The Central Pacific Youth Athletic Club (CPYAC) is seeking \$245,000.00 in capital funds to support the construction of a state-of-the-art facility that will serve as CPYAC's permanent home. The new facility will include a metal shop, an auto shop, a wood shop and a music studio; moreover, the facility will allow us to implement a work-training program for youth between the ages of 14 to 21. The 12-month program will include occupational skills training in yard services, handyman services, woodworking, audio-visual production, computer technology, and clerical services.





Background and Summary

Many who have grown up in the islands know that life in Hawai‘i is far more complex than the guidebooks let on. This is especially true for the east side of Hawai‘i Island, where socioeconomic conditions are amongst the most challenging in the state (Hawai‘i State Data Center 2021). 14.5% of youth in Hawai‘i aged 16-24 are “disconnected” (i.e., neither in school nor at work), compared to the national average of 13% (Liou 2019). Hawai‘i County’s unemployment rates are the second highest in the state (Federal Reserve Economic Data), while its alcohol and substance use rates are the highest (even when compared to the state overall: Oneye et al. 2021).

A longtime East Hawai‘i resident, Walter Carvalho saw a local need for mentorship opportunities early on. Known to many as Coach Wally, he and other partners started the Central Pacific Youth Athletic Club (CPYAC) in 1999 and obtained the organization’s 501(c)(3) status the following year. During its first four years, CPYAC was funded by membership fees, local fundraisers, and most prominently, Coach Wally himself. As an accomplished athlete, trainer, and mentor, Coach Wally knows the transformative power of discipline and hard work. Blending Hawai‘i’s passion for athletics with his own extensive experience, Coach Wally has overseen CPYAC’s growth from a small passion project to a community-driven institution offering holistic approaches to youth development. Through academic support, athletic training, skills development, and mentorship, Coach Wally’s model engages both younger and older youth to reach their full potential. CPYAC also partners with fellow coaches to provide direct training opportunities to aspiring young athletes. Since its founding, over a thousand youth have participated in CPYAC’s academic and athletic programs. CPYAC annually serves approximately 150 youth between the ages of 5 to 25, with participants coming from areas as far away as Honoka‘a, Volcano, and Kalapana. Participants are required to uphold a minimum 2.5 GPA in order to partake in CPYAC’s programs.

The tradition of strength—both physical and mental—is at the heart of this organization. Coach Wally has always understood that true strength is not just about physical prowess but about mental fortitude, discipline, and resilience in the face of adversity. CPYAC teaches youth to push beyond their limits, both in the gym and in life. CPYAC shows youth that success is earned through hard work, and that no matter their past, they have the potential to create a brighter future. To that end, CPYAC now seeks to embark on the next stage of its journey with the proposed construction of a state-of-the-art facility that will serve as the organization’s permanent home. This new facility will allow CPYAC to diversify its program offerings with the implementation of an innovative work-training program. For this program, CPYAC will place 30 qualified youth (currently in school and between the ages of 14 and 21) in an expanded, 12-month program that will include mentoring and occupational skills training in yard services, handyman services, wood working, audio-video production, computer technology, and clerical services. We seek \$245,000.00 in capital funds from the Grants-in-Aid program to help make this vision a reality.

Service Summary, Timeline, and Outcomes

CPYAC guides at-risk youth between the ages of 5 to 25 toward healthy lifestyles choices through success in education, substance abuse education, and specific athletic activities. Our programs run concurrently to the academic year and are organized as follows:

- Afterschool Program: Mondays-Fridays, 2:30pm-7:00pm
 - Students must check in with the Director for attendance.
 - Students will have access to the internet, library and encyclopedias for academic research and special projects. Tutors are available to students at all times.
 - Students must complete academic assignments before starting any physical or extracurricular activities, on exceptions. Academic work is reviewed by tutors.
 - One completing academic work, students will engage in guided exercise programs to better their health, awareness and coordination.
 - Athletic activities include cardiovascular training, weight training, boxing, kick boxing, basketball/softball, and Jiu Jitsu.
- Summer Program: Mondays-Fridays, hours dependent on staffing availability
 - The summer program balances academic studies (when applicable) with physical fitness activities.
 - For students interested in swimming and/or junior lifeguard classes, an Olympic pool is available.
 - Students can also partake in boxing, kickboxing, and Jiu Jitsu training.
 - The program prioritizes drug and alcohol awareness education.
 - Free time is available for students, including activities such as Playstation, Xbox, ping pong, basketball, and athletic conditioning.
- Work-Training Program: This program is not yet implemented. It is contingent upon the completion of the new facility.
 - The program is informed by a literature review of best practices on drug prevention and education. It will highlight the following indicators:
 - Communication skills
 - Refusal skills
 - Dealing with peer pressure
 - Perception of harm HIV/AIDS
 - Information on making healthy choices
 - Leadership Skills
 - Life skills
 - Holistic wellness (physical, emotion, spiritual)
 - CPYAC's strategy develops the skills detailed above by focusing on four area:
 - Drug resistance skills that increase knowledge of health and substance abuse and foster healthy attitudes such as food and nutrition, intentions and dealing with peer pressure to engage ni substance abuse.
 - Improving academic/physical fitness performance, school attendance, and behavior and attitudes toward school and fitness.
 - Enhancing problem-solving and decision making skills
 - Skills to overcome shyness, to communicate effectively, and to mitigate the pitfalls of misunderstandings.

