
A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that school health
2 assistants under existing state law may administer medications
3 to students in public schools. However, due to vacancies, many
4 schools experience challenges in meeting the needs of students
5 who are prescribed medications or may benefit from receiving
6 medications in emergency situations while on campus.

7 The legislature further finds that school staff acting as
8 volunteers can be an effective substitute after completing
9 training and general instruction in tasks such as correctly
10 interpreting the health care provider's orders; identifying the
11 correct student to receive the medication; identifying the
12 correct route of administration of medication, either oral or
13 nasal; confirming the correct dosage; administering the
14 medications at the right time; and duly documenting events.

15 Skilled nursing services, such as those that require a license,
16 are out of scope for both school health assistants and trained
17 volunteers.



1 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to authorize public
2 school employees or agents who have completed appropriate
3 training to act as volunteer substitutes to administer
4 medications to students consistent with standards applicable to
5 school health assistants.

6 SECTION 2. Section 302A-853, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
7 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:

8 "(a) School health assistants, and other employees and
9 agents trained by a health care professional employed or
10 contracted by the department, may assist students by
11 administering oral, nasal, and topical medication, and in
12 emergency situations, other premeasured medication; provided
13 that:

14 (1) If the student receiving the medication is a minor, a
15 parent or guardian requests and authorizes the
16 administration of medication;

17 (2) The medication has been prescribed by a licensed
18 physician, ~~[as defined in section 334-1,]~~ physician
19 assistant, advanced practice registered nurse, or [by
20 a] other practitioner with prescriptive authority;



1 (3) The administration of the medication is with the
2 approval of a health care professional within the
3 department, department of health, or health care
4 service as defined in section 323D-2 pursuant to a
5 written agreement with the department; and

6 (4) The administration of the medication is necessary for
7 the health of the student and for the student's
8 attendance at school."

9 SECTION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
10 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

11 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 3000.
