Chairs San Buenaventura and Keohokalole and Members of the Committees:

The Department of the Attorney General (Department) supports this bill and the protection it would afford to those providing or receiving lawful gender-affirming care in the state.

The purpose of this bill is to expand the protections established under Act 2, SLH 2023, codified as chapter 323J, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), to include gender-affirming health care services. The bill also clarifies jurisdiction under the Uniform Child-Custody Jurisdiction and Enforcement Act for cases involving children who obtain or seek gender-affirming health care services in this State.

The Department notes that as currently drafted, the amendment in section 15, on page 47, lines 12-14, can be interpreted to mean that if a child is in Hawaii for the purpose of obtaining gender-affirming health care services, the Hawaii courts will automatically have jurisdiction to make an initial child-custody determination under section 583A-201(a)(2), HRS, regardless of whether a court of another state has jurisdiction or has declined to exercise jurisdiction. If the Committees' intent is to clarify that a child's presence for the purpose of obtaining gender-affirming health care services satisfies only the requirement for a "significant connection with this State" in section 583A-201(a)(2)(A), HRS, on page 46, lines 12-15, of the bill, then the reference to "subsection (a)(2)" on page 47, line 14, should be amended to "subsection (a)(2)(A)."

Bill No. and Title: Senate Bill No. 1150, Relating to Health Care

**Purpose:** Expands the protections established under Act 2, SLH 2023, to include gender-affirming health care services. Clarifies jurisdiction under the Uniform Child-Custody Jurisdiction and Enforcement Act for cases involving children who obtain gender affirming health care services

### **Judiciary's Position:**

The Judiciary takes no position on this bill but offers the following comments regarding those portions of the bill that seek to modify the Uniform Child Custody Jurisdiction and Enforcement Act ("UCCJEA") in chapter 583A.

The purpose of uniform acts according to the Uniform Law Commission is to seek "to establish the same law on a subject among the various jurisdictions." The UCCJEA is intended to help "competing" states determine which state is in the best position to decide a custody dispute. It is not intended to determine which parent is awarded custody, but rather which state

should assume jurisdiction over the issue. The adoption of the UCCJEA and its predecessor, the Uniform Child Custody Jurisdiction Act ("UCCJA"), were intended to reduce forum shopping and litigation by parents in child custody disputes. The UCCJEA is currently adopted in 49 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands. While the Judiciary has not researched the UCCJEA in these other jurisdictions, it is possible that adopting the amendments in SB1150 will make Hawai'i's version of the UCCJEA inconsistent with other jurisdictions. This inconsistency could result in increased litigation and expense to determine which state should have jurisdiction, and a resultant delay in the court's ability to issue appropriate and necessary orders, the very issue the UCCJEA was meant to avoid.

The Judiciary also seeks clarification as to what is intended by the proposed amendment to HRS section 583A-201. Is a child's presence in the state for the purpose of receiving gender-affirming care intended to completely satisfy all the requirements of HRS section 583A-201(a)(2) or just the requirements stated in either HRS section 583A-201(a)(2)(A) or HRS section 583A-201(a)(2)(B)?

The proposed amendment to HRS section 583A-204 would allow Hawaii to take temporary emergency jurisdiction if a child is present in Hawaii and it is necessary to protect the child because the child has been "unable to obtain gender-affirming health care services". We seek additional clarification regarding if this is intended to apply to any and all situations where a child is unable to obtain gender-affirming care no matter the reason (e.g. lack of health insurance, unavailability of care in the other state) or when due solely to a parent's refusal to consent to gender-affirming care.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony on this bill, which would, among other things, amend protections for reproductive health care services to include gender-affirming health care services. The Office of Information Practices (OIP) takes **no position on the substance** of this bill, but **supports** the proposed **amendment to section 323J-4**, HRS, which would fix a potential conflict between the existing language of that section and chapter 92F, HRS, the Uniform Information Practices Act (UIPA).

That section currently prohibits government agencies as defined in the UIPA and their employees from providing any information "in furtherance of any out-of-state or interstate investigation or proceeding seeking to impose civil or criminal liability" for the provision, use of, or assistance related to reproductive health care services. Since the definition of "agency" is explicitly based on that used in the UIPA, the prohibition is clearly intended to apply to UIPA requests. The problem is that the prohibition on disclosing information applies not just to patient health information or similarly confidential information but to information in general, and

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it is not limited to a situation in which the agency or employee furnishing information actually knows that the record request was made in connection with an investigation or proceeding seeking to impose liability. An agency providing records as required under the UIPA could thereby find itself in violation of section 323J-4, HRS.

This bill (at page 8 line 2) would amend section 323J-4, HRS, to limit the prohibition to situations where an agency discloses **nonpublic** information under the UIPA in furtherance of an investigation or proceeding seeking to impose liability as described. This amendment makes clear that the general prohibition on disclosure does not bar an agency from disclosing public records, and OIP **supports** it.

Aloha Chair San Buenaventura, Vice Chair Aquino, Chair Keohokalole, Vice Chair Fukunaga and Members of the joint Senate Health & Human Services and Commerce & Consumer Protection Committees:

The Democratic Party of Hawai'i **STRONGLY SUPPORTS** SB1150, RELATING TO HEALTH CARE. Pursuant to the Platform of the Democratic Party of Hawai'i, the Party supports an inherent right to live a healthy life and believes all people have the right to access high quality healthcare. The Democratic Party of Hawai'i supports protection of transgender rights by advocating for legislation that safeguards gender affirming care and condemns anti-transgender measures.

This bill expands the protections established under Act 2, SLH 2023, to include gender-affirming health care services. Clarifies jurisdiction under the Uniform Child-Custody Jurisdiction and Enforcement Act for cases involving children who obtain gender-affirming health care services.

SB 1150 will provide significant legal and civil protections to individuals and entities providing and receiving gender affirming care. It will:

- Defends Hawai'i's Sovereignty: This is a STATE'S RIGHTS issue, ensuring that the laws we enact in Hawai'i are protected from interference by laws passed in other states on the continent.
- Protects Parents' Rights: Parents in Hawai'i will be safeguarded from outof-state courts attempting to interfere with their decisions regarding medical care for their children—decisions made under the supervision of licensed healthcare professionals and legal in Hawai'i.

- Supports Families and Medical Professionals: Parents, guardians, and medical providers will be empowered to make informed, compassionate decisions for their keiki without fear of retaliation or legal threats from other states.
- Ensures Medical Privacy: Ensuring that your medical records belong to YOU. This bill expands protections to keep Hawai'i residents' healthcare information private and secure from external entities.
- Defends Hawai'i's Healthcare Providers: Doctors and healthcare professionals practicing in Hawai'i will be shielded from punitive actions by other states when delivering care that aligns with Hawai'i's laws.
- Preserves Indigenous Values: This bill safeguards the cultural heritage of Pacifika Islanders, who have long embraced gender diversity, from external pressures to conform to western gender-binary "ideals". This is about stopping the erosion of indigenous cultural values.
- Reinforces Existing Protections: This legislation mirrors the protections for reproductive rights enacted under 2023's ACT 2, extending the same security to gender-affirming care.
- What this bill does not do: It does NOT authorize surgeries on minors; It does NOT permit prescriptions without parental consent; It does NOT force anyone to transition or "make" anyone transgender; It does NOT allow children to be removed from their families.

We, the Democratic Party of Hawai'i, believe that providing and receiving life saving health care is a basic human right. Sadly, over the past several years, it has become clear that extremists across the nation have made it their legislative priority to target women and members of the LGBTQIA+ community by stripping away their rights, especially access to health care.

Dozens of states across the nation have either passed or are considering passing laws prohibiting gender affirming health care to people of ALL AGES. These laws target providers and recipients, making it a criminal offense to provide gender affirming care. Recently, there the Texas AG has gone as far as issuing subpoenas for medical records relating to gender affirming care - from medical providers outside his own state of Texas - to prosecute gender affirming care providers and recipients who may reside in Texas. Such moves are intended to have a chilling effect, frivolously overreaching state lines, in the pursuit to diminish and extinguish gender affirming care across the nation – even in states that do not have such discriminatory and misguided laws on their books. We must take action and take a stand to protect the human rights and human dignity of our LGBTQIA+ Community. The LGBTQIA+ community is under unprecedented attack across the nation, and it is our responsibility to stand up to bullies and protect the civil and basic human rights of our fellow residents.

In 2023, we passed a similar bill (SB1, now ACT 2) to address specific protections for reproductive rights. We are confident that, together, we can continue to make a difference and also pass protections for gender affirming care. Hawai'i will not bow to the politics of fear and hate. Please support this bill.

My name is Carolyn Martinez-Golojuch, and I am honored to submit this testimony in strong support of Senate Bill 1150. As a mother and a long-time civil rights advocate, I have dedicated my life to fighting for the rights and dignity of all individuals, particularly our most vulnerable communities. ### Comments:

I am Dr. Crystal Beal testifying on behalf of QueerDoc. I am a Board-Certified Family Medicine physician and transgender medicine specialist. QueerDoc offers gender affirming healthcare in Hawai'i. **We strongly support of SB1150.** 

This bill is essential for the continuation of life-saving, medically necessary, and evidence-based care, especially in the face of escalating legislative attacks across the country.

We have seen hundreds of youth and families moving or traveling to

access gender affirming care as healthcare is less accessible or banned in other states. This week alone, I supported dozens of families with youth planning relocation. We know that family and community support - including state support - reduces youth suicidal ideation, attempts, and completed attempts. This legislation will save trans youths lives.

We are also worried about our patients' safety, our safety, and the safety of our homes and family members. We have experienced death threats for providing this medically necessary care. We need strong protection from our state officials. Passing this bill is an incredibly important step towards ensuring Hawaii remains a safe place where all can receive access to medical care without fear of persecution and where providers feel safe to practice.

I am writing in strong support of Senate Bill 1150 on behalf of the Hawai'i State Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer Plus. (LGBTQ+) Commission, which was established by the 2022 Hawai'i State Legislature with the following purpose:

"...to improve the State's interface with members of the lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, plus community; identify the short- and long-range needs of its members; and ensure that there is an effective means of researching, planning, and advocating for the equity of this population in all aspects of state government."

The Hawai'i State LGBTQ+ Commission submits this testimony in **strong support** of Senate Bill 1150, which expands the protections established under Act 2, SLH 2023, to explicitly include gender-affirming health care services and clarifies jurisdiction under the Uniform Child-Custody Jurisdiction and Enforcement Act for cases involving children who obtain such care.

Act 2 was a monumental step toward ensuring that Hawai'i remains a beacon of safety and acceptance for LGBTQ+ individuals, particularly transgender, Māhū, and non-binary community members. SB 1150 builds upon this foundation, ensuring that individuals who seek gender-affirming care—recognized by every major medical association as **medically necessary and life-saving**—are protected from out-of-state legal attacks and discriminatory policies that seek to criminalize such care.

As we have seen across the nation, the transgender, Māhū, and non-binary community faces **unprecedented attacks** from certain factions of the federal government and state legislatures that seek to restrict access to gender-affirming health care. These efforts are not only politically motivated but also dangerous, putting lives at risk by denying individuals the ability to access the care they need to live authentically and safely. By enacting SB 1150, Hawai'i has the opportunity to **stand in direct opposition to these harmful policies** and reaffirm its commitment to protecting the rights, dignity, and well-being of all its residents.

For transgender, Māhū, and non-binary keiki and adults, access to gender-affirming care can mean the difference between life and death. Studies show that access to such care significantly reduces the risk of depression, anxiety, and suicide. Yet, across the country, from the Federal to certain states, extremist efforts seek to strip these individuals of their right to exist safely and

freely. We cannot allow such hostility to take root in Hawai'i.

Dear Chair San Buenaventura, Chair Keohokalole, and the Members of the Committee,

Members of Indivisible Hawai'i thank you for this opportunity to testify in strong support of SB1150 which would provide necessary protections to transgender people.

Transgender people have always been among us and part of our society, and have long faced widespread discrimination. In its decision *Bostock v. Clayton Cnty*, 590 U.S. 644 (2020), the U.S. Supreme Court disallowed discrimination against transgender people in the employment context finding that such discrimination was barred by Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. Despite this clear ruling and its plain application recognizing the protections against discrimination in countless other similarly worded statutes all over this country, the Trump Administration has issued an executive order ignoring *Bostock* and in effect simply attempting to erase transgender individuals altogether: "It is the policy of the United States to recognize two sexes, male and female." See Executive Order "Defending Women from Gender Ideology Extremism and Restoring Biological Truth to the Federal Government." This Executive Order clearly foreshadows additional actions coming against our transgender citizens.

Hawaii has long been in the forefront of assuring protections for its citizens against discrimination. SB1150 provides specific and reasonable protections for our transgender citizens. It is so important to provide these protections.

On behalf of the Hawai'i Association of Professional Nurses (HAPN), we appreciate the opportunity to submit testimony in strong support of SB1150, which seeks to protect reproductive health care and gender-affirming health care services in Hawai'i. However, we respectfully request an amendment to include provider-neutral language ensuring that all qualified licensed health care providers—physicians, advanced practice registered nurses (APRNs), physician assistants (PAs), and other licensed professionals—are explicitly covered under the bill's protections.

Rationale for Provider-Neutral Language

- Broadening Access to Care: Hawai'i's health care system relies on a diverse range of licensed providers, including APRNs and PAs, who serve as primary and specialty care providers, particularly in rural and underserved areas.
- Consistency Across Statutes: The bill currently protects certain professions (e.g., physicians, mental health counselors, psychologists, marriage and family therapists) from out-of-state legal consequences but does not explicitly extend these protections to APRNs, PAs, or other qualified health care providers.
- Avoiding Legal Loopholes: By using provider-neutral language such as "physician, APRN, PA, or other qualified licensed health care provider", the bill ensures all providers offering lawful services in Hawai'i receive the same protections.

