Since 1993, Ethnic Education Hawai'i (formerly Ethnic Education Foundation Hawai'i) has been serving the community. Leona Jona, a refugee from Hungary and cofounder of EEH, recognized the limited support for immigrants and non-English speakers in Hawai'i and the need to address the gap in services. She was moved to create a vehicle of disseminating information to underserved groups that would assist them in learning and understanding how to live and work in a new environment.

The primary goal of Ethnic Education Hawai'i (EEH) is to provide equal access to vital information for those who cannot access English language media. It has been the leading non-profit organization in Hawai'i dedicated to providing language access for immigrant and LEP individuals. It addresses the rights and responsibilities of new immigrants and migrants and provides information on housing, jobs, education, public health and safety, and other resources. EEH also fosters appreciation of diverse cultures and languages, thereby promoting greater understanding.

Working with ethnic radio and TV stations, EEH ensures that immigrants, COFA migrants, and LEP population are represented, and they have access to accurate information in their native languages via radio, television, and print media. Since the pandemic and the Maui wildfire, EEH has evolved to

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

The primary goal is to provide information and resources that will foster participation of immigrants and LEP individuals in all aspects of civic life and their capability to be responsible, productive members of society. To accomplish this, EEH will focus on these areas: a) media outreach, b) capacity building, 3) community cultural celebrations.

Funding will strengthen EEH's ability to work with media outlets that directly focus on Hawai'i's underserved population who are native speakers of languages other than English and are not proficient in English.

- a. Media Outreach— Conduct outreach utilizing ethnic radio, TV, community paper and publications, and social media, (i.e,Meta/Facebook, Instagram, Spotify, YouTube) about the available services and resources to aid in navigating challenges that impacts facets of life adjusting to a new environment in multiple languages (i.e., jobs, housing, health, and safety).
- b. Capacity Building—Grow capacity of immigrant and LEP population to fully access benefits, exercise their rights, and contribute to society (i.e., voter education, digital literacy, job skills, education and training workshops).
- c. Community Cultural Celebrations—Engage families and community through celebrations promoting interaction and engagement among families, neighbors, and resources in the community.
- 3. The public purpose and need to be served;

Of the State's population, 348,139 persons (or around 1 in 4) speak a language other than English at home. Forty-three (43% or) of them or 161,055 residents speak English "less than very well," and are counted as limited English proficient speakers (LEP). (2019 State of Hawaii Data Book)

Due in part to a lack of understanding of their rights and responsibilities and limited English language proficiency, foreign-born residents, particularly recent immigrants, experience prejudice, cultural misunderstanding, and other barriers to full inclusion and

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participation in society. This in turn limits their access to government and other community-based resources. Language access is an issue that affects the entire community. During the pandemic and more recently in the aftermath of the Maui wildfire, Hawai'ii's LEP community expressed concern and frustration regarding non-existent or limited access to essential government services, including health-related information and unemployment benefits, in a language they understand.

EEH grant activities helps the State of Hawai'l and other agencies in the state comply with federal and state mandates to provide language access. Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 established language access as a civil right. The 2000 Executive Order 13166 requires federal agencies and organizations that receive federal funds are required to provide meaningful access to LEP people, In 2006, Hawaii' established the Office of Language Access and affirmed its commitment to civil rights and comprehensive access to services regardless of national origin. The State has received several citations from the federal court, federal agencies of civil rights, including the Department of Justice, and the Hawai'i Civil Rights Commission for failing to offer limited English proficient individuals language accessible services.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

This project will benefit immigrants who are native speakers of languages other than English and are limited English proficient (LEP). LEP immigrants, as well as non-immigrants, are a disadvantaged and vulnerable group of the community with limited access to information and resources. Many experience prejudice and cultural misunderstanding and are unable to receive government and community resources. Non-native English speakers also face housing and food insecurity, domestic violence, human trafficking, and bullying.

Over 40% of immigrants live at or below 300% of the federal poverty threshold. The median earnings of the non-English speakers can be 10 to 34 percent lower than that of the English only speakers due to their lack of proficiency in English. The foreign-born population in Hawaii is 260,000 or 18%, which is higher than the US population that is 14%. Immigrants come from many countries such as China, Japan, Korea, Mexico, Vietnam and the Philippines. Nearly 50% of immigrants come from the Philippines. Hawaii immigrants contribute over \$17.5 billion to the state GDP--paying taxes, creating businesses, staffing essential jobs--while often being paid below-poverty rates and lacking access to social benefits (New American Economy, 2021).

The language groups that will be served by the grant activities are those speaking Cantonese, Chuukese, Ilokano, Japanese, Korean, Laotian, Mandarin, Marshallese, Okinawan, Pohnpeian, Samoan, Spanish, Tagalog/Filipino, Tongan, and Vietnamese.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

The proposed activities will cover the entire State of Hawaii. Media outreach will air over the radio station and streaming, ethnic TV, community print publications, and social media (Meta/Facebook, YouTube). The majority of in person events will be held on Oʻahu and Maui islands.

