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# HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE OFFICE OF THE STATE FIRE MARSHAL TO CONVENE A VEGETATION MANAGEMENT WORKING GROUP TO STUDY, EVALUATE, AND MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS FOR REGULATIONS THAT DEFINE PROPERTY OWNER OBLIGATIONS FOR VEGETATION MANAGEMENT ON PUBLIC AND PRIVATE PROPERTY TO MITIGATE WILDFIRE RISK, AND MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS THAT DEFINE A LINE CLEARANCE TREE TRIMMER AND ESTABLISH MINIMUM SAFETY STANDARDS, TRAINING, AND QUALIFICATIONS FOR INDIVIDUALS PERFORMING LINE CLEARANCE TREE TRIMMING AT OR NEAR ELECTRIC UTILITY FACILITIES.

1 WHEREAS, on August 8, 2023, catastrophic wildfires swept  
2 through various communities on the island of Maui; and  
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4 WHEREAS, the wildfires significantly impacted human life  
5 and the health, community housing, education, economy, and  
6 environment of Maui residents; and  
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8 WHEREAS, the presence of grass, trees, and other vegetation  
9 adjacent to or under electric utility lines is a significant  
10 fire risk; and  
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12 WHEREAS, in response to the wildfires, in 2023 the House of  
13 Representatives established six interim working groups,  
14 including the Wildfire Prevention Working Group, which were  
15 charged with evaluating specific topics related to the Lahaina  
16 wildfire and making recommendations for specific legislative  
17 action; and  
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19 WHEREAS, the Wildfire Prevention Working Group found that  
20 people are the primary drivers of wildfires in Hawaii, as  
21 ninety-nine percent of wildfires are caused by human ignitions;  
22 and  
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1 WHEREAS, the Wildfire Prevention Working Group also found  
2 that guinea grass, fountain grass, molasses grass, and  
3 buffelgrass can form continuous fuel beds, ignite easily, attain  
4 extremely high fine fuel loads, and grow back more vigorously in  
5 the post-fire environment than the majority of native  
6 vegetation; and

7  
8 WHEREAS, electric utility companies have miles of utility  
9 lines installed throughout the State on public and private  
10 lands, including within the public rights of way and mountainous  
11 areas of the State; and

12  
13 WHEREAS, communication equipment, by nature, does not  
14 independently create wildfire risks, making its role in  
15 vegetation management appropriately limited; and

16  
17 WHEREAS, other states such as Oregon and Washington  
18 appropriately regulate vegetation management requirements  
19 specifically for electric utilities due to the unique wildfire  
20 hazards posed by high-voltage power lines; and

21  
22 WHEREAS, a significant portion of these public lands is  
23 covered with unmanaged grasses, trees, and other vegetation that  
24 may pose a significant wildfire risk; and

25  
26 WHEREAS, the Bureau of Labor Statistics has reported that  
27 the Tree Industry average annual fatal-incident rate is thirty  
28 (30) times greater than the All-Industry average annual  
29 fatal-incident rate; and

30  
31 WHEREAS, the Legislature recognizes that other state  
32 jurisdictions have recognized the additional hazard presented to  
33 individuals performing line clearance tree trimming at or near  
34 electric utility facilities and have adopted state law requiring  
35 minimum safety standards, training and qualifications for  
36 individuals performing such work; and

37  
38 WHEREAS, additional study into appropriate vegetation  
39 management will enable the State to develop appropriate  
40 policies, regulations, and guidance for the parties responsible  
41 for the management of vegetation on public and private lands to  
42 mitigate wildfire risk and establish minimum safety standards,



1 training, and qualifications for individuals performing line  
2 clearance tree trimming at or near electric utility facilities;  
3 now, therefore,

5 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the  
6 Thirty-third Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session  
7 of 2025, the Senate concurring, that the Office of the State  
8 Fire Marshal is requested to convene a Vegetation Management  
9 Working Group (Working Group) to study, evaluate, and make  
10 recommendations for regulations that define property owner  
11 obligations for vegetation management on public and private  
12 property to mitigate wildfire risk , as well as minimum safety  
13 standards, training, and qualifications for individuals  
14 performing line clearance tree trimming at or near electric  
15 utility facilities; and  
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17 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in its review of vegetation  
18 management, the Working Group is requested to consider the  
19 following:  
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21 (1) Wildfire risk mitigation actions being proposed as  
22 part of the Hawaiian Electric Company's Climate  
23 Adaptation Transmission and Distribution and  
24 Resilience Program and Wildfire Safety Strategy filed  
25 with the Public Utilities Commission as Docket No.  
26 2022-0135 and Docket No. 2025-0156, respectively; and  
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28 (2) The hazard mitigation plans of electric utilities,  
29 including the Kauai Island Utility Cooperative, filed  
30 with the Public Utilities Commission as part of a  
31 non-docketed proceeding under Case No. 2023-04661 in  
32 response to Public Utilities Commission Order No.  
33 40396; and  
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35 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Working Group is requested  
36 to include the following members:  
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38 (1) The State Fire Marshal, who is requested to serve as  
39 the chairperson of the Working Group;  
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41 (2) The Director of Transportation, or the Director's

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29 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Working Group is requested

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- 38 (3) A representative of a communications service provider;
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- 40 (4) A representative of the International Brotherhood of
- 41 Electrical Workers, Local 1260; and
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1 (5) A landowner that owns more than one thousand acres of  
2 land in the State; and

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4 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Working Group is requested  
5 to submit a report of its findings and recommendations,  
6 including any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later  
7 than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session  
8 of 2026; and

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10 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department the Office of  
11 the State Fire Marshal is administratively attached to, is  
12 requested to provide administrative support to the Working  
13 Group, including drafting of the report; and

15 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Working Group is requested  
16 to dissolve on June 30, 2026; and

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18 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this  
19 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Department the  
20 Office of the State Fire Marshal is administratively attached  
21 to; Director of Transportation; Director of Commerce and  
22 Consumer Affairs; Chairperson of the Board of Land and Natural  
23 Resources; Superintendent of Education; Chairperson of the  
24 Public Utilities Commission, who is requested to transmit copies  
25 of this Concurrent Resolution to all regulated  
26 telecommunications carriers; Mayors of the Counties of Maui,  
27 Kauai, and Hawaii and Mayor of the City and County of Honolulu;  
28 President and Chief Executive Officer of the Hawaiian Electric  
29 Company, Inc.; Chairperson of the Board of Directors of the  
30 Kauai Island Utility Cooperative; and President of the  
31 International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, Local  
32 Union 1260.