### Conclusion

Hawai'i has long been a leader in expanding access to health care and protecting both patients and providers. By adopting provider-neutral language in SB1150, we can ensure that all qualified health care professionals are protected under the law, preventing unnecessary legal or licensure risks for those delivering essential reproductive and gender-affirming health care services.

We urge the committee to pass SB1150 with amendments to reflect this inclusive approach, ensuring Hawai'i's laws safeguard the full spectrum of licensed health care providers.

### Comments:

Aloha Chairs San Buenaventura and Keohokalole, Vice Chairs Aquino and Fukunaga, and members of the Committees,

I am writing in **strong support of SB1150**, which would help protect patients, providers, and families from out of state persecution, professional discipline, and separation when gender affirming care is received or provided in Hawai'i to a resident of a state where such care may be unlawful.

As a health professional who for 35 years directed a National Institutes of Health research laboratory that often tackled questions of gender and sexuality, I learned both how complex these matters are, and how important it is to rely on the advice of doctors and caregivers who are interested purely in health and wellbeing. The bans that other states are now imposing on gender-affirming care have nothing to do with health and well-being; they are purely an expression of religious and social beliefs.

Hawai'i has a long history of taking an evidence-based, reasonable, and compassionate approach to health. Consider Liliuokalanis support of vaccination and quarantine for smallpox in the 1880s. Recall Hawaii's groundbreaking facilitation of needle exchange in the 1980s. This is the type of tradition that should be continued, not abandoned.

Passing SB1150 is an incredibly important step towards ensuring Hawai'i remains a safe place where people and families can receive access to gender affirming health care without fear of persecution.

My name is Abby Simmons, Chair of the Stonewall Caucus of the Democratic Party of Hawai'i, and I am testifying on behalf of our Caucus in <u>strong support of SB1150</u>, the Health Care Access Protection Act.

On behalf of the Stonewall Caucus, we urge you to pass this critical legislation to safeguard the rights, dignity, and well-being of LGBTQ+ individuals and families in Hawai'i.

As states across the country enact laws that criminalize gender-affirming care, attack reproductive rights, and punish families for supporting their children, Hawai'i has the opportunity—and the responsibility—to stand as a beacon of safety, equality, and inclusion.

### Why SB 1150 is Essential for Hawaii's LGBTQ+ Community

### 1. Protecting Access to Lifesaving Gender-Affirming Health Care

Gender-affirming care is medically necessary, evidence-based care that is recognized by every major medical association, including the American Medical Association, the American Academy of Pediatrics, and the American Psychological Association. It is care that saves lives.

Yet, in multiple states, lawmakers have passed extreme bans on gender-affirming care, not only for minors but also for adults. Some states have gone further—threatening parents with legal action for supporting their children's health needs and criminalizing medical professionals for simply following best practices.

Hawai'i must ensure that no person seeking gender-affirming care—whether they are a resident or a visitor—faces legal threats from another state.

### 2. Preventing Government Overreach in Family and Custody Matters

SB 1150 ensures that Hawai'i courts will not participate in the unjust separation of children from their parents based on another state's politically motivated laws against gender-affirming care.

Every child deserves a family that loves and supports them. And every parent deserves the right to make informed, medically sound decisions in consultation with their child's doctors. No family should have to live in fear that seeking necessary health care could result in legal consequences or the loss of custody.

### 3. <u>Strengthening Privacy Protections for LGBTQ+ Individuals and Providers</u>

Hawai'i has long valued medical privacy and patient confidentiality. SB 1150 ensures that health care providers cannot be compelled to share records or cooperate with out-of-state investigations targeting LGBTQ+ patients or their families.

- It prohibits Hawai'i agencies from participating in legal actions from other states that seek to penalize individuals for accessing or providing gender-affirming or reproductive care.
- It protects health care professionals from disciplinary actions taken by other states that do not align with Hawaii's laws and values.
- It ensures that subpoenas, warrants, and extradition requests related to lawful medical care in Hawai'i will not be enforced.

### In conclusion:

Hawai i Health & Harm Reduction Center (HHHRC) *strongly supports* SB 1150, which expands the protections established under Act 2, SLH 2023, to include gender-affirming health care services.

This state's shield laws in the context of reproductive health provide protections against out-of-state discipline, civil liability, and disclosure of medical information related to reproductive health care services. These same protections should also extend to gender-affirming care.

17 states and the Washington, D.C., have shield law protections for gender affirming care. Hawai is should join them.

These are very fraught times for sexual and gender minorities, who already face persistent obstacles their health and well-being. This includes <u>LGB youth</u> and <u>trans youth</u> in Hawai'i. Presidential executive orders have sought to erase and suppress trans people, including one on 1/29 <u>targeting trans students in K-12 schools</u> calling for forced outing, restrictions on participation in co-curricular activities, and banning any instruction regarding gender identity.

Hawai'i has made a good deal of progress in affirming the rights of trans people, with gender identity and gender expression protected categories in its non-discrimination laws. Yet there are still barriers to receiving care, and the outlook is grim given a White House occupant intent on demonizing trans people in service of an extremist authoritarian ideology—one that has precedent.

HHHRC proudly serves Oʻahu's trans community with our <u>Kuaʻana Project</u>. Our mission is to reduce harm, promote health, create wellness, and fight stigma in Hawai'i and the Pacific. We work with many individuals impacted by poverty, housing instability, and other social determinants of health. Many of our program clients and participants have also been deeply impacted by trauma, including histories of physical, sexual, and psychological abuse.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on this measure.



#### Hawaii Lawmakers:

We, The Libertarian Party of Hawaii, vehemently denounce SB1150/HB615, or what we've dubbed "the Hawaii Kidnapping Bill". This proposed legislation is a flagrant violation of individual liberty and a gross abuse of governmental power that threatens the fundamental rights of parents and children alike.

Several clauses buried in this bill seek to essentially legalize child kidnapping across state lines, including by a non-parent, so long as the abduction is performed under the guise of obtaining 'gender-affirming' treatments. The proposed law would provide immunity for what would otherwise be a criminal act. By the time parents in other states figure out what's going on and seek a court order in their home state, their child could already be spirited away to Hawaii, where our judiciary has proven itself unwilling to follow the constitution nor the law.

This bill is a thinly-veiled act of political war against the rights of other states and families. The lawsuits will cost Hawaii dearly and may lead to bigger issues. By redefining crucial legal frameworks such as the Uniform Child-Custody Jurisdiction & Enforcement Act (which governs interstate child custody cases), this bill creates loopholes that enable the systematic removal of children from their families under the pretext of 'Gender Affirming Care', which threatens Hawaii's participation in the UCCJEA, and will result in Hawaii no longer being able to reliably return children who are taken away from Hawaii in child custody disputes.

This bill not only disregards the sanctity of family but also infringes upon the basic freedoms of individuals to make personal and informed decisions regarding their healthcare. This bill undermines due process, disregards parental authority, promises expensive fights with other states, and poses a grave threat to the well-being of minors nationwide.

It mandates secrecy, criminalizes interference with kidnappers, and obstructs the extradition of those charged with criminal acts in connection with 'gender-affirming care'. Such measures not only defy ethical medical principles but erode transparency and accountability in our justice system.

The Libertarian Party of Hawaii stands resolutely against this measure and any legislation that undermines individual rights, parental autonomy, and child welfare. We call upon legislators to reject this dangerous bill and uphold the principles of freedom and parental rights.

### SB1150 Would Legalize Child Kidnapping for Sex Change

The Hawaii Kidnapping Bill (<u>SB1150</u>, '<u>Relating to Health Care</u>') is among the worst proposed laws of this legislative session.

Set for a <u>February 11, 2025, hearing</u> before Senate HHS/CPN committees, SB1150 grants a de-facto immunity and asylum in Hawaii for any kidnapper who claims to be helping a child receive so-called 'gender-affirming' treatments.

The bill is copied word-for word from <u>HB2079</u> of 2024 which passed the House but died in the Senate. If SB1150 were to pass the Senate, the House votes may therefore already be lined up.

The bill's intent to legalize interstate kidnapping is outlined in the text:

§583A-208 - Jurisdiction declined by reason of conduct:

(d) In making a determination under this section, a court shall not consider as a factor weighing against the petitioner any taking of the child, or retention of the child after a visit or other temporary relinquishment of physical custody, from the person who has legal custody if there is evidence that the taking or retention of the child was for the purposes of obtaining gender-affirming health care services for the child and the law or policy of the other state limits the ability of a parent to obtain genderaffirminghealth care services for the child.

Most of this bill is a series of loopholes, redefinitions, and special opt-outs of legal norms all in service of making Hawaii a sanctuary for underage sex change surgery. Amendments to deep and highly specialized areas of the law work together in the service of legalizing the truly unthinkable.

The Hawaii Kidnapping Bill's unique and unmistakable true intent is to allow legal protections for any non-parent with sufficient access and means to remove a child of any age from their

home state, and to bring them to Hawaii in the name of receiving "Gender Affirming Care" – so long as they could not receive said 'care' in their home state.

The many sections of Hawaii Revised Statutes affected by the Hawaii Kidnapping Bill are designed to trigger a series of child-custody 'loopholes' that cause inter-state barriers to be systematically removed, so long as the instigator says the magic words: "Gender Affirming Care."

Local parents are also stripped of Hawaii Family Court recourse because SB1150 places their failure to provide access to so-called 'Gender Affirming Care' in the same category as child abuse, or more specifically, medical neglect. There is no meaningful due process for any family that is accused of medical neglect. There is no provision for legal representation or even notification of parents.

The bill accomplishes its perverse ends by a 'reinterpretation' of a critical section of the Uniform Child-Custody Jurisdiction and Enforcement Act (<u>UCCJEA</u>) which governs interstate child-custody proceedings, and amending over a dozen other laws, to exempt any petitioner from the oversight offered by Hawaii's Family Court system.

The bill's proposed amendments to the UCCJEA redefine a family-court emergency, to allow any person "acting as a parent" to obtain emergency temporary custody against natural parents who decline to provide their children so-called "Gender Affirming Care." Natural parents' refusal to provide sex-change procedures would be treated as being of the same legal weight and severity as actual physical abuse or child abandonment.

#### The bill reads:

§583A-204, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:

- (a) A court of this State [has] shall have temporary emergency jurisdiction if the child is present in this State and the child has been abandoned or it is necessary in an emergency to protect the child because [the]:
- (1) The child, or a sibling or parent of the child, is subjected to or threatened with mistreatment or abuse [.]; or

(2) The child has been unable to obtain genderaffirming health care services.

This language plainly redefines a custody "emergency" to mean "unable to obtain genderaffirming health care services."

The rewriting of this uniform, nationwide custody law also undermines and threatens Hawaii's participation in the UCCJEA. The whole point of our Uniform Child Custody Jurisdiction Enforcement Act is uniformity. If Hawaii passes SB1150 and stops returning children to other states, we risk being unable to secure the return of any Hawaii child who is taken out of state to pursue a custody battle.

The court that prevails in exercising jurisdiction first, usually maintains jurisdiction for the rest of the case, both practically and statistically speaking. Under the proposed language from SB1150, once 'emergency jurisdiction' is sought and approved by the Hawaii Family Court, several critical timelines begin to toll for the legal residency of the child to determine which court will have the ultimate say in final custody determinations.

The next phase is the so-called 'temporary orders' hearing. This section of SB1150 creates another loophole that can be easily exploited by a motivated kidnapper to keep a stolen child for longer than the short-term 'emergency jurisdiction' alone would allow.

The loophole specifically reads:

(d) The presence of a child in this State for the purpose of obtaining gender-affirming health care services shall be sufficient to meet the requirements of subsection (a)(2)."

Subsection (a)(2) governs what a court must do when the child is not clearly a legal resident of the State.

The UCCJEA prohibits this kind of abuse of temporary placement - as the original language of (a)(2) along with requirements (A) & (B) below shows us:

§583A-201 Initial child-custody jurisdiction.

(a) Except as otherwise provided in section 583A-204, a court of this State shall have jurisdiction to make an initial child-custody determination only if: ...

- (1) This State is the home state of the child ...or...
- (2) A court of another state does not have jurisdiction under paragraph (1), or a court of the home state of the child has declined to exercise jurisdiction on the ground that this State is the more appropriate forum under section 583A-207 or 583A-208, and:
- (A) The child and the child's parents, or the child and at least one parent or a person acting as a parent, have a significant connection with this State other than mere physical presence; and
- (B) Substantial evidence is available in this State concerning the child's care, protection, training, and personal relationships;...

Under the proposed language from SB1150, these UCCJEA requirements are magically deemed "satisfied" and replaced—by using three magic words: "Gender Affirming Care", if the child is from a state that has sex-change laws deemed insufficient by Hawaii and/or the natural parents are not providing sex-change 'treatments.' The kidnapper—who may be a non-relative— is treated by the Hawaii Family Court like a good Samaritan who will be granted temporary custody of a child stolen from his or her biological parents. No recourse nor due process is available for the affected victims and their families in their home state.

This bill goes to great lengths to enable outrageous practices across state lines. It aims to build long-term and short-term cases against parents who are otherwise perfectly fit - solely based on their sex-change viewpoint and/or the laws of their state. It allows any motivated adult to kidnap children with impunity from any state deemed insufficient in its sex-change laws.

