Portuguese Culture & Historical Center (PCHC): Preserving Heritage for Future Generations

The mission of the Portuguese Culture & Historical Center (PCHC) is to preserve and celebrate the rich heritage of the Portuguese community in Hawai'i, ensuring its legacy is passed down to future generations. Established in October 2017, PCHC has made significant strides in achieving its mission, laying a strong foundation for its future endeavors.

In its first year, PCHC achieved several milestones that underscored its commitment to cultural preservation. The organization sponsored the annual Portuguese FESTA, a vibrant celebration of Portuguese culture that brings the community together. It also assumed responsibility for maintaining the Portuguese House at the Hawai'i Plantation Village, a key historical site. To build long-term community engagement, PCHC launched a membership program and obtained its 501(c)(3) nonprofit status, opening doors to funding opportunities that further its mission.

The Portuguese community has played an integral role in shaping Hawaiian history, contributing significantly to its cultural and social fabric. However, the unique contributions of this community are at risk of being forgotten due to assimilation and the loss of knowledge as elder generations pass away. PCHC recognizes the pressing need for a dedicated facility that will serve as a hub for preserving Portuguese culture, educating the public, and fostering community engagement.

In its second year, PCHC expanded its impact through new initiatives. The organization launched a website to share information and resources with the broader community, actively participated in community events to raise awareness, and initiated various fundraising activities to support its goals. Furthermore, PCHC opened and staffed an office, developed a regular newsletter, and built a growing donor base, all accomplished with the dedication of its volunteer team.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

Future Plans and Vision

The PCHC board remains committed to maintaining a strong community presence and furthering its mission. A significant milestone has been the acquisition of six acres of land, which will house a permanent Portuguese Cultural Center. This future facility will serve as a beacon of Portuguese heritage, enabling the community to document its history, celebrate its culture, and foster connections for generations to come.

Goals of the Portuguese Cultural Center

- 1. **Document and Preserve Contributions** aims to create comprehensive records of Portuguese contributions to Hawaiian history, ensuring this invaluable legacy is accessible to future generations.
- 2. **Genealogical Research** The center will provide a dedicated location where individuals of Portuguese heritage can explore and research their lineage.
- 3. **Public Education** Through various programs, PCHC will educate the wider community about the cultural, historical, and social contributions of the Portuguese in Hawai'i.
- 4. **Event Space** The center will offer facilities for celebrating key Portuguese historical events, fostering cultural pride and generating income through rentals and other uses.

5. **Community Gathering Space** The center will serve as a welcoming venue for community gatherings, family events, and cultural celebrations, strengthening ties within the Portuguese and broader Hawaiian communities.

With a strong foundation, a clear vision, and a dedicated team of volunteers, PCHC is poised to preserve the legacy of the Portuguese community in Hawai'i. Through its efforts, PCHC ensures that the invaluable contributions of this community will be celebrated and remembered for generations to come.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

Effective communication is essential for the success and growth of any organization. However, the Portuguese Culture and Historical Center (PCHC) has faced significant communication challenges due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Over the past two years, restrictions on group activities, limited public interaction, and individual reluctance to engage in social settings have hindered PCHC's ability to achieve its membership and fundraising goals. These challenges disrupted three primary components of PCHC's communication and growth plan: community activities, membership outreach, and public events.

Despite these obstacles, PCHC has demonstrated resilience. During this period, the organization's membership grew from 20 members in 2018 to 239 members today, underscoring the dedication of its volunteers and the community's interest in preserving Portuguese heritage. Now that Hawai'i is reopening, PCHC is seizing the opportunity to revitalize its communication efforts. In-person activities and membership meetings have resumed, and the PCHC office is open to the public, creating a strong foundation for further organizational growth.

This new chapter presents PCHC with an opportunity to expand its reach and diversify its membership. The project's goal over the next year is to increase membership and enhance community outreach. By leveraging in-person interactions and digital platforms, PCHC aims to connect with a broader and more diverse audience. Planned initiatives include establishing and maintaining a strong presence on Facebook and developing a comprehensive media campaign to promote the Portuguese FESTA in August 2022. Communication strategies will also include membership letters, newsletters, regular website updates, and expanded office hours to provide better phone coverage and accessibility.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

Population to Benefit

The primary beneficiaries of this project are individuals of all ages of Portuguese descent residing in Hawai'i. Currently, the majority of PCHC's membership consists of kūpuna (elders). To ensure the organization's long-term stability, it is essential to attract younger members by engaging the families of current members and offering activities that appeal to all generations.

The project's target population includes a broad spectrum of individuals, from young families to seniors, and aims to foster a sense of cultural pride and community among Portuguese Hawaiians. PCHC's goal is to double its membership by the end of 2022, with at least 25% of new members being 40 years of age or younger. This growth will strengthen the organization's capacity to preserve and celebrate Portuguese culture in Hawai'i for generations to come.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

Opportunity for Building on Donated Land

The Portuguese Culture and Historical Center (PCHC) has taken a monumental step forward in its journey to create a Portuguese Historical and Cultural Center, thanks to the generosity of Mr. Peter Savio of the Savio Group of Companies. In early 2024, Mr. Savio and his dedicated team finalized the transfer of a valuable parcel of land to PCHC, making this long-standing dream a tangible reality. Their tireless efforts to secure the necessary approvals, legal documentation, and surveys have ensured that the land, officially deeded to PCHC as condominium Unit 6, Fee Simple, is now under the organization's stewardship. Valued at \$760,300, this property represents a foundational asset for PCHC's vision of creating a lasting cultural legacy.

