#### 1. A brief description of the applicant's background;

The mission of Maui A.I.D.S. Foundation (MAF) is to promote the sexual health and wellbeing of members of our community. MAF is a 501C3 nonprofit that was founded in 1986 as a community-based nonprofit organization in response to the devastating impact of HIV/AIDS. Always responding to community need, MAF has added linkage to medical care and health insurance, access to HIV and other STI medications, financial housing assistance, food pantry, case management, educational support, expanded STI testing and treatment, and most recently; Narcan distribution and Syringe Services Exchange (SSP).

#### 2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

The goal of this proposal is for MAF to secure funding to expand free clinic services in the rural and remote areas of Maui County in tandem with MAF's STI prevention education and harm reduction outreach by increasing program capacity with the use of a Medical Mobile unit that creates access, discretion, and opportunity for the following services:

- STI testing, counseling, diagnosis and treatment for, and Vaccination (when applicable) for:
  - o Chlamydia & Gonorrhea
  - o Syphilis (including congenital syphilis)
  - Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV)
  - Hepatitis B Virus (HBV)
  - Hepatitis C Virus (HCV)
  - o Diagnosis, Treatment, and Referral for specialty care
- STI Prevention Education, including:
  - o Condoms, Internal Condoms, Dental Dams
  - Safe & Healthy Sexual Lifestyles
  - STI Prevention Education
- Harm Reduction Education, including:
  - o Opioid Overdose Prevention
  - Narcan Training & Distribution
  - Syringe Exchange Program (SEP)

- Medical Case Management, Health Insurance Enrollment, Housing Assistance, including:
  - Food Pantry & food cards
  - Hygiene Kits
  - Transportation subsidies (vehicle registration, minor repairs, & safety check assistance, ride-share for medical appointments, and fuel cards)
  - Health insurance enrollment & guidance of eligibility requirements
  - Housing assistance subsidies (HIV clients)

#### 3. The public purpose and need to be served;

The public purpose of this grant is to provide discreet and sanitary STI Testing and Treatment, Vaccination, and Prevention Education Services to fire ravaged Lahaina, Kihei, Hana and East Maui, and Upcountry Maui directly to target populations "where they are" to overcome the barriers to care due to lack of transportation, the effects of the Maui Wildfires, and avoidance when venue is uncomfortable due to stigma.

The benefits in using a Free Clinic Medical Mobile Unit are because they are accessible, discreet and readily available even when clients have access to other health care venues. From MAF's own client surveys over the past year, the main reasons clients chose MAF's Free Clinic for care were, 1) convenience of walk-in or same-day appointments, 2) no cost, and, 3) availability of expert STI care. In response to the question about where patients would have gone for services if MAF's Free Clinic did not exist, 9.4% of males and 11.5% of females answered that they would have waited to see how they felt and then decided what to do. Non-action on STIs increases the spread of these viral infections. and 24.4% of males and 25.8% of females would have gone to an emergency room, which would have resulted in increased costs for both the clients and Maui's overburdened hospital.

#### 4. Describe the target population to be served.

The target group

- a. Individuals that engage in high-risk sexual behaviors related to substance use
- b. Individuals from rural and remote areas with lack of transportation and readily available health care
- c. Individuals with no health insurance
- d. Individuals from the Native Hawaiian and AAPI communities
- e. Individuals that are experiencing the challenges of houselessness including those with temporary shelter
- f. Individuals that are sexually active but have not been tested or have not been tested within the last three-six months.

#### III. Service Summary and Outcomes

#### 1. Describe the scope of work, tasks and responsibilities;

Testing and Treatment- Free Clinic Services: The testing and treatment provided by free clinic services is designed to prevent the spread of HIV, HCV, and other STIs. At the top of everything that MAF accomplishes, the continued rise of STIs in Maui County is the main strategic objective. A Medical Mobile Unit would enable MAF to take free comprehensive rapid HIV, HCV, Syphilis and other STIs testing to individuals, "where they are" to ensure a constant access to prevent spread to others.

Individuals identified as positive for HIV and/or HCV will be referred and/or linked to a variety of services to help with their sexual health and well-being such as: further STI testing, prevention and harm reduction education, housing subsidies, mental health services, and substance abuse program referrals. Individuals testing positive are referred to and enrolled in supportive care provided by the Case Management Department (CSD). CSD provides integral assistance in food subsidy, transportation assistance, health insurance enrollment, mental health and behavioral health (adherence assistance) services, and specialty care medical treatment. The objective is steady core needs to attain adherence to treatment programs and to keep a continuum of testing to ensure that infections do not spread to others.

All testing procedures include education on safer sex practices, developing a plan to reduce potential risk of STI transmission for self and others and referrals to community partners. MAF services will be promoted throughout Maui County through print, radio, social media, at the Maui Nonprofit Directors Association that has over 60 nonprofit social service agencies, government departments, schools, and community health fairs. MAF also has developed the Corrections Project with the purpose of preventing new infections of HIV/HCV within the incarcerated population through education, testing and linkage to care upon release.