In the recent <u>Geanna Bradley torture-murder case</u>, her legal guardians allegedly exploited telehealth for months or even years to hide their alleged torture of Geanna. Yet SB1150 allows telehealth practitioners to prescribe sex-change hormones to juveniles:

- §329- Prescriptions; gender-affirming health care services. (a) Notwithstanding this chapter or any other law to the contrary, for the purposes of providing genderaffirming health care services, a practitioner who is licensed in this State may prescribe schedule III and IV controlled substances, including testosterone:
  - (1) While the practitioner is located outside the State; and

(2) Without conducting an inpersonconsultation with the patient; provided that the practitioner shall prescribe the controlled substances via a synchronous audio-visual telehealth interaction

According to the text, a single telehealth Zoom call is all it would take: after that, upon filing a petition to exercise emergency jurisdiction to a Hawaii court, instantly, the kidnapping of any child legally becomes a civil case and no longer open to prosecution as a criminal matter - denying victims and their families the help of federal or state law enforcement to return their children before permanent harm is done, and also forcing the out-of-state family to travel to Hawaii to be present for hearings. If the kidnapper has a long enough head-start and the family doesn't suspect them, by the time they find out what is happening, it could already be too late.

In 2024, <u>testimony</u> in support of <u>HB2079</u> came from Oregon-based QueerDoc.com which describes itself as, "a telemedicine-based gender affirming clinic." QueerDoc arrogantly announces, "the medicine and science are not up for debate" and enthuses about 100s of mainland telehealth practitioners who "can issue a prescription for estrogen, progesterone, and testosterone blocking medications at that telehealthappointment."

Far from unbiased, QueerDoc has an agenda for our children. The clinic was founded by an MD who describes <u>herself</u> as "they" <u>and on her website touts</u> "lived experience as a nonbinary femme and are SUPER queer themself, enjoying queer burlesque, vintage fashion, and their queer, kinky, poly family!"

If the home state claims the child was kidnapped and attempts to escalate a criminal case - the bill's authors, disgustingly, have thought of that possibility too:

§323J-6 Denial of demands for surrender. Notwithstanding any provision of chapter 832 to the contrary, the governor shall deny any demand made by the executive authority of any state for the surrender of any person charged with a crime under the laws of that state when the alleged crime involves [the provision or receipt of,]:

(1) Seeking, receiving, paying for, or [assistance with,] inquiring about reproductive health care services[,] or gender-affirming health care services;

- (2) Providing or responding to an inquiry about reproductive health care services or gender-affirming health care services;
- (3) Assisting or aiding or abetting in any of the conduct described in paragraph (1) or (2); or
- (4) Attempting or intending to engage in or providing material support for (or any other theory of vicarious, attempt, joint, several, or conspiracy liability derived therefrom) conduct described in paragraphs (1) to (3),"
- *§323J-7 Laws contrary to the public policy of this State.*
- (a) A law of another state authorizing a civil action or criminal prosecution based on any of the following [is] shall be declared to be contrary to the public policy of this State:
- (1) [Receiving, seeking, or] Seeking, receiving, paying for, or inquiring about reproductive health care services[;] or gender-affirming health care services that are lawful under the laws of this State;
- (2) Providing or responding to an inquiry about reproductive health care services[;] or genderaffirming health care services that are lawful under the laws of this State;
- (3) [Engaging in conduct that assists or aids or abets the provision or receipt of reproductive health care services;] Assisting or aiding or abetting in any of the conduct described in paragraph (1) or (2); or
- (4) Attempting or intending to engage in or providing material support for (or any other theory of vicarious, attempt, joint, several, or conspiracy liability derived therefrom) conduct described in paragraphs (1) to (3)[,in accordance with the laws of this State].

SB1150 would forbid the entire State of Hawaii, including the Governor, from disclosing records or extraditing any kidnapper charged in another state, so long as the kidnapper alleges that the purpose of taking the child was to provide access to gender affirming care. It would forbid the courts from returning any child kidnapped from their home state under these auspices by nullifying any direct criminal charges. The authoritarian bill even forbids sending any information about whether the child has been subjected to life-changing procedures, like

sex-change surgeries, even if the biological parents obtained help from the other states' Governors, or if other authorities were to make formal legal demands. It would leave out-of-state parents completely in the dark and at the mercy of distant kangaroo courts. It even forbids the extradition of anyone charged with a crime in connection with 'helping a child to receive Gender Affirming Care', granting effective immunity for the actions of interstate kidnappers, so long as those actions are claimed to be in service of helping the child access Gender Affirming Care, even if they are wanted fugitives for those acts in another state.

Please let that sink in for a moment.

The Hawaii Kidnapping Bill also makes it a crime to interfere with the kidnappers or to disclose any data about the 'Gender Affirming Care' with anyone other than the kidnapper-petitioner, even if ordered by another court.

All this is predicated on nothing more than a single telehealth Zoom call as 'evidence' for the life-changing decision of an interstate judicial child custody determination.

It mandates nondisclosure by every last 'mandatory reporter' professional and care provider that could conceivably influence such a proceeding, placing a permanent professional gag order on whatever is done to the abducted children, no matter what authority or expert is doing the questioning.

It would be a crime under State law to comply with any oversight or investigation into the kidnappings from outside of Hawaii. Inside Hawaii, the situation would only be different if the family consented to give their children sex-changes; if not, then the provisions, when taken together, may form a direct bar to anyone requesting this information for any purpose contrary to promoting access to Gender Affirming Care. (The most relevant sections on this inquiry include: §323J-2, §323J-3, §323J-4, §451J-12). It appears that any family in Hawaii who does not consent to such care would not have access to records.

The authors of the Hawaii Kidnapping Bill have made a very distinct legislative package designed to facilitate abusive behavior. If it passes, the odds of an out-of-state family ever getting their child back from Hawaii legally would be slim. This law provides for atrocities against vulnerable, trafficked minors - with no legal protection or recourse for defendants and victims, and full protection for the perpetrators.



# SENATE BILL 1150, RELATING TO HEALTH CARE

FEBRUARY 11, 2025 · HHS/CPN HEARING

**POSITION:** Support.

**RATIONALE:** The Democratic Party of Hawai'i Education Caucus <u>supports</u> SB 1150, relating to health care, which expands the protections established under Act 2, SLH 2023, to include genderaffirming care services; and clarifies jurisdiction under the Uniform Child-Custody Jurisdiction and Enforcement Act for cases involving children who obtain gender-affirming health care services.

**Gender-affirming care is health care.** In recent weeks, the Trump administration has issued multiple executive orders targeting the rights of LGBTQ+ individuals, including orders banning transgender service members from the military, moving transgender women back into men's prisons, denying passports with gender markers, blocking schools from requiring teachers and other school staff to use names and pronouns that align with transgender students' preferred gender identify rather than the sex they were assigned at birth, and defunding gender-affirming care for transgender youth.

These efforts fly in the face of decades of research supported by every major medical association. The American Psychiatric Association, for instance, released a statement in 2018 saying, "Significant and long-standing medical and psychiatric literature exists that demonstrates clear benefits of medical and surgical interventions to assist gender variant individuals seeking transition. Access to medical care (both medical and surgical) positively impacts the mental health of transgender and gender variant individuals." Similarly, the American Public Health Association issued a statement in 2017

asserting that the APHA "urges Congress and state legislatures to enact legislation to protect the

rights, legal benefits, and access to services of people of all gender identities and expressions."

For its part, the American Medical Association, the largest association of physicians and medical

students in the United States, has articulated its position on this issue on multiple occasions, most

recently in 2023, when it said that the AMA "recognizes that treatments for gender dysphoria and

gender incongruence are medically necessary" and that the organization "will work with stakeholders

to advocate for laws and policies that protect access to care, oppose laws and policies that impede

the provision of care, support protections against liability for physicians and institutions who provide

care and patients who seek it, communicate about the importance of gender-affirming care, and

advocate for coverage of gender-affirming care by public and private health insurers."

Sadly, our society has seen a surge in far-right organizations and states attempting to ban gender-

affirming care, arguing that being transgender is an "ideology." As the Human Rights Campaign has

stated, "These proponents have perpetrated a concerted disinformation campaign that has fueled not

only discriminatory laws, but also threats and violence against providers of gender-affirming care." As

conservative states continue seeking access to patient data in an effort to not only suppress the right

of transgender individuals to receive gender-affirming care, but eliminate transgender people's

existence within our country altogether, it is imperative that Hawai'i takes a strong stand to reaffirm

the islands as a sanctuary for gender-affirming care and transgender rights, including by establishing

a shield law for patients and medical providers who seek and provide gender-affirming care.

On February 4<sup>th</sup>, Attorney General Anne Lopez joined a coalition of fourteen attorneys general to

reaffirm their pledge to protect access to gender-affirming care. The coalition released the following

statement: "As state attorneys general, we stand firmly in support of healthcare policies that respect

the dignity and rights of all people. Health care decisions should be made by patients, families and

doctors, not by a politician trying to restrict freedoms. Gender-affirming care is essential, lifesaving

medical treatment that supports individuals in living as their authentic selves."

Let's follow the coalition's lead, oppose fearmongering and discrimination, and enshrine the right to

gender-affirming care for our transgender community in state law.

SB 1150, RELATING TO HEALTH CARE

FEBRUARY 11, 2025 · HHS/CPN HEARING

**POSITION:** Support.

**RATIONALE:** Imua Alliance <u>supports</u> SB 1150, relating to health care, which expands the protections established under Act 2, SLH 2023, to include gender-affirming health care services; and clarifies jurisdiction under the Uniform Child-Custody Jurisdiction and Enforcement Act for cases involving children who obtain gender-affirming health care services.

Everyone deserves access to the medical care they need. This includes gender-affirming care for transgender individuals. The Trump administration signed an executive order on January 28, 2025 that aims to block access to gender-affirming care for children and young adults. The order seeks to cut off federal funding from institutions that provide hormone therapy, puberty blockers, and surgical treatment for people under 19.

Washington, Oregon, and Minnesota have already filed lawsuits opposing the order. According to the three states, the order particularly targets medical care that is recommended for gender dysphoria, when a person's internal sense of gender identity conflicts with their sex assigned at birth. The lawsuit calls the order "cruel and baseless," and accuses the executive branch of "attempts to dictate medical care by executive fiat." The states argue that the order violates the Fifth Amendment's equal protection guarantee by singling out transgender individuals for discrimination.

On February 4<sup>th</sup>, Attorney General Anne Lopez joined a coalition of fourteen attorneys general to reaffirm their pledge to protect access to gender-affirming care. The coalition released the following statement: "As state attorneys general, we stand firmly in support of healthcare policies that respect

the dignity and rights of all people. Health care decisions should be made by patients, families and doctors, not by a politician trying to restrict freedoms. Gender-affirming care is essential, lifesaving medical treatment that supports individuals in living as their authentic selves."

The World Medical Association (WMA), an international group representing physicians from 114 National Medical Associations, states: "The WMA emphasizes that everyone has the right to determine one's own gender and recognizes the diversity of possibilities in this respect. The WMA calls for physicians to uphold each individual's right to self-identification with regard to gender...The WMA urges that every effort be made to make individualized, multi-professional, interdisciplinary, and affordable transgender healthcare (including speech therapy, hormonal treatment, surgical interventions and mental healthcare) available to all people who experience gender incongruence in order to reduce or to prevent pronounced gender dysphoria."

In a coordinated push led by national anti-LGBTQ+ hate groups, legislators across the country have overridden the recommendations of the views of the medical establishment and introduced hundreds of bills that target transgender, non-binary, and gender-expansive youth's access to age-appropriate, medically necessary care. By preventing doctors from providing care or threatening to take children away from parents who support their child in their transition, these efforts prevent transgender, non-binary, and gender-expansive youth from accessing medically necessary, safe health care backed by decades of research and supported by every major medical association representing over 1.3 million US doctors, according to the Human Rights Campaign.

LGBTQ+ youth, who comprise an estimated 40 percent of the runaway and homeless youth population in the United States, are exponentially more likely to fall prey to human traffickers because of discrimination, family and community trauma, and a longing for comfort and acceptance (an estimated 26 percent of LGBTQ+ adolescents are rejected by their families and put out of their homes simply for being open and honest about who they are). In providing care for victims of human trafficking, we have heard their stories hundreds of times. Eliminating access to gender-affirming care only worsens this cycle of alienation and abuse. On the other hand, enshrining access into state law is s step toward ensuring that transgender youth can receive the care they need to live meaningful, fulfilling, and healthy lives.

The Hawai'i Public Health Institute, <sup>1</sup> supports SB 1150, relating to health care. This bill expands the protections established under Act 2, SLH 2023, to include gender-affirming health care services.

### **Gender-Affirming Care Promotes Overall Wellness**

A 2022 study by Stanford University School of Medicine found that positive mental health outcomes were higher for transgender people who accessed hormone replacement therapy as teenagers.<sup>2</sup> Moreover, a review of 53 studies published in the Journal of Gay & Lesbian Mental Health found that after receiving gender-affirming care, depression, anxiety, suicidality, suicide attempts, and gender dysphoria were significantly reduced.<sup>3</sup>

### **Support from Health Organizations**

In 2016, the American Public Health Association (APHA) released a statement entitled "Promoting Transgender and Gender Minority Health through Inclusive Policies and Practices" that states, in part, that the APHA "urges Congress and state legislatures to enact legislation to protect the rights, legal benefits, and access to services of people of all gender identities and expressions."

