SB 865 SD1 - RELATING TO AGRICULTURE

Chair Garrett, Vice Chair Amato, and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in support of the intent of SB 865 SD1 relating to Agriculture that appropriates funds to establish a permanent Educational Support Associate position within the University of Hawai'i (UH) College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resilience's (CTAHR) Kona Cooperative Extension.

Coffee has emerged as an important cash crop for growers in Hawai'i. It has also become an important export commodity boosting Hawai'i's economy. CTAHR conducts research and provides research-based information to increase coffee production in the state and improve the economic viability of growers. Although coffee research plots exist at multiple CTAHR stations, CTAHR's Agricultural Research and Extension Station (CARES) in Kona currently has the sole Extension Agent engaged in applied research and outreach on coffee. Sustainability of coffee production is threatened by the Coffee Leaf Rust and Coffee Berry Borer and additional research and Extension capacity is needed to support the coffee industry throughout the state.

We strongly support the intent of this bill, and respectfully offer comments that it would be advantageous to have an Extension Agent position rather than an APT (Administrative, Professional and Technical) staff position that focuses on coffee, and other orchard crops with export potential such as macadamia nuts, cacao and tea to meet the needs of coffee and other orchard crops growers in the region and statewide.

We strongly support the intent of SB 865 SD1 with comments, provided that its passage does not replace or adversely impact priorities as indicated in our BOR Approved Budget.

Comments:

The Maui Coffee Association supports the Appropriation of funds to establish a permanent Educational Support Associate position within the University of Hawai'i College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resilience's Kona Cooperative Extension.

Coffee has been grown on Maui for over 100 years and is undergoing a renaissance especially in the realm of large scale production and small farms and growers. Maui coffees have consistently scored well in the state Cupping Competitions sponsored by Hawaii Coffee Association. In 2024 Maui coffees were grouped with the highest average scores of all coffees in the state including those from Kona and Ka'u. Clearly top quality coffee is coming out of Maui and coffee quality is paramount when producing and maintaining a world-class Maui grown coffee.

From a financial perspective Hawaii is the most expensive growing region of the world. With the arrival on Maui of coffee leaf rust (2020) and coffee borer beetles (2016) the survival of the coffee industry in Maui Nui was placed at significant risk. The County of Maui-Office of Economic Development helped alleviate a portion of this risk through its 2020 funding of Optical Color Sorting Equipment currently for use by our local coffee growers. The final step to ensure the viability and sustainability of Maui Coffee is continued funding to support the educational needs related to the farming, processing, roasting, packaging and preparation of Maui Coffee to capture higher yields, maintain quality, and increase profit margins.

In 2024, a staggering 400 million cups of coffee are consumed each day. Each year, the average American spends \$1,097 on coffee. In today's coffee sector, increased consumption is a constant and permanent fixture, with an astounding level of growth achieved with every passing year.

The current estimated size of the Maui coffee industry is approximately 550 acres in production, with 500 acres harvested in Lahaina alone, yielding 2,475,000 pounds of coffee in annual production. With the addition of Mahi Pono entering the coffee market and planting 510 acres of coffee in 2019 Maui County will become the 2nd largest coffee producer in the State at an annual yield of approximately 5,000,000 lb. What follows are projections on how many pounds Maui farmers produce annually.

Certainly, supporting an Educational Support Associate position within the University of Hawai'i College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resilience's Kona Cooperative Extension is a viable use of State funds at such an important time in Hawaii's Coffee industry.

Testimony by Kau Coffee Farmers Cooperative in Support of Amended SB865_SD1

Dear House Representatives,

As representatives of the Kau Coffee Farmers Cooperative, we urge your support for SB865_SD1 to address urgent staffing and funding needs critical to the sustainability of Hawaii's coffee industry.

In previous years, the coffee and orchard crop industries were supported by 4 permanent faculty and 6 permanent staff within CTAHR. However, faculty and staff numbers have decreased by approximately 75%, leaving only a minimal team at the Kona Research Station, along with one staff member employed on temporary grant funding. In November 2024, prior to Federal budget cuts, over \$260,000 was redirected from the USDA SCRI CLR grant outreach budget to other researchers and entities. This reallocation left the program with no funding for the final period of the grant (9/1/24–8/31/25), effectively cutting nearly half of the original budget. Consequently, the program now faces a \$66,000 shortfall for CLR project expenses and struggles to maintain its remaining staff. Without additional funding, the program risks having no staff support for the industries. These reductions in staffing and resources highlight the critical challenges of being understaffed, underfunded, and overstretched, which ultimately compromise the ability to provide adequate support to farmers, processors, and other stakeholders.

