I. Public Purpose and Need to be Addressed

In accordance with Section 42F-102 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes, we are actively pursuing financial support to fulfill the vital public purpose of Thrive With Movement. Launched in January 2023, Thrive With Movement operates as an extension of Aloha Dance Studio, a beloved establishment in the Kauai community since 2002. The requested capital funding is intended to sustain and enhance the initiatives of Thrive With Movement, with a specific emphasis on addressing the mental health challenges faced by youth and adolescents. This crucial objective aligns with our overarching mission of providing assistance to children aged 1-18 from low-income or at-risk backgrounds on the island of Kauai.

II. Background and Summary

1. Introduction:

In accordance with Section 42F-102, Hawaii Revised Statutes, we want to explicitly state that the grant being sought will be utilized for a public purpose. This purpose aligns with the mission of Thrive With Movement, which was founded in January 2023. Thrive With Movement is committed to continuing the programs formerly offered by Aloha Dance Studio, a cherished institution that served the Kauai community for over 22 years. The primary goal is to sustain and expand these impactful initiatives, specifically targeting families affected by inflation and struggling to afford extracurricular activities for their children. The absence of diverse opportunities for children and youth accentuates the urgency of supporting programs that not only provide cultural expression and physical well-being but also fill the void in family and youth activities.

Thrive With Movement is dedicated to empowering children and youth, particularly those facing financial constraints, to unleash their full potential through engagement in the performing arts, including dance, tumbling, and musical theater.