Moreover, the American Psychological Association's (APA) Policy Statement on Affirming Evidence-Based Inclusive Care for Transgender, Gender Diverse, and Nonbinary Individuals, Addressing Misinformation, and the Role of Psychological Practice and Science asserts that "the APA underscores the necessity for access to comprehensive, gender-affirming healthcare for transgender, gender-diverse, and nonbinary children, adolescents, and adults." <sup>5</sup>

### **Attorney General Statement**

On February 4, 2025, Hawai'i Attorney General Anne Lopez joined a coalition of 14 attorneys general to reaffirm their commitment to protect access to gender-affirming care. In a publicly released statement the coalition noted, "As state attorneys general, we stand firmly in support of healthcare policies that respect the dignity and rights of all people. Health care decisions should be made by patients, families and doctors, not by a politician trying to restrict freedoms. Gender-affirming care is essential, lifesaving medical treatment that supports individuals in living as their authentic selves."

Across the nation, we are witnessing sweeping efforts to restrict access to gender-affirming care for transgender individuals, including a presidential executive order that would end federal funding to medical institutions that provide gender-affirming care. In response, our state has an obligation to protect the fundamental right to health care for the LGBTQ+ community, as well as the patients and medical practitioners who seek and provide such care.

Because of the national climate, gender affirming care providers and patients alike are living in fear of being criminally prosecuted by hostile states. In 2023 and 2024, we saw numerous states ban gender affirming care for both minors and adults, and this year, we are seeing attacks from the federal government. # TESTIMONY IN SUPPORT OF HB1150 – RELATING TO GENDER AFFIRMING CARE February 11, 2025, 9:45 AM Conference Room 229, Hawaii State Capitol

Aloha, Chair San Buenaventura, Chair Keohokalole, and Honorable Members of the Senate Committees on Health and Human Services and Consumer Protection:

The Hawai'i Nurses' Association – OPEIU Local 50 is affiliated with the AFL-CIO, was founded in 1917, and represents 4,000 nurses & health care professionals in the State of Hawai'i. We appreciate the opportunity to testify today in <u>strong support</u> of SB1150 and to share our concerns regarding the broader national implications of restricting gender-affirming care.

## **Protecting Patients' Right to Evidence-Based Care**

The Hawaii Nurses' Association is committed to ensuring that every patient has access to compassionate, evidence-based healthcare. Gender-affirming care is recognized by leading medical organizations—including the American Medical Association and the World Professional Association for Transgender Health—as a medically necessary treatment for transgender and gender diverse individuals. It is vital for the physical, mental, and emotional well-being of these patients.

A national ban on gender-affirming care would not only limit access to essential services but would also infringe on patients' fundamental right to receive appropriate and individualized care. Denying gender-affirming treatment risks exacerbating health disparities and may lead to increased rates of mental health challenges, such as anxiety, depression, and suicidal ideation among transgender patients. By impeding access to care, such legislation would undermine the progress made in supporting the health and dignity of all individuals.

# **Implications for Nursing Practice and Licensure**

Equally concerning are the professional ramifications for nurses. Our practice is built on a foundation of ethical commitment to patient-centered care and adherence to evidence-based standards. Should a national ban on gender-affirming care be imposed, nurses who provide this care in alignment with current professional guidelines could find themselves in a precarious position. They might be forced to choose between fulfilling their ethical duty to their patients and complying with new legal constraints that contradict established medical practice.

This conflict is not only detrimental to patient outcomes but also poses a direct threat to the professional integrity and licensure of nurses. Imagine a scenario where a nurse, acting in the best interests of a patient, provides gender-affirming care only to face potential disciplinary action or even the loss of their professional license. Such a risk is unacceptable and fundamentally incompatible with the principles of nursing practice. Nurses must be free to practice in accordance with evidence-based guidelines without the fear of legal repercussions that compromise their ability to advocate for their patients.

#### A Call to Action

- 1. **Recognize the Critical Role of Gender-Affirming Care:** Ensure that any policies or legislation support patient access to medically necessary care and protect the clinical judgment of healthcare providers.
- 2. **Safeguard Nursing Practice:** Prevent any national mandates that would force nurses to choose between ethical, evidence-based practice and compliance with laws that restrict patient care, thereby protecting both patient rights and nurses' professional licenses.
- 3. **Promote Policies Grounded in Science:** Advocate for legislative measures that are informed by current medical research and the collective expertise of healthcare professionals, ensuring that all patients receive the care they need.

The Hawaii Nurses' Association stands firmly with our patients and our nursing professionals. We believe that upholding the right to gender-affirming care is essential not only for the health of transgender individuals but also for the integrity of our healthcare system. We respectfully request that this committee consider these critical issues as you deliberate on SB1150. Our collective goal must be to ensure that all patients receive the highest standard of care, and that nurses are empowered to practice without fear of punitive repercussions when they deliver evidence-based treatment.

As an organization dedicated to protecting children and strengthening families, we believe that parents should be the first and foremost educators of their children. No law should create a system that purposely excludes them from crucial decisions affecting their child's well-being. We all agree that any policy impacting <a href="minors">minors</a>—especially those involving medical interventions and early childhood education—must be grounded in scientific evidence, ethical considerations, and the best interests of our keiki. Unfortunately, research does not support promoting gender ideology or medical transitions for minors.

#### Research does not support medical interventions for gender-confused minors'.

Medical interventions such as puberty blockers, cross-sex hormones, and surgeries are experimental and lack long-term safety studies. The FDA has not approved puberty blockers for gender dysphoria, and European countries (such as Sweden, Finland, and the UK) have reversed or restricted their use due to safety concerns. Our concern is that minors lack the maturity to consent to irreversible medical procedures that will have lifelong consequences. Allowing minors to make these decisions without parental consent is not only poor public policy but also a threat to family unity.

<u>Our bottom line is that parents—not schools or policymakers—should be the primary educators</u> on moral and sensitive topics concerning gender and sexuality.

#### Medical transition has not been shown to reduce youth suicides.

Advocates often claim that medical transition is necessary to prevent youth suicide, but peer-reviewed studies contradict this claim. In fact, quite the opposite may be true. Swedish longitudinal studies found that individuals who underwent medical transition had higher suicide rates compared to the general population. That means any promise made in saying that medical transition would resolve any mental health struggles is both misleading and dangerous, as gender dysphoria is often linked to other psychological conditions.

# Childhood gender dysphoria usually resolves by adulthood. iii

There is research that shows that 80-95% of children with gender dysphoria eventually accept their biological sex by adulthood if not affirmed in a transgender identity. Psychologists recognize that gender confusion in children is often a phase, influenced by emotional development, peer relationships, and societal factors. Public policy should never encourage social and medical transitions that prevent a natural resolution while pushing our keiki toward unnecessary medicalization.

# The dramatic increase in gender dysphoria is likely being driven by social factorsiv.

In the past decade, cases of gender dysphoria have surged, especially among adolescent girls, a demographic not historically affected. Studies suggest social contagion and peer influence play a significant role in this rise, as online communities and social media promote transgender identities. We must be cautious and strongly hesitant of any attempt to ignore social influences or rush to medical interventions without understanding the broader context.

# Sex education for early elementary school children, including transgender ideology, has not been shown by research to be beneficial.

No scientific research supports the claim that introducing young children to transgender ideology improves mental health or well-being. Early exposure to complex gender concepts can cause confusion and distress in young minds.

In closing, it is our moral and societal responsibility to protect vulnerable keiki from experimental medical procedures and ideologies. We must work together to ensure that policies affecting minors are based on truth, compassion, and the best available research—not on ideological pressure or social trends.

Dear Chairs San Buenaventura and Keohokalole, Vice Chairs Aquino and Fukunaga and Members of the Committees:

The American Civil Liberties Union of Hawai'i ("ACLU of Hawai'i") writes in **support of SB1150**. This bill expands protections established under ACT 2, Session Laws of Hawaii 2023, to include gender-affirming health care services and clarifies jurisdiction under the Uniform Child-Custody Jurisdiction and Enforcement Act for cases involving children who obtain gender-affirming health care services.

The ACLU of Hawai'i is committed to defending LGBTQ+ individuals and their right to necessary health care services. We also believe in principles of federalism, which gives states the right to rely on its Constitution and enact laws to more expansively protect the civil rights and liberties of its residents. It also means that another State cannot force the State of Hawai'i to enforce its laws that are contrary to the public policy of Hawai'i.

Each person has the right to bodily autonomy and bodily integrity. *Medical decisions should* be left to individuals and their doctors. Patients and their doctors should be trusted to make private medical decisions, not politicians. Every family should have the freedom to love and support their child, transgender or not. Gender-affirming care is a critical part of helping transgender adolescents succeed in school, establish healthy relationships with their friends and family, and live authentically as themselves.

Transgender youth who are affirmed in their gender by their families do better in school, feel safer in their communities, establish healthy relationships with their parents and peers, and are better equipped to plan for their future. In contrast, denying them this support increases their likelihood of dropping out of school, increases their risk for substance use, worsens symptoms of depression and anxiety, and gravely increases their risk for suicide.

**SB1150** not only protects young individuals and their parents from other state jurisdictions from being separated based on the laws of those other states, this bill also provides for and protects the right to "medically necessary health care that respects the gender identity of the patient, as experienced and defined by the patient." This includes mental and behavioral health care.

The legal landscape across too much of the country is changing in harmful ways; as a result, many of our fundamental rights, dearly held and relied upon for generations, are being called into question.

The Executive Order that President Trump issued on January 28, 2025, directing all federal agencies to "immediately take appropriate steps to ensure that institutions receiving Federal research education grants end" gender affirming medical care for people under nineteen has an openly discriminatory purpose. Its effect is to prevent transgender people from expressing a gender identity different from their sex designated at birth—and expressing governmental disapproval of transgender people who, by definition, have a gender identity that does not align with their sex designated at birth.

These Orders are part of a government-wide effort by the Trump Administration to restrict legal protections and essential services for the transgender community. These orders contravene the State of Hawai'i's strong commitment to the protection of civil rights. **Article I, Section 5 of the Hawai'i Constitution provides that "no person shall be denied the enjoyment of civil rights or be discriminated against in the exercise thereof because of race, religion, sex or ancestry."** 

Let's be clear – these discriminatory orders taken at the federal level are already having a chilling effect on the transgender community and their allies. People are scared, and they need to know that they will be protected if they continue to exercise their right to necessary medical care for themselves or their families.

We appreciate the legislature's commitment to safeguarding medically necessary treatments and upholding freedom from unjustified government intrustions into bodily autonomy, a core liberty interest protected by due process.

Aloha Chair Keohokalole, Chair San Buenaventura, Vice Chair Fukunaga, Vice Chair Aquino, and Members of the Committee,

Lambda Law Hawai'i, a Law Student Association at the William S. Richardson School of Law, at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa, strongly supports SB1150. This bill expands the protections established under Act 2 of 2023 to include gender-affirming healthcare services. It also clarifies Hawai'i jurisdiction for child custody and child enforcement act cases for children whose parents choose to authorize gender affirming care (GAC) for their keiki. Finally, it protects healthcare providers who provide GAC from professional licensing penalties incurred in states who are hostile to such care.

Gender affirming care covers a wide range of practices that are medically sound and supported by experts as best practice for many people, including trans and nonbinary children and adults, but also encompassing cis children and adults. The negative rhetoric that has been building against GAC, which has been unfortunately imported into Hawai'i as of late, is unfounded and biased against trans people, who are a minority in our population. We must ensure that this life-saving care is not criminalized in the Aloha State, and that parents who choose to allow their children to pursue this care (as well as doctors who provide this care) will not be subject to the punitive and cruel laws of other states.

This bill would not force anyone to engage in any health care practices they disagree with, nor would it impose any obligations on parents, healthcare providers, or children to do anything they aren't already doing. This bill simply protects a vulnerable population facing attacks from other states, and shields those who support them from criminalization and other penalization as other jurisdictions attempt to reach into our own for such purposes.

No matter what the current U.S. President says, trans and nonbinary people are here to stay, and we deserve and must be guaranteed access to the medicines and practices that we require to live happy and healthy lives. Let us continue to be a leader in materially respecting the dignity of all the people of Hawai'i, including māhū, fa'afafine, bakla, and LGBTQ+ people who make our communities that much stronger.

It has become clear that extremists across the nation have made it their priority to target women and members of the LGBTQIA+ community by stripping away their rights, especially access to health care.

Dozens of states across the nation have either passed or are considering passing laws prohibiting gender affirming health care to people of ALL AGES. These laws target providers and recipients, making it a criminal offense to provide gender affirming care. My name is Dr. Casandra Simonson MD FAAP and I am testifying on my own behalf and not representing anyone else. I have been a community pediatrician serving Native Hawaiian and underserved keiki in Maui for over 10 years and here today to talk to you about the importance of supporting SB1150.

Teenagers can be hard to talk to. It's a lot of shrugs and "ums", and "huhs"? But sometimes my patient is a teenager with a secret. Sometimes it is a boy with a secret suitcase of women's clothing ready and waiting for when they turn 18. Sometimes it's a transgender teen whose father is in the military. A teen who told me her Dad would hurt her, badly, if he ever found out. According to some, I am the one hurting children, mutilating them without their parents' consent. Not only can I not do that, I can't do anything without both parent's or guardian's consent. Many parents choose to try to help their child. That is their right and in my opinion as a pediatrician, it is the right choice. Gender affirming care is about safety. There are people suffering, hiding, waiting for escape. Some only find escape by suicide.

Being transgender isn't contagious. Being transgender doesn't hurt anyone else. Transgender care is between the patient, their family, and their doctor and no one else.

We have the opportunity in Hawaii to be a safe place, a strong place, an independent place. We have a chance to reflect on our values. The state should protect and respect parents right to seek care for their children. In the future, when people look back on this time in dismay and disbelief, supporting SB1150 will ensure your voting record be on the right side of history.

Unlike what opponents of this bill might say, this bill does not authorize surgeries on minors, it does not allow children to be removed from their families, and it does not force anyone to transition or "make" anyone transgender.