The Importance of the Educational Support Associate Position

- This permanent position is indispensable in ensuring that Hawaii's coffee industry—ranked as the state's third most valuable agricultural commodity—receives the necessary educational outreach, applied research, and pest management strategies to thrive.
- Without this position, the program faces a complete loss of staffing support, further
 impairing its ability to assist coffee farmers statewide in combating pests and diseases
 like CBB and CLR.
- Additionally, the macadamia nut and tropical fruit industries, which depend on the Extension program, would lose critical services due to the current inadequate staffing levels.

Since 2011, Andrea Kawabata's Extension program alone has brought over \$4.6 million in grant funding to CTAHR and serve as a critical resource for farmers. Despite these remarkable efforts, the loss of her only program staff due to insufficient funding threatens the industry's future.

Urgency of Immediate Funding. The proposed APT Educational Support Associate position mirrors the successful full-time, permanent APT staffing model provided by the UH-CTAHR SOAP program in 2018. Funding this position now, will alleviate the financial instability created by reliance on temporary grants, ensuring consistent and effective support for Hawaii's agricultural communities.

We respectfully request that SB865_SD1 be amended to fund this position in the 2025 legislative session. The timely implementation of this Act is crucial for the continued success and sustainability of Hawaii's coffee, macadamia, and tropical fruit industries.

Thank you for your consideration and support of Hawaii's agriculture.

The Hawai i Farm Bureau supports SB 865, SD1, which appropriates funds to establish a permanent Educational Support Associate position within the University of Hawaii College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resilience's Kona Cooperative Extension.

The excellent work performed by UH CTAHR for Hawai'i's farmers and ranchers cannot be overstated. The ongoing outreach and education are unparalleled in the State. Farmers and ranchers rely on this program for their success. CTAHR has helped develop and improve agricultural technologies pertinent to Hawai'i's farmers and ranchers. A dedicated person in addition to the single ONE, e.g. 2 FTE is able to follow up on issues, plan a course of remedial action, provide educational consistency/continuity and informally instruct us on how to mitigate potential problems with our crops. As a local entrepreneur business, Hawaiian Goodness uses locally grown produce which coffee is a major component. We have been hard hit for the past several years and rely on the expertise of CTAHR to help us through the crises. It is a dis-service to have only 1 person and temporaries servicing our \$48.2 million industry - a 2nd FTE would definitely help and outreach to the broader community would be exponential. Please support this measure. The cost to place a permanent position is miniscule compared to the revenues which can be reaped for Hawaii State.

Aloha Esteemed Senators and Representatives,

I am writing on behalf of Kauai Coffee Company LLC. in full support of **SB865**. My name is Bronson B. Yadao. I am the Orchard Manager of a 3000-acre coffee plantation on the Westside of Kauai. As many of you know, Hawaii's coffee industry has been decimated by CBB (Coffee Berry Borer) and more recently CLR (Coffee Leaf Rust). Kaua'i was the last major growing region in the State (and world) to be infected by CBB and CLR. The discovery of both took place in 2020 and 2021 respectively.

Geographic isolation is a blessing in the sense that Hawaii's coffee industry was able to stave off both pests- decades, centuries after most of the prominent growing regions of the world. Now that the entire State has both major pests- geographic isolation is also a curse in the sense that industry experts predominantly reside thousands of miles away in Latin America, Africa, and Asia.

As it stands, UH CTAHR has a single extension agent with extensive coffee expertise residing in the Kona region of Hawaii island. Although Andrea Kawabata is very knowledgeable, capable and responsive- she is only a single professional- dealing with an ever-growing threat to the industry across the State.

I strongly support appropriating additional funding for much needed support for additional *expert* staffing, educational events, applied research, travel for statewide outreach, equipment, and materials and supplies.

Aloha Chair Andrew Takuya Garrett, Vice Chair Terez Amato, and Members of the House Committee on Higher Education,

Hawaii Food+ Policy supports SB865 SD1 to establish a permanent Educational Support Associate within CTAHR's Kona Cooperative Extension. This investment addresses gaps in agricultural education, support, and pest management.

CTAHR's 2014 analysis reveals 84% of coffee farms (516 operations) earn under \$10,000 annually on 1.67-acre plots, compared to nine large-scale farms generating over \$250K. CTAHR currently sustains these producers through pest management programs and on-site support; however, limited staffing restricts outreach to small farms and schools.