III. Service Summary and Outcomes

Access to information, services and civic engagement is a challenge for the average English-speaking citizen. For LEP low- income communities, communication barriers limit their full participation in the community and negatively affects their income and many face discrimination. The grant activities provide resources and expertise to increase communication and help meet government mandates for language access. EEH serves this community need by a) funding multilingual media activities and collaborates with ethnic print, radio, TV, and social media to reach this underserved population.

EEH will employ traditional media (radio, TV, print) to reach a wider audience and social media to target a more specific audience. Information on services, resources, and issues concerning immigrant and LEP communities will be relayed through these multiple outlets.

- a. Media Outreach— Conduct outreach utilizing ethnic radio, TV, community paper and publications, and social media, (i.e,Meta/Facebook, Instagram, Spotify, YouTube) about the available services and resources to aid in navigating challenges that impacts facets of life adjusting to a new environment in multiple languages (i.e., jobs, housing, health, and safety).
 - EEH will contract with radio and TV organizations (KNDI, KZOO, KPRP, KMVI, KRM Internet Radio, KBFD TV) to translate and disseminate urgent and timely information in a responsive manner throughout the state broadcast of 2,000 60-second PSA. (Approximate number of listeners: 150,000)
 - EEH will contract with radio statations (KNDI, KPRP, KRM Internet) to broadcast 52 30-minute radio programming to discuss in more depth issues of importance and interest to immigrant and LEP populations (interview resource experts, talk story with community leaders, tips on health and wellness).
 - EEH will contract with radio and TV organizations (KNDI, KPRP, KMVI, KRM Internet Radio) to broadcast 3 3-hour radiothon to hold on-site in conjunction with community events on O'ahu and neighbor islands.
 - EEH, in collaboration with Hawai'i Ethnic Media, will simulcast the 3 3-hour radiothons and 52 30-minute educational programs on Meta/Facebook and/or other social media channels.
 - Contract with social media/website developer to revamp website to increase visits to the EEH website and social media following.

- b. Capacity Building—Grow capacity of immigrant and LEP population to fully access benefits, exercise their rights, and contribute to society (i.e., voter education, digital literacy, job skills, education and training workshops).
 - Contract with social media/website developer to revamp website to increase visits to the EEH website and social media following.
 - Collaborate with community organizations (FilCom CARES, Pacific Gateway Center, The Legal Clinic, We Are Oceania, Kaibigan Ng Lahaina Safe Haven), education institutions (University of Hawai'i, Chaminade University of Honolulu, Waipahu and Farrington high schools) and government to sponsor a resource fair tailored to the needs of immigrant and LEP communities.
 - Partner with other organizations to provide training on skills necessary to live, learn, and work in today's society where digital technologies such as mobile devices, internet platforms, social media, and paperless billing are increasingly indispensable to communicate and access information.
 - EEH BOD who are faculty at Chaminade University of Honolulu and University of Hawai'i and Manoa will engage 20 students to develop 4 social media content related to immigrant and LEP issues or culture.
 - EEH will contract with community organizations and/or leaders to coordinate immigrant and LEP resource event(s), in collaboration with community- and faith-based organizations, government, and education institutions, to engage 100 individuals.
 - EEH will conduct two talk story events (in person or virtual) with immigrant and LEP communities to share their thoughts about their experiences, challenges, and what source of support to assist in their transition.
- c. Community Cultural Celebrations—Foster mutual respect and understanding among diverse cultural and linguistic groups by celebrating milestones and special cultural occasions to promote interaction and fellowship among families, neighbors, and community.
 - EEH will partner with Waipahu and Farrington high schools and Chaminade and UH Mānoa student groups to celebrate the caregiving and navigational role of youths who assist their grandparents and other family members. Invite nominations from those who have been helped. Submissions can be video, audio, or written. This intergenerational event will culminate in a community celebration when the nominees will be recognized, and the nominator will be present to share their story. The inaugural event will honor 25 youths and hosts 100 guests at the celebration.
 - Graduation Photo Gallery—Graduation is an important milestone that is steeped in tradition in Hawai'i especially for those who are first in their family to graduate. There will be a photo shoot for anyone who is part of the class of 2026. High school and college graduates can have their individual photo taken and/or with their friends and family. Those participating will be encouraged to share their photo on EEH's Instagram account with a message in a language other than or in addition to English

EEH's previous work illustrates the types of activities EEH can provide to meet community needs, particularly during disasters or emergencies. For example, EEH quickly engaged ethnic TV and radio stations to widely disseminate urgent messages to keep the community safe.

EEH also partnered with FilCom CARES, the leading entity proactively working to address the disproportionate impact of COVID-19 on the Filipino population in Hawai'i, to broadcast radiothons on three radio stations that were simulcast on Facebook.

EEH and KNDI also provided timely and needed bilingual translated materials after the Lahaina fires. KNDI translated messages to their ethnic language group promptly about critical events. EEH conducts these ongoing services to O'ahu communities. Government and community organizations rely on this service as EEH is a primary source for some language communities.

