Ka Makani Kaili Koa"s 2025 Grant In Aid Proposal

I. Certification

- 3. **Public Purpose** The requested grant will address critical cultural, learning-based, and economic needs in the State of Hawaii, empowering Native Hawaiians and underserved communities through culturally rooted programs such as those currently administered in partnership with Hui Mahi'ai Aina, located adjacent to the DHHL Waimanalo Homestead on DHHL lands and with the JROTC program at Nanakuli Intermediate and Highschool, situated within the DHHL Nanakuli Homestead and the JROTC program at McKinley Highschool, the home of the King's Guards.. This aligns with Section 42F-102, Hawaii Revised Statutes, fostering sustainability, economic resilience, and cultural preservation.

II. Background and Summary

1. Applicant Background Ka Makani Kaili Koa (KMKK), a Native Hawaiian Organization (NHO) 501(c)(3), is a 100% volunteer-driven entity focused on uplifting Hawaiian communities through culturally rooted learning, preservation, and empowerment. Inspired by Kumu Mary Kawena Pukui and the values of Opuali'i, KMKK integrates STREAMY (Sciences, Technologies, Reading, Research, Remuneration, Engineering, Electronics, Arts, 'Āina, Mathematics, Mele, Mo'omeheu, and You) principles into its programming. Based on Mokupuni o Kakuhihewa (Oahu), KMKK addresses the cultural, learning-based, and community development needs of Native Hawaiians and Indigenous communities, fostering resilience and empowerment across the State of Hawai'i.

Our Mission KMKK aligns with the State of Hawaii's efforts to address homelessness, combat the displacement of Native Hawaiians from their homeland due to economic pressures, mitigate the "brain drain" of graduates leaving Hawaii for better opportunities, and address the critical shortage of medical professionals. By integrating cultural preservation with STREAMY culturally rooted learning and leadership development, KMKK creates sustainable pathways for Native Hawaiians to thrive economically while remaining rooted in their communities. Our mission fosters career pathways in vital sectors, including healthcare, engineering, technologies, and education, while providing community resilience through economic and cultural revitalization.

2. Goals and Objectives

- Provide culturally responsive learning to combat systemic inequalities.
- Develop career pathways that address shortages in Hawaii's key sectors, including healthcare, engineering, technologies, and education.
- Promote sustainability and economic resilience to enable Native Hawaiians to afford to live and thrive in Hawaii.
- Reverse the brain drain by offering opportunities for graduates to remain in Hawaii to live and thrive.
- Support community well-being through initiatives addressing houselessness and resource access.

3. Public Purpose and Need

KMKK addresses Hawaii's critical challenges, including:

Unique Methodology: KMKK employs a distinctive approach, using Native Hawaiian culture as both the vehicle and means of mastering Western fields of knowledge and practice. STREAMY-based programs integrate cultural traditions and values, creating a holistic learning experience in which participants develop the skills to thrive in modern professional environments while remaining deeply connected to their heritage. This methodology ensures cultural preservation is interwoven with economic and educational advancement, fostering enduring resilience within Hawaii's communities.

Homelessness: Providing culturally rooted learning and economic opportunities to marginalized communities, including houseless populations.

Economic Displacement: KMKK enables Native Hawaiians and underserved residents to remain in Hawaii through affordable and accessible career pathways. By leveraging partnerships with the Hawaii Air National Guard, KMKK supports 'ōpio in securing funding for college education in STEAM fields critical to the State of Hawaii, such as healthcare, technology, and engineering. This approach creates opportunities for individuals to build sustainable livelihoods while addressing local workforce shortages.

Brain Drain: KMKK combats the "brain drain" by fostering meaningful career opportunities within Hawaii. Through programs like the Leleihoku Guard, Queen's Own Troop 5, and Kaimiloa Sea Scout 5, 'ōpio are prepared for future leadership roles and introduced to entrepreneurial ventures that provide multiple income streams. Supplemental STEAM programming ensures students achieve academic excellence, such as maintaining a 3.0 GPA and excelling on ASVAB scores to qualify for STEAM-related roles in the Hawaii Air National Guard.

Healthcare Shortages: Addressing the urgent shortage of medical professionals, KMKK's programs promote pathways into healthcare and allied health fields. By integrating education, leadership training, and support systems, participants are equipped to pursue careers that provide financial stability and contribute to the well-being of their families and communities. KMKK emphasizes life skills and resilience, ensuring participants can navigate challenges and pass on these strengths to future generations.

- **4. Target Population** The primary beneficiaries of KMKK's initiatives are Native Hawaiians, Indigenous populations, and marginalized groups across Hawaii, including youth, elders (kupuna), houseless individuals, and women.
- **5. Geographic Coverage** KMKK's programs serve communities across the State of Hawaii, including remote and rural areas where resources are scarce.

III. Service Summary and Outcomes

- **1. Scope of Work** Ka Makani Kaili Koa delivers a suite of programs designed to integrate education, culture, and community-building:
- Under the Helmet Initiative: Ka Makani Kaili Koa, through its Under the Helmet initiative, is steadfast in its commitment to fostering the personal, professional, and cultural development of youth and communities. Our programs seamlessly integrate Native Hawaiian cultural values with STREAMY (Sciences, Technologies, Reading, Research, Remuneration, Engineering, Electronics, Arts, 'Āina, Mathematics, Mele, Mo'omeheu, and You) education, providing a comprehensive and engaging learning experience. Each program is meticulously designed to inspire, educate, and empower participants by promoting teamwork, innovation, cultural heritage, sustainability, and ethical decision-making. These efforts align to encourage 'o'pio to explore career pathways through the Hawaii Air National Guard, securing their future education and financial stability.