With only one extension agent and temporary grant-funded staff, 30-47% of grants now fund salaries rather than direct farmer resources. A permanent Educational Support Associate will: accelerate applied research on pest-resistant coffee cultivars and biocontrol methods; expand K-12 outreach; stabilize grant allocations; and strengthen small farms (<5 acres) with pest/disease management guidance and climate adaptation strategies

This role bridges CTAHR's research with on-ground needs, enhancing school gardens as STEM learning hubs while supporting coffee producers facing existential threats. Prioritizing permanent staffing ensures continuity in youth agricultural education and farmer field days—critical for an industry where 94% of operations are small-scale.

Chairperson and Members of the Committee,

My name is SongYi Paik, and I strongly support SB865, which seeks to establish a permanent educational support associate position within the University of Hawai'i College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources' (CTAHR) Kona Cooperative Extension and Applied Research Program. This position is essential to strengthening research, outreach, and farmer education efforts to address the critical challenges facing Hawaii's coffee industry.

Hawai'i's coffee industry is one of the state's most valuable agricultural commodity. However, coffee growers continue to face significant threats, particularly from two devastating pests:

- Coffee Berry Borer (CBB): First detected in Kona in 2010, CBB has since spread to
 multiple islands, reaching Lāna'i in 2020. CBB infestations can cause severe yield losses,
 particularly when harvests are delayed (Barrera, 2008)¹. Effective management requires
 continuous farmer education, research, and outreach to ensure the adoption of best
 practices.
- 2. Coffee Leaf Rust (CLR): First detected in Hawaii in 2020, CLR has now spread to Maui, Hawai'i Island, O'ahu, and Lāna'i. CLR leads to premature leaf drop, weakening plants and significantly reducing coffee cherry production. Further research is urgently needed to identify resistant coffee varieties, assess their viability for Hawaii's unique growing conditions, and educate farmers on effective management strategies.

Despite the industry's statewide presence, coffee growers are underserved due to geographic remoteness and the limited capacity of existing CTAHR personnel. Establishing a permanent educational support associate position will provide much-needed assistance to extension faculty, enhance community outreach, and bolster research efforts aimed at mitigating CBB and CLR.

This position is not just an investment in research and education; it is an investment in the sustainability of Hawai'i's coffee industry. I respectfully urge the committee to support SB865 and ensure that coffee growers across the state receive the assistance they need to protect their livelihoods and maintain the legacy of Hawai'i-grown coffee.

I appreciate the opportunity to provide testimony in support of this important measure.

During the last decade, coffee farmers had faced the two major pests reported in all coffee producer regions around the world, (the coffee berry borer and the coffee leaf rust). Effort addressing those issues had been conducted by Federal, State agences and the coffee farmers associations to develop integrated pest management (IPM) strategies adapted to Hawaiian coffee agroecosystems. However, without the participation of the extension agents (Kona Cooperative Extnsion) it is impossible to deliver alternatives of control than help farmers to suppress those pests and to improved the coffee production systems. Dear Representative Garrett, Representative Amato, and members of the Higher Education Committee,

My name is Andrea Kawabata and I am a UH-CTAHR Extension Agent working with coffee statewide and the tropical fruit and macadamia nut industries in West Hawaii. I write to you in **STRONG SUPPORT for SB865_SD1** which appropriates funds to establish a permanent Educational Support Associate position within the University of Hawai'i College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resilience's Kona Cooperative Extension.

Respectfully, I strongly urge you to amend SB865_SD1 so it is funded this (2025) legislative session. Without this permanent position, my extension program will be crippled and I will not be able to sustain the level of outreach and applied research needed for producers to remain sustainable and in business. While the coffee industry battles Coffee Berry Borer (CBB), the most damaging insect pest of coffee, and now, Coffee Leaf Rust (CLR), the world's most economically devastating coffee disease, my program does not want to let the farmers down and would like to continue serving farmers and other stakeholders to the best of our ability.

HDOA currently ranks **coffee as the #3 most valuable agricultural commodity in Hawaii**. And yet, extension support for this important industry continues to shrink. Historically and prior to the arrival of the CBB and CLR, Hawaii's coffee industry was supported by two full-time Extension agents, one Extension specialist, one researcher, and six research station technicians - all permanent positions. Today, my position is the only Extension position dedicated to coffee and Kona Research Station's two research technicians divide their time between the Kona and Mealani Research Stations and other non-coffee projects. Any and all coffee and orchard crops Extension program staff are temporarily and 100% funded through grants.

