
A BILL FOR AN ACT

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE XVII, SECTION 3 OF THE HAWAII CONSTITUTION TO SPECIFY THAT THE STANDARD FOR VOTER APPROVAL OF A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT PROPOSED BY THE LEGISLATURE IS A MAJORITY OF ALL THE VOTES TALLIED UPON THE QUESTION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the state
2 constitution is at times amended when voters in a general
3 election approve a proposed amendment that has been placed on
4 the election ballot. The legislature further finds that the
5 manner in which ballot responses are required to be counted for
6 state constitutional amendment purposes, by deeming ballots left
7 blank, spoiled, or over voted as a vote in opposition to the
8 proposed amendment, is confusing and may lead to a result
9 unintended by the voter.

10 Pursuant to the state constitution, the standard for
11 passage of a proposed constitutional amendment at a general
12 election is two-fold. First, a majority of voters must have
13 voted "yes" on the proposed amendment question, based on the
14 "majority of all the votes tallied upon the question"
15 requirement that appears in article XVII, section 2 of the



1 Constitution of the State of Hawaii. Second, this majority must
2 also represent a majority of all votes cast in the election,
3 based on that same section's requirement that the majority
4 constitute "at least fifty per cent of the total vote cast at
5 the election." In practical terms, this means that all ballots
6 that are validly returned are considered to have been cast. So
7 if the voter responded to the proposed amendment question by
8 leaving the answer blank, spoiling the ballot, or over voting,
9 the answer is counted as a "no" vote. Thus, when factoring in
10 all votes cast, the actual threshold for passage of a state
11 constitutional amendment can be significantly higher than fifty
12 per cent of voters voting "yes" or "no" on the question.

13 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to propose an
14 amendment to article XVII, section 3 of the Constitution of the
15 State of Hawaii regarding the standard for ratification of a
16 constitutional amendment proposed by the legislature to require
17 that a majority of all the votes tallied upon the question be a
18 "yes" vote, and not include blank, spoiled, and over votes in
19 determining whether a majority was reached. Only ballots that
20 indicate a "no" vote will be counted as "no."



1 The legislature notes that this proposed amendment is not
2 intended to change the standard for tabulating votes on
3 constitutional amendments that are generated by a constitutional
4 convention, and will therefore leave unamended the relevant
5 language in article XVII, section 2 of the Constitution of the
6 State of Hawaii.

7 SECTION 2. Article XVII, section 3, of the Constitution of
8 the State of Hawaii is amended to read as follows:

9 **"AMENDMENTS PROPOSED BY LEGISLATURE**

10 **Section 3.** The legislature may propose amendments to the
11 constitution by adopting the same, in the manner required for
12 legislation, by a two-thirds vote of each house on final reading
13 at any session, after either or both houses shall have given the
14 governor at least ten days' written notice of the final form of
15 the proposed amendment, or, with or without such notice, by a
16 majority vote of each house on final reading at each of two
17 successive sessions.

18 Upon such adoption, the proposed amendments shall be
19 entered upon the journals, with the ayes and noes, and published
20 once in each of four successive weeks in at least one newspaper
21 of general circulation in each senatorial district wherein such



1 a newspaper is published, within the two months' period
2 immediately preceding the next general election.

3 At such general election the proposed amendments shall be
4 submitted to the electorate for approval or rejection upon a
5 separate ballot.

6 ~~[The conditions of and requirements for ratification of
7 such proposed amendments shall be the same as provided in
8 section 2 of this article for ratification at a general
9 election.]~~ The proposed amendments shall be effective only if
10 approved at a general election by a majority of all the votes
11 tallied upon the question."

12 SECTION 3. The question to be printed on the ballot shall
13 be as follows:

14 "Under the existing language of the Constitution of
15 the State of Hawaii, amendments to the Constitution of the
16 State of Hawaii that are proposed by the Legislature are
17 only effective if approved at a general election by a
18 majority of all votes tallied upon the question, this
19 majority constituting at least fifty percent of the total
20 vote cast at the election.



1 Shall the Constitution of the State of Hawaii be
2 amended to change that standard for voter approval of
3 constitutional amendments that are proposed by the
4 Legislature by removing the requirement that the majority
5 of all votes tallied upon the question must constitute at
6 least fifty percent of the total vote cast at the
7 election?"

8 SECTION 4. Constitutional material to be repealed is
9 bracketed and stricken. New constitutional material is
10 underscored.

11 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 3000;
12 provided that this amendment shall take effect upon compliance
13 with article XVII, section 3, of the Constitution of the State
14 of Hawaii.