Through outreach activities in the community, staff trains participants on how to communicate both verbally and nonverbally through negotiation/communication skills with their sexual partners. Participants will be instructed on how to effectively use condoms. Education revolves around cultural values and the barriers caused by stigma. Emphasis is placed on the importance of a partner's involvement in safer sex (i.e., enhance partner norms supportive of condom use) to eliminate new HIV/STI infections.

Sexual health is often misunderstood, misinterpreted and stigmatized. Stigma is widely recognized as a significant barrier to the prevention, management, and treatment of STIs. Stigma around substance use is a primary barrier to seeking and receiving help for opioid and other substance misuse disorders. Stigma negatively impacts policy since perceptions about STI transmission and substance use are often inaccurate and outdated.

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Due to the high prevalence of asymptomatic STIs, many of these cases can only be identified through screening. A large portion of vulnerable youth do not seek routine screening or decline to be tested in the absence of symptoms. Reducing stigma reduces the dynamic process of devaluation that significantly discredits an individual in the eyes of others. A Medical Mobile Unit would allow testing, treatment, referrals, and other steadying assistance in a sanitary, non-stigma, and discreet manner.

### 2. Provide a projected annual timeline for accomplishing the results or outcomes of the service;

Since MAF already has a successful prevention, harm reduction, and free clinic program in place that is funded through a variety of sources, the Medical Mobile Unit could be purchased and operating within two-three months of contract execution. The comprehensive Annual Program Evaluation (in III, item 4) includes projected outcomes for a 1-year program.

The barriers to getting clients into the clinic would be positively impacted and the spread of infections will begin to decrease. The \$275,000 for this unit will be part of direct services in the amount of \$424,964. MAF is a continuum of services that are administered in a holistic manner so the Medical Mobile Unit will always have the full weight of the agency's 2.2-million-dollar budget.

Since an increasing number of people have limited access to health care, free clinics have become an established and meaningful contributor to the public safety net. Free clinics often serve patients who may have limited access to health care due to: being uninsured or underinsured, the inability to pay, a member of a racial/ethnic minority, having limited English proficiency, lack of citizenship, and lack of housing.

Free clinics benefit everyone. A cost-effectiveness analysis of a free clinic serving around 250 patients, saved an estimated \$1.28 million in future healthcare costs – costs that would most likely be paid for with public resources. Dividing these cost-savings by the operational costs of a free clinic yielded a return on investment of \$34 per \$1 invested. Patients accessing and receiving health care are also unlikely to utilize emergency rooms for primary care, medications or hospitalizations for chronic conditions. Individuals whose health conditions are managed and who are receiving routine care, are able to work and provide for their families, which unburdens public resources.

The Maui A.I.D.S. Foundation (MAF) was established in the year 1986 in response to the growing crisis of HIV/AIDS affecting the island of Maui. At its core, the organization was conceived as a community-based initiative, motivated by the urgent need to address the devastating impact of the epidemic.

Like many other AIDS Service Organizations (ASOs) across the nation, MAF began its journey with humble roots. The organization was initially driven by a committed group of volunteers united by a collective determination to assist individuals within their circle of friends, acquaintances, and the broader community who were grappling with the substantial challenges posed by the HIV/AIDS pandemic.

The foundation took the critical step of incorporating as a 501(c)(3) as a nonprofit entity, setting the stage for its enduring mission. A pivotal turning point during this period was the emergence of financial support from entities such as the State of Hawaii and the Federal funding from the Ryan White Care Act. These resources enabled MAF to recruit dedicated staff members and transition into an entity with by-laws, a Board of Directors, policies and procedures, and formalized programs and services.

Maui AIDS Foundation is a health and social service organization always striving to meet the needs of the Maui County community by serving those incarcerated, those living with HIV, Hepatitis, and other Sexually Transmitted Infections (STI), those affected by substance use, LGBTQIA+ and Mahu individuals, women and youth at-risk, Native Hawaiian communities, and those experiencing mental illness disorders by promoting wellness and enhancing their quality of life.

#### Executive Director

Linda Puppolo is a 38-year resident of the Island of Maui continuing her journey from the Boston suburbs, California Bay Area, and the foothills of the Sierra Blanca in New Mexico. As the Executive Director of the Maui A.I.D.S. Foundation and previously also of the Maui County Workforce Development, she provides executive management to agencies with client based community services. Her other work has included, Clinic Manager of the Planned Parenthood Clinic and the Operations Manager of an eighty-acre flower farm in Kula, Maui, Hawaii. She is known in the Maui County Community for her work as an advocate for children's issues, nonprofit administration and accounting, and her years of community service which led to being named the 1992 Women of Maui Award recipient by the Maui County Committee on the Status of Women. In 2022, Linda was named National Workforce Professional of the Year by the National Association of Workforce Development Professionals.