Through SB1150, parents, guardians, and medical providers will be empowered to make informed, compassionate decisions for their keiki without fear of retaliation or legal threats from other states. Parents in Hawai'i will be safeguarded from out-of-state courts attempting to interfere with their decisions regarding medical care for their children—decisions made under the supervision of licensed healthcare and legal professionals in Hawai'i.

Individual medical records belong to that individual. This bill expands protections to keep Hawai'i residents' healthcare information private and secure from external entities. Doctors and healthcare professionals practicing in Hawai'i will be shielded from punitive actions by other states when delivering care that aligns with Hawai'i's laws. This bill safeguards the cultural heritage of Pasifika Islanders, who have long embraced gender diversity, from external pressures to conform to western gender-binary "ideals". This is about stopping the erosion of indigenous cultural values—another form of colonization.

**IATSE 665 strongly supports SB1150. We urge your committee to do the same.** Thank you for the opportunity to testify.

On behalf of our organization, Kumukahi Health + Wellness, I am writing in strong support of the Health Care Access Protection Act, which ensures that all individuals in Hawai'i have access to gender-affirming health care without fear of discrimination or legal repercussions. This bill upholds our state's values of inclusion, bodily autonomy, and respect for all individuals.

Gender-affirming care (GAC) encompasses a range of medical, mental health, and social services that support transgender and non-binary individuals in living authentically. It includes but is not limited to counseling, hormone therapy, puberty blockers (for adolescents), and, in some cases, surgery. All major U.S. medical and mental health organizations (e.g., American Medical Association, American Academy of Pediatrics) recognize GAC as medically necessary and evidence-based.

Our organization is the only dedicated neighbor island gender affirming clinic on the neighbor islands, which opened in 2021 in Hilo and Kona. We opened because we heard the need for medical services on island. Many Hawai'i Island residents could not fly to O'ahu for gender affirming care and were turning to non-medical grade hormonal drugs that they got from friends or the internet. With the current anti-transgender executive orders, our patients are once again talking about stockpiling medication, going underground for medication, or completely stopping in fear of being targeted by the law. TG women experience higher incidence of HIV & STIs (UNAIDS, 2020) because of these survival methods. This is why we support GAC in our clinic:

#### **Evidence-Based Standards**

- GAC follows well-established clinical guidelines, such as those from the World Professional Association for Transgender Health (WPATH) and the Endocrine Society (Coleman et al., 2022).
- Treatment decisions are individualized, often requiring assessments from multiple healthcare professionals (mental health providers, endocrinologists, and surgeons as applicable).

#### Positive Health Outcomes

- Studies link access to GAC with reduced depression, anxiety, and suicidality among transgender and non-binary individuals (Almazan & Keuroghlian, 2021; Tordoff et al., 2022).

- Hormone therapy is prescribed after thorough evaluation, and its benefits include alignment of physical traits with one's gender identity.

#### **Policy Implications**

- Restricting access to GAC can worsen mental health outcomes, especially for youth'
- Supporting policies that protect and expand coverage for GAC can reduce discrimination and improve health equity.

Gender-affirming care (GAC) for minors involves a range of supportive, evidence-based treatments—such as counseling, social transition, puberty blockers, and, in some cases, hormone therapy—aimed at alleviating gender dysphoria and promoting overall well-being. All major U.S. medical organizations, including the American Medical Association and the American Academy of Pediatrics, recognize the necessity of age-appropriate, individualized care for transgender and non-binary youth.

In the Hawai'i YRBS Report 2019, Hawai'i County had the highest population of young people identify as LGBTQ+, with 2.1% high school students and 1.9% of middle school students that identify as transgender or non-binary. At Kumukahi, we have had so many parents calling us, concerned for their child who was suicidal because they were not getting support in their identity journey. They report other parents and schoolmates calling them "butchie," "mahu," or "sissy," and they are desperate to help their child to get behavioral and medical support to they need. We know that TG youth are less likely to live in the family home and TG people are more likely to not continue education, use injection drugs, and experience sexual and physical abuse (DOH Sexual and Gender Minority Health Report, 2020). This data demonstrates a need

for a program aimed directly at improving the quality of life for this vulnerable group. This is why we support GAC in our clinic:

#### Improved Mental Health

- Research consistently shows that minors receiving timely GAC experience reduced rates
  of depression, anxiety, and suicidal ideation (Tordoff et al., 2022).
- Early support during adolescence fosters healthier social development and overall quality of life (Chong et al., 2021).

#### **Puberty Blockers**

- Safe, reversible treatments that temporarily pause puberty, allowing youth time to explore their identity without permanent physical changes (Coleman et al., 2022).
- Studies have found that access to puberty blockers correlates with decreased suicidality among transgender youth (McEwing, 2020).

#### **Evidence-Based Guidelines**

- Standards of care from the World Professional Association for Transgender Health (WPATH) and the Endocrine Society outline best practices for minors at different stages of development (WPATH, 2022).
- These guidelines emphasize thorough assessments by interdisciplinary care teams, mental health providers, and family involvement.

#### Long-Term Benefits

- Early interventions can prevent negative health outcomes later in life, including chronic depression, anxiety, and suicidality (Tordoff et al., 2022).
- Consistent, supportive care empowers youth to thrive academically, socially, and emotionally.

#### **Policy Implications**

- Restrictive legislation limiting minors' access to GAC can exacerbate health disparities and psychosocial risks (White Hughto et al., 2015).
- Policymakers can support minors by advocating for insurance coverage, funding healthcare professional training, and safeguarding the right to access age-appropriate treatments.

We, in Hawai'i, have a long-standing history of protecting our diverse communities, and we do not need out-of-state policies determining what we know is best for our Hawai'i people. I urge you to pass this critical legislation and reaffirm our commitment to protecting our community members.

Testimony of Support on S.B. 1150

Chairs Keohokalole and San Buenaventura, Vice Chairs Fukunaga and Aquino, and members of the Committees: The Hawai'i State Center for Nursing (HSCN) supports the intent of this measure and provides testimony in support related to Section 10 and 11 as it relates to nursing practice and patient safety.

This measure expands the protections established under Act 2, SLH 2023, to include gender-affirming health care services. Section 10 and 11 in this measure enable the Hawai'i Board of Nursing to consider the context for which disciplinary action has been take on nurses with licenses in other states who are applying for or licensed in Hawai'i.

Protecting healthcare providers who perform legal, safe, evidence-based healthcare from out-of-state or interstate investigation due to political disagreements is an important action which aids in recruiting and retaining our local healthcare providers. This measure codifies statutes to be consistent with the current, evidence-based practice standards. In addition, this measure aims to protect patients' access to care that is established in law in Hawai'i, as well as protect the qualified healthcare providers who offer these healthcare services.

The Legislature is a critical part of ensuring our state has access to healthcare providers. States that have enacted supportive laws for healthcare providers see growth in the number of healthcare professionals in their state, particularly in rural and shortage areas.¹ Conversely, when states enact laws that impede a provider's ability to provide safe, timely, evidence-based healthcare, it can lead to healthcare "deserts" in which providers leave the practice, region, or state.² The impact is that patients lose access to care.

Thank you for your attention to this matter. While HSCN takes no position on the substance of this measure, HSCN appreciates the opportunity to comment on the content pertaining to nurses.

Aloha Chair, Vice Chair, and Members of the Committee,

I am writing today in strong support of the proposed bill, SB1150, to expand the protections established under Act 2, SLH 2023, to include gender-affirming health care services. This expansion is not just necessary—it is critical to ensuring that all individuals, regardless of gender identity, receive the compassionate, respectful, and affirming care they deserve.

Today, I work closely with LGBTQ+ youth through Spill the Tea Café as a Master's Social Work Intern. Spill the Tea Café is a space dedicated to providing a safe and affirming environment for young people in our community. According to the Hawai'i Department of Health (2024), data on the health of sexual and gender minority high school students revealed that 1 in 20 local high school students identify as lesbian, gay, or bisexual, and 1 in 10 local students are questioning their orientation. Connecting these numbers with the 500+ youth we serve, our commitment to providing trauma-informed and gender-affirming care in our practices makes a world of difference to the youth we support. Many of our teens have faced rejection, discrimination, and systemic barriers that prevent them from accessing the care and support they need. At Spill the Tea Café, they find a place where they are seen, respected, and embraced for who they are. They share stories of relief and empowerment—of finally having a space where they are not just tolerated but celebrated.

In both my professional and personal life, I have witnessed firsthand the harm caused by inadequate and insensitive health care. I cannot stress enough the importance of this legislation. About ten years ago, when I was in high school, I had a close friend who struggled immensely within the healthcare system. Every doctor's visit was problematic—misgendering, invasive questioning and a fundamental lack of recognition of their identity were routine experiences. Rather than receiving the care they needed, they were met with scrutiny and judgment. Their physical and mental well-being suffered because the very system designed to care for them instead became a source of distress. From my friend's experience a decade ago to the current teens at Spill the Tea Café, this is not an isolated incident—it is a reality for far too many.

This bill is about more than just policy; it is about saving lives. Gender-affirming health care should not be controversial—it is evidence-based, life-saving care that ensures individuals can live authentically and with dignity. Expanding protections will not only improve health outcomes but also send a powerful message that Hawai'i values all of its residents, including transgender and non-binary individuals.

I urge you to support this bill and take a stand for gender-affirming care. Let's ensure that no one has to endure the harm our teens are experiencing, and let's continue fostering spaces where all LGBTQ+ youth can thrive.

My name is Christine Andrews and I am a resident of Wailuku, Maui. As a friend, family member, and ally of trans people, I submit this testimony today in strong SUPPORT of S.B. 1150, relating to health care.

I hope that the members of the Committees agree with me that every person has the fundamental right to access the health care they need without fear of discrimination, prejudice, or barriers to treatment that supports their mental, physical, and emotional well-being. Unfortunately, across the country right now, extreme politicians desperate to gain power are attacking the LGBTQ+ community, particularly transgender and non-binary youth, and weaponizing critical issues to rally support around anti-LGBTQ+ legislation. I ask that you act now to protect the people of Hawai'i from these escalating and harmful attacks.

The health care that transgender people need, sometimes referred to as gender-affirming care or transition-related care, is health care for transgender people of all ages. It includes a range of services, including mental health care, medical care, and social services. At all ages, clear, well-established, evidence-based standards of care exist. Gender-affirming care helps transgender and non-binary people live openly and authentically as their true selves. Just like any other form of health care, it also helps transgender and non-binary people live safe and healthy lives.

Gender-affirming care is treatment for a diagnosis of gender dysphoria, which impacts many transgender and non-binary people. Gender dysphoria happens when one's gender identity does not match their sex as assigned at birth. According to the Human Rights Campain, trans people's health care is always delivered in age-appropriate, evidence-based ways, and decisions to provide care are made in consultation with doctors and parents, just like health care for all other people. Collectively representing more than 1.3 million doctors across the United States, every major medical and mental health organization — including the American Medical Association, the American Academy of Pediatrics, and the American Psychological Association — recognizes that it is medically necessary to support people in affirming their gender identity.

Gender-affirming care for transgender people is best-practice, medically necessary health care. And research has consistently found that receipt of gender-affirming care can significantly improve the lives of people who receive it.

A recent study from the Trevor Project shows that transgender youth with access to hormone replacement therapy medications have lower rates of depression and are at a lower risk for suicide. A study by Stanford University School of Medicine found that positive mental health outcomes were higher for transgender people who accessed hormone replacement therapy medications as teenagers, versus those who accessed it as adults. A third study, published in the New England Journal of Medicine, found that two years after initiating hormone replacement therapy medications, transgender youth reported higher levels of life satisfaction and positive affect, and lower levels of gender dysphoria, depression, and anxiety. Previous studies have also found that transgender and non-binary youth who are able to receive puberty blockers report positive psychosocial impacts, including increased well-being and decreased depression. Other recent studies have found that receipt of puberty blockers can dramatically reduce risk of suicidality — in some cases by over 70% — among transgender youth, compared to those who were unable to access desired treatment.

Similar results have been seen for transgender adults: In two separate systematic reviews, one focused on 53 studies exploring mental health following gender-affirming surgeries, and the second focused on 29 studies exploring mental health impact across multiple forms of gender-affirming care, authors found that quality of life and happiness increased among trans adults following receipt of gender-affirming care, and depression, anxiety, suicidality, and suicide attempts, and gender dysphoria were reduced.

Previous studies have found that de-transitioning is quite rare —with some studies finding levels of de-transition and regret as low as 1% or 2%. Transgender youth who meet criteria for gender dysphoria and who undergo social or medical transition are actually the least likely to de-transition — and those vast majority of transgender youth remain consistent and persistent in their gender identity over time: One recent study, published in the academic journal Pediatrics, followed over 300 transgender youth after first initiating social transition, and found that over 92% remained consistent and persistent in their gender identity 5 years later. However, evidence-based standards of care exist to ensure that no one, regardless of their age, undergoes any permanent, irreversible changes without informed consent and careful consultation with medical and mental health care providers.

Based upon the foregoing, I request that you pass S.B. 1150 to help protect members of our Hawai`i community from attacks on their civil rights.

I am writing in strong support of SB1150, the Health Care Access Protection Act. I offer this testimony from my perspective as both a nursing professor at a local university and a practicing cardiac care nurse with ten years of bedside experience in both Hawaii and Portland, Oregon.

As a resident of Kaneohe and someone who has provided healthcare in multiple settings, I have witnessed firsthand how access to comprehensive healthcare, including genderaffirming care, profoundly impacts overall health outcomes. In my cardiac care practice, I have treated patients who delayed seeking necessary medical care due to concerns about acceptance and coverage of their complete healthcare needs. These delays often result in preventable hospitalizations and more severe cardiac complications - situations that could have been avoided with earlier intervention in an accepting and supportive healthcare environment.

