Currently, only 6.25% (1 acre) of the campus benefits from firebreaks, leaving the majority of the campus—and the essential services it provides—exposed to fire risk. To address this urgent need, WCCHC is launching its 2025 Fire Mitigation Initiative, a comprehensive plan to fortify the campus against the growing threat of wildfires. This initiative includes expanding firebreaks, upgrading fire suppression systems, increasing water storage capacity with cisterns, and extending water line networks throughout the campus. These improvements will enhance the safety of WCCHC's facilities, staff, and patients while ensuring uninterrupted access to critical healthcare services for the Waianae Coast community.

This initiative reflects our unwavering commitment to protecting our patients, staff, and community. By proactively strengthening our defenses against wildfires, WCCHC reaffirms its role as the region's principal safety-net healthcare provider. These efforts go beyond addressing an environmental threat; they are an essential measure to preserve the health, safety, and well-being of the Waianae Coast community.

II. Background and Summary

1. Brief Description of the Applicant's Background

The Waianae Coast Comprehensive Health Center (WCCHC), established in 1972, opened its doors with one doctor and five staff. This past year, WCCHC proudly celebrated its 52nd anniversary as the oldest and second largest of 14 community health centers in Hawaii and the largest private employer on the Waianae Coast. WCCHC currently employs over 650 staff who work throughout its main campus in Waianae and seven satellite clinics in Waianae, Nanakuli, Kapolei, Ewa, and Waipahu, six schoolbased sites on the Waianae Coast, and at various other business and program sites throughout West Oahu.

WCCHC is a vital safety-net health provider serving the medically underserved in West Oahu. In 2023, WCCHC served 35,495 patients, the majority being Native Hawaiian (48%), followed by Asian and other Pacific Islanders (28%), and Caucasians (12%).

Data shows that 71% of patients are at 100% of the federal poverty level or below, 3% are uninsured, and 60% received coverage under Med-QUEST, Hawaii's Medicaid program. Of the total number of patients served, 2% identified as homeless.

WCCHC's services include 24-hour emergency care, laboratory and imaging services; primary medical care (adult medicine, family practice, pediatric health, women's health, LGBTQ health); specialty services (dermatology, endocrinology, gender affirming care, general surgery, nephrology, obstetrics/gynecology, ophthalmology, orthopedics, osteopathic manipulation, podiatry, vascular care, wound care); walk-in clinics; school-based health clinics; behavioral health (substance abuse treatment and pain management); dental; vision; pharmacy; social services (case management, homeless outreach, transportation, patient assistance services); women, infants & children (WIC) program; health promotion services (nutrition counseling, integrative weight management, food distributions, keiki and kupuna pantries, farmers' markets, food subscription programs, tobacco cessation program, and community wellness programs);

native Hawaiian healing (Iomilomi, lā'au lapa'au, ho'oponopono, cultural workshops) and more.

WCCHC is proud to be a training hub for future healthcare professionals, offering a wide range of comprehensive programs, including a Medical School, residencies in Family Medicine, Behavioral Health (Psychology Internship & Fellowship), Nurse Practitioner, and Pediatric Dentistry. WCCHC also provides training opportunities for Community Health Workers, Patient Service Representatives, Medical Assistants, and Nursing students, as well as partnerships with local universities for clinical rotations and internships. Additionally, WCCHC hosts medical, dental, pharmacy, psychology, public health and health administration students for rural and community health practicums. These programs are designed to nurture the next generation of healthcare providers from the community for the community, equipping them with the skills and experience needed to serve underserved populations with compassion and excellence.

WCCHC fulfills its mission by delivering high-quality healthcare services to those who seek care, regardless of their ability to pay, and by actively working to improve the overall health and well-being of our community.

2. Goals and Objectives Related to the Request

The Waianae Coast Comprehensive Health Center (WCCHC) is dedicated to advancing fire mitigation initiatives to safeguard its 16-acre flagship campus, located in a vulnerable and geographically isolated community of the Waianae Coast. As the largest and only safety-net healthcare provider in the area, WCCHC plays a critical role in delivering essential medical care to the community. Protecting this campus is essential to ensuring uninterrupted access to these vital services.

Our 16-acre main campus includes a one-acre walking trail system designed to act as a firebreak, creating a buffer between the base of the mountain and campus structures. Despite this, only 6.25% of the campus benefits from firebreaks, leaving the majority of our facility—and the critical services we provide—vulnerable to fire risk.

