A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO SEX TRAFFICKING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that sex trafficking is a 2 pervasive problem that is part of the larger phenomenon of 3 commercial sexual exploitation. A 2020 report by the Office of 4 Sex Trafficking Intervention Research of Arizona State 5 University and the Hawaii state commission on the status of 6 women noted that sex trafficking victims have been found 7 throughout Hawaii's urban and rural areas and include youth who 8 attend school. The report also observed that the "lack of a 9 general understanding of the scope and complexity of sex 10 trafficking in Hawaii has allowed the victimization of Hawaii 11 residents to continue". Similarly, the National Human 12 Trafficking Resource Center observed that the widespread lack of 13 awareness and understanding of human trafficking has resulted in 14 low levels of survivor identification by the people who most 15 often encounter them. Because trafficking occurs in legitimate 16 business settings and residential neighborhoods in addition to 17 underground markets, exploited or trafficked persons are often



in plain view and interacting with unsuspecting community
members.

3 The legislature also finds that the adverse impacts of sex 4 trafficking are far-reaching and affect individuals, families, 5 and communities. Further, traffickers may target school-aged 6 children by having classmates or peers befriend the victim and 7 lure the victim to parties and other activities. Traffickers 8 also use social media platforms and websites to attract 9 potential victims. However, victims are often reluctant to report their traffickers, who commonly employ tactics such as 10 emotional manipulation and control, intimidation, threats, and 11 12 deceit. In some cases, the trafficker may be a family member or 13 romantic partner of the victim.

14 For these reasons, the legislature recognizes the urgent 15 need for educational and outreach activities that will help to 16 identify and prevent sex trafficking before it occurs. 17 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to require: 18 (1)The posting of informational placards containing 19 information on sex trafficking and resources available 20 to sex trafficking victims in public buildings and at 21 other specified locations;



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1	(2)	The department of education to provide training to
2		teachers, school administrators, and other school
3		personnel on the dynamics of sex trafficking and
4		strategies for prevention and response; and
5	(3)	The department of the attorney general to develop and
6		implement a series of public education and outreach
7		events on the dynamics of sex trafficking and the
8		importance of community involvement in sex trafficking
9		prevention and response efforts, and to appropriate
10		moneys to the department for this purpose.
11	SECT	ION 2. Chapter 27, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended
12	by adding	a new section to part I to be appropriately designated
13	and to rea	ad as follows:

15	<u>required.</u>	(a) Each of the locations specified below, upon the
16	<u>availabil</u>	ity of the model placard described in subsection (c),

19	public and	d employees, and in a place where similar notices are
20	<u>customari</u>	ly posted, an informational placard that complies with
21	the requir	rements of this section:

3	(2)	All offices of county agencies;
4	(3)	All school campuses under the jurisdiction of the
5		department of education; and
6	(4)	All offices and classrooms at each school campus in

8	(b)	The informational placard required to be posted
9	pursuant	to subsection (a) shall be at least eight and one-half
10	inches by	eleven inches in size, written in a sixteen-point font
11	<u>or larger</u>	, and shall include:
12	(1)	An explanation of sex trafficking and typical forms of
13		sex trafficking;
14	(2)	A statement that victims of sex trafficking are
15		protected under federal and state law;
16	(3)	Information on resources and support, including the
17		National Human Trafficking Hotline; and
18	(4)	Detailed information on the National Human Trafficking
19		Hotline, including specific statements that the
20		hotline:



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1	(A)	May be reached by calling a telephone number, to
2		be printed on the placard, or by sending a text
3		message to a number, to be printed on the
4		placard, to access help and services;
5	<u>(B)</u>	Is available twenty-four hours a day, seven days
6		a week, every day of the year;
7	(C)	Can provide help, referral to services, training,
8		and general information in more than two hundred
9		languages;
10	<u>(D)</u>	Is operated by a nonprofit, non-governmental
11		organization; and
12	<u>(E)</u>	Will ensure that all communications with the
13		hotline are anonymous and confidential.
14	(c) No 1.	ater than January 1, 2026, the department of human
15	services shall	develop a model placard that complies with the
16	requirements of	f this section and shall make the model placard
17	available for a	download on the department's website."
18	SECTION 3	. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
19	amended by add	ing a new section to part III to be appropriately
20	designated and	to read as follows:

12		racial and ethic backgrounds, sexual orientations, and
13		gender identities;
14	(5)	Strategies to assist in the prevention of child sex
15		trafficking;
16	(6)	Trauma-informed strategies for responding to victims
17		of sex trafficking;
18	(7)	Informational resources for victims of sex
19		trafficking;
20	(8)	Information on victim service providers that provide
21		services to students who have been identified as



1		victims of sex trafficking or who are at risk of
2		victimization; and
3	(9)	Information on the importance of obtaining
4		enthusiastic consent, in the context of dating and
5		intimate relationships, with respect to preventing sex
6		trafficking and other forms of sexual violence.
7	(b)	At the beginning of each school year, the department
8	shall pro	vide teachers, educational officers, and school-based
9	behaviora	l health specialists with explanatory information on
10	departmen	t-approved protocols for providing services to
11	identifie	d victims of sex trafficking.
12	(C)	The department may coordinate and contract with any
13	state or	county department or agency, victim service provider,
14	or any ot	her expert in the field of sex trafficking prevention
15	and respo	nse to carry out its duties under this section.
16	(d)	As used in this section, "victim service provider"
17	means any	non-governmental organization that provides direct
18	intervent	ion, including social, medical, mental health,
19	behaviora	l health, legal, case management, educational,
20	emergency	, or housing services to victims of sex trafficking."



1	SECI	TION 4. (a) The department of the attorney general
2	shall dev	elop and implement a series of public education and
3	outreach events on the dynamics of sex trafficking and the	
4	importance of community involvement in sex trafficking	
5	prevention and response efforts. The events shall be held in	
6	the counties of Hawaii, Kauai, Maui, and the city and county of	
7	Honolulu, and may include town hall-style events and the	
8	staffing of informational booths or tables at existing	
9	community-based events. The department shall disseminate	
10	information on:	
11	(1)	Vulnerable populations and risk factors for sex
12		trafficking and commercial sexual exploitation,
13		including community-level risk factors and
14		society-level risk factors;
15	(2)	Specific locations in each county where confirmed sex
16		trafficking has occurred;
17	(3)	Laws that criminalize sex trafficking, including
18		penalties faced by convicted sex traffickers;
19	(4)	Methods used by sex traffickers to lure victims into
20		<pre>sex trafficking;</pre>
21	(5)	Ways to identify victims of sex trafficking;



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1	(6)	Effects of sex trafficking on a victim's social,
2		mental, and physical health;
3	(7)	Adverse impacts of sex trafficking on victims'
4		families and on communities in which sex trafficking
5		occurs;
6	(8)	Actions that community members can take to support sex
7		trafficking prevention and response efforts;
8	(9)	Resources for victims of sex trafficking, including
9		the availability of services for victims; and
10	(10)	State and national hotlines for victims and witnesses
11		of sex trafficking.
12	(b)	The department of the attorney general may coordinate
13	and contra	act with any state or county department of agency,
14	victim service provider, or any other expert in the field of sex	
15	trafficking prevention and response to carry out its duties	
16	under this Act.	
17	(c)	As used in this Act, "victim service provider" means
18	any non-g	overnmental organization that provides direct
19	intervent	ion, including social, medical, mental health,
20	behaviora	l health, legal, case management, educational,
21	emergency	, or housing services to victims of sex trafficking.



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1 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general 2 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much 3 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2025-2026 and the 4 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 5 2026-2027 for developing and implementing the public education 6 and outreach events required by section 4 of this Act. 7 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department 8 of the attorney general for the purposes of this Act. SECTION 6. New statutory material is underscored. 9 10 SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2025. 11

Requires and appropriates moneys for the Department of the Attorney General to develop and implement public education and outreach events on the dynamics of sex trafficking and the importance of community involvement in prevention and response efforts.

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
