A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PEER SUPPORT PROGRAMS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that parenting can be		
2	challenging for anyone, but especially for parents and families		
3	whose basic needs are not met. Parents and caregivers who lac		
4	needed support may experience depression and mental health		
5	challenges, intimate partner violence, child abuse and neglect,		
6	and substance addiction. This in turn may cause early childhood		
7	trauma for the children under their care.		
8	The legislature further finds that each year in Hawaii,		
9	close to six hundred children from birth to age five are		
10	confirmed to be victims of child abuse and neglect, although the		
11	actual number of cases may be as much as five times greater.		
12	The legislature notes that half of all children in the child		
13	welfare system are under the age of five. Child rearing		
14	practices and handling parenting responsibilities made up the		
15	majority of contributing factors to child abuse and neglect,		
16	along with drug use. Child abuse and neglect impacts brain		
17	development and is costly, with the total lifetime economic		

- 1 burden associated with child abuse and neglect estimated to be
- 2 \$2,600,000,000 in Hawaii. The legislature additionally finds
- 3 that fifty-eight per cent of Hawaii children live in families
- 4 made vulnerable by adverse childhood experiences, which include
- 5 family violence, substance abuse, untreated family mental health
- 6 issues, divorce, or incarceration.
- 7 The legislature additionally finds that peer-to-peer
- 8 support programs provide people with an instant and
- 9 cost-effective safety net. Parents and caregivers have a place
- 10 where they can learn, get screening and referrals, share
- 11 resources, and build their self-confidence. The goal of these
- 12 programs is to keep parents and children together, strengthen
- 13 and grow community support and services, and increase the sense
- 14 of hope and self-assurance amongst parents and caregivers of
- 15 young children. Peer-to-peer support programs have also proven
- 16 to be effective in reducing negative parenting practices,
- 17 connecting victims of intimate partner violence to appropriate
- 18 support, and encouraging completion of substance use disorder
- 19 programs.
- The legislature notes that investing early in peer-to-peer
- 21 support programs can save millions of taxpayer dollars in

2 the prenatal-to-five-year time period can save seven times in downstream costs, including reducing costs associated with 3 treatment programs, child welfare programs, special education 4 5 programs, and incarceration. 6 The purpose of this Act is to support parents and 7 caregivers of children from birth to age five by appropriating 8 funds to the family health services division of the department 9 of health to establish and oversee peer-to-peer support 10 programs. SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general 11 12 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ 13 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2025-2026 and the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal 14 year 2026-2027 for the family health services division of the 15 16 department of health to establish and support peer-to-peer support programs for families with children from birth to age 17 five, to be expended as follows: 18 19 for full-time equivalent ((1)FTE) 20 program specialist V position and full-time 21 equivalent (FTE) program specialist IV position;
