2.1 A brief description of the applicant's background;

As an established 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization, the O'ahu Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association (OHCRA) has been a pillar of the Hawaiian canoe racing community for over four decades. With a proven history of organizing and conducting canoe paddling racing events, OHCRA has earned recognition as a leader in perpetuating Hawaiian cultural traditions and competitive watersports. This extensive background equips OHCRA with the expertise and resources to sustain and advance Hawaii's canoe racing legacy.

OHCRA has experienced significant growth, boasting 22 member clubs that include 18 active, 1 associate and 3 affiliate clubs. The association supports 3,800 active paddlers and 4,300 recreational paddlers, highlighting its expansive reach and strong foothold within the paddling community. Representing 35% of the Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association's (HCRA) total membership, OHCRA continues to set the standard for participation and engagement in the sport.

As the largest canoe racing association in the state, OHCRA hosts more races annually than any other association in Hawaii. Its ability to successfully manage large-scale events underscores its logistical expertise, dedicated volunteer network, and commitment to maintaining safety, sportsmanship, and professionalism. OHCRA's adherence to established rules and procedures ensures the highest level of organization at every event.

Further elevating its stature, OHCRA owns and organizes two of the world's most prestigious canoe races—the Molokai Hoe and Na Wahine O Ke Kai. These internationally acclaimed races are often referred to as the "canoe paddling Olympics" and draw competitors and spectators from around the globe. Successfully managing these high-profile events demonstrates OHCRA's exceptional capabilities in logistics, promotion, participant engagement, and overall race production.

The management of 22 clubs and thousands of paddlers highlights OHCRA's organizational capacity and dedication to promoting Hawaii's cultural and athletic heritage. The association's ability to handle the planning, coordination, and execution of numerous events year-round serves as a testament to its expertise, reliability, and unwavering commitment to the sport of Hawaiian canoe paddling

2.2 The goals and objectives related to the request;

The Oahu Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association (OHCRA) is proud to build upon the success of the first-year launch of the Kukulu Canoe Building Pilot Program. This groundbreaking initiative has already demonstrated its potential to revitalize and preserve the art of traditional Hawaiian canoe building through hands-on learning, workforce development, and cultural stewardship. With \$900,000 in committed grant funds, OHCRA now seeks full matching support to expand and sustain the program into its second year to address the urgent need for preservation and growth.

<u>Kukulu Canoe Building Program:</u> This program is dedicated to revitalizing and preserving the art of traditional Hawaiian canoe building through hands-on learning, workforce development, and cultural stewardship. By engaging master builders and cultural practitioners, the Kukulu

Program will ensure the transfer of critical knowledge and skills, addressing the immediate needs of canoe maintenance, repair, and production.

GOALS:

- Sustain and expand the Kukulu Canoe Building Program into a second year.
- Transition two master builders to full-time employment.
- Increase the number of apprentices from 3 part-time to 8 full-time positions, enhancing workforce development.
- Establish a dedicated warehouse facility with an educational training center, creating spaces for apprenticeships, cultural events, and community engagement.
- Address the maintenance backlog of 82 koa canoes statewide, ensuring preservation and functionality.
- Provide storage and protection for canoes entrusted to OHCRA, including those from canoe clubs and Bishop Museum.
- Revitalize the tradition of canoe building, preserving cultural practices and skills before they are lost.

OBJECTIVES:

- Successfully operate and expand the Kukulu Program, strengthening the pipeline of apprentices and master builders.
- Reduce or eliminate the backlog of canoe repairs and maintenance.
- Ensure the continuity of canoe building knowledge by transferring skills from aging master craftsmen to younger generations.
- Enhance Hawaii's reputation as a global leader in traditional canoe building practices through workshops, cultural preservation events, and expanded outreach.
- Provide new employment and training opportunities, reinforcing OHCRA's role as a workforce development leader in Hawaii.

This focused approach positions OHCRA to sustain the Kukulu Canoe Building Program as a cornerstone of cultural preservation and workforce development. It ensures the continuation of Hawaii's rich canoe building traditions while addressing critical maintenance needs and expanding educational opportunities for future generations.

2.3 The public purpose and need to be served;

This program is dedicated to revitalizing and preserving the art of traditional Hawaiian canoe building through hands-on learning, workforce development, and cultural stewardship. By engaging master builders and cultural practitioners, the Kukulu Program will ensure the transfer of critical knowledge and skills, addressing the immediate needs of canoe maintenance, repair, and production.

<u>Cultural Preservation:</u> The Kukulu Program actively supports the preservation of Hawaii's indigenous cultural heritage by providing a structured initiative to teach and perpetuate the traditional art of canoe building. This effort ensures that rare and irreplaceable knowledge is passed down from master craftsmen to future generations, safeguarding a cornerstone of Hawaiian identity.

