the FDA in 2000. Since then, it has established a well-documented safety record. Leading medical and scientific organizations such as the American Medical Association, the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and the American Academy of Family Physicians recognize medication abortion care as safe and effective.

We believe that it is critical that access to medication abortion be available so that health care providers have an additional method of providing a safe and effective abortion treatment to their patients.

This is a priority issue for the Hawai'i State Democratic Women's Caucus. The Hawai'i State Democratic Women's Caucus is a catalyst for progressive, social, economic, and political change through action on critical issues facing Hawaii's women and girls.