CPYAC's supportive environment fosters academic success, physical fitness, and personal responsibility. College students who tutor younger children gain valuable mentorship experience (and college credit where possible), while the younger children benefit from the security and guidance of being mentored. The athletic program emphasizes discipline, perseverance, and personal growth, all core values that extend beyond physical training to the real world itself. These

values serve as life skills that help participants build self-confidence, improve decision-making, and avoid the dangers of street violence, substance abuse, and other negative influences.

Many East Hawai'i youth face numerous barriers to success, including coming from single-parent households, experiencing the trauma of having parents incarcerated, or grappling with economic hardship and limited access to educational resources. Many are themselves at risk of falling into negative cycles of behavior, including involvement in crime, drugs, or violence. Through its unique combination of athletic training, academic support, mentorship, and vocational skills development, CPYAC provides a structured and positive alternative. Our holistic approach addresses the multifaceted challenges that these youth face. Our goal is to break the cycle of generational poverty and give them the tools they need to become self-sufficient, confident, and productive adults. We currently track outcomes through various self-reporting data measures, including those reporting academic achievement. We are in the process of designing more quantitative measures of assessing our programs, but these are contingent upon the completion of the facility. With various workshops (including a metal shop, and auto shop, and a wood shop), we will be able to implement more quantitatively sound measures of assessing our programs.

Financials

We are requesting funds to support the construction of a facility that will serve as a permanent home for CPYAC. This is the first grant application we are submitting for this project. We do not have a personnel budget because our team is all-volunteer. Once the building is operational, we will have a better idea of our future budgeting needs. We are currently investigating other relevant funding sources and will be able to report our quarterly funding for FY 2026 as we progress throughout the year. We have not taken any state or federal tax credits in the last three years. We have not received any county, state, or federal funding over the last three years. Through Next Generation Toughman Hawai'i, we typically host about five fights throughout the year to raise funds for CPYAC, with each event grossing up to \$30,000.00. Our current unrestricted assets total \$103,871.54, and we have included a bank statement to verify this amount. These are the only unrestricted assets CPYAC holds.

Experience and Capability

Walter Carvalho is the CEO and Executive Director of CPYAC. He is a former minor league baseball player and major league softball player. He was one of the top all-around athletes in his hometown in sports such as boxing, wrestling, and football. Here in Hawai'i, he has coached sports at the Boys and Girls Club, Hilo High School and St. Joseph High School. He has also coached collegiate students from both UH Hilo and HCC as well as little league baseball for more than 40 years. Coach Wally has also worked at all the major MMA event on TV UFC, BELLATOR, ONE FC, and many more. As a licensed cutman, he works very closely with many of the world's top athletes. CPYAC has had input from a physician, a psychologist, a dietician, volunteer tutors, and physical educators for the last five years.

Facilities

In its early days, CPYAC's programs took place in a Hilo Quonset hut behind Vema's Eatery on the corner of Kalaniana'ole and Banyan Streets. CPYAC relocated to the former Woolworth's space at Hilo's Prince Kūhiō Plaza in May 2005 but was priced out of that space in 2012. We now

host programs in a 4000sqft building in the Puna district. The facility will continue to serve as our principal site for all services until our new location is built.

CPYAC is seeking funds to build a permanent home where program participants will have access to hands-on vocational training, job readiness programs, and further avenues for personal growth (we have already secured and bulldozed the land). While CPYAC's programs already have a meaningful impact in the community, the lack of a permanent facility limits our ability to scale and expand our services. A new facility will provide the infrastructure necessary to support the growing number of youth we serve, offering them a broader spectrum of educational and professional opportunities. The new facility would offer the following:

- Metal Shop: Providing youth with hands-on experience in welding, metalworking, and fabrication, skills that can lead to well-paying job opportunities in the skilled trades.
- Auto Shop: Offering training in auto repair and maintenance, an industry with high demand for skilled workers.
- Woodshop: Giving youth the opportunity to learn carpentry, woodworking, and furniture building, all of which are valuable skills that can translate into future employment.
- Music Studio: A creative space where young people can explore their musical talents, record, and gain valuable technical skills in sound engineering and production.

Each of these spaces will provide hands-on, practical training that prepares young people for careers in high-demand fields, while simultaneously giving them a constructive outlet for their energy, creativity, and drive.

CPYAC is on the cusp of a transformative moment. The funding we seek for the construction of our new facility will allow us to expand our services and provide even more youth with the skills, mentorship, and opportunities they need to succeed. Through academic support, athletic training, vocational education, and personal mentorship, we are building stronger futures for the youth of East Hawai'i. With the support of this grant, we will be able to further our mission to empower youth, keep them off the streets, and provide them with the resources they need to thrive

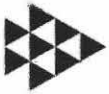