Our Programs:

- E-Sports: Combines competitive gaming with educational components, fostering teamwork, strategy, and digital literacy while exploring the business and culture of e-sports.
- Hawaii Space Voyagers: Focuses on aerospace education through rocketry, satellite design, and space exploration, inspiring interest in STEAM fields.
- INdigenous Games Design: Integrates cultural heritage with game design, teaching participants to create educational and entertaining games rooted in Indigenous values.
- Makua Hoʻokipa: Promotes intergenerational learning by connecting kupuna (elders) with youth to share cultural wisdom and practices.
- Na Mea Ho'ohui: Utilizes LEGO to introduce participants to STEAM career pathways through hands-on projects encouraging creativity and problem-solving.

- 'OE (THEE): Encourages innovation and entrepreneurship through technology, engineering, and creative arts projects.
- Panagadal Ho'oulu: Inspired by Dr. José Rizal's legacy, this program emphasizes sustainable agriculture and food security education.
- RC All Terrain Academy: Explores off-road remote-controlled vehicle design and operation, emphasizing engineering and environmental stewardship.
- RC Drift School: Merges STEAM principles with the excitement of remote-controlled car drifting, focusing on physics and e-vehicle technologies.
- Robotics: Training makua and kupuna in judging VEX robotics competitions supporting VEX robotics programs throughout the State of Hawai'i.
- **Na Koa O Hawaii**: A leadership and cultural program dedicated to revitalizing Hawaiian Kingdom Era military traditions through:
 - Leleihoku Guard Program: A Hawaiian Kingdom-era cavalry youth guard program that teaches leadership, teamwork, and military history and traditions through equestrian drills, physical training, and reenactments.
 - Queen's Own Troop 'Elima: A historical scouting unit adopted by Queen Liliuokalani, emphasizing outdoor skills, community service, and Hawaiian cultural traditions.
 - Kaimiloa Sea Scouts 'Elima: A maritime leadership program focusing on Polynesian navigation, boating skills, and ocean conservation.
 - Na Koa O Ka Moi: A youth leadership program blending Hawaiian Kingdom Era military drill tradition with personal development, public speaking, and military career exploration opportunities.

2. Annual Timeline

Cultural Events: KMKK leverages cross-cultural exchanges as part of its mission to foster unity and cultural preservation. Key events include:

- **49th Honolulu Intertribal Powwow**: A celebration of Native American and Hawaiian traditions, promoting mutual respect and cultural understanding.
- Ka Huaka'i Hui Pū 'Ana o Nā Lāhui: Gathering of Nations Cultural Exchange: A
 groundbreaking event uniting Indigenous nations to share traditions and inspire global
 collaboration.
- **Ka Hoʻike Nui o Nā ʻĀina ʻŌiwi**: A showcase of the rich cultural heritage of Indigenous lands, featuring performances, art, and educational exhibits.

These events stem from the Under the Helmet and Na Koa O Hawaii initiatives, enriching participants' understanding of their heritage while fostering cross-cultural connections.

- Quarter 1: Program development, recruitment, and setup.
- Quarter 2: Full-scale program operations and mid-year evaluation.
- Quarter 3: Cultural event execution and participant milestone reviews.
- Quarter 4: Comprehensive assessment and planning for the following year.

- **4. Tax Credits:** KMKK has not been granted any state and federal tax credits within the prior three years. Additionally, KMKK has not applied and does not anticipate any state and federal tax credits. KMKK is not applying for any capital project.
- **5. Past Contracts and Grants** KMKK has not received federal, state, or county government contracts, grants, and grants in aid within the prior three years and will not be receiving federal, state, or county government contracts, grants, and grants in aid for fiscal year 2026 for program funding.
- **6. Unrestricted Assets:** KMKK's current balance of unrestricted assets as of December 31, 2024, is less than \$50,000.

V. Experience and Capability

Our leadership has an average of 28 years of combined experience in all aspects of the organization and its mission.

2. Facilities Office space is provided at no cost by a board member's residence. Expansion plans include securing dedicated facilities for Under the Helmet and Na Koa O Hawai'i initiatives.

IV. Financial

- **Per Diems**: \$50,000 allocated for daily per diems for volunteers and program participants in compliance with internal per diem SOP..
- **Travel Costs**: \$75,000 allocated for in-state travel expenses, including air, and ground transportation, fees, and taxes.
- **Program Supplies**: \$200,000 for initiatives' needs.
- **Uniform Costs**: \$40,000 for volunteers and participants.
- **Tools Costs**: \$100,000 for acquiring hardware for operations and initiatives.
- Rental Costs: \$125,000 for operational spaces.
- **Event Costs**: \$250,000 for annual and ongoing events stemming from Under the Helmet and Na Koa O Hawaii initiatives.
- Administrative Expenses: \$85,000 for operational support.

Total Adjusted Budget: \$925,000