The macadamia nut industry is ranked as Hawaii's #7 most valuable ag commodity and the tropical fruit industry continues to grow. While there was one Extension specialist and one Extension agent dedicated to macadamia and cacao island-wide, and tropical fruit in East Hawaii, this husband and wife team left in 2020 and these full-time, permanent positions have not since been filled. And so, these crops fell back to my program.

In the past, 4 permanent faculty and 6 permanent staff were dedicated to the coffee and orchard crop industries. Today, CTAHR faculty and staff has been reduced by about 75% with just myself, Nick and Bevin at the Kona Research Station, and Matt who is hired on temporary grant

funds. Additionally, this past November 2024 (prior to the Federal cuts) and without any personal communications from the project director, over \$260,000 from my USDA SCRI CLR grant outreach budget was diverted and given to researchers and other entities, leaving me with ZERO funding for the final period (9/1/24-8/31/25) of the grant. Nearly half of my total contracted budget was swept. Because of this action by the PI, I now have over \$66,000 in budget shortfall for CLR project expenses and a dedicated staff (Matt) who I am desperately trying to keep employed. If funding doesn't come through, my program's staff support for the industries will be reduced to ZERO. These numbers tell a story that **we are understaffed**, **underfunded**, **and spread too thin** and as such, we cannot provide the adequate support that farmers, processors, and other stakeholders should be receiving.

If you consider how important secretaries are to an office, their positions parallel the importance of staff to an Extension program. Since 2011, my program has brought in more than \$4.6 million to CTAHR and a pending total of approx. \$11 million. Together, staff and I have conducted hundreds of workshops, webinars, and field day events statewide and I can tell you first-hand that a second person is critical for event set-up, moving tables, chairs, putting up and breaking down tents, traveling with multiple luggages filled with educational booth display items, posting flyers, interacting with growers during public events, creating a monthly newsletter, posting events and announcements online, sending reminders to participants, moderating the chat and muting participants during webinars, taking photos and videos, maintaining demonstration field plots, etc. My current temporary staff is so dedicated and well-versed that he was able to apply for a Jr. Extension Agent position to take on some of my duties while I was on maternity leave so that farmers would continue to receive program support and recommendations while I was away.

Our program is one of high output and impact and we would like the opportunity to continue to do so. We have helped coffee growers statewide develop and implement an IPM for CBB control which has been successful at lowering beetle damage rates from 40% to less than 5%. We provided outreach on CLR prior to its arrival and so when it was first found in Maui, we were able to help with its identification and published alerts, field guides, and sanitation and management recommendations immediately. We still have a lot of work to do with CLR but are gaining ground as research is finalized. Our own applied research projects have given coffee farmers additional tools for controlling CBB (with Delegate WG, pruning, etc.), coffee root-knot nematode (with 'Meisner' rootstock, replant strategies, etc.), and CLR (with 'Ito' Catimor hybrid the first vetted, CLR-resistant trees distributed to farmers, control recommendations, etc.). Much of this work would not be possible without staff support and none of it can be done without funding from at least three grant-funded projects annually.

In closing, the APT position described in SB865_SD1 will support Hawaii's top agricultural commodities and help my program focus on what's important - Hawaii's farming community. With this position, we hope to mirror the UH-CTAHR SOAP program with their full-time, permanent APT provided by legislature in 2018 and seek to build capacity to better support the coffee, macadamia, and tropical fruit industries one valuable STAFF member at a time. And, while I would still seek grant funding to support and conduct educational outreach and

applied research throughout the state, this permanent position would greatly alleviate the headache and heartache of letting farmers down because of the decision of others who do not appear to have Hawaii's agricultural industries in their best interest.

I humbly ask that you support an amended version of SB865_SD1 that would approve and fund the position in 2025. Thank you for taking the time to read my email and to hear my plea.

Chair Garrett, Vice Chair Amato and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on Senate Bill 865. My name is Stuart T. Nakamoto. I am an Extension Economist/Specialist at the UH-CTAHR however I am testifying on my own behalf and not the CTAHR. I strongly support SB865.

The reasons enumerated in the measure explain the rationale behind this request and the economic benefits of the coffee industry to the state. I would like to elaborate on some points.

The bill references a crop value of \$48.2 million, which is right after harvest at the farmgate. When value is added by further processing to green coffee (the stage before roasting) that crop is worth over \$67 million, while still at Hawaii agricultural operations. This revenue supports producers, their families, and their communities. Very importantly, coffee contributes much to the visitor industry and Hawaii's economy.

All with one agent. Moreso, the coffee industry is at a critical juncture -- external funding support is being cut just when assistance is needed to cope with Coffee Leaf Rust, Coffee Berry Borer and other pests.
