I am writing to express my strong opposition to SB 95, which proposes increased fines for operating a vehicle or moped without a current inspection certificate. While vehicle safety is undoubtedly important, this bill disproportionately penalizes individuals who may already be struggling with financial hardship and fails to address the root causes of non-compliance with inspection requirements.

1. Financial Burden on Low-Income Individuals

Increasing fines for failing to obtain a certificate of inspection places an undue financial burden on individuals and families who may already be struggling with the cost of living in Hawai'i. The current cost of inspections and potential repair costs required to pass can be prohibitive for low-income residents. Penalizing them with higher fines only exacerbates financial difficulties rather than promoting compliance.

2. Lack of Consideration for Unforeseen Circumstances

There are numerous valid reasons why a driver may have an expired inspection certificate, including delays in scheduling an inspection, temporary financial hardship, or unforeseen vehicle issues. SB 95 does not account for these situations and instead implements a punitive measure that fails to consider real-world challenges vehicle owners face.

3. Better Alternatives for Compliance

Instead of imposing higher fines, the legislature should consider alternative measures to encourage compliance. Potential solutions include:

- Offering financial assistance or waiver programs for low-income residents who struggle to afford inspections.
- o Implementing a grace period with warnings before imposing fines.
- Enhancing public awareness campaigns to educate vehicle owners about inspection requirements and deadlines.

4. Unfairly Target Moped Owners

The bill treats mopeds in the same manner as automobiles despite the significant difference in vehicle impact, usage, and maintenance costs. Many moped users rely on their vehicles as an affordable means of transportation and should not be disproportionately penalized for minor inspection lapses.

5. Negative Impact on Transportation Accessibility

For individuals who rely on their vehicles to commute to work, attend school, or transport their families, increased fines for an expired inspection certificate could lead to a cycle of hardship. Suppose fines make it more difficult for individuals to afford repairs or re-

inspection. In that case, they may be forced off the road entirely, limiting their ability to maintain employment or meet daily responsibilities.

For these reasons, I respectfully urge you to vote **against** SB 95. Rather than imposing excessive fines, I encourage the legislature to explore more effective and equitable solutions to enhance vehicle safety without unfairly burdening residents.