#### Bryan Chin, DNP, APRN, FNP-BC

#### Director of Clinical Services

Dr. Bryan, a graduate of the University of California, Berkeley, and UH John A. Burns School of Medicine with a (DNP) Doctorate in Nursing Practice, (APRN) Advanced Practice Registered Nurse, and (FNP-BC) Family Nurse Practitioner Board Certified has been our in-house Provider since 2017. He currently directs the Clinical Services Department, which includes our testing, treatment, and vaccination services with the aim of offering STI services at no cost to the at-risk and the underserved communities of Maui County.

#### Tiare Anelaokalani Kima Sua

Co-Director of Prevention and Harm Reduction Education

Tiare has been working with the Maui AIDS Foundation as an HIV Prevention Specialist since 2007. Tiare was born and raised on the island of O'ahu where she started in

HIV/AIDS research at Kulia Na Mamo located in Honolulu. Kulia Na Mamo, founded by Ashliana Hawelu, was a nonprofit organization promoting health and HIV prevention strategies for the transgender population. Tiare moved to Maui to continue her passion in helping people living with HIV/AIDS and to help stop the spread of HIV. Tiare's main mission in MAF is to educate the community about HIV/AIDS, HCV, and other STIs, leadership, and to help spread awareness of Maui's transgender and LGBTQ youth population. Tiare is the Editor and Chief of AFFIRM Magazine and the founder of H.E.A.R.T.S - Hawaii's Empowered Alliance Reaching Transgender Services. Tiare recently was personally awarded a grant from the prestigious Borealis Philanthropy Foundation.

#### Mana Shaw-Rodriguez

Co-Director of Prevention and Harm Reduction Education Mana has been with the agency since 2017 providing STI testing, counseling and education to the Maui County Community. She working on all social media increasing awareness of testing and treatment services, and became a certified tester providing HIV & HCV testing and counseling to inmates at MCCC in 2019. Mana is passionate about educating the public about sexual health education and harm reduction to eliminate misconceptions about HIV and STI's, and mitigate stigma. Mana also provides Naloxone kits and trainings to the community to prevent opioid overdose and offers that training to groups, businesses, and nonprofit organizations throughout Maui County.

The principal office is located at 1935 Main Street, Wailuku, Hawaii, (the Harry and Jeanette Weinberg Office Building) where all three nonprofits have been operating since 1999. The funding sponsor was the Weinberg Foundation.

The Purpose of this corporation is as follows: "To provide for low income persons, persons with Immunodeficiency Syndrome (AIDS), and battered women and their children on a Non-Profit basis rental housing." The funding also included the office building developing a long-term plan for paid permanent housing in perpetuity.

Maui A.I.D.S. Foundation operates its Free Clinic, Case Management, Administration, and all other programs from the first floor of the building


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




#### Aloha Members of the Hawaii State Senate & House of Representatives,

### WHO WE ARE

Maui AIDS Foundation (MAF) is a nonprofit 501(c)(3) health and social service organization always striving to meet the needs of the Maui County community including but not limited to serving: those incarcerated, those living with Hepatitis and other STIs, people living with HIV, substance use,

LGBTQIA+ and Mahu populations, women at-risk and others at-risk, Native Hawaiian communities, and mental illness

by promoting wellness and enhancing their quality of life.

### HARM REDUCTION SERVICES

- Free and confidential STI testing (HIV, HCV, syphilis, gonorrhea, and chlamydia), with free in-house treatment for syphilis, gonorrhea, and chlamydia
- Syringe (needle) exchange for IDU, always a 1-for-1 exchange
- Narcan training and Narcan distribution to individuals and organizations
- Linkage to client services for anyone who tests positive for HIV
- Harm reduction supplies such as condoms, Safe-Sex Kits, and Hygiene Kits for the community
- HIV and HCV testing and education at the Maui Correctional Facility
- Weekly collaboration with the Maui Police Department serving houseless individuals by providing testing, hygiene kits, and supplemental food
- No-cost access to PrEP/PEP
- STI 101 and Healthy Relationship Presentations for high school students in Maui County
- Outreach work in Hana, Lana'i, and Moloka'i.
- Beach and bar outreach



• From July to September in 2024, we provided:

433 HIV tests 361 HCV tests 356 syphilis tests

413 tests for gonorrhea & chlamydia exchanges for 4,215 dirty needles

- Treated 28 individuals for chlamydia and 9 individuals for gonorrhea
- Educated 43 individuals at the Maui Correctional Facility about HIV and HCV, with 38 individuals getting tested for HIV and HCV
- Reached at least 200+ houseless individuals providing hygiene kits, safe sex kits, Narcan, and food items
- Gave out at least 1000+ Safe Sex kits during our bar and beach outreach services
- Presented on STI 101 and Healthy Relationships to 4 different schools in Maui County
- HIV/HCV/STI education & testing with Aloha House.