My experience working in Portland, Oregon provided me with clear evidence of how streamlined access to comprehensive healthcare, including gender-affirming care, positively impacts community health. There, I observed efficient systems where comprehensive care teams could provide necessary treatments without insurance barriers. The contrast with Hawaii's current system highlights the critical need for this legislation.

Hawaii has a rich cultural history of acceptance and inclusion. Our islands have long recognized and celebrated gender diversity, as evidenced by the respected role of māhū individuals as cultural practitioners, healers, and leaders. This tradition of acceptance is beautifully displayed in cultural celebrations like the Merrie Monarch Festival. SB1150 aligns our healthcare policies with these deeply held cultural values of aloha and inclusion.

In my role educating the next generation of nurses, I strive to instill in my students an understanding of culturally competent care that honors all patients' dignity and identity. However, even the most compassionate healthcare providers cannot fully serve their patients when structural barriers, such as lack of insurance coverage, impede access to necessary care.

The consequences of delayed or denied care extend far beyond immediate health concerns. As a cardiac nurse, I have seen how the stress and anxiety of fighting for insurance coverage, combined with delayed treatment, can lead to deteriorating physical and mental health. When patients feel they must choose between financial stability and necessary medical care, we have failed them as a healthcare system.

This bill is particularly important as it protects families seeking healthcare, ensuring that Hawaii maintains jurisdiction in cases where families come here for gender-affirming care that may be restricted in other states. This aligns with our state's values and our commitment to protecting access to essential healthcare services.

The Health Care Access Protection Act represents an opportunity for Hawaii to demonstrate leadership in healthcare equity, building upon our cultural foundation of aloha and acceptance. By enacting this legislation, we would remove significant barriers to healthcare access and allow medical professionals to provide comprehensive care that aligns with current medical best practices.

Our state motto, "Ua Mau ke Ea o ka 'Āina i ka Pono" (The life of the land is perpetuated in righteousness), calls us to act with justice and compassion. I am writing in **strong support of SB1150**, which would help protect patients, providers, and families from out of state persecution, professional discipline, and separation when gender affirming care is received/provided in Hawaii to a resident of a state where such care may be unlawful. To penalize such providers such as myself and/or others from implementing such care will adversely affect the care we provide to Hawaii's most vulnerable along with the care our counterparts in the continent give their care as well.

# Thank You for your time and consideration,

My name is Patrick Faris, and I was born male in the Midwest in 1983. I have lived on the Big Island of Hawaii for the past decade. From a young age, I was drawn to feminine ideas. I could list instances of playing "Pretty Pretty Princess" or my natural feminine expressions in art, music, and dance. As I grew older, I realized these expressions were not considered normal within the limited binary of gender expression that our colonized mindset would have me believe was normal.

In addition to my feminine expressions, during the early 90s as I entered puberty, it became clear that my desires for love were more homosexual. Although I didn't fully understand it at the time, it was drilled into me that such desires were wrong and that I would burn in hell for being different. At the age of 13, my family placed me in state care, where I was diagnosed with "Gender Identity Disorder" in the mid-90s. This medical diagnosis was used to treat me medically to make me "normal," as outlined in my court papers. The mental and physical abuse I received from state control in Iowa was appalling. Looking back now in my 40s, nothing about me has changed. I am still gay, I still like feminine things, and I still identify as non-binary. However, I have seen life become easier for others who have lived in similar situations. In 2013, GID (Gender Identity Disorder) was changed to Gender Dysphoria. Changing the name of something does not mean it isn't used to identify and categorize a person, which can justify unfair treatment. It is crucial that supportive care is offered to children and adults as they discover who they are as individuals.

I would like to draw a distinction between my sexuality and sexual identity. Sexuality is what we should be doing consensually in relationships as adults, while sexual identity often has little, if anything, to do with our sexual identity. This is where social conservatives, particularly those with religious roots who follow the atomic family model as the only moral standard, want to blur the line. My gender fluidity as a child had nothing to do with my sexuality. Anyone who paints that story is more interested in blurring those lines for their own prejudice than understanding the expressions of nature, which are a spectrum from feminine to masculine and everything in between. Gender expression is personal, and denying its fluidity is to deny any person who does not fit 100% into these categories. Such people are dangerous to the complexity of humanity and the understanding of nature itself.

For five years of my childhood, I struggled with identity battles, experiencing depression and anxiety that was life-threatening. This lack of support showed in my grades and self-harm. This all changed as I neared my 18th birthday and received more support from those who saw me, not the societal construct of limited labels. I obtained a job as a makeup artist for MAC Cosmetics and grew into a productive adult, for which I am eternally grateful. I fear for kids today because, in the 90s, I grew up in a very silent generation. I have watched kids and young adults hide who they are, creating fake lives that only hurt others and themselves, or worse, ending their own lives prematurely from lack of support.

Aside from my personal observations growing up in state care, I would like to address the medical insights I have learned firsthand from friends who are trans of all kinds. Not every trans person undergoes hormonal or physical treatments. The majority of us live in our bodies as we were born but accept those pieces of us that are a mix of physical and psychological traits. There are people who take hormones to support their changes, and these should not be taken lightly. Proper psychological and physical medical professionals should assure the best care and address the risks, some of which limit physical transitions. This is one reason why support should not be erased but supported. Humans, especially children, will experiment with alternative means that may not be safe, like silicone injections and off-market hormone therapy. Male-to-female or female-to-male transitions with hormones can affect physical developments like muscle growth, which can be faster than bone density. Contrary to what some social conservatives say, once hormone therapy is started, muscles may be stronger than bone density can support, and muscle fatigue can be a problem. These medical transitions should be taken seriously between patient and doctor, and in the case of children, all options should be open to the child as they come into their own identity, not the imposed identity of parents, school, or politicians.

Doctors should always consider the well-being of any patient, and this should be addressed between the doctor and patient, even as a child. The fact that laws are being put into place to defy this right on any topic is an overreach of government into the lives and bodies of individuals. Anyone who stops and thinks about this knows it is wrong. It would be like telling a man they can only wear boxers or briefs or telling a woman they have to wear a wired bra versus a sports bra. These are the biased constructs of a colonized mindset. Everyone who looks honestly at them knows they exist.

The youth do not have the jaded view of their bodies that adults do. If any man looks back at their childhood, they will see those moments of creative nature they had to hide because they feared being too feminine. Any woman who looks back at their childhood may see those moments when their courage to be bold was silenced because ladies were seen and not heard. Trans is an issue today, though trans has always existed in human culture and nature as a whole. The more we force ourselves into black-and-white definitions, the more issues we have.

I am writing in support as an adult who sees confusion being weaponized as fear of something most people don't understand. These are very sensitive subjects to individuals. I remember my father beating me for being too girly. I remember doctors trying to justify mentally abusive treatment to make me "normal" because that was what was normal to them. Please know that normal doesn't exist, however comfortable the idea of it is. We are all on a spectrum.

I am writing in strong support of SB1150. I am a Board Certified Psychiatrist and a World Professional Association for Transgender Health (WPATH) GEI SOC8 Certified Member, who trained locally, is licensed in the state, and continues to teach, mentor, and collaborate on research with local providers.

Right now, the bodily autonomy and rights of transgender people across the U.S. are being threatened or limited in frightening ways. In the last few years, hundreds of bills have been proposed or made into law. This is happening despite strong evidence that supporting transgender people and providing them access to gender affirming care saves lives and improves mental health outcomes [1]. For example, research from the Family Acceptance Project show that LGBTQ youth who experience low family acceptance of their LGBTQ identity report higher levels of depression, substance use, suicidal ideation, and suicide attempts [2]. Conversely, a large national sample of LGBTQ youth found that being respectful of a youth's gender identity was associated with just over 40% lower odds of them attempting suicide in the past year [3]. The measures outlined in SB1150 would help safeguard Hawai'i's transgender community.

In 2023, the State of Hawaii's Department of Health released a statement on rights and public health, acknowledging that all TGD persons "...should have an equitable opportunity to achieve their optimal state of health and well-being." It recognized the unique contributions of māhūwahine, māhūkāne, transgender, gender diverse people, and other populations to the diversity of Hawai'i, and the importance of protecting them from discrimination. SB1150 will help.

This legislation ensures that our state remains a sanctuary for bodily autonomy and medical privacy, rejecting the influence of restrictive laws from other states that seek to punish people for seeking or providing care. I strongly urge you to pass this bill and continue Hawai'i's leadership in defending human rights and medical freedom. Although not adults, children make a lot of choices that affect the rest of their lives. Their behavior and grades in school, the opportunities they pursue, and the people they spend time with all affect where their lives go. The obsession of some people with their healthcare decisions, which often for transgender care include social transition (haircuts, name changes, fashion changes) much more than medical care, is pure manufactured panic.

Even when youth do get true medical care, it is either supportive therapy in a world that shows clear distain for them, or sometimes hormone blockers, which can always be stopped in time. Most every child goes through irreversible changes associated with the hormones (mostly testosterone and estrogen) that cause secondary sexual characteristics. Every child, cisgender or transgender. Dear Chairs San Buenaventura, Aquino, Keohokalole, Fukunaga and Members of the Health and Human Services and Commerce and Consumer Protection Committees:

My name is Gerald Montano. I give this testimony as a Hawai`i-licensed physician with an American Board of Pediatrics certification in general pediatrics and specialty board certification in adolescent medicine. I have over ten years of experience in gender-affirming care and cared for over five-hundred transgender and gender-diverse youth and young adults. Additionally, I have conducted research, scholarship, and teaching in LBGTQIA Health.

I am asking for the Hawai'i legislature to protect: (a) <u>healthcare access for transgender and gender-diverse youth</u>, (b) <u>protect parents' rights in seeking healthcare for their child</u>, and (c) <u>protect a healthcare provider's right to practice compassionate, evidence-based medicine</u> by passing SB1150, which expands the protections established under Act 2, SLH 2023, to explicitly include gender-affirming health care services and clarifies jurisdiction under the Uniform Child-Custody Jurisdiction and Enforcement Act for cases involving children who obtain such care.

Gender-affirming care is the process of affirming and expressing one's internal sense of gender, rather than the gender assigned to them at birth, through behavioral health support and medical/surgical interventions. It is a century-old medical practice. The clear evidence supporting the practice of gender-affirming care has led to all the major medical and mental health professional associations, including the American Academy of Pediatrics, the Endocrine Society, the World Professional Association of Transgender Health, and the American Medical Association—which together represent most physicians—to recommend gender-affirming care for children and adolescents. Additionally, there are thirty-two mainstream national and international organizations supportive of gender-affirming care.

However, gender-affirming care has come under attack. Since February 2020, at least 186 bills have been filed in US state legislatures to restrict access to gender-affirming care. <sup>1,2</sup> These bills would bar medical providers from prescribing gender-affirming hormone therapy (including puberty blockers) or performing gender-affirming surgeries on adolescents under age 18 years. <sup>1,2</sup> In addition to prohibiting specific medical interventions, these bills would also mandate jail time and fines for medical providers, and in some cases parents, who seek gender-affirming care for their transgender or gender-diverse children. <sup>1,3</sup> Most recently, the current US President issued an executive order aimed at restricting access to gender-affirming health care for minors. The order calls for a complete reversal of federal support for gender-affirming care for youth under age 19.<sup>4</sup>

Studies consistently find that transgender and gender-diverse youth are highly vulnerable to mental and behavioral health problems, including depression, anxiety, and substance use.<sup>5</sup> A large, multi-state survey found that 35% of transgender youth reported having attempted suicide in the past year.<sup>6</sup>

It is important to understand that these poor outcomes are not because of one's gender identity, but rather due to a combination of gender dysphoria—the experience of significant distress about not having the physical characteristics of the gender one identifies with—and the shame and discrimination they face because of their gender identity, thus the need for gender-affirming care.

The evidence and clinical guidelines written by the Endocrine Society, WPATH Standards of Care, and the University of California at San Diego's Center of Excellence for Transgender Health and recommendations from organization like the AAP and the Endocrine Society inform the medical and mental health care of transgender and gender diverse youth. Guidelines on gender-affirming care are thorough, individualized, and family centered. Any decisions on gender-affirming care are made together by the multidisciplinary care team, family, and child and will require parental permission.

Gender-affirming care is not just about medicines. It is also about social support. For example, the only recommendation for the treatment of school-age, pre-pubescent children is allowing the child to wear the clothes and hair they want, use preferred name and pronouns, and play with the toys they like. This is referred to as social transition. This treatment brings tremendous benefits for transgender and gender-diverse youth, including decreased depression and anxiety, <sup>10,11</sup> and improvement of school wellbeing, decreasing truancy, and lower levels of bullying. <sup>12</sup>

Medications in gender-affirming care are only given when: (1) a child has already started puberty, which can be distressing to youth with gender dysphoria, and (2) has displayed insistence, consistence and persistence in their gender identity. Not all transgender and gender diverse youth need or would like to use medications to affirm their gender identity. Puberty blockers, which are completely reversible, help give time for parents, youth, and providers to consider less reversible options and allows the youth not to have to deal with going through the puberty that is wrong for them and therefore decreases their distress. Puberty blockers are safe medications that have been used for many decades previously for children who are starting puberty too early or what is referred to as precocious puberty.<sup>13</sup> We have multiple studies on the reversibility and on the safety and psychosocial benefits of these medications for gender dysphoria, <sup>14-21</sup> including similar psychosocial outcomes in young adulthood to cisgender youth and rates of suicidality three times lower than in youth who did not have access to puberty blocking medications.<sup>20</sup>

Hormone therapy, like estrogen or testosterone, are partially reversible options for treatment. This allows for a young person to essentially go through the puberty that aligns with their gender identity. It is important to note that changes occur over a period of several years, like the natural puberty process. There is strong evidence that these hormones are safe and provide psychosocial benefit to youth experiencing gender dysphoria. 15,22-32 Hormone therapy does not sterilize. Many

studies have shown that people who have started hormone therapy are still able to have children after stopping or even when on hormone therapy.<sup>33</sup> This is why contraception is still recommended to all transgender and gender diverse people on gender affirming hormones.

