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A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PHARMACY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. Chapter 461, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
3	and to read as follows:
4	" <u>\$461- Registered pharmacy technicians; certificate of</u>
5	registration required. (a) Beginning January 1, 2026, no
6	person shall act as a pharmacy technician without first
7	obtaining a valid certificate of registration issued by the
8	board pursuant to this section.
9	(b) Each certificate of registration shall be valid
10	through December 31 of each odd-numbered year, upon which the
11	registration shall lapse and a new registration shall be
12	required.
13	(c) The registration fee for a pharmacy technician shall
14	be \$20.
15	(d) Beginning January 1, 2026, a pharmacy shall only
16	employ registered pharmacy technicians to perform pharmacy
17	technician duties. The pharmacist-in-charge shall verify that



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1	the person is registered as a pharmacy technician and that the				
2	board has issued a certificate of registration for the pharmacy				
3	technician before the pharmacy technician performs any tasks				
4	identified in this chapter or rules adopted pursuant to this				
5	chapter. The supervising registered pharmacist shall be				
6	responsible for the actions of the registered pharmacy				
7	technician.				
8	(e) The certificate of registration shall be prominently				
9	displayed in an area accessible to the public in the workplace				
10	where the registered pharmacy technician is employed or				
11	practices.				
12	(f) If the registered pharmacy technician is suspected to				
13	have violated any law or rule regarding the practice of				
14	pharmacy, legend drugs, or controlled substances or if there is				
15	evidence that a registered pharmacy technician may have violated				
16	any of these laws or rules, the pharmacist-in-charge shall				
17	notify the board, in writing, within ten days or, if any danger				
18	to the public health or safety exists, immediately. Any				
19	registered pharmacist, whether or not practicing in the same				
20	pharmacy, who has knowledge or suspicion of another registered				
21	pharmacy technician in violation of any law or rule regarding				

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1	the pract	ice of pharmacy, legend drugs, or controlled substances		
2	<u>shall not</u>	ify the board, in writing, within ten days or, if any		
3	danger to	danger to the public health or safety exists, immediately."		
4	SECT	ION 2. Section 461-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
5	amended b	y adding three new definitions to be appropriately		
6	inserted	and to read as follows:		
7	" <u>"</u> Au	xiliary pharmacy personnel" means a person who works in		
8	<u>a pharmac</u>	y assisting a registered pharmacist or registered		
9	pharmacy	technician and who may perform the following:		
10	(1)	Retrieval tasks, such as retrieving prescriptions or		
11		<u>files;</u>		
12	(2)	Clerical tasks, such as data entry, typing labels, and		
13		maintaining patient profiles;		
14	(3)	Tasks such as selling prescriptions, telephoning,		
15		filing, and typing;		
16	(4)	Accounting tasks, such as recordkeeping, maintaining		
17		accounts receivables, third-party billing, and		
18		posting;		
19	(5)	Inventory control tasks, such as monitoring, pricing,		
20	•	dating, invoicing, stocking pharmacy, and preparing		
21		purchase orders; and		



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1	(6) Custodial tasks, such as helping maintain a clean and
2	orderly pharmacy.
3	"Registered pharmacy technician" means a person, exclusive
4	of pharmacy interns and auxiliary pharmacy personnel, registered
5	with the board pursuant to section 461- , who may, in addition
6	to the tasks of an auxiliary pharmacy personnel, perform
7	filling, packaging, manipulative, repetitive, or other
8	nondiscretionary tasks, and tasks specified in section 461-11.4,
9	only while assisting and while under the supervision and control
10	of a registered pharmacist.
11	"Supervision" means the direction and oversight of a
12	registered pharmacy technician or pharmacy intern by a
13	responsible registered pharmacist at all times when the
14	registered pharmacy technician or pharmacy intern performs acts
15	specified in this chapter or rules adopted pursuant to this
16	chapter."
17	SECTION 3. Section 461-4.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
18	amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
19	"(a) In addition to any other powers and duties authorized
20	by law, the board:

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1	(1)	Shall adopt, amend, and repeal rules pursuant to
2		chapter 91, as it deems proper for the purposes of
3		this chapter, Public Law 100-293, and title 21 Code of
4		Federal Regulations part 205;
5	(2)	Shall examine, license, reinstate, and renew the
6		licenses of qualified applicants for registered
7		pharmacists and wholesale prescription drug
8		distributors[]; issue certificates of registration
9		for registered pharmacy technicians; and issue and
10		renew permits to operate pharmacies;
11	(3)	May require the inspection of any wholesale
12		prescription drug distributor premises in the State to
13		ensure compliance with this chapter and rules adopted
14		under this chapter, or may require an applicant for a
15		pharmacy license to submit a statement that the
16		premises, including but not limited to security and
17		sanitation, are in conformance with the board's
18		requirements and that the applicant possesses the
19		reference materials and technical clinical equipment
20		and supplies as may be specified in rules adopted
21		under this chapter;

