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# SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF LAND AND NATURAL RESOURCES TO  
CONVENE A KAILUA BAY ADVISORY WORKING GROUP.

1           WHEREAS, the Kailua-Kona Wharf, commonly referred to as the  
2 Kailua Pier, in Kailua-Kona, Hawai'i Island, serves as a vital  
3 hub for place-based cultural history, community gatherings,  
4 ocean-based tourism, and recreational activities which supports  
5 local businesses and enhances the economy of West Hawai'i; and  
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7           WHEREAS, Kailua Pier and the surrounding area of Kailua Bay  
8 hold deep cultural and historical significance to the Hawai'i  
9 Island community as a sacred and political center for Native  
10 Hawaiians, serving as the royal residence of King Kamehameha I  
11 in his later years and the site of Ahu'ena Heiau, where the King  
12 governed and upheld traditional Hawaiian practices; and  
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14           WHEREAS, Kailua Bay witnessed pivotal moments in Hawaiian  
15 history, including the transition from the traditional kapu  
16 system to a new era of governance in 1819, marking a profound  
17 shift in the cultural and societal structure of Hawai'i; and  
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19           WHEREAS, the area has remained a vital hub for maritime  
20 activity, commerce, and cultural traditions, sustaining  
21 generations of Native Hawaiian fishers, voyagers, and  
22 practitioners who continue to honor the ancestral connection to  
23 the land and ocean; and  
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25           WHEREAS, today, the Kailua Pier provides essential access  
26 for fishing, boating, and cultural events, including the annual  
27 Queen Lili'uokalani Canoe Race, the IRONMAN World Championship,  
28 and traditional Hawaiian ceremonies, fostering both economic  
29 growth and cultural preservation; and  
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31           WHEREAS, in addition to servicing local residents, the  
32 Kailua Pier serves as a key arrival point for cruise ships,  
33 bringing thousands of visitors to West Hawai'i each year, who



1 contribute significantly to the region's economy through  
2 tourism-related spending by supporting local businesses,  
3 restaurants, tour operators, and cultural sites; and  
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5 WHEREAS, the high level of activity at the Kailua Pier has  
6 resulted in persistent challenges related to homelessness,  
7 including the frequent vandalism of public facilities, damage to  
8 restroom infrastructure, and unauthorized encampments, creating  
9 ongoing safety and sanitation concerns for residents and  
10 visitors; and  
11

12 WHEREAS, while maintenance of the Kailua Pier is essential  
13 for public safety, environmental protection, and the long-term  
14 benefit of the community, persistent vandalism and destruction  
15 of public restrooms and infrastructure have led to rising  
16 maintenance costs, disruptions to public access, and the need  
17 for continuous repairs by state and county agencies; and  
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19 WHEREAS, the management and operations of Kailua Pier fall  
20 under the jurisdiction of multiple government agencies,  
21 including the Department of Land and Natural Resources, various  
22 departments of the County of Hawai'i such as Parks and Recreation  
23 and the Police Department as well as federal entities such as  
24 the United States Coast Guard; and  
25

26 WHEREAS, local nonprofit organizations, including  
27 Destination Kona Coast, play a crucial role in visitor education  
28 and greeting programs while serving as dedicated stewards of  
29 Kailua Pier, actively monitoring its operations, identifying  
30 facility concerns, and relaying issues to government officials  
31 in a timely manner; and  
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33 WHEREAS, adopting an interjurisdictional approach to  
34 addressing challenges at Kailua Pier would enhance communication  
35 between pier users and government officials, while fostering  
36 coordinated oversight and effective management among responsible  
37 authorities; now, therefore,

39 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-third  
40 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2025; the  
41 House of Representatives concurring, that the Department of Land



1 and Natural Resources is requested to convene a Kailua Bay  
2 Advisory Working Group; and

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4 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Kailua Bay Advisory Working  
5 Group is requested to:

7 (1) Provide a structured forum for state, county, and  
8 community stakeholders to collaborate on  
9 interjurisdictional issues affecting Kailua Pier;  
10  
11 (2) Identify and implement solutions to enhance safety for  
12 pier users, including swimmers, boaters, and visitors;  
13  
14 (3) Ensure that commercial, recreational, and cultural  
15 activities at the pier remain viable and beneficial to  
16 the West Hawai'i community;  
17  
18 (4) Monitor and advocate for necessary repairs, upgrades,  
19 and funding to maintain the pier's long-term  
20 sustainability;  
21  
22 (5) Address issues including water quality, marine life  
23 protection, and pollution affecting Kailua Pier and  
24 Kailua Bay;  
25  
26 (6) Offer policy and operational recommendations to  
27 improve pier management and operations;  
28  
29 (7) Serve as a liaison between government entities and the  
30 public, ensuring that community voices are heard and  
31 considered in decision-making;  
32  
33 (8) Track ongoing and emerging challenges, including  
34 homelessness, parking availability, and user  
35 conflicts, and propose collaborative solutions; and  
36  
37 (9) Convene on a monthly basis; and  
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39 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Land and  
40 Natural Resources is requested to include the following members  
41 in the working group:  
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- 1           (1) The Administrator of the Division of Boating and Ocean  
2           Recreation or the Administrator's designee, who shall  
3           serve as chairperson;
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- 5           (2) The member of the Senate who represents the senatorial  
6           district in which the pier located;
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- 8           (3) The member of the House of Representatives who  
9           represents the house district in which the pier is  
10          located;
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- 12          (4) The member of the Hawai'i County Council who represents  
13          the council district in which the pier is located;
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- 15          (5) The Mayor of the County of Hawai'i, or the Mayor's  
16          designee;
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- 18          (6) A representative of the Statewide Office on  
19          Homelessness and Housing Solutions;
- 20
- 21          (7) A representative of the Hawai'i Tourism Authority;
- 22
- 23          (8) The Chief of the Hawai'i Police Department, or the  
24          Chief's designee;
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- 26          (9) A representative of the Kai 'Opua Canoe Club to be  
27          invited by the chairperson;
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- 29          (10) A representative of the Kai 'Ehitu Outrigger Team of  
30          Kailua-Kona to be invited by the chairperson;
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- 32          (11) A representative of the Kailua Village Business  
33          Improvement District to be invited by the chairperson;
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- 35          (12) A representative of the Courtyard King Kamehameha's  
36          Kona Beach Hotel to be invited by the chairperson;
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- 38          (13) Two at-large members of the community appointed by the  
39          Senator representing the senatorial district in which  
40          the pier is located; and

1 (14) Two community at-large members of the community  
2 appointed by the Representative representing the house  
3 district in which the pier is located; and  
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5 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that beginning in 2025 and for three  
6 years thereafter, the Kailua Bay Advisory Group is requested to  
7 submit a quarterly report of its findings and recommendations,  
8 including any proposed legislation, to the Legislature; and  
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10 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this  
11 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Chairperson of the  
12 Board of Land and Natural Resources, Coordinator on  
13 Homelessness, Administrator of the Division of Boating and Ocean  
14 Recreation, Mayor of the County of Hawai'i, Chairperson of the  
15 Hawai'i County Council, Chief of the Hawai'i Police Department,  
16 the Chairperson of the Hawai'i Tourism Authority.
