Bill Title: SB 0420 RELATING TO EDUCATION.

Purpose of Bill: Allows newly graduated high school students to be eligible for workers' compensation coverage during the summer following their high school graduation while participating in Department of Education-sponsored work-based learning programs.

Department's Position:

The Hawaii State Department of Education (Department) supports SB 420, which provides workers' compensation coverage for new high school graduates participating in Department-sponsored work-based learning programs through July 31 of the graduate's high school graduation year.

To assist new high school graduates as they transition to their post-secondary plans, the Department offers the new graduates various supports during the summer following their graduation, including college and career advising, training, and internships. Work-based learning opportunities, such as industry-led summer training and internships, are an extension of our new graduates' Career and Technical Education programs of study that enable them to further develop the skills needed to succeed in the workforce. Planning and preparation for these internships take place during the graduates' senior year. This bill would provide our new graduates the same coverage as our continuing students.

The Department appreciates the Legislature's support of our work-based learning initiatives and our goal for all students to be globally competitive and locally committed. Preparing our students for the current and emerging workforce here at home will not only address our workforce needs, but will also lead to a thriving Hawaii.

Aloha e Chair Kidani, Vice Chair Kim, and Members of the Committee:

My name is Sherry Menor, President and CEO of the Chamber of Commerce Hawaii ("The Chamber"). The Chamber supports Senate Bill 420 (SB420), which allows newly graduated high school students to be eligible for workers' compensation coverage during the summer following their high school graduation while participating in Department of Education-sponsored work-based learning programs.

SB420 aligns with our 2030 Blueprint for Hawaii: An Economic Action Plan, specifically under the policy pillar for Business Services. This bill promotes policies that drive economic growth, enhance workforce opportunities, and improve the quality of life for Hawaii's residents.

Ensuring students' success beyond high school requires real-world work experience. The Department of Education's 2023-2029 strategic plan emphasizes internships and work-based learning but does not provide workers' compensation coverage for graduates participating in these programs during the summer after high school. Without coverage, students may be discouraged from gaining valuable hands-on experience.

This legislation addresses the gap by extending workers' compensation to recent graduates in department-sponsored work-based learning programs until July 31 of their graduation year. By ensuring student safety, it promotes career readiness and strengthens school-employer partnerships. The Chamber's Education and Workforce Development (EWD) Department works in partnership with the Hawaii DOE to create systems and guidance for educators and employers to implement internships. Through previous work with employers, this bill would alleviate concerns from employers for workers compensation and give the DOE additional oversight for student safety.