The PCHC Business Plan outlines an ambitious long-term vision to construct a multi-building complex that will serve as a hub for preserving and promoting Portuguese culture in Hawai'i. However, the current P-2 (Preservation) zoning of the land requires a phased approach to development until rezoning to BMX or B2 can be secured.

III. Service Summary and Outcomes

3. **Phase 1: Maximizing Current Zoning Potential** Phase 1 focuses on utilizing the property to its highest potential under existing P-2 zoning regulations. This includes the construction of a single 1,500-square-foot building, as permitted by zoning rules. The proposed building will serve as a Reception Area, welcoming visitors, providing office space for staff and volunteers, and housing a Gift Shop featuring Portuguese and Hawaiian products.

- 4. In addition to the new building, Phase 1 includes developing essential infrastructure to support site operations. This infrastructure will include a grassy area for hosting cultural events such as the annual FESTA, plaque and tree-planting ceremonies to honor donors, and an Initial Operations Capability (IOC) opening ceremony.
- 5. Existing structures on the property, including an old water tank with approximately 4,800 square feet of floor space and three 45-foot containers (360 square feet each), will be evaluated and modified to make them functional and useful. The estimated cost for Phase 1 is \$1.7 million. This phase lays the groundwork for Phase 2, ensuring that much of the infrastructure required for the next stage is already in place.
- 6. **Phase 2: Realizing the Full Vision** Phase 2 is the realization of the full PCHC Business Plan, transforming the property into a multi-building complex that includes nine individual buildings, parking facilities, a vineyard, and a Maintenance Yard. These facilities will provide a vibrant hub for cultural events, genealogical research, community gatherings, and educational initiatives.
- 7. The estimated cost for Phase 2 ranges from \$12 million to \$15 million. This phase will establish PCHC as a cornerstone institution for the preservation and celebration of Portuguese culture in Hawai'i, offering a wide range of resources and facilities for both members and the broader community.
- 8. By implementing this phased approach, PCHC is taking practical, strategic steps to achieve its vision while making immediate use of its new land. This project represents a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to create a space that honors the contributions of the Portuguese community in Hawai'i and ensures their cultural legacy for generations to come.
- 2. Provide a projected annual timeline for accomplishing the results or outcomes of the service;

PCHC Phase 1 Timeline (One-Year Vision)

Quarter 1: January - March the first quarter, the focus will be on property acquisition, finalizing the purchase and dedicating the property for PCHC use. Simultaneously, efforts will begin on the zoning and land use application to align the property's designation with the final development plan. Additionally, there will be a concerted effort to consolidate archival materials related to the heritage and history of the Portuguese community, ensuring a strong foundation for the project.

Quarter 2: April - June the second quarter marks the formation of a Capital Campaign Committee, tasked with overseeing funding outreach efforts and developing a comprehensive strategy targeting the Portuguese community, business community, and NGOs. Community outreach will be launched to engage Portuguese communities both locally and internationally,

aiming to secure 30% of the funding goal for the first three years. At the same time, funding efforts for legal, planning, and professional services will be initiated to support procedural applications and planning processes.

Quarter 3: July - September in the third quarter, the focus shifts to identifying and pursuing federal and state grants to meet 20% of the three-year funding goal. Outreach efforts to NGOs will also be initiated, aiming to secure 50% of the necessary funding within the three-year timeline. Furthermore, there will be an emphasis on volunteer recruitment, particularly among younger generations, to ensure continuity and foster future leadership for PCHC's initiatives.

Quarter 4: October - December the final quarter will feature the inaugural annual event at the project site. This event may include land clearing, tree planting, site blessings, and the placement of naming legacy stones. It will also serve as a celebration of progress, engaging the community and honoring development milestones. Additionally, there will be a strong push for membership engagement, encouraging PCHC members to take active roles in committees, staffing, and leadership to ensure the successful implementation of Phase 1 initiatives.

Ongoing Efforts Throughout the year, consistent communication with the Portuguese and business communities will be maintained to sustain momentum for funding efforts. Progress in securing legal, professional, and grant funding will be monitored and adjusted as needed. Finally, fostering community involvement and celebrating small wins will help build excitement and support for PCHC's vision, laying the groundwork for long-term success.

4. Networks and Partnerships (Maximum 1,000-character count with spaces):

The Portuguese Culture and Historical Center (PCHC) maintains regular communication with other Portuguese organizations across Hawaii, all committed to preserving the heritage of the Portuguese in the state. These organizations include the Maui Portuguese Culture Club, Maui Heritage Hall, Hawaii Island Portuguese Chamber of Commerce, Portuguese Chamber of Commerce of Hawaii, Nova Esperança, Punchbowl Holy Ghost Portuguese Pioneer Civic Association, The Camões Players, Portuguese Genealogical and Historical Society of Hawaii, the Honorary Consul for Portugal in Honolulu, and the Consulate General of Portugal in San Francisco. PCHC collaborates most closely with the Portuguese Genealogical and Historical Society of Hawaii, whose offices are adjacent to PCHC and remained open throughout the pandemic. While some associations paused activities during COVID-19, many resumed in 2022. PCHC-sponsored events often leverage the expertise of these groups in areas such as language, cooking, music, and dance. Organizations on Oahu have also participated in past FESTA events and will benefit from PCHC's new office space, which will serve as a hub for meetings and classes. These partnerships actively support this project by sharing PCHC activities with their memberships.

The initial focus in 2025 will be on laying the groundwork for future growth, including establishing essential infrastructure such as water access, road access, and compliance with state and city regulations. This foundational work will enable the center to support its activities independently.

For long-term sustainability, the center will diversify its income streams to reduce reliance on grant funding. This includes generating revenue through rental income from its facilities, organizing fundraising events and campaigns, and offering fee-for-service programs. 



