SB 1204 - RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII

Chair Kim, Vice Chair Kidani, and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony on SB 1204 which, among other things, reestablishes the Cancer Research Center of Hawai'i as an organized research unit within the University of Hawai'i John A. Burns School of Medicine (JABSOM).

The University of Hawai'i at Mānoa cannot support this bill in its present form. We recognize the importance of ensuring strong collaboration across the John A. Burns School of Medicine and the Cancer Research Center of Hawai'i, as well as the need to continue to seek operational efficiencies on the Kaka'ako campus. However, we believe that it is essential that the University's academic units retain the authority to develop and implement academic and research programs - and the associated organizational structures - to be responsive to the needs of the people of Hawai'i.

President Hensel has tasked me with creating a process and timetable for the development of a comprehensive plan for the optimization of the Kaka'ako campus structure and activities, which may include even closer integration of the Cancer Research Center and JABSOM.

Thank you for the opportunity to **<u>COMMENT</u>** on SB 1204: Relating to University of Hawaii, which creates the cancer research unit within the University of Hawaii medical school. While we appreciate the Legislature's intent of reducing costs to the State, we do have concerns on the proposed measure.

By placing the University of Hawaii Cancer Center (UH Cancer Center) within the John A. Burns School of Medicine for organizational and cost reduction purposes, we are concerned that this would endanger designation as a National Cancer Institute cancer center and may impact NIH grant funding and support grants.

As the only NCI designated cancer center in the pacific region, the UH Cancer Center works with partners such as the University of Guam to address cancer issues specific to the Asian and Pacific Islander populations. While cancer mortality has fallen nationally, specific populations in Hawaii continue to face a higher burden of cancer and benefit from the research conducted at the UH Cancer Center on these specific racial and ethnic groups. We urge the committee to consider these issues on this measure.

I strongly oppose Senate Bill 1204, which reestablishes the Cancer Research Center of Hawaii as an organized research unit within the University of Hawaii John A.

Passage of this measure would gravely threaten the P30 grant from the National Cancer Institute (NCI) of the National Institutes of Health. UHCC is one of 72 such designated centers, and as such has a position of respect, authority, and collaboration that will be lost if this bill is passed.

It is important also to note that modern cancer research reaches across the entire local community, including but not limited to to our medical school. UHCC is achieving many synergies (most recently and notably Queen's hospital's partnership in Ho'ola, UHCC's Early Phase Clinical Trial Center), so important partnerships are presently being achieved and grown. This bill would interfere with that progress by layering on unnecessary bureaucracy.

While the legislature may have some insights into and questions about the governance of UH, it should not have complete control of its structure. I believe this is legislative overreach.

My name is Rebecca "Becki" Ward and I am a passionate advocate for cancer prevention, screening, and treatment — all of which require active investment in cancer research. I am in <u>STRONG OPPOSITION</u> to SB1204, which will effectively serve to reduce badly-needed cancer research in Hawaii.

My primary concern is the likely loss of designation as one of 71 NCI Cancer Centers in the US and the resulting loss of access to funding opportunities, such as the P30 grants. I currently serve on the Community Advisory Board for the UH Cancer Center, have volunteered with the American Cancer Society for the past 15 years (including serving as Hawaii Pacific Board Chair and serving on national research peer review panels), and have lost my husband and numerous close friends to cancer over the years. With my perspective, I know how important it is that we continue to build the cancer research capacity in Hawaii so that patients do not have to go to the Continent for access to trials. The physical and emotional challenges of leaving Hawaii for specialized cancer care and access to clinical trials adds to the incredible stress of the cancer experience.

I know that the vision of the UH Cancer Center is to increase this capacity in Hawaii; and this will be extremely difficult, if not impossible, without the NCI designation, which UHCC has fought hard to maintain.

Dear HRE Committee Chair Donna Mercado Kim, Vice Chair Michelle N. Kidani, and Members, Senators Fukunaga, Hashimoto, and Fevella:

Mahalo for the opportunity to document my **strong OPPOSITION to SB 1204**, which proposes to administratively reorganize the currently freestanding Organized Research Unit of the University of Hawai'i (UH) at Mānoa for cancer research (the UH Cancer Center, formerly the Cancer Research Center of Hawai'i) within the UH John A. Burns School of Medicine (JABSOM).