To address this urgent need, WCCHC has developed a comprehensive fire mitigation plan, which includes:

- Installing additional firebreaks across the remaining areas of the campus to minimize the spread of potential fires.
- Expanding water line networks to ensure adequate fire-fighting capacity across the campus.
- Increasing cistern storage capacity to provide a reliable emergency water supply for the community.

 Upgrading fire suppression systems to strengthen our fire response capabilities.

These essential measures will significantly enhance the resilience of our main campus against fire-related incidents, providing increased safety for our facilities, staff, and patients. By implementing these strategies, WCCHC will ensure the uninterrupted delivery of life-saving medical care to the Waianae Coast community, preserving this vital healthcare lifeline for those who rely on it.

3. Public Purpose and Need to Be Served

The Waianae Coast is uniquely vulnerable to the devastating impacts of wildfires, a reality that demands urgent and sustained attention. This region, set in the rugged and arid landscape of Western Oahu, is characterized by steep slopes and challenging terrains, creating an environment where fires can ignite and spread rapidly. The dry climate exacerbates these risks, providing ideal conditions for wildfires to thrive. The situation is further complicated by frequent strong winds that can quickly fan small fires into large-scale emergencies.

One of the most concerning factors in this area is the proliferation of highly flammable invasive grasses. These, combined with the warm climate, recurrent droughts, and a history of human-induced fire incidents, significantly elevate the risk for fires. The threat is not just to the natural environment but also to the communities and infrastructure within this region.

Adding to the complexity is the limited access to the Waianae Coast, with only one primary route available for entry and exit. This poses a significant challenge for emergency services, often restricting their ability to quickly and effectively respond to wildfires and natural disasters. Once fires spread to the steep, inaccessible upland areas, the response options are limited and often rely on costly aerial operations, such as helicopter bucket drops. Helicopter bucket drops may be unavailable in high wind situations and leave these areas with limited extinguishing options.

For decades, the Waianae Coast has faced recurring wildfires, with several incidents occurring each year. These events highlight the region's vulnerability and emphasize the urgent need for effective fire mitigation strategies.

The increasing frequency and severity of wildfires pose a growing threat to the Waianae Coast, including WCCHC, the region's principal and only safety-net healthcare provider. The safety of our communities and the protection of critical infrastructure like WCCHC cannot be overstated. Investing in fire mitigation is not just a matter of environmental stewardship; it is a crucial step in safeguarding our communities, preserving our natural resources, and ensuring uninterrupted healthcare services.

We must prioritize and allocate sufficient funds for fire mitigation efforts on the Waianae Coast. This is an essential investment in our communities' safety, well-being, and resilience.

4. Target Population to be Served

The Waianae Coast is an economically distressed community of 51,965 that has yielded poor healthcare outcomes. The State of Hawaii Primary Care Needs Assessment Data Book Tracker states the following:

- 22.4% of the population has an annual income less than 100% of the federal poverty level, the highest on Oahu (8.7%) and second highest in the State (9.9%);
- 34.3% of Waianae households are receiving SNAP/Cash or other forms of public assistance, the highest rate on Oahu (9.7%) and the second highest in the State (11.1%);
- The average per capita income is \$21,084, making it the lowest on Oahu (\$35,202) and the third lowest in the State (\$34,035);
- 55.0% of the children in households are receiving assistance, the highest on Oahu (22.4%) and the second highest in the State (25.3%);
- 7.2% of adults aged 25 and older do not have a high school diploma, the second highest on Oahu (8.3%) and the State (8.2%).

WCCHC provides care to 35,495 patients through its comprehensive healthcare network across West Oahu. This includes the main campus in Waianae, seven satellite clinics in Waianae, Nanakuli, Kapolei, Ewa, and Waipahu, six school-based health centers on the Waianae Coast, and a 24-hour emergency room, ensuring accessible healthcare for the communities it serves.

5. Geographic Coverage

The Waianae Coast Comprehensive Health Center (WCCHC) primarily serves the Waianae Coast community, where 64% of our patient population resides. Our secondary service areas extend to Kapolei, Ewa, and Waipahu. At the heart of our services is our main campus in Waianae, where we are dedicated to enhancing fire mitigation efforts to safeguard this vital healthcare lifeline for our community.

