A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FARM TO FAMILIES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that one in three
- 2 households in Hawaii is struggling to secure consistent access
- 3 to food. This data paints a sobering picture of families in
- 4 distress, underscoring the need for immediate action to restore
- 5 the basic dignity of nourishment to every household across the
- 6 islands.
- 7 The legislature further finds that the crisis
- 8 disproportionately affects the most vulnerable in Hawaii: the
- 9 keiki. Nearly thirty per cent of children in Hawaii are growing
- 10 up in food-insecure homes, some enduring entire days without a
- 11 meal. When experiencing hunger, keiki can face increased risk
- 12 of cognitive issues, aggression, anxiety, behavioral problems,
- 13 depression, and suicidal ideation. For families facing hunger,
- 14 fresh, healthy produce is often one of the first things removed
- 15 from grocery lists, negatively affecting long-term health.
- 16 The legislature also finds that this emergency
- 17 disproportionately impacts Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islanders



- 1 the most, with more than forty per cent of households
- 2 experiencing food insecurity, a reflection of longstanding
- 3 inequities in access to resources, economic opportunity, and
- 4 essential services. The legislature believes that the State's
- 5 communities should not bear this burden alone.
- 6 The legislature recognizes that Hawaii's food banks worked
- 7 with over five hundred agency partners, such as schools,
- 8 community-based nonprofits, churches, community centers, and
- 9 food pantries, to distribute more than twenty-seven million
- 10 meals in 2023, collectively serving two hundred forty thousand
- 11 individuals each month, in every community across the State.
- 12 These numbers are nearing the numbers served during the height
- 13 of the COVID-19 pandemic, but the support systems available
- 14 during the COVID-19 pandemic are no longer in place.
- 15 The legislature additionally finds that, to try to bridge
- 16 the gap between the State's food banks and their partners to
- 17 bring fresh, Hawaii-grown produce to families, the food banks
- 18 have partnered with five hundred seventy-five local farms and
- 19 food hubs to create a consistent market for Hawaii agriculture
- 20 producers, strengthening the State's community food systems and
- 21 creating a healthier, more resilient Hawaii. For example, the

- 1 Hawaii Foodbank invested over \$11,000,000 in Hawaii-grown
- 2 produce over the last five years, which, using the local foods
- 3 economic multiplier, equates to an investment of nearly
- 4 \$19,000,000 in the State's local economy.
- 5 The legislature notes that, as the cost of importing food
- 6 continues to rise, increasing the State's reliance on local
- 7 agriculture is not only a sustainable solution but also a
- 8 necessary one. Farmers across Hawaii have the potential to grow
- 9 more fresh, nutritious food that can directly serve those most
- 10 in need. By strengthening the connection between local farms
- 11 and community food systems, the State can reduce its dependence
- 12 on imports and ensure that more families have access to
- 13 Hawaii-grown produce like Okinawan sweet potato, choy sum, bok
- 14 choy, long beans, breadfruit, kalo, and more.
- 15 The legislature further finds that programs that encourage
- 16 partnerships between farmers and food assistance programs can
- 17 make a profound impact. By investing in Hawaii-grown
- 18 agriculture producers, the State can support not only local
- 19 farmers but also the communities they feed. This approach
- 20 aligns with the values of mālama 'āina--caring for the land--and
- 21 ensures that the State honors the deep connection between the

- 1 land and the people of Hawaii. Uplifting local farmers will
- 2 also uplift the entire community, fostering a more resilient
- 3 food system that can withstand future challenges.
- 4 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to establish and
- 5 appropriate funds for the Hawaii farm to families program to
- 6 fund food banks in the State to purchase, store, and transport
- 7 fresh, Hawaii-grown or -produced food to food insecure
- 8 communities. This program will serve the State's food needs,
- 9 provide Hawaii's agriculture producers with a market to support
- 10 their operations, and keep moneys circulating within the State
- 11 to boost the local economy.
- 12 SECTION 2. Chapter 141, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 13 amended by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and
- 14 to read as follows:
- 15 "PART . HAWAII FARM TO FAMILIES PROGRAM
- 16 §141- Definitions. For the purposes of this part:
- "Department" means the department of agriculture.
- 18 "Food bank" has the same meaning as in title 7 United
- 19 States Code section 7501(5).
- 20 "Fresh, Hawaii-grown or -produced food" means fruits,
- 21 vegetables, nuts, coffee, eggs, poultry and poultry products,

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- 1 livestock products, milk and milk products, aquacultural and
- 2 maricultural products, and horticultural products that are one
- 3 hundred per cent grown, raised, and harvested in Hawaii.
- 4 §141- Hawaii farm to families program. (a) There is
- 5 established the Hawaii farm to families program to be
- 6 administered by the department. Under the program, the
- 7 department shall relieve food shortages by providing funds to
- 8 food banks located in the State to facilitate consistent supply
- 9 chains of fresh, Hawaii-grown or -produced food to food insecure
- 10 communities.
- 11 (b) Food banks that receive support pursuant to this
- 12 section shall use the funds to purchase, store, and transport
- 13 fresh, Hawaii-grown or -produced food in the State to recipients
- 14 at no cost to the recipients.
- 15 \$141- Rules. The department shall adopt rules pursuant
- 16 to chapter 91 necessary for the purposes of this part."
- 17 SECTION 3. The department of agriculture shall submit a
- 18 report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the
- 19 convening of the regular sessions of 2026 and 2027 that contains
- 20 a summary of the activities of the Hawaii farm to families
- 21 program established under section 2 of this Act, including:

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- 1 (1) The amount of funds expended by the program;
- 2 (2) Food banks participating in the program, broken out by
- 3 county;
- 4 (3) Amount of food purchased and distributed, by volume
- 5 and dollar value;
- 6 (4) Category of food purchased and their island origin, by
- 7 volume and dollar value; and
- **8** (5) Any other findings and recommendations, including any
- 9 proposed legislation.
- 10 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
- 11 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 12 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2025-2026 and
- 13 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
- 14 year 2026-2027 for the Hawaii farm to families program.
- 15 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 16 of agriculture for the purposes of this Act.
- 17 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