Ethnic Education Hawai'i has worked with many organizations over the years to provide educational information to minority and underserved communities. EEH has been awarded and successfully administered government grants and contracts from the State of Hawaii Department of Health, Office of Language Access, and HIEMA. These completed project were funded to reach/serve disadvantaged LEP communities, the same as the target audience of this plan. EEH was able to complete proposed activities on time and on budget and submitted required information and reports. The success of our programs is evidenced by the longevity of providing these types of services since our beginnings in 1993. During the pandemic we were able to guickly launch many public service campaigns with the Department of Health and the Office of Language Access addressing critical information regarding COVID-19 and government mandates and general cautionary messages. We assisted with the Office of Elections in an unofficial way by taking their messages as a public service of the announcements of mail-in ballot for the Primary and General Elections.

For over three decades, EEH has developed experience and expertise in communicating to many language communities. The current board of directors are committed to actively using their resources to meet the project plan to reach LEP communities. The EEH board includes native speaker of six Asian and Pacific islander languages (a Spanish speaker will be joining the board in 2025) and represent government, university, business, and non-profit backgrounds.

The plan includes funds for activities to promote language access for LEP communities with high proportion of lower income and lower educational status. The activities and services include: workshops and training similar to "KNOW YOUR RIGHTS"; training in technology to be able to apply for resources and increase access to services and resources; and promote heritage languages and culture to elevate community standards and outcomes. EEH will utilize funds for consultants who have expertise in priority topics (e.g. immigration, language access) and activities that will increase the capacity of bilingual community members to support the plan (e.g. training on social media, develop content).

KNDI Radio is the primary outreach partner who operates all day and every day. Over the years and including times of emergencies (e.g. COVID and Lahaina wildfires), KNDI is responsive to insert into their program schedule major news bulletins and instructions needed by the public, and especially translations for LEP audiences. The diverse resources covering thirteen languages or languages is vital for the community. The radio hosts are professional and experienced bilingual broadcasters who have earned a reputation for their ability to communicate effectively with the various language communities. Many of the KNDI radio hosts are part of their community churches and groups, finding the core needs of their groups and bringing radio and TV programs and announcements to meet their needs. The plan includes facilities of other partners TV organizations (Korean, Olelo) to implement project activities.

EEH has a downtown office and is nearby to community partners (e.g. The Legal Clinic for immigrants) and has access to university and community facilities for training and community functions. Livestreaming of radiothons and the 30-minute radio programs are made possible through Hawai'i Ethnic Media's studio. Through the organization's partnership with FilCom CARES, EEH also has access to churches.

EEH has expanded its outreach to include more in-person community events and partnered with radio stations on the neighbor islands. This State GIA grant request includes a .5 FTE Executive director and a 1.0 FTE Administrative and Fiscal Support Specialist to meet the needs of the organization and the immigrant and LEP communities.

EEH's volunteer board of directors offers business and community organizational experience. They devote many hours to volunteering and bring perspective to each grant program. She served as chair of the Hawai'i State Civil Rights Commission and Judicial Selection Commission. Dr. Agbayani is co-chair of Hawai'i Friends of Civil Rights and a board member of The Legal Clinic. She was born in the Philippines and attended the University of the Philippines, East West Center and the University of Hawai'i. For decades, Dr. Agbayani has been an advocate for diversity, inclusion and equity for workers, immigrants, women, and persons with disabilities, LGBT, Filipino, African Americans, Pacific Islanders and other groups.

Mr. Kelly Bokin is the Front Office Manager of Hilton Garden Inn-Seattle. He is a board member of the Marshallese Community Organization of Hawaii, Pacific Islands and Native Hawaiian Advancement Coalition. Mr. Bokin helps Marshallese individuals who, although they may be bilingual, have difficulty speaking English well. He graduated from Leeward Community College with and associate's degree and is currently pursuing his Bachelor's degree in Business Administration at Grand Canyon University in Arizona.

Ms. Jennifer Myung Hui Kim is an entrepreneur and is the president of Pacific Rim Network. Fluent in Korean, she covered news about Koreans in Hawai'i and South Korea as senior broadcaster for Radio Seoul. Ms. Kim is the chair of the board of the Korean Library Foundation and was instrumental in the organization's mission to enhance and expand the Hawai'i State Public Library System's Korean language collection for all ages, including e-books, kid books, and Korean drama. She was also a visiting professor at the Kyung Min University in South Korea. Ms. Kim serves as an advisor on the National Unification Advisory Council, Hawai'i Branch.

Dr. Malate also serves on the 'Ewa Villages Historical Society and advocates for the redevelopment of Varona Village and preservation of the culture and history of 'Ewa Plantation Town.

Dr. Eva Rose B. Washburn-Repollo is an Associate Professor of Communication at the School of Business and Communication of Chaminade University of Honolulu. She teaches Basic Communication, Intercultural Communication and Media and Discourse Studies.
