A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO SCHOOL MEALS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:


1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Hawaii's working 2 families face significant economic challenges, including the 3 rising cost of living, inflation, and limited affordable options 4 for basic needs. Access to nutritious meals is essential for 5 the overall well-being of Hawaii's people. Further, for 6 students, access to healthy meals is critical to academic 7 success and achievement. However, for some students, school 8 meals may be their only consistent source of food.

9 The legislature also finds that Aloha United Way released 10 the asset limited, income constrained, employed (ALICE) report 11 in January 2025, which identified that, while twelve per cent of households in the State are below the poverty line, twenty-nine 12 13 per cent are identified as ALICE households. ALICE households 14 are defined as households with incomes above the federal poverty 15 level but continue to struggle with the bare-minimum costs of 16 basic necessities such as housing, childcare, food,

17 transportation, health care, and a smartphone plan, plus taxes.

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
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1	The repor	et also found that forty-six per cent of ALICE
2	households experience consistent food insecurity.	
3	The legislature further finds that subsidizing the meal	
4	costs for	s students whose family income is not more than three
5	hundred p	per cent of the federal poverty level will have the
6	benefit of providing support to families in need. Additionally,	
7	subsidized meal costs for these students will allow students to	
8	focus on their academic careers, extracurricular activities, and	
9	life goals. Meal subsidies at department of education schools	
10	will allow more students to achieve a high-quality education	
11	while ensuring adequate nutrition for physical development and	
12	mental well-being.	
13	Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to:	
14	(1)	Beginning with the 2025-2026 school year, expand free
15		school meal coverage to students who currently qualify
16		for reduced-price lunch;
17	(2)	Beginning with the 2026-2027 school year, expand free
18		school meal coverage to students whose family income
19		is not more than three hundred per cent of the federal
20		poverty level; and

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1	(1) Within the first twenty-one days of the first semester		
2	of a school year while the student's application for		
3	free or reduced lunch is being processed; or		
4	(2) Within seven days after a student's meal fund account		
5	reaches a zero or negative balance].		
6	[(c)] <u>(e)</u> The department may adopt rules or policies		
7	governing the collection of funds for student meal accounts with		
8	a negative fund balance; provided that no rule or policy shall		
9	prohibit feeding a student [as required pursuant to subsection		
10	(b).] or otherwise conflict with subsection (d).		
11	(f) It is the intent of this section not to jeopardize the		
12	receipt of any federal aid and, only to the extent necessary to		
13	effectuate this intent, the governor may modify strict		
14	provisions of this section, but shall promptly report any		
15	modification with the governor's reasons therefore to the next		
16	succeeding session of the legislature for review."		
17	SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general		
18	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$565,000 or so much		
19	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2025-2026 and the		
20	same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year		

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2026-2027 for meal subsidies for students eligible for reduced price meals.

3 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department4 of education for the purposes of this Act.

SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$2,800,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2026-2027 for meal subsidies for students at department of education schools whose family income is not more than three hundred per cent of the federal poverty level.

11 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of 12 education for the purposes of this Act.

13 SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed14 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

15 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2025.