Education and Workforce Development: Through hands-on apprenticeships, the program educates and trains new craftsmen, equipping them with technical skills essential to constructing and maintaining koa canoes. These skills are not only culturally significant but also

provide opportunities for sustainable employment and vocational growth within Hawaii's indigenous community.

<u>Community Engagement and Collaboration:</u> The program serves as a cultural hub, engaging canoe clubs, schools, and community organizations to foster collaboration, promote cultural pride, and encourage active participation. This inclusive approach strengthens community bonds and instills respect for traditional Hawaiian practices.

<u>Environmental Sustainability:</u> By emphasizing traditional building techniques that utilize natural materials, the Kukulu Program promotes eco-friendly practices. It highlights sustainable resource management and provides an alternative to modern, less sustainable construction methods, reflecting Hawaii's commitment to environmental stewardship.

<u>Economic and Cultural Tourism Impact:</u> The program has the potential to attract cultural tourism, providing economic benefits while educating visitors about indigenous Hawaiian traditions. Demonstrations, events, and exhibitions can create new opportunities for public engagement and tourism growth, benefiting both local communities and Hawaii's broader economy.

OHCRA will approach the scope of work with a dual-pronged approach—combining the Canoe Maintenance Facility and Kukulu Apprenticeship Program—ensures that Hawaii's canoe-building traditions are preserved, perpetuated, and expanded, safeguarding this vital aspect of Hawaiian culture for future generations.

<u>Canoe Maintenance Facility (CMF):</u> Establish a Canoe Maintenance Facility to provide a centralized location for traditional canoe building, repair, and preservation efforts, supporting the 82 koa canoes statewide. The facility will serve as a hub for master builders and apprentices to preserve and pass on cultural knowledge while addressing the urgent backlog of repairs.

Tasks:

- 1. Identify and secure a dedicated warehouse facility on Oahu suitable for canoe construction and maintenance.
- 2. Conduct inspections and obtain necessary permits to ensure compliance with safety and building regulations.
- 3. Equip the facility with tools, safety systems, and storage solutions to support canoe building and repair activities.
- 4. Develop the space to include classrooms and meeting areas for hands-on training and educational programs.
- 5. Establish storage areas to protect koa canoes entrusted to OHCRA for maintenance and safekeeping.
- 6. Source traditional materials, such as koa wood, and modern materials required for canoe construction.
- 7. Hire staff, including two full-time master builders and support personnel, to lead facility operations.
- 8. Create maintenance and safety protocols to sustain facility operations.
- 9. Launch community outreach to engage canoe clubs, cultural practitioners, and schools in programming.
- 10. Organize a facility grand opening and showcase the program's mission to the broader community.

<u>Kukulu Apprenticeship Program (KAP)</u>: Expand the apprenticeship program to preserve the Indigenous Hawaiian art of canoe building through formalized education and hands-on training.

Tasks:

- 1. Recruit 3 additional and increase hours for current 3 full-time apprentices to participate in the program, focusing on skill development and cultural knowledge transfer.
- 2. Provide hands-on training with master builders, covering traditional and modern canoe construction techniques.
- 3. Implement a mentorship program to pair apprentices with master craftsmen for guidance and skill reinforcement.
- 4. Develop and deliver classroom lessons on Hawaiian history, cultural significance, and the role of canoes in voyaging and navigation.

- 5. Introduce safety protocols and tool-handling procedures to ensure workplace safety.
- 6. Conduct workshops and cultural events to engage the community and showcase apprentice projects.
- 7. Evaluate apprentice progress through regular assessments and feedback sessions.
- 8. Organize canoe launches and ceremonies to celebrate program milestones and completed projects.
- 9. Establish partnerships with educational institutions and cultural organizations to expand outreach.
- 10. Create a digital archive documenting traditional canoe-building techniques and practices for future generations.

JUSTIFICATION/COMMENTS: The proposed salaries for 2 full-time Master Builders and 6 full-time Apprentices reflect comparable wages appropriate for Hawaii and align with industry standards for artisans and apprentices in industry fields. Master Builders bring decades of experience in traditional Hawaiian canoe building, koa wood craftsmanship, and cultural preservation, justifying their compensation as highly skilled cultural stewards and technical experts. The association has a proven track record of implementing educational and preservation initiatives, including its successful launch of the Kukulu Canoe Building Pilot Program.

OHCRA's recent work includes:

- Successful management of the inaugural Kukulu Program, training apprentices and engaging master builders in the preservation of traditional canoe-building techniques.
- Coordination of the Molokai Hoe and Na Wahine O Ke Kai, internationally recognized races that showcase Hawaii's canoe culture.
- Collaborations with local and state agencies, including the Department of Land and Natural Resources, to secure permits and manage restoration projects.
- Securing over \$1,100,000 in funding support for cultural preservation and workforce development programs.
- Partnerships with canoe clubs, museums, and educational institutions to promote cultural education and outreach.

The facility will also serve as a central hub for apprentices, master builders, and community engagement programs, ensuring accessibility and operational efficiency.