For many transgender and non-binary individuals their chest and genitals may be a significant cause of distress, and they may choose to have a variety of gender-affirming surgical procedures to achieve alignment of their body with their gender identity. It is also important to note that many transgender individuals do not want or are not able to have gender-affirming surgeries for a variety of reasons. Most of these surgeries are offered to those eighteen and above and are not the main treatments for gender-affirming care for youth. The most common surgical procedure among older adolescents is masculinizing chest surgery, which is often referred to as top surgery. For those trans-masculine youth who are born designated female but have already developed breast tissue, they frequently experience severe distress related to their chest, almost universally wearing chest binders to flatten the appearance of the chest and/or withdrawing socially. Top surgery which involves removing breast tissue to create a more masculine chest appearance has been shown to have tremendous social and psychological benefit for transmasculine adolescents and young adults. Any genital reassignment surgery, if desired and appropriate, happens after age 18 and these procedures have shown similar benefit.<sup>34</sup>

Several studies show that anti-trans legislation has led to an increased mental health burden to transgender and gender-diverse youth<sup>35,36</sup>, including increased rates of depression, suicidality, and anxiety when compared to their cisgender peers. In addition, these policies have been associated with increased likelihood of violence against transgender and gender-diverse youth based on their gender identity.<sup>37</sup> It would also burden Hawai`i`s healthcare resources as untreated gender dysphoria may result in unnecessary use of medical and mental health services that do not address it.<sup>38</sup> In contrast, nondiscrimination laws and other inclusive policies have been associated with decreased depressive symptoms and nicotine use among transgender and gender-diverse youth.<sup>39</sup>

Parents of transgender and gender-diverse youth who have lost access to evidence-based gender-affirming care have reported an increase in symptoms of anxiety, stress, depression and hypervigilance in their transgender or gender-diverse children.<sup>37</sup> In places where bills have been proposed but have not passed (e.g., in Florida, there are laws that criminalize caregivers who allow their child to receive gender-affirming care), <u>caregivers must make the agonizing decision to move to another state where gender-affirming care is protected.<sup>40</sup></u>

Gender-affirming care bans have also impacted medical and mental health providers. <u>Providers are leaving the states where these bans are implemented</u>. In cases where providers can still provide gender-affirming care, they face ethical dilemmas in providing care due to possible loss of license or being sued because the patient they treated has changed their gender identity. Additionally, providers are forced to make a mandated report of child abuse if a parent seeks their help regarding their child's gender identity. One study showed that the overall number of mental health providers who offered trans-specific care to trans adolescents was fewer in states with more restrictive laws/policies for transgender people. Hawai'i struggles to recruit competent healthcare providers, with 732 physicians needed to meet its citizens' healthcare

needs.<sup>45</sup> Any policy that would restrict or threaten to restrict the provision of care would hamper Hawai'i's efforts to recruit and retain healthcare providers.

Transgender and gender diverse youth face many threats to their health and wellbeing, especially with the recent onslaught of bills and executive orders restricting access to their healthcare. Additionally, states that have banned gender-affirming care have forced many families to leave to seek evidence-based healthcare for their children in other states. Finally, Hawai'i has a healthcare professional shortage and struggles to recruit and retain healthcare professionals. To protect transgender and gender-diverse youth, provide a reason for our ohana to stay in Hawai'i and recruit and retain healthcare professionals, **I strongly urge passage of SB1150**. In my work coordinating care and facilitating support groups for LGBTQ+ youth, I have witnessed firsthand the many challenges this population faces, including societal stigma, discrimination, familial rejection, and significant barriers in accessing critical healthcare services. Transgender youth are particularly vulnerable, facing systemic barriers that put their mental health and well-being at risk. This is especially true in states that are pursuing or have passed anti-transgender legislation.<sup>1</sup>

SB1150 provides a range of critical protections for youth seeking gender-affirming care in Hawai'i, safeguarding them from legal repercussions imposed by other states where such care is banned. This bill will significantly improve the health and well-being of the LGBTQ+ community by ensuring they can access **life-saving** medical treatment without fear. A 2022 study found that transgender and non-binary youth who receive gender-affirming care are 73% less likely to experience suicidality compared to those who did not receive such treatment.<sup>2</sup>

Above all, SB1150 recognizes that transgender youth and the broader LGBTQ+ community deserve to live a life of dignity, safety, and authenticity.

## I STRONGLY OPPOSE SB-1150.

This bill seeks to expand protections for gender-affirming health care services and clarify jurisdiction under the Uniform Child-Custody Jurisdiction and Enforcement Act (UCCJEA) for cases involving children who receive such services.

First and foremost, we must recognize that sex is an immutable biological fact. Every human being is born either male or female, and this is a scientific fact. Attempting to alter or deny this reality can have profound consequences for individuals and society as a whole. The American College of Pediatricians has raised concerns about the medicalization of normal variations in gender identity, especially for keiki.

Gender-affirming medical treatments, such as hormone blockers and cross-sex hormones, can have significant health consequences for keiki. These treatments can impact bone density, fertility, and mental health. The long-term effects are still unknown, and we shouldn't be experimenting with our keiki's health or supporting it. Once a keiki starts down the path of medical transition, it can be difficult to turn back. Surgeries and hormone treatments can lead to permanent changes in their bodies.

This bill will reduce the role of parents in critical decisions regarding their keiki's health care. Gender-affirming care is a significant medical intervention that should involve informed consent from parents or guardians, especially for keiki. Expanding protections without ensuring robust safeguards for keiki could lead to legal disputes and ethical dilemmas. It is crucial to balance the rights of keiki with the need for parental oversight. Without stringent criteria, there is a risk that these protections could be misused, potentially leading to situations where keiki are subjected to treatments without adequate consideration of their long-term well-being.

Clarifying jurisdiction for gender-affirming health care under UCCJEA could create jurisdictional conflicts between states. This might lead to legal challenges and confusion in custody disputes involving keiki who have received such care. This bill does not provide

sufficient clarity on how these jurisdictional changes would be implemented or how they would affect existing custody arrangements. This lack of clarity could lead to legal uncertainty and increased litigation. Potentially altering custody determinations based on gender-affirming care, this bill could disrupt family dynamics and create unnecessary legal barriers for families navigating complex custody issues.

Respectfully, I STRONGLY encourage you to vote NO on SB-1150.

By passing S.B. 1150, Hawai'i will ensure our healthcare providers can deliver appropriate, patient-centered, and evidence-based care without the looming threat of out-of-state legal actions. This legislation aligns with our state's commitment to the health and safety of all residents, safeguarding both providers and the communities we serve.

Aloha Chair, Vice Chair, and Members of the Committee,

My name is Haylin Dennison, and I am submitting testimony in strong support of SB1150, which safeguards access to gender-affirming care. I testify today as a mother, a mental health specialist, and a healthcare provider who has witnessed firsthand the life-saving impact of gender-affirming care on transgender and non-binary youth.

# A Mother's Perspective

I am the proud mother of a transgender child. Like many parents, I once struggled to understand what my child was experiencing. I was raised in a deeply conservative Christian household, and when my child came out, I had to get education regarding gender diversity because I was never exposed to this information. My only regret is not being supportive earlier, so my child could have suffered less. My love for my child is unwavering, and I did what every parent should— I listened, I learned, and I sought the best possible care for him.

When my child was struggling with their identity, they were also struggling with depression. The statistics tell us that transgender youth face alarmingly high rates of anxiety, depression, and suicidality, but what those numbers don't show is the very real and deeply personal journey families go through to ensure their children are supported. For my child, access to genderaffirming care was not a political issue—it was a matter of survival.

## A Mental Health Specialist's Perspective

As a licensed therapist specializing in youth mental health, I see the impact of gender-affirming care every day in my clinic. I am the founder of Spill The Tea Café, a nonprofit mental health center serving LGBTQ+ youth, where hundreds of young people and their families seek support.

The data is undeniable: gender-affirming care saves lives. Studies from the Trevor Project, the National Institutes of Health, and major medical associations confirm that gender-affirming medical care, including hormone therapy and puberty blockers, significantly reduces suicide rates, depression, and self-harm in transgender youth. Yet, we continue to see legislation across the country aimed at restricting access to this essential care—care that is supported by the American Academy of Pediatrics, the American Medical Association, and the American Psychiatric Association.

Without gender-affirming care, I have seen young people become hopeless, withdrawn, and suicidal. With it, I have seen them thrive—excelling in school, developing confidence, and stepping into their futures with joy and purpose. When we deny them care, we are denying them the right to a healthy, happy life.

## A Healthcare Provider's Perspective

As a provider, I believe it is our ethical duty to follow science and evidence-based best practices in patient care. Gender-affirming care is not experimental. It is well-researched, widely accepted, and medically necessary for those who seek it. It is provided in a slow, careful, thoughtful, and individualized manner by trained professionals who work closely with families and patients to ensure informed decision-making.

Legislation that restricts or bans gender-affirming care places unjust burdens on families, creates barriers to critical services, and interferes with the sacred doctor-patient relationship. We do not legislate against life-saving care for any other group of patients—why should transgender individuals be treated differently?

SB1150 ensures that transgender individuals in Hawai'i can access the care they need without fear of discrimination, harassment, or legislative interference. It affirms that medical decisions should be made by patients, families, and their healthcare providers—not by politicians. It upholds Hawai'i's longstanding values of aloha, inclusion, and dignity for all.

I urge you to pass SB1150 and stand on the right side of history. Protecting access to gender-affirming care is not just a policy decision—it is a moral imperative. Our children's lives depend on it.

I strongly support gender-affirming care. This care is not about surgery; it is about life-saving healthcare that can drastically improve the lives of transgender and gender-diverse individuals. The idea that gender-affirming care is unnecessary or harmful is both deeply misguided and dangerous. Evidence shows that when transgender and gender-diverse people have access to the care they need—whether it's hormone therapy, mental health services, or support for social transition—they experience a significantly improved quality of life, with better mental health outcomes, higher life satisfaction, and lower suicide rates.

Let me be clear: **gender-affirming care is not about surgery; it is about providing people the care they need to feel like themselves, to thrive, and to survive**. It is about making sure they have access to the medical, psychological, and social support that allows them to live their truth. We cannot ignore the simple fact that **denying people this care has life-or-death consequences**. When transgender and gender-diverse people are denied access to care, the rates of depression, anxiety, substance use disorder, and suicidality skyrocket. These individuals are far more likely to experience these mental health crises than their cisgender peers, and we already know that these numbers only increase in the absence of appropriate care.

One of the arguments often made against gender-affirming care is the idea that regret rates are high, but this simply isn't true. Studies consistently show that the regret rate for gender-affirming care, especially for minors, is **extremely low**, especially when compared to other forms of medical care that are more widely accepted, such as circumcision. The regret rate for gender-affirming surgeries or hormone therapy for adults remains at less than 1%, a statistic far lower than the regret rate for circumcision, which is a procedure often performed on infants who cannot consent. In fact, **the vast majority of people who receive gender-affirming care express a profound sense of relief, joy, and gratitude, experiencing a marked improvement in their mental health and overall well-being.** 

It's important to consider the numbers regarding regret rates, but it's also crucial to remember the societal context. We live in a society that has long marginalized transgender and gender-diverse people. These individuals face abuse, oppression, and discrimination on a daily basis. The tragic consequences of this marginalization, especially when compounded by the lack of access to affirming care, are clear: higher rates of depression, anxiety, substance use, and

suicidality. When trans people cannot access the care they need, they face an elevated risk of harm and suffering.

We must ask ourselves: who should decide what care is appropriate for transgender and gender-diverse people? Is it the transgender individuals themselves, the professionals who work with them, and the people who love and support them, or should it be politicians who are using a personal agenda to push a harmful narrative about trans people? The debate over gender-affirming care should not be about political maneuvering or ideology—it should be about listening to the voices of trans and gender-diverse people and ensuring their health, safety, and dignity.

The consequences of allowing **anti-trans legislation to dictate healthcare decisions** would be catastrophic. Legislation that restricts or bans access to gender-affirming care will not stop transgender and gender-diverse people from seeking the care they need; it will only push them to unsafe, underground methods that can harm them physically, mentally, and emotionally. Additionally, such legislation **perpetuates the harmful cycle of discrimination** that already threatens the lives of these individuals.

We know that when trans and gender-diverse people can access care, they thrive. We know that when they are denied that care, they suffer and die at rates higher than their cisgender peers. It is critical that we provide these individuals with the necessary care they deserve. Transgender people are not a political issue; they are human beings, deserving of respect, dignity, and access to life-saving care.

I urge you to stand on the right side of history. Support gender-affirming care. It's not just medical care—it's the care that saves lives. It's the care that allows trans and gender-diverse people to live their lives with pride and safety. Please, do not let harmful, politically driven agendas dictate the lives of these individuals. Let the voices of the trans community and their healthcare providers guide this conversation, not the voices of those who seek to harm them.