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May fine, suspend, or revoke any license, 1 (4) 2 registration, or permit for any cause prescribed by 3 this chapter, or for any violation of the rules adopted under this chapter, and refuse to grant or 4 renew any license, registration, or permit for any 5 cause which would be ground for revocation or 6 7 suspension of a license, registration, or permit; May deny a license to any applicant who has been 8 (5) 9 disciplined by another state or federal agency. Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, a final order 10 11 of disciplinary action taken pursuant to this paragraph shall be a matter of public record; and 12 13 May approve pilot and demonstration research projects (6) 14 for innovative applications in the practice of pharmacy; provided that the projects shall not include 15 therapeutic substitution or substitution of a medical 16 device used in patient care; provided further that 17 nothing in this paragraph shall be construed to expand 18 19 the definition of "practice of pharmacy" [as defined] 20 under section 461-1. The board may also:

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1	(A)	Approve a provision that grants an exception to
2		any rule adopted under this paragraph;
3	(B)	Extend the time an exception to a rule is
4		granted, as may be necessary for the board to
5		adopt an amendment or modification to the rule;
6	(C)	Condition approval of a project upon compliance
7		with this section and any rules adopted under
8		this section; and
9	(D)	Rescind approval and terminate a project if, at
10		any time, a project fails to protect public
11		health or welfare."
12	SECTION 4	. Section 461-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
13	amended by ame	nding its title to read as follows:
14	"§ 461-5	[Qualifications] Registered pharmacists;
15	qualifications	for license."
16	SECTION 5	. Section 461-8, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
17	amended by ame	nding subsections (a) and (b) to read as follows:
18	"(a) All	licenses and permits issued by the board, except
19	temporary lice	nses issued under section 461-7, shall be renewed
20	biennially on a	or before December 31 of each odd-numbered year.
21	Failure to pay	the biennial fee and[, beginning with the renewal

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1	for the licensing biennium commencing on January 1, 2008,] to
2	satisfy the continuing education requirement on or before
3	December 31 of each odd-numbered year, shall constitute a
4	forfeiture of the license as of the date of expiration. Failure
5	to pay the biennial fee on or before December 31 of each
6	odd-numbered year shall constitute a forfeiture of the permit as
7	of the date of expiration.
8	(b) Any license or permit forfeited pursuant to subsection
9	(a) may be restored within three years upon payment of any
10	penalty fee, the current biennial fees, and the renewal fee for
11	the next biennium, if applicable, upon submission of proof of
12	compliance with the continuing education requirement for the
13	prior biennium, and upon meeting any other requirements
14	specified in rules adopted pursuant to chapter 91."
15	SECTION 6. Section 461-9, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
16	amended by amending subsections (b) and (c) to read as follows:
17	"(b) No person shall practice as a pharmacy intern without
18	having first obtained a permit from the board. The board shall
19	adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91 defining the functions of a
20	pharmacy intern, establishing the requirements to be met by an
21	applicant for a pharmacy intern permit, and specifying the

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1	duration of the permit and the procedures for the immediate
2	supervision of the pharmacy intern by a registered
3	pharmacist[-]; provided that the supervising registered
4	pharmacist shall supervise the actions of the pharmacy intern.
5	(c) A <u>registered</u> pharmacy technician may be employed to
6	[assist the] perform filling, packaging, manipulative,
7	repetitive, or other nondiscretionary tasks, and tasks specified
8	in section 461-11.4, only while assisting and while under the
9	supervision and control of a registered pharmacist and under
10	rules adopted by the board pursuant to chapter 91 [that define
11	the qualifications and functions of the pharmacy technician and
12	provide the procedures for control and supervision by a
13	registered pharmacist]."
14	SECTION 7. Section 461-11.4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
15	amended by amending subsections (a) through (d) to read as
16	follows:
17	"(a) A pharmacist, pharmacy intern, or <u>registered</u> pharmacy
18	technician under the direct supervision of a registered
19	pharmacist may administer a vaccine to a person three years of
20	age or older; provided that:

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1	(1)	The vaccine is authorized or approved by the United
2		States Food and Drug Administration;
3	(2)	The vaccine has been ordered by a registered
4		pharmacist and administered in accordance with the
5		recommendations of the Advisory Committee on
6		Immunization Practices of the United States Department
7		of Health and Human Services;
8	(3)	The pharmacy intern has completed a practical training
9		program approved by the Accreditation Council for
10		Pharmacy Education that includes hands-on injection
11		technique, clinical evaluation of indications and
12		contraindications of vaccines, and the recognition and
13		treatment of emergency responses to vaccines;
14	(4)	The registered pharmacy technician has completed a
15		practical training program approved by the
16		Accreditation Council for Pharmacy Education that
17		includes hands-on injection technique;
18	(5)	The registered pharmacy technician has a Certified
19		Pharmacy Technician certification from either the
20		Pharmacy Technician Certification Board or National
21		Healthcareer Association;





1	(6)	The <u>registered</u> pharmacist, pharmacy intern, or
2		registered pharmacy technician has a current
3		certificate in basic cardiopulmonary resuscitation;
4	(7)	The registered pharmacist or registered pharmacy
5		technician has completed a minimum of two credit hours
6		in immunization-related continuing education courses
7		during each licensing biennium;
8	(8)	The <u>registered</u> pharmacist is in compliance with all
9		applicable recordkeeping and reporting requirements,
10		including complying with adverse events reporting
11		requirements;
12	(9)	The <u>registered</u> pharmacist, pharmacy intern, or
13		registered pharmacy technician has reviewed the
14		patient's vaccination records before administering the
15		vaccine;
16	(10)	The registered pharmacist has informed the patient and
17		the patient's primary guardian or caregiver of the
18		importance of a well-child visit with a pediatrician
19		or other licensed primary care provider and has
20		referred the patient as appropriate; and

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Where a prescription has been ordered by a person 1 (11)2 other than the registered pharmacist, the registered 3 pharmacist, pharmacy intern, or registered pharmacy technician shall verify that the prescriber or the 4 prescriber's authorized agent is the patient's medical 5 6 home. After the vaccination is administered, the registered 7 (b) 8 pharmacist, pharmacy intern, or registered pharmacy technician 9 under the direct supervision of a registered pharmacist shall 10 immediately provide to the patient a vaccination record 11 including the following information: 12 The patient's name and date of birth; (1)The type of vaccine administered; and 13 (2) 14 The date and location that the vaccine was (3) administered. 15 The registered pharmacist, pharmacy intern, or 16 (C) 17 registered pharmacy technician under the direct supervision of a registered pharmacist shall make a good faith effort to provide 18 19 within seventy-two hours to the medical home and within five business days to the department of health immunization registry 20

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

18	suspend a	ny license, registration, or permit applied for or	
19	issued by	the board, in accordance with this chapter, and fine	
20	or otherw	rise discipline a licensee, registrant, or permit holder	

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1	for any c	ause authorized by law, including but not limited to	
2	the following:		
3	(1)	Procuring a license or registration through fraud,	
4		misrepresentation, or deceit;	
5	(2)	Professional misconduct, gross carelessness, or	
6		<pre>manifest incapacity;</pre>	
7	(3)	Permitting an unlicensed or unregistered person to	
8		perform activities that require a license <u>or</u>	
9		registration under this chapter;	
10	(4)	Violation of any of the provisions of this chapter or	
11		the rules adopted pursuant [thereto;] to this chapter;	
12	(5)	Violation of any [state or] federal <u>or state</u> drug,	
13		controlled substance, or poison law;

6		with section 461-11.4; or
7	(12)	Prescribing or dispensing contraceptive supplies
8		without complying with section 461-11.6.
9	(b)	Any person who violates any of the provisions of this
10	chapter o	r the rules adopted pursuant [thereto] <u>to this chapter</u>
11	shall be	fined [not] <u>no</u> less than \$100 [nor] <u>and no</u> more than
12	\$1,000 for each violation.	
13	(c)	All proceedings for denial, suspension, fine, or
14	revocation of a license, registration, or permit on any grounds	
15	specified in subsection (a) shall be conducted pursuant to	
16	chapter 91, including the right of judicial review."	
17	SECT	ION 9. Section 26H-6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, shall
18	not apply to this Act.

Board of Pharmacy; Registered Pharmacy Technicians; Certificate of Registration; Pharmacists-in-charge; Supervision

Description:

Beginning 1/1/2026, requires pharmacy technicians to be registered with and obtain a certificate of registration from the Board of Pharmacy. Imposes a duty on pharmacists-in-charge to report violations conducted by registered pharmacy technicians. Specifies that supervising registered pharmacists are responsible for the actions of registered pharmacy technicians and pharmacy interns. Effective 12/31/2050. (SD1)
