H.B. NO. 409

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ISLAND BURIAL COUNCILS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that iwi kupuna 2 (ancestral remains) hold profound spiritual and cultural significance for Native Hawaiian people. The practice of malama 3 4 iwi kupuna (caring for ancestral remains) is an essential part 5 of Native Hawaiian traditions and is typically a kuleana 6 (responsibility) reserved for ohana (family). Native Hawaiian 7 burial beliefs, customs, and practices ensure that the remains 8 of ancestors are treated with the utmost respect and that their 9 spiritual connection to the land and their descendants is 10 honored.

11 The legislature further finds that island burial councils 12 play a critical role in preserving iwi kupuna and upholding 13 Native Hawaiian burial practices. While the membership of each 14 council currently includes representatives from specified 15 geographic regions, as well as representatives having 16 development and large property owner interests, the primary 17 criterion for regional representatives is an understanding of



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1 Hawaiian culture and history and the burial beliefs, customs, 2 and practices of Native Hawaiians. However, no similar 3 criterion exists for landowner and developer representatives. 4 The legislature recognizes that to fully align the 5 composition of island burial council with Hawaiian values 6 related to malalma iwi kupuna, representatives of development 7 and property owner interests are not necessary members. The 8 inclusion of these representatives may detract from the 9 council's focus on the care and protection of iwi kupuna, which 10 is a deeply spiritual and cultural responsibility.

11 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to align the 12 composition of island burial councils with values related to 13 malama iwi kapuna by ensuring that the councils are composed 14 primarily of persons with a deep understanding of Native Hawaiian cultural practices, removing the requirement for 15 16 representatives having development and large property owner 17 interests, and decreasing the overall composition of the island burial councils. 18

19 SECTION 2. Section 6E-43.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is20 amended by:

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1. Amending subsection (a) to read as follows:



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1 "(a) There shall be established within the department five island burial councils, one each for Hawai`i, Maui/Lāna`i, 2 3 Moloka`i, O`ahu, and Kaua`i/Ni`ihau, to implement section 6E-43. Each council shall consist of [nine] seven members, except the 4 Moloka`i council, which shall consist of five members. 5 [Each 6 council shall consist of no more than three representatives of 7 development and large landowner interests; provided that the 8 Moloka`i council shall-consist of no more than one 9 representative of development and large landowner interests.] 10 The [remaining] council members shall represent the geographic regions identified in paragraphs (1) through (5). At all times, 11 12 at least two of the regional representatives of each council 13 shall have been appointed from a list of nominees submitted to 14 the governor by the office of Hawaiian affairs, as provided 15 under subsection (b). Each council shall include at least one 16 representative for each geographic region identified as follows: 17 .(1) The Hawai`i council shall include the following 18 geographic regions: Kohala, Kona, Ka`ū, Puna, Hilo, 19 and Hāmākua;

| 21 | organizat | ions, such as Hui Malama I Na Kupuna O Hawai`i Nei, |
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1 shall adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91 necessary to carry out 2 the purposes of this section. The council members shall serve 3 without compensation, but shall be reimbursed for necessary 4 expenses incurred during the performance of their duties. The 5 councils shall be a part of the department for administrative 6 purposes."

7 SECTION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed8 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

9 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
