## RELATING TO TELECOMMUNICATION

Chair McKelvey, Vice Chair Gabbard, and Members of the Committee, thank you for the opportunity to testify on S.B. 870.

The Department of Accounting and General Services (DAGS) offers comments for

S.B. 870, which requires the Comptroller to identify state office buildings that can provide equitable telecommunication access to allow certain residents, including those with disabilities, to participate remotely in legislative hearings and requires a report to the legislature.

We appreciate the intent of this measure and, based on our research and discussion with the Hawaii State Library System, we believe the infrastructure and resources may already be in place. The Hawaii State Library System currently has 51 libraries that have been outfitted with internet access (wifi), laptops, are environmentally controlled (air conditioning), and have a staff capable of providing the necessary support to potential users wanting to access legislative

hearings. The State's libraries are designed to support residents with disabilities to ensure access to the services available there. We will continue to work closely with the Hawaii State Library System to provide support and to help share information about the existing access.

To: Sen. Angus L.K. McKelvey, Chair Sen. Mike Gabbard, Vice Chair Members of the Senate Committee on Government Operations

The Hawaii State Public Library System (HSPLS) **supports** the intent of S.B. 2482 and provides comments on this measure, which requires the Comptroller to identify state office buildings that can provide equitable telecommunication access to allow certain residents, including residents with disabilities, to participate remotely in legislative hearings. This measure also requires the Comptroller to submit a report to the Legislature.

The HSPLS has been providing the public resources to participate in the legislative process for many years. In 2020, while most businesses and government offices were still closed to the public, the HSPLS deployed 16 Chromebooks and charging stations to each of our 51 public libraries statewide to supplement the technology already available at our public libraries.

Working in coordination with both the Senate and House Clerk's Offices, we also updated our website and trained HSPLS staff in order to effectively assist any member of the public who wanted to participate in the 2021 Legislative Session. The equipment and processes remain in place for any member of the public to participate in the legislative process each year. We look forward to working with the Comptroller to achieve the intent of this measure.

#### RE: SENATE BILL NO. 0870, RELATING TO TELECOMMUNICATIONS.

Chair McKelvey, Vice Chair Gabbard, and Members of the Committee:

The Hawaii Primary Care Association (HPCA) is a 501(c)(3) organization established to advocate for, expand access to, and sustain high quality care through the statewide network of Community Health Centers throughout the State of Hawaii. The HPCA <u>SUPPORTS</u> Senate Bill No. 0870, RELATING TO TELECOMMUNICATIONS

By way of background, the HPCA represents Hawaii's Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs). FQHCs provide desperately needed medical services at the frontlines to over 150,000 patients each year who live in rural and underserved communities. Long considered champions for creating a more sustainable, integrated, and wellness-oriented system of health, FQHCs provide a more efficient, more effective and more comprehensive system of healthcare.

This bill, as received by your Committee, would require the Comptroller to identify certain state resources that can be utilized for telecommunication access to increase neighborhood island and rural Oahu residents; participation in the state legislative process.

This bill would take effect upon its approval.

Hawaii has long been at the forefront of integrating newer technologies into daily life. One example of this is Hawaii's Telehealth Law which has served as a model across the United States. Yet, it was only after COVID struck our islands that this law became fully integrated into daily life.

Today, it is common practice to ZOOM or SKYPE with your health practitioner instead of physically going to the provider's office for a visit. When COVID first hit our islands, many health providers had to limit the number of patients that could be serviced in-person because of a scarcity of Personal Protective Equipment, restrictions in the gatherings of groups, and the need for changes to the physical arrangement of examination rooms and other diagnostic facilities.

For people with adequate broadband access, telehealth was a lifeline for the provision of essential primary health care services. Yet, health care facilities in rural areas experienced the same problems when COVID hit. They too had to limit the number of patients they could see. But because these communities lacked adequate broadband access, they were effectively cut off from primary care. Many were forced to bear their maladies until it became necessary to go to the emergency room.

In light of this, the HPCA views the lack of broadband access in rural areas as an issue of social equity. In this day and age, everyone should have equal access to health care. Telehealth was envisioned as the means of leveling the field between urban and rural areas. The lack of broadband ensures that urban and rural communities remain unequal.

If this bill turns certain key state facilities into broadband hubs, it would not only help to promote the public's access to the legislative process, but also provide all citizens with desperately needed services such as telehealth.

#### For this reason, the HPCA urges your favorable consideration of this measure.
