
A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HOMELESSNESS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that many homeless
2 persons thrive when they have ready access to familiar support
3 groups and loving family members. In Hawaii, some homeless
4 persons are currently stranded in the State, far from their
5 families, because they lack the financial resources to return
6 home.

7 The legislature recognizes that Hawaii has limited
8 resources for human services, and some homeless persons may find
9 that their families or home states are better equipped to
10 provide long-term care and support.

11 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to:

12 (1) Establish and appropriate moneys for a return-to-home
13 program to provide travel expenses and relocation
14 assistance for eligible persons who wish to return to
15 their home states; and

16 (2) Require the department of human services to develop
17 and implement a public information campaign related to



1 the State's residency requirements and return-to-home
2 program.

3 SECTION 2. Chapter 346, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
4 amended by adding a new section to part XVII to be appropriately
5 designated and to read as follows:

6 "§346- Return-to-home program. (a) There is
7 established within the department the return-to-home program to
8 provide travel expenses and relocation assistance for eligible
9 persons who wish to return to their home states.

10 (b) For purposes of the program, the department shall:

11 (1) Establish a public-private partnership by contracting
12 with eligible nonprofit organizations, for-profit
13 organizations, or foundations to administer the
14 program without regard to chapters 103D and 103F;

15 (2) Seek the participation of local airlines, passenger
16 ship lines, charter companies, travel agencies, and
17 the visitor industry;

18 (3) Coordinate with federal programs, including the United
19 States Repatriation Program, to maximize resources and
20 avoid a duplication of services;



- 1 (4) Seek assistance and input from the governor's
- 2 coordinator on homelessness; and
- 3 (5) Work with homeless outreach programs to ensure that
- 4 persons who wish to participate are made aware of the
- 5 program and that vulnerable populations, including
- 6 victims of domestic violence or human trafficking, are
- 7 not involuntarily displaced.

8 (c) A person shall be eligible to participate in the
9 return-to-home program if the person:

- 10 (1) Agrees to participate in the program voluntarily;
- 11 (2) Maintains legal residence in a state other than
- 12 Hawaii;
- 13 (3) Has no verifiable permanent address in Hawaii;
- 14 (4) Lacks financial independence, including a return
- 15 ticket or the financial means to return home;
- 16 (5) Is unemployed; and
- 17 (6) Is reliant, or at risk of becoming reliant, on state
- 18 assistance programs;

19 provided that a person having at least one dependent child who
20 resides in the State, or a person receiving medical treatment



1 that cannot be interrupted, shall not be eligible to participate
2 in the program.

3 (d) The department shall verify the information required
4 by subsection (c) to prevent fraudulent claims or involuntary
5 displacement and shall allow a person who is made a participant
6 in the program without the person's consent, or a person who
7 wishes to participate in the program but is denied eligibility,
8 to immediately appeal the decision.

9 (e) The department shall submit a report of its findings
10 and recommendations, including the number of return-to-home
11 program participants for the previous year, costs, program
12 outcomes, and any proposed legislation, to the legislature no
13 later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular
14 session.

15 (f) For the purposes of this section:

16 "Home state" means a person's legal state of residence.

17 "Permanent address" means a verifiable physical residence
18 that a person owns, rents, or resides in with family.

19 "State assistance programs" includes housing subsidies,
20 unemployment benefits, or any other form of public aid or
21 welfare."



1 SECTION 3. No later than , the department of human
2 services shall develop and implement a public information
3 campaign to:

- 4 (1) Inform new arrivals to Hawaii about the State's
5 requirements for establishing legal residency; and
6 (2) Inform communities that might benefit from the return-
7 to-home program about the program's availability and
8 eligibility criteria.

9 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
10 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
11 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2025-2026 and the
12 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
13 2026-2027 for the return-to-home program and public information
14 campaign required by this Act.

15 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
16 of human services for the purposes of this Act.

17 SECTION 5. New statutory material is underscored.

Report Title:

DHS; Homelessness; Return-to-Home; Reports; Appropriation

Description:

Establishes and appropriates moneys for a return-to-home program within the Department of Human Services to provide travel expenses and relocation assistance for eligible persons who wish to return to their home states. Requires the Department to develop and implement a public information campaign related to the State's residency requirements and return-to-home program.

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