# Dear Legislators,

I am writing to support SB 1150 as a mother of a transgender child (11 yo) as well as a physician who has been working in this community for over 20 years. My child (M) is on the pathway towards puberty blockers and hormone therapy so she may have the choice to experience puberty as her authentic self. I know that her mental health will deteriorate later in adolescence if she does not have this option. I am haunted and cannot get out of my head the death by suicide of Tennessee college student Serenity Birdsong (a transgender leader and advocate) who couldn't go on any longer soon after the state of Tennessee abandoned her and all other transgender people by making GAC illegal. If she had the choice to receive GAC earlier in life, she would most likely be alive today. She took her life in the college library. I see my own child when I hear her story! There is no question that death by suicide for transgender persons (particularly youth) will increase in Hawaii if GAC is stopped or limited. Our State has the opportunity to be a leader in this fight to save our citizens.

It is critical that gender affirming care be protected in Hawaii in all its forms for children, adolescents, and adults. Narratives about young children having genital and breast surgeries are not true and are used to cloud the real issue. In our current political climate, I am proud that Hawaii has been a sanctuary and has stood up for the rights of its citizens with regard to LGBTQ rights and reproductive rights. GAC is no exception in that unfortunately needs the same protection immediately for all people because everyone is somewhere on the gender spectrum. The binary construct is a false narrative that has been proven wrong throughout history and is not frightening at all once you take the time to understand that people need to be who they are in order to pursue the constitutional right of happiness.

Our journey started when M was 3 years old. She was assigned male at birth because she has male genitalia but soon made it clear to us that she is not a boy. I don't like saying that because we shouldn't have to decide if we are one or the other, but in her case her identity is very "feminine" (actually more "feminine" than me).

First it was the pure joy of wearing Disney princess dresses all day long. Dress up for young children has no gender boundaries and everyone found it adorable. Then it was everyday clothes. Mom, no cargo shorts, shirts with pockets, or board shorts for swimming. I want leggings, pretty tops, and a two piece swimsuit like my friends. Then it was Mom, I want to be a girl. Then it was, Mom, I am a girl and I want to be called she and not he. Her friends were all girls and tastes were all what society ascribes to be female-everything pink, sleep overs, and Taylor Swift. She is on a girls gymnastics team and by the way is not all the best gymnast on the team.

People started to notice that this was not a phase and perceived it as less adorable. My husband and I were apprehensive. We read everything we could find, took our cues from M, and supported it all. We learned that if we lead that others will follow with positivity towards M (even if they don't feel it yet inside). We did this in every arena at home, in public, at school. We only lost one friend which makes us believe that people can grow and unlearn that transgender people are a problem.

Please live and dress as the gender that you do NOT identify with for only a day and see how you feel. I don't think it will last long.

GAC is healthcare and does not only apply to transgender care. Examples include testosterone for erective dysfunction, hormone replacement for menopause, breast augmentation for cis gender females, breast reduction for cis male breast development, treatment of precocious puberty and the list goes on. Please help gender diverse children and adults stay safe and prosper in our state. Trust parents, children, and healthcare providers to make reasonable individual informed decisions and to healthcare decisions (gender affirming or otherwise) private and not reliant on federal funding.

Thank you for hearing SB1150. I am in **support** of this bill as a measure to affirm that the State of Hawai'i will uphold human rights and individual privacy as they pertain to reproductive and gender-affirming health care. As the federal government and many states have stated intent and/or taken action to severely limit and criminalize these areas, it is up to the State of Hawai'i to protect the essential rights of personhood, privacy, and individual decision.

One of the key components of this bill clarifies that the State will not pursue legal action against any person aiding or assisting a pregnant person receiving reproductive or gender-affirming services, which gives medical providers in Hawai'i assurance that they will not face litigation for doing the jobs they were trained to do. Other states that have chosen to create arbitrary legal demands regarding reproductive health have endangered pregnant people, such as Amber Thurman in Georgia. She was an otherwise healthy 28 year-old mother who failed to receive standard care because providers decided they could not legally render service until Ms. Thurman faced fatal timing, regardless of what they may have wanted to do as experienced medical providers. Potential litigation from the State should not be a factor in the decisionmaking of medical providers to service patients in a timely manner.

Another critical finding that supports the passage of this bill: last year, Nature magazine published an article that assessed 48 state-level transgender ban laws and found a statistically significant causal relationship between said laws and transgender suicide increase. It is to our best interests to move in the opposite direction and protect our youth, which includes encouraging them to be and explore what it means to be their most authentic selves.

I affirm again that gender-affirming care is life-saving treatment. I would not be here writing to you today without it. Please take this action to protect all of these people who love transgender youth, who risk so much to take care of us.

17 states and the District of Columbia already have such laws in place, and it is vital that Hawaii ensures similar protections are put into place here.

Moreover, there's the ethical debate about consent. Can children, whose brains are still developing, truly consent to medical decisions with lifelong implications? We protect minors from making other life-altering decisions like voting, driving, or drinking alcohol due to their lack of maturity. Why should this be different for decisions that involve altering their biological sex?

From a societal perspective, there's also the concern about the influence of social trends and peer pressure. I am writing to express my strong support for HI SB1150. As a resident of Hawai'i, a concerned advocate, and a mental healthcare provider to young members of the LGBTQ+ community, I believe that this bill is crucial because it protects individuals' rights to healthcare that is ultimately life-affirming. Furthermore, it offers protection to the caregivers who seek to support and advocate on behalf of their keiki.

In my own work as a youth therapist and social worker, I have witnessed how gender-affirming healthcare services can indeed save lives. Discrimination, including invalidating healthcare practices, places LGBTQ+ youth at a higher rate for suicide as compared with their non-LGBTQ+ peers. In a 2023 national survey, the Trevor Project¹ found that about half of transgender and nonbinary young people considered the people at their school to be gender-affirming, with those who did reporting lower rates of attempted suicide. Gender-affirming language, people, and spaces are protective factors that can significantly lower the rates of attempted and fatal suicide among LGBTQ+ youth across the state and beyond.

Importantly, these blockers do not permanently alter a person's body; they simply pause the natural process of puberty, allowing for informed decisions later on. This thoughtful approach is

crucial for the well-being of transgender youth, enabling them to navigate their identities in a supportive and non-pressuring environment.

It is essential to emphasize that medical care should be between doctors and patients, not dictated by government policies. Healthcare decisions are deeply personal and should be based on the expertise of medical professionals and the individual needs of patients. Involving government in these intimate decisions can lead to harmful consequences and undermine the trust that is fundamental to the doctor-patient relationship.

Denying transgender-affirming care is not just detrimental; it can have dire consequences. Without access to the necessary medical and psychological support, individuals may face increased risks of mental health crises, isolation, and despair. I strongly oppose SB1150 due to its overreach into parental rights, legal jurisdiction, and due process. This bill undermines the principles of family autonomy, disrupts established legal frameworks for child custody, and creates significant risks for both families and the state of Hawai'i.

SB1150 reclassifies parental refusal to provide "gender-affirming care" as medical neglect, equating it with child abuse. This diminishes parental discretion in medical decision-making and allows courts to override parental authority even in the absence of demonstrable harm. Furthermore, by permitting non-parents to seek emergency jurisdiction over minors, **the bill undermines due process by limiting parental ability to contest custody decisions**. Family autonomy must be preserved, and parents should not be excluded from critical medical decisions affecting their children.

SB1150 alters the Uniform Child-Custody Jurisdiction and Enforcement Act (UCCJEA) by granting Hawai'i courts expanded emergency jurisdiction over out-of-state minors brought to the state for medical procedures. This **creates a legal loophole that could incentivize** individuals—including non-relatives—to transport minors across state lines without parental consent, circumventing existing custody agreements and state laws.

Additionally, the bill prevents cooperation with extradition requests related to custody disputes, effectively designating Hawai'i as a legal sanctuary for those seeking to remove children from parental custody without legal consequence. This departure from national legal norms could jeopardize Hawaii's ability to enforce its own custody rulings in other states.

By weakening legal protections against unauthorized custody transfers, **SB1150 creates vulnerabilities that could be exploited by bad actors**, including those with coercive or harmful intentions. The bill provides no clear safeguards to ensure that minors transported across state lines for medical procedures are acting of their own free will or receiving appropriate medical oversight.

Furthermore, the bill's confidentiality provisions limit parental access to medical records, obstructing their ability to ensure their child's well-being. This **lack of transparency conflicts** 

with well-established legal principles that recognize parental rights in medical decision-making and child welfare.

SB1150's unilateral approach to custody and medical jurisdiction could have unintended consequences for Hawaii's legal standing. If the state refuses to return minors to their legal guardians in other jurisdictions, it risks undermining reciprocity under the UCCJEA, which could hinder Hawaii's ability to reclaim its own children in future custody disputes. The bill also raises constitutional concerns, as it may conflict with the Full Faith and Credit Clause, which requires states to recognize and enforce each other's legal judgments.

SB1150 goes beyond protecting children—it disrupts legal norms, erodes parental rights, and creates significant risks for families and the state's legal framework. Instead of advancing policies that weaken custody protections and parental involvement, the legislature should focus on solutions that prioritize both child welfare and due process.

I urge you to vote **NO** on SB1150 to protect family integrity, uphold legal consistency, and ensure child safety under a fair and balanced legal framework.

I write in strong, strong support of the Healthcare Access Protection Act.

My name is Kūmoanaākea. I'm currently a sophomore in high school, and, as I write this, I am sixteen years of age. For much of my time on this earth, my relationship to gender has been fluid and changing, but never quite the standard. My birth certificate reads female, but in my heart I have always known that something wasn't right about that. Over my years I grew and learned that there are others like me. I was taught the language. There was a name for my experience. I am transgender. My mind is kāne.

I explained to my 'ohana. They accepted me. I began to wear different clothes. I talked differently. I asked the people close to me and those who I met to call me 'he'. I grew more and more comfortable in my skin. I had a different name. Living became less frightening. But when I was younger than I am now, first finding who I was, it was new and unsteady. I wasn't quite secure. I had a terrible, twisted feeling in my gut when I saw myself in the mirror or when I heard my voice. Too womanly, too girlish, too feminine was I, ashamed of being different from my peers of the same gender. I wasn't the same. It was visible. It made me nauseous. I had what is called gender dysphoria. I felt physically ill because what was on my outside mismatched what was on my insides. I can say that it's one of the worst feelings I've ever had to endure.

In 2021, my doctor cared enough to listen to what I asked of her. I had done the research on my own. I needed gender affirming healthcare. She made certain I knew what I was asking for. I couldn't take puberty blockers, as I had already gone through mine. I could

take testosterone. After testing my blood to ensure that hormone therapy was safe for me, and that I was entirely aware of the side effects, I was taught by a nurse how to safely and sanitarily give myself my medicine.

The acne and the voice cracks and the small amount of facial hair were changes that made me closer to the other boys in my grade. I felt more at home in my body. My flesh became a sanctuary and not a prison. The hatred I had of myself lessened and lessened as I became closer to what I truly wanted to be. I do not experience gender dysphoria today. Clothes don't make me male, female, or otherwise. I can have long hair and be as male as I'll ever be. The body I have belongs to me, and therefore belongs to a man. I no longer take Testosterone, as it's not necessary for my happiness. I love how I am. But the definition of my facial features, the broadness of my shoulders, and the lowered voice are all a result of my hormone replacement therapy, and they're with me even now. The attentive care of my doctors got me through an awful time in my life. Depression and frequent suicidal ideation plagued me everyday. Those people saved me from taking my own life. To know that they were there for me, to know that things would get better with my treatment, and to know that there were trustworthy people who valued me outside of my home is so incredible. My doctors are a safe place for me.

This act would protect those who provided me with life saving care. Without them I wouldn't be here to provide this testimony. People like me should have access to safe, reputable healthcare. It saves lives.

I am writing to the Chair, the Vice Chair, and members of the committee in favor of SB1150 and the protections of healthcare access and other basic human rights for transgender people.

In light of the current federal administration's blatant attacks on the very existence of transgender and nonbinary people, it's more necessary now than ever that the numerous gaps and loopholes in the State of Hawai'i's current protections for trans people be cemented shut to ensure that many trans folks including myself do not lose their access to medically necessary gender-affirming healthcare.

Even under the previous administration's less discriminatory federal policies, these gaps and loopholes have been exploited regularly by health insurance companies attempting not only to avoid covering gender-affirming services such as hormone replacement therapy and surrounding medications and procedures, but also to discriminate against trans patients, depriving them of services afforded more easily to others, such a psychotherapy, ER visits, and physical checkups.

This becomes especially tricky for those under Quest and other Medicaid and Medicare related coverage, unable to afford the costly payments on the aforementioned services.

Since beginning hormone therapy nearly four years ago, not only has my quality of life, self-confidence and body image improved extraordinarily in numerous ways, but my physical health has as well. I am finally at a healthy weight, I'm less prone to sickness, and I finally like what and who I see in the mirror. Due to years of medical trauma, I find it hard to trust medical professionals, but I finally have a primary care physician who I trust and feel safe with both for gender affirming care and for standard medical checkups.

The thought of having my access to gender-affirming care being revoked and being forced to detransition and have the body that I love taken away fills me with debilitating dread and sadness. The thought of the same thing happening to other trans people feels even worse.

If gender-affirming care was made inaccessible in Hawai'i, many transgender people would be forced to relocate to other states and countries out of sheer medical necessity. This includes Hawaiian trans people such as myself, who should not have to leave our native homeland because of hateful policies being forced upon us.

Many others who do not have the option of relocating would have to resort to other less safe and reliable sources for their gender-affirming care, or be forced to detransition altogether. This cannot be allowed to happen.

I am urging you to pass SB1150 and do what is in your power to give us the best and most infallible protections possible.