III. Service Summary and Outcomes

Scope of Work, Tasks, and Responsibilities

WCCHC's Chief Administrative Officer, Senior Director of Facilities, Planning, and Design, and Senior Director of Facilities will collaborate with construction and engineering firms to implement our comprehensive fire mitigation measures. These measures include the installation of additional firebreaks, water lines, cistern storage, and upgraded fire suppression systems. The team will ensure compliance with all relevant federal, state, and city regulatory requirements. The Senior Director of Facilities will oversee the ongoing maintenance, periodic testing, and functionality of these systems to ensure they remain effective and reliable.

Medical providers, clinical and non-clinical management, mid-management, and program managers are active in addressing quality management components at WCCHC through the following: Peer Review Committee; Quality Improvement Committee; Compliance and Risk Management Committees; Adult Medicine, Pediatrics and Women's Health Specialty Committees; Disaster Preparedness Committee; Health and Safety Committee; Clinical Leadership Team; and the Executive Leadership Team.

Improvement of the overall organization is addressed through the Quality Improvement Committee, the Executive Leadership Team, and the Board of Directors.

4. Measure(s) of Effectiveness

The effectiveness of this project will be measured by the ability to provide additional fire mitigation to our main campus site and the ability to strengthen our overall emergency preparedness system, including strengthening our partnerships with the Honolulu Fire Department and state civil defense systems. The effectiveness will also be measured by ensuring the completion of the project per the project timeline.

IV. Financial

1. Budget

WCCHC is requesting \$1,000,000 to enhance our fire mitigation initiatives, which are essential to safeguard our 16-acre flagship campus from the increasing threat of wildfires. As the *only primary healthcare provider* and a vital lifeline for the Waianae Coast community, protecting our facilities ensures uninterrupted access to the critical services our patients rely on.

The requested funds include \$680,000 for hard costs such as demolition, earthwork, and infrastructure improvements; \$180,000 for soft costs, including design, engineering and permitting; and \$140,000 for essential equipment like tanks and pumps. These

strategic investments will greatly enhance fire protection, safeguarding our main campus and ensuring the uninterrupted delivery of essential, life-saving healthcare services to the community

WCCHC will continue to seek additional funding for fire mitigation and emergency preparedness through a diverse range of sources, including federal, state, and city programs, grants, private foundations, and other resources dedicated to public and community benefit.

4. State and Federal Tax Credits

WCCHC is not, and will not, be pursuing tax credits for any current projects.

5. Prior Three Years and FY 2026 Program Funding

WCCHC did not receive any funding for our fire mitigation efforts.

6. Balance of Unrestricted Current Assets

As of November 30, 2024, WCCHC had \$28 million in unrestricted current assets. The federal Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA), the agency overseeing the community health center program under which WCCHC is funded, expects a health center to maintain cash on hand to cover an equivalent of two months of operating expenses.

V. Experience and Capability

1. Necessary Skills and Experience

WCCHC is a non-profit community health center that has served the community for 52 years. The growth of the physical campus and programmatic aspects of the health center over the past five decades demonstrates its experience and ability to plan and manage financial resources and capital development activities. WCCHC has a strong

and tenured Facilities, Planning, and Design team that has successfully completed multiple construction, renovation, and safety-related projects.

2. Facilities

WCCHC operates out of its main center in Waianae, seven satellite clinics in Waianae, Nanakuli, Kapolei, Ewa, and Waipahu, six school-based sites along the Waianae Coast, and other business and program sites.

WCCHC's 16-plus acre flagship campus is situated on state Department of Land and Natural Resources and Department of Hawaiian Home Lands parcels centrally located on the Waianae Coast. Permanent structures have been constructed or renovated through funding from federal, state, city government, and private foundations.

The main campus offers a wide range of services and amenities for the community, including a 24-hour emergency room, imaging and laboratory facilities, primary care clinics, specialty clinics, behavioral health clinics, a dental clinic, a pharmacy, case management and outreach services, the WIC program, a health promotion office, a research office, a dining facility, the Native Hawaiian Healing Center, an amphitheater, as well as administrative and information technology offices.

WCCHC has an approximate one-acre walking trail system on our main campus, serving as a firebreak between the base of the mountain and campus structures. This trail is part of the fire mitigation measures currently in place, which collectively cover only 6.25% of the 16-acre campus. While this initiative enhances fire protection by improving access and water availability in case of a fire, the limited coverage leaves the majority of the campus—and the critical services it provides—vulnerable to fire risk.
