Aloha Chair Aquino, Vice Chair Lee, and members of the Senate committee,

My name is Tuia'ana Scanlan, IATSE International Trustee and President of IATSE Local 665, the union representing technicians and artisans in the entertainment industry in Hawai'i. **IATSE 665 strongly supports SB1523**, relating to private sector collective bargaining rights.

Hawai'i boasts the highest union density per capita in the US where 24.1% of the working population are union members.

Unions have long been beneficial to not only their members, but also the communities in which they reside. Unions significantly contribute to state GDP, create safer workspaces across the state, and raise the standard of living for many of the people around them. The Hawai'i Employment Relations Act (HERA) of 1945 solidified the right of agricultural workers and later public sector workers to organize unions. HERA doesn't have explicit protections for private sector employees. To protect the thousands of working families who thrive because of private sector union labor, we implore you to support SB1523.

Public sector workers are protected by HERA. But those of us who are union members that are employed by private companies – film/tv production companies, live event promoters, hoteliers, shipping companies, construction companies, commercial fishing companies, and many more – are not. This bill is for our right to exist as members of these unions in the state of Hawai'i. When I say that Elon Musk is chewing on the wires of the US government to see what he can break and then steal anything that isn't bolted down, that's hyperbole. When I tell you that an unelected billionaire is actively undermining and destroying US institutions like USAID, the Department of Education, and soon the Department of Labor, that's a fact and a very real existential threat. Without the right to exist as a union, contracts, rates, benefits, working conditions, and the economic impact we generate for the state of Hawai'i could be invalidated.

Opponents of this bill may say that state law cannot preempt federal law. But it has historically worked in Hawai'i for nearly a century. Prior to the passage of HERA in 1945, agricultural employees couldn't join or form a union, nor could public sector workers. We also see it in our state's minimum wage, which is significantly higher than the federal minimum wage. Additionally, <u>SB1523 requires no appropriated funds</u> from state coffers. We can and must shield the working families of Hawai'i from the onslaught of the 47th president's agenda. We are fighting for our right to exist. Elon Musk and his cronies are actively undermining US departments and institutions. It's only a matter of time before he sets his sights on the Department of Labor. And we must seal off this crack in the bulwark before it's too late. The fate of thousands of working families in Hawai'i rests in your hands.

IATSE 665 strongly supports SB1523. We urge your committee to do the same. Thank you for the opportunity to testify.

Chair Aquino and Committee Members:

Thank you for hearing this bill and for this opportunity to testify in **strong support** of Senate Bill 1523.

The International Union of Painters and Allied trades, District Council 50, is an organization that consists of five (5) local unions: the Painters, Local Union 1971; the Glaziers Architectural and Glass Metal Workers, Local Union 1889; the Carpet Linoleum and Soft Tile, Local Union 1926; the Drywall, Tapers Finishers, Local Union 1944; and the Pearl Harbor Metal Trades Specialty Workers, Local Union 1941 – in all, approximately two thousand (2000) members statewide.

Currently, state law does not afford private labor unions like ours labor law protections like the right to organize, collectively bargain, or strike. These rights are protected by federal law under the National Labor Relations Act ("NLRA"), but there are initiatives currently underway on the national level to either repeal or limit the NLRA.

This measure will ensure that no matter what happens to the NLRA, all private sector unions in Hawaii will continue to have the same protections they now enjoy under federal law.

Currently, a study by the AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety found that 17.6% of all fatal crashes between 2017 and 2021 involved a drowsy driver. (https://aaafoundation.org/drowsy-driving-in-fatal-crashes-). Labor unions enforce regulated hours in a work day, protect our right to work without discrimination. Unions like ours protect our wages hence giving the lower and middle class a stable opportunity to contribute to society, while sustaining our income to afford insurances required for health and welfare.

The Hawai'i Nurses' Association – OPEIU Local 50 is affiliated with the AFL-CIO, was founded in 1917, and represents 4,000 nurses & health care professionals in the State of Hawai'i. We appreciate the opportunity to testify today in <u>strong support</u> of HB1523. Our union has recently endured the hardships of a strike and a prolonged employer lockout. These experiences have underscored the urgent need for legislative measures that safeguard our rights as healthcare workers and, ultimately, protect the quality of patient care throughout our state.

STATEMENT OF THE ILWU LOCAL 142 ON SB1523 RELATING TO PRIVATE SECTOR COLLECTIVE BARGAINING RIGHTS

The International Longshore and Warehouse Union (ILWU) Local 142 <u>STRONGLY SUPPORTS</u> <u>SB1523</u>. Hawaii has the highest union membership rate in the US, with nearly one in four workers belonging to a union. Unions boost Hawaii's economy, improve workplace safety, and raise living standards for all.

While the 1945 Hawaii Employment Relations Act (HERA) protects the right of agricultural and public sector workers to organize, it excludes private sector union members. SB1523 is crucial for extending these vital protections to the thousands of Hawaii families who rely on private sector union jobs. For example, without legal recognition, private sector unions may struggle to negotiate binding agreements, leaving workers vulnerable in disputes.

Currently, private sector workers in industries such as hospitality, shipping, construction, and commercial fishing lack the same organizational rights as public sector employees. Without legal recognition of their unions, their contracts, benefits, working conditions, and economic contributions to Hawaii could be jeopardized. Hawaii has a history of successfully enacting worker protections that go beyond federal law, such as with our state's minimum wage.

We urge the legislature to support SB1523 and ensure these vital protections are provided to Hawaii's private sector workers.



Aloha Chair Aguino, Vice-Chair Lee, and members of the Committee:

My name is Gino Soquena, Executive Director of the Hawaii Building & Construction Trades Council (HBCTC) which represents 18 construction trade unions here in Hawaii. The HBCTC **STONGLY SUPPORTS** SB1523. This bill expands the types of employees protected by the Hawaii Employment Relations Act to include independent contractors and all individuals subject to the jurisdiction of the National Labor Relations Act.

Hawaii has the most union members per capita in the nation. Project 2025 would threaten to jeopardize private sector union members, which includes construction trade labor unions, to lose their collective bargaining rights at the Federal level. Although federal law regarding private sector collective bargaining rights generally preempts state law, state law can supersede federal law in certain situations if it provides higher or better protection.

SB1523 would include those private sector union members under the Hawaii Employment Relations Act that would be affected by the threat of Project 2025 rather than be only under the jurisdiction of the National Labor Relations Act.

I strongly urge the committee to support this bill and recommend its passage to protect private sector union members and their families from the threat of Project 2025. Thank you for the opportunity to testify.
