Aloha Chair Inouye, Chair Elefante, Vice Chair Elefante, Vice Chair Wakai, and Members of the Committees,

I am writing in strong support of **SB130**, which requires partial reimbursement for search and rescue operations when an individual intentionally disregards safety by entering closed areas or hiking trails marked with signage indicating closure. This legislation is a necessary step toward alleviating the financial strain on government resources and promoting responsible and safe behavior among hikers.

Reason for Support: Alleviating Financial Burden

Hawaii's natural beauty attracts both residents and tourists to its outdoor spaces, but with this comes a significant increase in search and rescue operations. As the bill highlights, these operations are often needed when individuals disregard safety warnings, enter closed trails, or leave designated hiking areas. The costs of these rescues are borne entirely by government agencies, diverting critical resources from other public safety needs. Implementing a partial reimbursement system, as proposed by SB130, will ensure that those who engage in risky and irresponsible behavior bear some of the financial responsibility for the consequences of their

actions. This policy is not only fair but also essential to preserving state and county resources for emergencies that are truly unavoidable.

Encouraging Responsible Behavior

Requiring reimbursement for search and rescue operations will serve as a deterrent to reckless behavior. When individuals know there are financial consequences for ignoring closure signs or entering dangerous areas, they are more likely to prioritize their safety and follow posted rules. This legislation aligns with existing policies in other states such as New Hampshire, Maine, and Vermont, which have successfully implemented similar measures to reduce unnecessary rescues and promote accountability among hikers. By adopting this approach, Hawaii will join these states in setting a standard for responsible outdoor recreation.

Addressing Public Concerns

Some may argue that charging individuals for rescue operations could deter people from seeking help in emergencies. However, SB130 specifically targets cases in which the individual acted in direct violation of clearly posted warnings and closures. This ensures that the reimbursement requirement is applied only in cases of intentional disregard for safety, not genuine accidents or unforeseeable situations. Furthermore, the bill wisely establishes a partial reimbursement model, requiring at least half of the costs to be covered. This balances accountability with compassion, recognizing that while individuals should bear responsibility for risky actions, the government still has an obligation to provide rescue services.

Recommendations for Strengthening SB130

While I strongly support SB130, I recommend the following additions to ensure its effectiveness:

1. Ensure Clear and Consistent Signage:

To avoid disputes about whether closures were properly communicated, all closed trails and areas should be clearly marked with standardized signage in multiple languages, reflecting Hawaii's diverse population and tourist base.

2. Implement a Public Awareness Campaign:

Educating residents and visitors about the risks of hiking in closed areas and the potential financial consequences of search and rescue operations will further promote compliance and discourage reckless behavior.

3. Introduce a Cap on Reimbursement:

To address concerns about fairness, particularly for individuals of lower income, consider implementing a cap on the amount reimbursed by individuals, ensuring it does not become overly punitive while still holding them accountable.

Conclusion

SB130 represents an important step in promoting safer hiking practices, reducing the financial burden on government entities, and encouraging responsible enjoyment of Hawaii's natural resources. By requiring partial reimbursement for search and rescue operations, the state can deter reckless behavior while ensuring that taxpayer dollars are used efficiently and equitably. I respectfully urge the Committees to pass SB130 and help ensure that Hawaii's beautiful trails remain safe and accessible for all who wish to enjoy them responsibly. Aloha committee members of the Senate Committee on Water and Land and the Senate Committee on Public Safety and Military Affairs,

I am testifying in support of this bill.

There have been an increasing number of hikers that have needed rescue services over the past decade, and as the utilization of social media continues to increase, more and more adventurers will continue to go off-trail to close into areas that are dangerous, not just for them, but for those who need to respond and rescue them. It seems that tourists, military, and sometimes even locals, are always being rescued.

I am from Kaneohe and grew up seeing helicopters rescuing hikers off the closed "Stairway to Heaven."

Having also worked for DLNR in the Department of Forestry, I've seen many of the hiking trails that are maintained by the State of Hawaii. There are ample trails and areas for hikers to access to enjoy the nature they are in search for.

For a variety of reasons, be it ignorance (people get lost), lack of preparation (people take a wrong turn by mistake), or be it entitlement (people thinking the rules don't, or shouldn't, apply to them), adventurers get sometimes end up in situations where they need to be rescued while off-trail in areas they shouldn't be. This puts our rescue personnel at risk and is not needed.

Ideally, I believe that rescue services shouldn't be provided to someone who is off-trail, and only be provided to those who are injured (or need help) on trail. If we are going to keep rescuing people off-trail, they should be fined for trespassing as well as for the costs of the rescue, including the hourly cost burden of the employees, the supplies and materials (gas, helicopter use, etc).

Those who want to go out into nature need to be better prepared (by researching the trails ahead of time), as well as going with someone who knows the trails, and they should make sure they stay on trail. Going off-trail is inexcusable and should never happen.

Please consider supporting this bill.