As has been the case with versions of this bill that have been deferred in previous Legislative sessions, SB 1204 again asserts that "merging the cancer research center of Hawaii (sic) and JABSOM will eliminate redundancies" and "streamline future strategic collaborations, foster enhanced cooperation, and create new opportunities for joint initiatives in medical research, education, and patient care."

I have worked at the Cancer Center for 26 years, most of them as a research study project manager and as an active member of various planning and advisory committees. I have proactively managed multiple studies over the years that have been collaborations between Cancer Center and JABSOM faculty. These things *do* happen—organically—and they are happening right now, without a reorg.

To point out a recent example: You may have seen the Cancer Center and our director, Dr. Naoto T. Ueno, on the front page of the Honolulu Star-Advertiser in December 2024. The headline reads as follows, emphasis mine: "UH partnership will target disparities in cancer outcomes," with the subheadline, "The alliance is expected to raise the quality and consistency of care in Hawaii and the Pacific." This "alliance" refers specifically to the UH Cancer Center and JABSOM. Among the specific aims of this initiative, Ka 'Umeke Lama ("Bowl of Enlightenment"), is the establishment of a medical oncology fellowship program that will focus on addressing the health disparities and other determinants of health that are unique to the people of Hawai'i and the U.S. Affiliated Pacific Islands. This is groundbreaking and of utmost importance, especially in light of the federal government's current focus shifting away from understanding and addressing the health of minority and diverse populations like ours. Simply stated, we do not have enough of an oncology workforce locally to "fix" the glaring gaps in cancer mortality suffered especially by Kanaka Maoli. Up until this point, any physician in training who aimed to specialize in oncology had to pursue a fellowship program on the continental U.S.; unfortunately, many of those trainees never make it back to Hawai'i to practice, despite their best intentions to do so, for any number of reasons. In addition to the development of the fellowship program, Ka 'Umeke Lama also lays out strategic plans to launch targeted cancer clinical trials, as well as culturally- and resource-appropriate cancer screening programs.

We are *already* on track, as an alliance, to make significant headway in terms of health equity for the people of Hawai'i—even more so, that is, than what we as researchers and medical education professionals and UH-affiliated physicians are doing every day with the supposed "redundancies" SB 1204 purports to eliminate. Between 2014 and 2016, then-Chancellor of UH Mānoa, Robert Bley-Vroman, initiated *two* reviews of the Cancer Center, both of which recommended streamlining overlapping operations with those of JABSOM where costs could be saved without jeopardizing the core missions of each institution, and many of the recommended integrations have since been implemented. A restructuring, as it turned out, would not actually lead to cost savings. The UH administration and the Board of Regents were so convinced that they resolved in 2016 to retain the Cancer Center as an independent Organized Research Unit in which the Cancer Center Director reports directly to the University Provost. When you have evidence that compelling, why deny the associated recommendations to (a) keep the units administratively separate and (b) maintain the sovereignty of the Cancer Center Director? We *do* still believe in evidence-based practice here, don't we? At least, the Cancer Center and JABSOM do.

Thank you for this opportunity to provide testimony in strong opposition to SB1204, which proposes to legislate the internal structure and management of the University of Hawai'i (UH) by moving the UH Cancer Center under the John A. Burns School of Medicine (JABSOM). This bill would replace the judgment and decision of the Board of Regents, which established the Cancer Center in 1981 as a freestanding Organized Research Unit (ORU) of the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa, by imposing a structure suggested by the Legislature without regard for the potentially devastating impacts of such a change. We oppose this bill for three reasons: First, passage of this measure would gravely threaten the P30 grant from the National Cancer Institute (NCI) of the National Institutes of Health, which carries our formal designation as one of only 71 NCI-designated cancer centers in the nation. This is a critical designation for which we have worked diligently and in which the university and State have invested significant resources. Second, a legislative mandate regarding internal restructuring is not necessary or appropriate to achieve synergies and efficiencies among the Cancer Center and other UH units, which include but are not limited to JABSOM. Third, while the Legislature has reserved to itself the right to legislate matters of statewide concern, it is neither appropriate nor necessary for the legislature to substitute its opinions on this specific matter of internal structure and management for the reasoned views of the UH, which is responsible to maximize the ability of the Cancer Center to reduce the burden of cancer on the people of Hawai'i.
